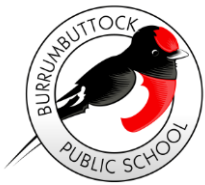

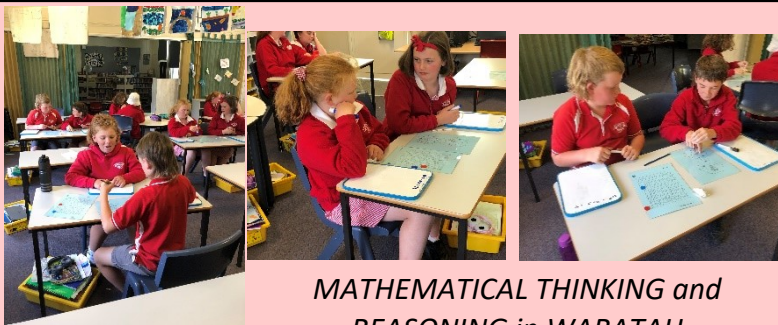

Burrumbuttock Forum Report

Despite a plea to the community to help save the Burrumbuttock Forum from falling into disfunction, only seven people attended the hoped for rescue meeting, on Wednesday evening 17th November.

However, while the Forum is presently without a president, Marion Vile chaired the meeting, and although the attendance was disappointing, she proceeded with meeting.

Janice Whitty reported that estimate for the construction of the new recreation ground complex had gone up, with the first stage toilet block increasing from \$168,000, to over \$300,000.

The total cost of the proposal was now over \$2-million. Greater Hume Shire had indicated that at some point in the future it could be in a position to make a contribution, but the committee first needed to obtain some grant funds. A number of grant applications were currently in the pipeline, and they would keep applying for grants, she reported.

Other matters which needed attention included upgrading street lighting, the need for maintenance to be carried out on Cemetery Road, the erection of the tourist information sign board at Schmidt Park, and the possible installation of a disable parking spot at the hall.

It was decided to hold another meeting on 19th January, with a view of preparing a submission to Greater Hume Council, in time to be considered at the council's February estimates meeting.

Garden Day at the Elms

It was a lovely sunny day on the 17 November for a Garden Party at Elizabeth and John Newton's. The Burrumbuttock Lutheran Church Ladies Fellowship worked incredibly hard for the event, with plant/ craft/ food stall tables groaning under the weight of the items for sale, and they provided afternoon tea for the near 100 hundred people who attended. Everyone enjoyed the event and were very happy with the amount raised for the various charities..

Brocklesby and Burrumbuttock Netball Club Recruiting Coaches

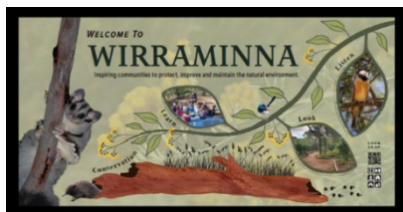

Wirraminna News

It has been an odd year for everyone. At Wirraminna we were lucky to be able to be reasonably normal. As the custodians of a Greater Hume Shire property, maintenance of the site was regarded as an essential service, so we were able to continue working, outdoors, and with appropriate distancing, as required at different times during the year.

The main change was the absence of many visiting schools, which we found sad, as it is one of the reasons for our existence. However, we still have quite a lot to look back on with satisfaction, and the weather has been very kind.

Signs and gabions The Park entrance has had an upgrade, to live up to the re-built visitors' shelter. Gabions and seats look good, and provide a lot of new habitat crannies for lizards and native bees and wasps. All setting off our interesting new sign. Most of other signs around the park have also been renovated with some to be replaced when funds are available.

Toilet and garden

The much-needed toilet block has been built, and is much appreciated by office staff and volunteers and when we have school visits. It will be kept locked for security at other times. The old composting toilet has served us well and will still be available for casual visitors. Unfortunately, the building required removal of quite a large section of garden but then provided the opportunity to plant more plants. Part of the pleasure of gardening is the occasional need for renewal.

Nelder planting

Much of the winter was taken up with preparation of beds and planting in the Climate Resilience gardens in the Nelder. It is a bit ironic that our choice of drought resistance plants has been met with a wet spring and the likelihood of a wet summer to follow. But we plant for the future and it is great not to have to do a lot of early establishment watering.

Full dam

The dam is now full to over-flowing and the margins are responding with a flush of wetland plants. It was a great pleasure to hear a Reed Warbler in this new habitat.

Security cameras

It was a very bad experience to have 3 serious thefts from our sheds over the last year or so. Luckily the Greater Hume Shire insurance covered much of the loss, but we have had to install an extensive camera and alarm system to feel secure enough to replace the equipment we need.

Nail Can Hill bed

This bed displays wildflowers and shrubs that occur on Nail Can Hill near Albury, some of which no longer grow further west in the Burrumbuttock locality. It has suffered neglect in recent years while we were busy elsewhere. The bed has been replanted this year and now contains some lovely plants we don't have anywhere else in the park.

Fish and frogs

The fish and frogs in the Discovery Centre are thriving. It was believed that there were only 6 of the original 8 frogs in the Corroboree Frog tank, all of which have been photographed and numbered, so they can be identified individually. They all have distinct patterns. But an audit this year found that number 7 had been there all along, which explains why sometimes it was hard to decide who was who. It is rare that more than a few can be seen at once. They spend a lot of time in their moss tunnels.

