#### **Australia Day/Invasion Day**

The Waratah Class at Burrumbuttock Primary School have been having intellectual discussions about a range of issues related to Australia Day/Invasion Day. We are learning to express our opinions and listen to other's points of view respectfully, and with an open mind. Here are some of our opinions:

"We should celebrate Australia Day because we are all different and no matter who you are, you shall be accepted to live in Australia. It doesn't matter who you are or how you look, you're allowed. We should all celebrate it because it is the day, we became Australian".

"We shouldn't celebrate Australia Day, because people get offended and we celebrate it because the white people came and took over the Aboriginal life and land. So Aboriginal people today can be against it. I think it's not fair, and there are white people today who agree and think it's not fair too".

"We should celebrate Australia Day so our people are happy. But also give a bit of land to the Aboriginal people or help them in any way we can. We should have an Aboriginal Day where we can learn about the Aboriginal people".

"Everyone is working on making Australia Day equal. Maybe we could have a celebration for the people that celebrate and a commemoration for the people that think it is a sad day. But pay equal respect to all people. I think we could celebrate on the 26th, but then on the 25th commemorate. Sometime in the near future we will think about it and find a solution".

"The Prime Minister should not have changed the National Anthem because we want to talk about the future not the past. We are not all one person so we should keep it as 'young and free'. We have to join everyone in it not just some people. We should not change it because it has been like that for a long time".

"The Prime Minister should have changed the National Anthem because Australia isn't young and we should all be known as one, because no matter who you are, we can all live in Australia. Australia stuck around for 60,000 years before the white settlers came and took over, and it's still here now so we know it's not young anymore".

# Flower Show and Open Gardens postponed for 2021

The Public Hall committee met on 16<sup>th</sup> February with one of the agenda items being whether we went ahead this year with the Flower Show and Open Gardens.

All in attendance agreed that the Flower Show has been a very successful event in the past for over twenty years. The Public School P.& C. had notified us that they would be interested in running the kitchen this year, which was very profitable for them last time the Flower Show/Open Gardens was held in 2017.

Jenny Jacob had kindly sent through a document detailing the event coordinator's role broken down into different smaller roles to share the load across more people.

Kerrie Wise, Greater Hume Council, had provided some information regarding the COVID requirements for such an event. There would need to be people inside and outside the Hall supervising the Covid-distancing and at the gardens.

Food would need to be served in containers with a number of other requirements to be Covid-safe within the catering area. There would need to be a check-in QR code, or someone looking after a sign-in sheet. A Covid Coordinator would need to oversee all requirements.

At the meeting, however, there was concern about the number of volunteers available to plan the event through the coming months. Several people had been approached about opening their gardens but it was uncertain if enough could be found to stage the event successfully.

There was discussion that the ongoing Covid situation placed a lot of extra demands on the whole event, including the need for more people to assist. There is still uncertainty about how Covid will impact over the coming year. It was felt that a lot of hard work and time might be put into planning the Flower Show/Open Gardens, for it to be cancelled closer to the time, due to another Covid outbreak.

So, unfortunately it was decided that the Flower Show/Open Gardens will not be held this year due to the impact of Covid virus.

Hopefully the event will be able to be held next year when vaccinations have been rolled out and there is more certainty. We recognize that there is a lot of pent-up demand for community events to be held again to bring people together after such a long period of minimal community activities during 2020.



A standing ovation was given to President Maurice Tynan for his outstanding commitment to the Club especially his Weekly Newsletter which we all enjoy receiving.



#### Mrs Pech still going strong!



Many of you will know Mrs Pech from her twenty five years of teaching at Burrumbuttock Public School. She was a well-respected teacher who focussed on the important things like the three 'R's' – reading, writing and arithmetic.

Mrs Chris Pech retired from teaching in 2015, but with two hip replacements, she is a new woman and is now working alongside her husband, John in their fencing contracting business.

I caught up with Chris on the Howlong-Burrumbuttock roadside as they worked on re-fencing some of the 'Holyrood' property. After we had a good chat about what all the kids were up to, she was happy to answer a few questions about her current outdoor work program.

What hours do you work? Do you work 5 days a week? Do you cancel the day if it's raining or very hot?

In summer we get up at 4:30, start at 6am and work till 2 or 2:30. In winter we start at 7:00 and work anything from an 8 1/2 to 10 hour day depending on where we are up to, and yes, we do work 5 days a week. The weather is irrelevant unless it actually rains **all** day.

What do you take with you each day?

Every morning I make our lunch (fruit and sandwiches, etc), a thermos of tea in winter and iced coffee in a

thermos in summer, as well as putting ice in our water bottles.

John's vehicle is always loaded up with crowbars, shovels, toolbox, wire and hinge joint strainers, tie wire, post drivers, sledgehammers, chainsaws, wire spinners, wet weather gear and lots of other things that come in handy.

How do all your years of teaching help with your new job as a fencing contractor?

I still know my times tables really well and I certainly use them on the job. I still get called Mrs Pech when we are working for parents of, and the children I have taught. Which I find very amusing.

How many metres of fencing do you usually do per day? Is there plenty of work?

We can erect about 160 metres a day, give or take, depending on the length of the strains and the amount of preparation needed.

We seem to always have at least 6 months of work ahead of us - which is good as we know what to look forward to.

How does the work satisfaction compare to teaching primary kids?!

The best parts about fencing are:


- the job satisfaction in seeing something very second rate replaced with a really strong good looking fence that you know will be there for decades.
- · the people we work for
- being out and about in the mornings and enjoying the countryside and I get exercised on the job, which is time saving. But our dogs don't agree - they liked my early morning walks on the farm.
- knowing that other people comment on the job we do.
- For me there is less pressure than teaching, but I do
  miss the relationships I had with each of my
  students. Wire does have a mind of its own, but it
  never answers back and I can't make it sit on the
  seats at lunch time.
- I do miss staff friendships and chatting to parents but both jobs are very worthwhile in their own way and if you know me well, you know I like to be able to look back at the end of every day and see something worthwhile achieved.



