
And a Great Day was had by all.

Tomato pasta sauce

1kg ripe tomatoes, cored seeded, chopped, can be peeled

2 onions, sliced

4 cloves garlic, sliced

½ cup olive oil

Salt

Freshly ground black pepper

Red chilli – optional

Tumble tomatoes, onion, and garlic with oil and spread in a baking dish.

Bake, tightly covered, at 180 degrees C until tomatoes have collapsed and skins are golden brown and juices flowing – at least one hour. Season to taste.

Fresh herbs, olives, capers, etc. can be added after cooking when combining with cooked pasta.

Recipe can be easily doubled, but don't double the amount of oil. Freezes well.

It's a busy time for scammers by colin Wiltshire

The world of scamming has been growing steadily for many years and its growth seems to have been exponential the last couple of years, since the Chinese epidemic came along.

Attempts to steal your money can come over the phone, via facebook and by email. And they are growing more sophisticated all the time.

What is surprising is the number of scams coming via facebook when the company claims the welfare of its users is its priority, but bans some posts it considers scientifically or politically disagreeable, while allowing terrorist organisations and foreign state agencies, to propagate misleading propaganda.

Facebook also allows overtly scamming advertisements to appear, like a \$1800 chain saw for \$99 and a \$4500-odd excavator for \$125.62, and other such blatantly fraudulent adverts.

I'm aware of one case, where a local chap hoped he was buying a diesel pump worth \$1200-odd for just \$89. The scammers were good, issuing an invoice, contact phone number, and even a tracking number.


Supposedly the pump left America okay, with the tracking number showing it had arrived in Sydney, but then, mysteriously, it was mis-forwarded and disappeared into Queensland. Then communications with the supplier were disconnected.

It's a reminder of earlier days, when the internet was beginning to grow in capacity, and emails started arriving from Nigeria, claiming some government official had secured \$8-million, which he needed to get out of the country urgently. He'd needed to deposit it in a foreign bank account, and would like to use the receivers. If anyone agreed, they were then informed that it could only go if they paid the transfer fee. Ha-ha. Some people paid and paid, proving just how gullible and greedy some folk are.

The phone scammers all seem to have the same foreign accent and have names like Daniel, David, Paul, and Tony. Since these names are not common in India, the callers must come from somewhere else but I can't think where.

The phone numbers used by these scammers always used to come up as from overseas, allowing us to ignore them, but now overseas calls can be diverted through a local number apparently.

Typical phone attempts warn us that Amazon is going to withdraw money from our account unless we put a stop on our bank account, and



they can fix this for us. Or they tell us that our internet is due for disconnection unless we co-operate with them to remedy an identity problem.

The email scammers have been very busy in recent months, purporting to from our bank and needing to rectify our account numbers, or from Australia Post needing to verify our identity before our parcel can be delivered.

Wirraminna News

Restoration of the original woodland environment at Wirraminna involves two major activities: removal of introduced plants, and replacing them with the original grasses and wildflowers. To do this we need seed. This is why we have established a seed production area, as seed of most of our local species is not available.

Spring and summer are very busy times in the Seed Production Area, as each species does what plants do to ensure its survival: produces seed. If we don't manage to collect the seed, we have been wasting our time for the rest of the year. Some plants ripen and drop their seed all at once, and if you are not there at the right time you may lose it. Others ripen progressively over many weeks, and require many visits if we are to collect most of the seed. Particularly, in a year like this, some keep on flowering, and producing seed over many weeks. So this has been a very long harvest, and it is not finished yet.

What to do with all this seed? Some has been sent to Jayfields Nursery to grow plants, for use in Wirraminna, in the Burrumbuttock woodland or by Landcare. We have also provided Murray LLS with some seed for their planting projects. But most of our SPA plants are small understory and groundcover plants and there has not been a great demand for these.

So we have started to broadcast seed over our grassland restoration site to increase the diversity of plants there.

We were very pleased this month to be contacted by the Wodonga Native Garden Nursery, asking if we could supply them with seed. They were very happy to take seed of nearly 20 species, and in return will supply us with plants. We are very happy with this new relationship, as this volunteer group are very experienced with propagation, and supply large numbers of plants to landcare groups in Victoria. They are also interested in obtaining seed sourced from lower rainfall areas than Northeast Victoria, as they consider the prospect of a drier climate.

Wattles all year?

It is often said that there will be at least one wattle in flower every month of the year. Wirraminna has not yet achieved that, but two species are laying claim to February and March. The Deans Wattle and the Mulga are both in flower at present. They are both species that tend to flower in response to rain at any time of year, and are very welcome just now when no other species are out. They are near the path along the farm windbreak on the way to the SPA.