We had a boost in the fish populations this year, thanks to Luke Pearce from DPI Fisheries: some Olive Perchlets, Purple-spotted Gudgeons and additional Rainbow Fish to add the numbers of these attractive little fish. They are all fairly young, but have settled in well.

Squirrel Gliders

The many nest boxes in the park and the Burrum Woodland have been regularly monitored, and is interesting to detect the coming and going of the Gliders. This demonstrates the need to have a lot of available boxes or natural hollows as they never stay in one place for long.

Woodland/grassland

The trees in the Burrumbuttock Woodland have enjoyed the wonderful growing year and are beginning to look like a woodland. The native grassland, particularly in the top bay of Kangaroo grass, is doing very well and the wildflowers are spreading across the site.

The Saltbush Snake

The dam bank along the Howlong Rd boundary has been a bit of a no-mans-land until recently, but close inspection will reveal the birth of a winding silver snake, which will gradually grow and become a feature 'plant installation' as it winds along the bank and dips beneath the paths

Stacee

We were delighted to welcome Stacee back from maternity leave in the middle of the year. While Maddy did a good job standing in for her, Stacee knows Wirraminna so well, and keeps everything on such an even keel that no one could fill her shoes.

Activities

We have a close relationship with West Hume Landcare Group. And hosted a plant give-away during the winter when distributed several thousand local native plants to landholders in the area. We also hosted a Brekkie and Birds morning with west Hume which was very well attended, in two shifts, and led by Dave Watson.

Wirraminna, Petaurus and Greater Hume Council

The question has been asked often of our volunteers as to what is Petaurus Education Group and how is it connected to Wirraminna.

Petaurus was established many years ago as a standalone organization to provide Environmental Education to School Children. Its operation is funded by grants solely sourced by Petaurus staff. Wirraminna's costs relating to maintenance and improvements to the park are met by a small annual grant from Council and donations from visiting school groups, visitors and some small bus groups. However, Petaurus Education Group contributes to the office expenses for Wirraminna, as it uses this space for staff that it employs such as Stacey.

Paula Sheehan, the Regional Landcare Coordinator, has given us great support through the year, writing applications and winning funding for projects such as the Nelder Climate Resilience project and helping with project management and reporting. She also rolls up her sleeves and gets her hands dirty in getting the jobs done. We are very grateful for her support.

Greater Hume Shire Council has given Wirraminna strong support, helping us to deal with the robberies, providing funds for the toilet, and an annual maintenance grant, as they do to all Section 355 committees.

Thanks to volunteers

It has been a busy year which could not happen without our volunteers, who all bring different talents, skills, ideas and make Wirraminna happen. It is amazing what we have achieved. We can give so much pleasure to visitors, who enjoy the gardens and the 'patch of bush' that can be found in our 4-hectare site. And after a lock-down year, our first school for many months came back this month, with Eskdale Primary School having a very busy day under Stacey's guidance.

Grassy Woodlands Project - new round open!

The 3rd round of the **Grassy Woodlands Project** is now open! Are you a landholder keen to protect and enhance remnant native vegetation or revegetate new areas on your property? Or perhaps you'd like to enhance old shelterbelts by understory planting or direct seeding. We are pleased to launch a new round of funding for the Grassy Woodlands project for landholders in the West Hume and Corowa District Landcare areas, supported by Murray Local Land Services.

Both rode in memory of their Nanny Gwennie Hall and are planning bigger things next year. Peter and Matthew would like to say a huge thankyou to everyone who sponsored them and helped them to go way beyond their fundraising goals. They encourage others to get riding and join them next October.

Business dealt with at the meeting included:

Council's external auditor Mr Brad Bohun from Crowe, attended to report on the conduct of the 2020/2021 audit and the financial result for the year ending 30 June 2021.

Council agreed to offer a contribution of \$88,270 (exc. GST) to the developer of the approved 43 Lot subdivision at Yankee Crossing Road Henty to locate the sewerage pumping station on Yankee Crossing Road rather than in the lane adjacent to the Olympic Highway.

Council agreed to delegate the civic and ceremonial functions of the position of Mayor to the incumbent Mayor (Cr Wilton) from 4 December 2021 until a Mayor is elected in the week commencing 10 January 2022.

Council will call for Expressions of Interest from Real Estate Agents to appoint an Agent to market Lot 2 DP 610499 at Holbrook (known as Camden Forest).

Council confirmed ongoing membership of Riverina Regional Library for the term 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2025.



Council will give notice of withdrawal from the Riverina Regional Library Mobile Library Service effective 30 June 2024. Various models of operation are being explored to continue to provide library services post 30 June 2025.

Council noted the introduction of the new rate peg methodology effective 1 July 2022 from the Office of Local Government.

The Lease Agreement with John Holland Transport Asset Holding Entity for the Walla Walla Rural Fire Station will be renewed.

Council approved the extension of the NSW Grain Harvest Management Scheme for the next 12 months to 30 September 2022.

Subject to valuation, Council approved the purchase of 95-99 Albany Street, Holbrook.

Council is currently reviewing the Community Strategic Plan. There are a number of opportunities for the community to contribute to the development of the plan.