Over the years some have come and gone, as their life circumstances have changed, with a hard core ensuring the continuity of the park's development. At present we have a record number of helpers, and we would like to acknowledge their contribution. In no particular order:

- Pam, from the Albury-Wodonga Native Plant Society, who has great expertise and knowledge about growing native plants, and a skill in growing cuttings, so one successful plant can turn into several.
- Helen, also from the A-WNPS, who works with Pam and has a good knowledge and feel for the plants they grow in the garden beds.
- Tom, a member of the A-WNOS, has been battling ill health for some time, but we look forward to welcoming him back, for his IT skills and contribution to management of the garden beds
- Lou is a very experienced native gardener, and has been working with Pam and Helen to maintain and improve the garden beds. We miss her help during her period of ill-health and look forward to having her back soon.
- Estrella, who comes across the road, and does a great job raking paths, watering and keeping the area beautiful. She also feeds our fish every Tuesday.
- Angie comes back to Burrumbuttock from Howlong, and rakes, waters and weeds as the need arises.
- Marjorie, also from Howlong, has recently joined us. She has been a great help watering and has been discovered to be a wonderful water colour artist, creating lovely illustrations of some of the wildflowers in the Seed Production area.

- Trevor monitors and maintains the nest boxes, and is becoming well acquainted with the habits of our squirrel gliders and other possums, not to mention owls and owlet night-jars. He keeps valuable records of the nest box usage.
- Keiran has been responsible for much of the infrastructure in the park. He is a builder/creator, with a great eye for design, and has been responsible for the on-going transformation of the park entrance.
- Sue is one of the reasons Wirraminna is here, and has been making it all happen from the start. Her love of plants and
  for the protection of our fast-vanishing local flora, has shaped much of what we do at Wirraminna, particularly the
  restoration of the natural areas, and the development of the seed production area which underpins all the restoration
  efforts.

- Darryl, from the beginning, without whom probably none of it would happen, and still the one who holds it all together, while attending to so many detailed needs that the rest of us don't really notice.

# NEWS from the February 2021 meeting

Council is now allowing members of the public to attend the meeting in person, whilst complying with COVID 19 restrictions. The meeting is also recorded and available for viewing on Council's website <a href="https://bit.ly/35uKFxX">https://bit.ly/35uKFxX</a>

Council will continue to hold the monthly meetings at Holbrook Library Complex.

Business dealt with at the meeting included:

- Council recognised through a mayoral minute the passing of Mrs Gundula Holbrook and Cr Lilliane Brady OAM.
- Council resolved to recognise the loss of amenity of "Receptors" and acknowledge loss of Prime Agricultural Lands
  as significant aspects in consideration of determination of the Culcairn Solar Farm development before the IPC on
  that occasion in coming weeks.
- The General Manager has been asked to present a detailed report on financial support provided by Council to medical practitioners located in Greater Hume currently and over past years at a future meeting.
- Council approved a change of use and partial demolition of a metal fabrication and retail display of manufactured goods business in Holbrook.
- Council approved a development application for Extractive Industry at Wantagong.
- Council refused a development application for subdivision at Henty.
- Mr Peter O'Dwyer was selected as Council's appointee with planning expertise and Cr O'Neill was nominated as its Councillor representative on the Southern Regional Planning Panel.
- Council received and noted the 2017/2022 Delivery Plan and 2020/2021 Operational Plan review report to 31 December 2020 and approved the Interim Budget Review as at 31 December 2020.
- The Gilchrist Property Group was endorsed as the preferred tenderer of the proposed Multipurpose Sports Facility at Holbrook.
- Council authorised the Mayor and General Manager to affect the road closure and subsequent sale of the unused section of Nation Road to the applicant.
- Council did not authorise the road closure and subsequent sale of the unused section of road at Culcairn.
- Jindera Pony Club has been granted a further 5 year term with an option to renew on Reserve 94491 commencing 1 January 2021.
- A number of local sporting clubs will be donated the loam lifted from oval refurbishments at Culcairn, Henty, Holbrook and Jindera.
- Council resolved to authorise the General Manager to complete the acquisition of 124 Albury Street, Holbrook. A
  further report will be submitted to Council on future uses of the site once rehabilitated.

#### The Jindera Pioneer Museum, Opening - New Working Machines Shed, 21 March 2021

The Jindera Pioneer Museum will finally open their new Working Machines Shed on Sunday 21 March, 2021 at 11am, if Covid restrictions do not interfere. Lost Trades will also be featured on the day when the museum will be open to the public for a gold coin donation. Activities, skills, products and produce will be on site on the day, many created in ways that we rarely see today. The new working machines shed is dedicated to Tim Fischer who was a patron to the museum for many years. Tim's wife, Judy Brewer, will officially open the shed and many of the machines held within will be operational on the day. The new shed houses several old tractors of a variety of styles, vintages and brands. The 1916 Moline tractor is a particularly rare part of the collection and there are also several interesting engines that were used to run machinery on farms; the 1915 Ronaldson Tippet Austral engine is run regularly to the delight of visitors because of its deep sound and slow piston movement. The Deutscher "The Gem" oil engine is being restored and there are several small engines that are operational and on display. Another highlight in the working machines collection is the 1927 Oldsmobile. The 1915 Austral engine resided on the farm of Pete r Moll at Gerogery. the museum, from 1874 until his son Gus took over in 1914. 
