

Burrumbuttock Forum Report

At the May meeting of the Burrumbuttock Forum Ashley Lindner was congratulated on being elected to Greater Hume Shire Council.

The meeting was informed that no response had been received from the Shire Road Safety Officer, regarding the installation to traffic control signals at the entrance to the village along Howlong Road. This was believed to be because the Road Safety Officer had resigned, so it was resolved to renew the request, this time to the Shire Engineer, Mr Greg Blackie.

Walking track – Cr Lindner said the Urana section of the walking track is unused due its poor condition, forcing walkers to use the road side edge. This section needs to be widened, cleared, and gravelled.

Walla Road – J. Litchfield renewed his called for Walla Road to receive some maintenance grading. Consideration should also be given to widening the road, as it is used by a large number of heavy vehicles, and can be dangerous.



Glider Pole – As part of the program to increase awareness of the Squirrel Glider program, hoped to erect a Squirrel Glider tower, somewhere prominently in the village. This pole would be painted with images of the gliders and decorated appropriately. It was suggested that two poles could be erected diagonally opposite each other at the main intersection in Burrumbuttock. Anyone with suggestions should contact Stacee Bell.

Footpath extension - Cr Lindner reported that the school wished to have the Howlong Road footpath be

extended from its present end, opposite the school, along Howlong Road, to adjacent the preschool. This would allow for a more convenient movement of pupils between the two facilities.

Information Signs — Despite an undertaking by council to install an information sign adjacent to Schmidt Park, and subsequent requests from the Forum, no sign has appeared. The matter should be raised again with the council.

School Bus Routes – It has been some considerable time since Stoney Park Road, and Walla Road have received any maintenance grading, and is now well overdue. Council is to be asked to undertake this work.



The Tip (Transfer Station) – Marion Vile reported she had spoken to Council staff about the dilapidated and untidy surrounds at the tip, with a view to organising a clean up of the area. She was informed that council had the matter in hand, and the situation would be attended to shortly.

Flower Show — An enthusiastic group of folk has come together and agreed to hold another flower show, which is to be held on Sunday October 30th. Ms Christine Nesbit agreed to become the co-ordinator. There is a possibility of a grant of up to \$10,000 being obtained for the show.

Town entrance - Concern was expressed at the failure of council to clean up the dead wattle trees at the southern approach to Burrumbuttock, despite a previous request for the improvement to the village's approach.

It was resolved to write to the council, informing it of the issues concerning the Forum and requesting action. Next general meeting and AGM – 6th July 2022.

LANGUAGE STUDIES

Banksia and Waratah have immersed themselves in language studies this year. Last term we learnt Polish, this term we are learning German (with Japanese, and Auslan to follow next Semester). Exposure to different languages, even if it is learning just a few new sentences, or vocabulary, can increase a child's problem-solving ability, improve memory retention, and develop a greater empathy and acceptance of different cultures. Here are some keen volunteers practising saying "hello, how are you, my name is..." in German.

Hello, and here we are again, slightly sorer than last time, ready to head into round 8. It's been an interesting couple weeks, with some surprise results for a few teams, also packed with milestone games, interleague and casseroles!

A grade were in it to win it against Culcairn in round 4, but lost their legs in the last half, with Culcairn coming away with the chocolates. We had a thriller at Coreen for round 5 against CDHBU, where it was goal for goal up until the last quarter, but again we couldn't make it over the line. It was a wet and miserable day at Osborne for round 6, where our A grade got beat convincingly by the well oiled machine that is the Osborne netball team. When we met a 6th placed Lockhart for round 7, the team played the most cohesive game they've played all season, only losing by a couple of goals. B grade were strong from the beginning against Culcairn, with their attack setting the standard for the rest of the league. They came away with the win to be followed by a close one against a surging CDHBU but our girls held on, 39-44. Not to make excuses or anything, but B grade have been the unluckiest team in the club this year with illness and injury, they've really worked hard to rally with the bare minimum of players on occasion. Round 6 against a 2nd placed Osborne was one of these occasions. The girls kept fighting to the final whistle, but unfortunately they were dealt their first loss. Luckily, they bounced back. They dealt with Lockhart, 43-30. C grade have been on a tear and have been looking stronger and stronger each week. They won against Culcairn without too many issues and put CDHBU away in a close-ish sort of game. Their little win streak came to an end however against Osborne, where they lost, 29-52. With promise of team pizzas the next week, the girls were on the hunt against Lockhart! They got it done easily 70-18, and they got their pizzas from coach Del.

C reserve is another team who have been marred by injury, so they're to be commended for doing as well as they have been. The girls got it done over Culcairn 53-34, followed by another even more convincing win at Coreen 48-15. Again, however, Osborne were too strong for the Ressie girls and they were dealt a loss. Looking to get on the winners list, they had a tight game against an always strong Lockhart, winning by 3 goals.

In our U17s, the girls have been hunting for their first win. We came close against Culcairn, but lacked a bit of fitness to get it done in the last quarter. We were right with CDHBU for about the first half, but again our fitness let us down and we lost that one 40-25. The girls had an outstanding game in the wet against Osborne, with us thinking they play better in the wet than in the dry. Osborne were just a bit better than us, but it was a great game regardless.

By round 7, these girls wanted a win bad, and finally we got one against Lockhart, the first win for the season, 43-16.

The U15s have still been chugging along strong, but have had a few close calls. It was a close game against Culcairn, but the girls withstood their attack and came away with the win. CDHBU was another challenging opponent, but our girls were just one step ahead of them. Osborne and Lockhart have been the closest wins the team has had this season, which has been great, showing what these young girls are made of.

