COUNCIL NEWS March 2022

The meeting was recorded and available for viewing on Council's website https://bit.ly/35uKFxX

Business dealt with at the 16 March 2022 meeting included:

Council agrees to support and participate in the Australian Local Government Association's advocacy for their endorsed national funding priorities by writing to the local Federal Member(s) of Parliament, all known election candidates in local Federal electorates and the President of the Australian Local Government Association. The national funding priorities of the Australian Local Government Association (ALGA), would contribute an estimated \$6.46 billion per year to Australia's GDP and create 43,444 jobs.

Council resolved to move the June meeting from 15 June to 22 June to allow for appropriate review and endorsement of the Community Strategic Plan, Delivery / Operational Plan and 2022/23 Budget.

The Local Preference Purchase policy was endorsed for a 28 day public exhibition.

Council endorsed applications to the Building Better Regions Fund for the Culcairn Town Centre Accessibility, Streetscape and Drainage Works, and the 26 Lot expansion of the Jindera Industrial Estate.

Council resolved to make superannuation contributions to Councillors in accordance with Section 254B of the Local Government Act 1993.

Council appointed Hutchinson Civil P/L for tender TL08 2021/2022 for the Construction of Roundabout at Urana Street/Pioneer Drive at a cost of \$499,430.00 (excl. GST).

Council resolved that sale of residential vacant allotment Lot 1, DP 503816, 48 Wilson Street, Holbrook and sale of residential property – Lot 12 Section 758522, 65 Peel Street, Holbrook will proceed to public auction.

Council resolved the General Manager will enter into negotiations for the sale of 96 – 100 Main Street, Brocklesby – Former Brocklesby Hotel – Lot 18 DP 6431 And Lots A And B DP 413482.

Council resolved to accept the Expression of Interest from the Bathla Group for the purchase of 5ha of vacant land at Holbrook.

Spicy Apple Cake

In a large basin, put 2 large apples – peeled, cored and cut into 1.5 cm chunks

Add 1 cup castor sugar and mix together.

1 tspn bicarb soda

1 ½ tspns ground cinnamon



1/2 tspn nutmeg

1 ¾ cup plain flour

Mix the spices soda and flour together and sift over apples.

1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts or pecans - optional

- 1 egg whisked
- 1 1/2 tspns vanilla essence

125 g butter - melted and cooled

Mix altogether.

Press mixture into 23-24 cm round tin, or oblong lamington pan lined with baking paper. Mix $\frac{1}{4}$ cup sugar and $\frac{1}{2}$ tspn cinnamon and sprinkle over cake before putting in oven. Bake in moderate oven for 40 - 45 minutes for round tin, 30 mins for lamington pan.

<u>New NBN Tower at</u> <u>Burrumbuttock</u>

The tower is now active, so anybody in the coverage footprint can apply through their chosen Retail Service Provider (RSP's) for a new fixed wireless NBN service.

The Fixed Wireless service is an improvement on the existing satellite service in relation to available download allowance plans, as well as reduced delay in the network.

Plans are available through a large number of providers, so it **is worth checking plans** and offers.

NBN as the wholesaler is not permitted to advise on RSP's, so residents and businesses

should do their own research.

The coverage extends around 14km from the tower, however, there are some areas where

terrain will block the signal.

The best way to determine if Fixed Wireless is available is to check your address at this website:

https://www.nbnco.com.au/connect-homeor-business/check-your-address.

This will indicate if the delivery technology is **Fixed Wireless or Satellite.**

It is important to note that many locals will be using satellite, but can now switch to Fixed

Wireless if their location is covered by the tower.

\$10k & \$50k applications open to help rebuild regional communities

The Morrison Government is continuing to back regional Australia, providing small grant funding to help towns and communities recover and grow on the other side of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Local MP Sussan Ley says applications are now open for the new **Rebuilding Regional Communities Program**, offering local business and community or sporting groups a chance to apply for up to \$10,000 or \$50,000 to fund initiatives for places hit hardest by the pandemic.

Wirraminna News

Wirraminna was a very busy place this month. Schools are back, and we have had a Birdlife Australia event and a visit by some participants from the Weeds Conference in Albury. It has been such a pleasure to have so many people enjoying the place that so many of us have worked to create

Stacee has hosted several schools already during the first school term, and has many bookings for terms two and three. Schools bring students from Kinder to year 6, and Stacee has activities to suit them all. She sees it as very important that the children get out into the natural environment and begin to understand its diversity and the life that occurs there. The younger children may do a Bush Treasure Hunt, in which they are asked to search for a number of "treasures" such as a feather, a nice piece of bark, and a flower. This encourages them to explore and to look for natural things. While doing this they can notice so many other things.

The older children do a "ghost" hunt, during which they search for white cut-out silhouettes of the animals and birds scattered around the park that feature on our ghost sign. These are animals that used to occur in our region, but are now mostly gone. Only one is extinct; most of the others still occur elsewhere, but are no longer here. A couple were thought to be gone from our area but have since turned up again, maybe as a result of all the landcare planting. The ghost sign is near the Discovery Centre.

Another activity involves a search for animal puppets that are hidden in the habitat that they use (in a tree, under a log, in a grass tussock) while the students have to decide which animal is in the "wrong" habitat. This activity encourages a discussion of the importance of different habitats for different species.

We have quite often met families visiting Wirraminna because their children have been here with their school and want to show it off to their parents. These school visits are among the most important reasons for creating and maintaining Wirraminna.

Last weekend Birdlife Australia held a gathering of participants in the Birds on Farms surveys, which involve repeated 20 minute bird counts over a two hectare site on their farms. During the morning two groups did a survey, one on the Wirraminna Park and the other in the Burrumbuttock Woodland. Five species were seen in the woodland while 16 species were seen in the park. This reflects the complex vegetation environment we have created in the park, while the woodland is still a work in progress.

The Weeds Conference visitors had a fairly quick visit, but we had some interesting conversations about weed management and they were very complimentary about our park.

We have noticed Bogong moths visiting our Preschool this week. We explored them in the yard, collected one in our bug collector to take a closer look at and read the Traditional Wiradjuri Aboriginal story Myee, the Bogong Moth Woman that shares how the wild flower gained their colours. We have also recently learning more about our resident Golden Orb spiders. We have two of them, one living near our flag poles and the other on the pole of a shade structure. We have learnt about their golden webs, what they eat and that they have a smaller spider that lives with them to do the cleaning of the web by eating smaller insects that get caught in the web.