COUNCIL NEWS February 2022

The meeting was recorded and available for viewing on Council's website https://bit.ly/35uKFxX

Business dealt with at the 16 February 2022 meeting included:

Council will write to Albury City Council seeking re-establishment of the Lavington to Jindera Shared Path Working Group and investigate funding opportunities to undertake a feasibility study.

It was resolved that Council will seek support from the Hon. Sussan Ley MP, Member for Farrer to coordinate a meeting with the Hon. Paul Fletcher MP, Minister for Communication in relation to the poor mobile phone service throughout the Greater Hume Council area.

Council endorsed the submission made to the exhibition of the Draft State Significant Agricultural Land Map.

Council granted an extension of the swimming season at the Holbrook Pool to 20 March 2022, due to the need for a closure to undertake an abnormal clean earlier in the swimming season. The pool will be available to competitive swimmers training for events until 31 March on the provision that a qualified lifeguard provides supervision on a volunteer basis.

Council approved the Development Application (DA10.2021.72.1) for a service station, signage, landscaping and associated infrastructure on land described as Lots 1, 2 and 3 in DP12560 at Railway Parade and Sladen Street East subject to 56 conditions.

Council endorsed the draft Code of Meeting Practice, which will be advertised on Council website for public comment for a 28 day period commencing Monday 21 February.

Council agreed to allocate the \$56,754 remaining from the Henty Town Improvement Reserve to the Henty Sportsground Function Room extensions and refurbishment project.

Council endorsed the draft Payment of Expenses and Provision of Facilities to the Mayor and Councillors Policy, which will be advertised on Council website for public comment for a 28 day period commencing Monday 21 February.

A proposal for a major drainage structure on Jindera-Walla Walla Road, Walla Walla was accepted. The construction of the culvert under the Jindera-Walla Walla Road will be included in Council's 2022/23 budget.

Council agreed to the sale of 3613m2 on the corner of Pioneer Drive and Jindera St, Jindera to the Lutheran Church for \$230,000 (inc. GST). The proceeds from the sale will be allocated to the construction of the eastern side of Jindera St.

Council will include Ashley Lane, Culcairn as part of the next Road Strategy Review and will undertake works to minimize future flooding of access.

Business dealt with at the 2 February 2022 extraordinary meeting included:

The Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program – Round 3 funds will include the following allocations, \$1.25M to the replacement of the Jindera Swimming Pool shell subject to a further report to Council on any possible treatments that may remedy the structural issues with the existing pool shell. Additionally the remainder of the available funds, \$1,038,350 will be allocated to the Balfour Street drainage project.

Council approved the recruitment of an additional town planning staff member and administration support for the Environment and Planning Department.

Deborah's work will seek to understand current community attitudes and preparedness to welcome newcomers, available services and employment opportunities, as well to understand the journey so far for the many newcomers who already live here.

Deborah will be located at Holbrook, where she lives, and will be working part time for approximately 12 weeks on this stage of the project. Deborah has extensive experience coordinating community research projects across Australia and has worked with many organisations including Universities, High Schools,

Women's Health Centres, Youth programmes, Migrant services, Government and non-government organisations.

The Greater Hume Council is confident that stakeholders and the community will be supportive of Deborah as she goes about this work.

NSW Growing Regions of Welcome Pilot Program

This research is part of Multicultural NSW's Growing Regions of Welcome (NSW GROW) Pilot, a three-year program that works with local communities to attract migrants

and refugees to resettle in regional NSW. The focus is on people living in western Sydney with the skills and aspirations to move to the Murray and Riverina regions for employment and lifestyle opportunities. The overall aim is to provide migrants and refugees with the information and support they need to relocate to the regions, and support communities in the Murray and Riverina to welcome newcomers and help them to thrive in the long-term.

As part of NSW GROW, Welcoming Australia is coordinating the survey and supporting research in the Greater Hume region in collaboration with Greater Hume Council. The research will help our communities to better understand how ready they are to welcome people from migrant and refugee backgrounds.




SPORT REPORTS SWIMMING SUCCESS

HOME Aboriginal art from New South Wales

This artwork has been made by students from Burrumbuttock, Culcairn, Hume, and Walla Walla District Schools

Artist Lorraine Connelly-Northey, a descendent of the Waradgerie (Wiradjun) people, guided teachers and their students at each school, sharing traditional cultural knowledge. Highlighted in these teachings was the study of the South East Aboriginal practice of possum skin cloak making, a traditional form of garment making that has had an active resurgence in recent decades.

Aunty Lorraine is a nationally celebrated artist, who was born at Swan Hill and now lives and works on Waradgerie Country. Her work involves the collection of abandoned old rubbish, scattered and dumped within her tribal boundary and on the Country of her birth. This material is assembled using methods that reference traditional Aboriginal weaving techniques.

The HOME program is an education partnership between The Arts Unit, NSW Department of Education and the Art Gallery of New South Wales, in association with Murray Art Museum Albury.