Our U13s have been another dark horse of the competition, currently on the top of the ladder. They beat Culcairn, CDHBU and Osborne without too many dramas. They were pushed by Lockhart, who are 2nd on the ladder, and I am pleased to say, the girls won, 36-28. I cant wait to see what this little team does in the next few weeks!

The U11s team had a tough few weeks where they played a couple of the top teams consecutively. They lost to Culcairn, but bounced back against CDHBU with a great win of 6-12. They were with Osborne for much of the game, until the Osborne team ran away with the score, 19-10. This was followed by another tough day at the office for the girls against Lockhart. Watch this resilient team bounce back next week!


We had a big event recently at Wirraminna. Our book was launched by our local MP Justin Clancy, with about 40 volunteers, friends, and supporters down by the dam. Authored by Megan Graham, the book has been three years in the making; as like everything else, it was made more complicated by Covid 19. The book is not just a history of Wirraminna, fascinating as some us would find that, but a story of how and why Wirraminna happened, and what impact it can have on the people who spend time here, as either volunteers or as visitors.

As well as the regular stream of casual visitors who call in as they are passing, or for a picnic, we have visits from many community groups such as Probus, the Albury Camera Club, and Field Naturalists, who have all visited in the last couple of months. Some groups like to have a talk and guided tour from volunteers. Others just come and spend time here to see what is going on.

While we welcome all these groups, the most important visitors are the school groups. During the two years of Covid lock-downs, very few schools were able to visit, but this year they are back. Stacee is fully booked for the two cool terms of this year, with schools coming as far as from Lockhart and Oaklands, and from Victoria. The groups include Preschoolers and Kinder to year six. These students do a range of activities, which are

all aimed at getting them out into nature, learning to look, find, and experience the feel and sound of the environment. Some secondary schools also come, to carry out field measurements, and learn to describe vegetation and the environment. Most schools in the region bring their students back year after year and casual visitors often tell us that they are here because their children have told them about us.

Another bird tale By ColinWiltshire

Our dam has been the source of some considerable interest over the years, and in recent times I've written about a few happenings. The last couple of weeks has seen another story I thought was worth writing about. In this case its about the arrival of a Hoary-headed Grebe.

These Grebes are a widespread and quite common water bird, but still, you don't see them very often and while they are supposed to cluster in small groups I've only ever seen them alone. I've always called them 'Divers' and didn't know their real name until I looked up the Readers Digest, 'Complete Australian' bird book; which states they have no other name. Diver is another name for the Australian Grebe.

Anyway, they've been a bird I've particularly regarded ever since I was a teenager, when with a so called 'mate' we were wandering about the countryside with rifles under our arms. We came across a Diver on a dam, and despite my protest, my 'mate', decided that since our hunting had otherwise been fruitless, he'd shoot the Grebe. While all other bird species, fly off when frightened or threatened, Grebe's defence is to just dive.

If I hadn't seen the next couple of minutes my own eyes, I would not have believed that these little fellas are faster than bullets. I forget how many time my associate shot at the grebe, maybe half a dozen or so. Each time a shot rang out it just dived, to reappear soon after a short distance away. It remained unscathed, despite the shot seeming to have been on target.

Despite his repeated attempts to shoot the innocent little bird, it just kept diving, content with its defence and showing no sign of wanting to fly off. Whether it saw the flash from the barrel warning it, or it actually saw the bullet coming, there was no way of knowing, but whichever, it's a remarkable ability. It certainly got the thumbs up from me.

Anyway, last year, for the first time, a lonely Grebe arrived on our dam, stayed about three or four weeks and disappeared again. About a month ago she arrived back again, cruising about the dam, occasionally delivering a brief piercing tweet, but as the days passed, she seemed to want the company of the Black ducks, and even approached anyone who came to the close to the dam.

Then. one morning there were two of them, and the darker head on the new arrival suggested it was a 'him'. Her interest in the Black ducks evaporated, and side-by-side the pair cruised about the water. But their bliss only lasted a couple of days.

Suddenly there were three, the latest arrival also with a darker head, and immediately obvious was his intention to disrupt the burgeoning love affair. The disharmony has been ongoing for three days, and the commotion which three little birds can cause is surprising. It goes on almost continuously throughout the day, with flapping charges across the surface, the intruder in flight, with mostly the other male on the attack, but sometimes it's the female.

When the chase is underway there's a continuous, loud, piercing and vibrating trill, something akin a hysterical Collingwood fan, with the Magpies one point behind, and a minute left on the clock, but with possession. I think the trill comes from the female, but it's hard to pinpoint amid the turbulence. But more intriguing, is the underwater tactics which is the bigger part of the contest. While the intruder appraises the situation at a comfortable distance, the incumbents seem to plan their next attack, often deciding on the underwater option.

Sometimes it's a solo foray, though mostly it's in tandem, but as soon as they dive, so does their quarry, and it nearly always ends in just another resultless ritual incident. However, on one occasion the intruder popped up under a fallen leafy branch of a willow tree lying in the water, maybe seeing it as a refuge, and hiding for some time-out.

But the girl saw it as an opportunity, and stealthily moved towards the branch, apparently undetected. Then she dived and must have succeeded, since a moment later the male suddenly erupted from the water, and in a flapping panic shot to the other side of the dam. She just watched, no doubt with a great sense of satisfaction.

It seems obvious what's going on. The two males reckoning the female to ready for some intimate companionship, which they both wish to share. But their breeding season is from November to January, so it's anyone's guess what's the motivation for all the exuberance.
