

Wirraminna News

After a wet spring and early summer, the dry times have come again. Most of the park is still showing the lush growth that has been quite lovely but there is now a lot of pruning to be done as many of the shrubs are taking up more than their share of space, Watering has begun for the newly established plants, This is a quiet time for flowers, before the autumn bloomers get going but a quick walk around found a couple of Grevillea , a couple of Eremophiilas, and a Geebung, or Persoonia, which is just developing its beautiful gold and green display in the Art and Craft bed.



A good follow up from the visit by Costa a few weeks ago, has been an arrangement for a propagation day for the school students. They have a plan to extend their native garden, so Sue Rose will show them how to sow seeds of a range of wildflowers and native grasses, using seed from our Seed Production Area. They will use a range of species. Some are reliable and easy to germinate, but a few are more challenging and it will be exciting if they can have success with them. Restoring the diversity of the ground cover species in native woodland is the most difficult conservation challenge we face. Trees and shrubs are fairly easy, but if we want to bring back all the different wildlife species, including the smaller birds, lizards and insect life, we need to reintroduce as many of the original wildflowers and grasses as we can. These are the basis of the network of life and represent the ultimate goal we have for the natural areas of Wirraminna such as the dam bank. There are still a lot of weeds to control, but we now have an increasing supply of seed of some of the important species that we want to introduce.

We have a big change for the rest of the year as Stacee goes on Maternity Leave shortly. We are very happy for her and the increase in her family, and are looking for one or two wonderful people who can step into her shoes, to run school visits, and for administration tasks. We are expecting to have about 20 school visits again this year. These school visits are among the most important activities we have at Wirraminna, giving students from Kinder to Year 6, the opportunity to learn about the natural environment with a range of age relevant activities.

The dam is looking its best at present, and as well as providing valuable water soppy for the gardens, it is a Thriving ecosystem in itself, and attracts quite a few birds.





Recipe Page ...

With an abundance of tomatoes this season, this is a very simple and delicious recipe that can be varied with the addition of fresh herbs, mushrooms, etc. and can also be used in pizzas.

Tomato pasta sauce



1kg ripe tomatoes, cored seeded, chopped, can be peeled

2 onions, sliced

4 cloves garlic, sliced

1/2 cup olive oil

Salt

Freshly ground black pepper

Red chilli – optional

Tumble tomatoes, onion, and garlic with oil and spread in a baking dish.

Bake, tightly covered, at 180 degrees C until tomatoes have collapsed and skins are golden brown and juices flowing – at least one hour. Season to taste. Fresh herbs, olives, capers, etc can be added after cooking when combining with cooked pasta.

Recipe can be easily doubled, but don't double the amount of oil. Freezes well.

Description – Zucchini Slice



Try this easy recipe for a one-dish zucchini slice.

It's tasty, quick and there'll be minimal cleaning up.

lt's a win-win.

1 cup self-raising flour

2 medium zucchini, grated

6 free range eggs

425g canned no-added-salt chickpeas, drained

1 cup shredded tasty cheese

100g Woolworths leafy mix salad

Method: Preheat oven to 200°C/180°C fan-forced. Grease and line a 22 x 28cm (6cm deep) baking dish with baking paper. Place flour in dish. Season with pepper. Add two-thirds of the zucchini and toss to combine. Add eggs and chickpeas, then mix with a fork until well combined. Scatter over cheese and remaining zucchini. Bake for 25 minutes or until golden and set. Slice and serve with salad leaves.

- E- Expect and use good manners




We will be continuing to work with students based on these 5 expectations to create a positive learning culture and a happy and safe environment at Burrumbuttock Public School.



Murray landholders asked to watch for locusts and report

With much grass and vegetation available this season, Local Land Services is urging landholders to be on the lookout for locust activity and report any sightings immediately.

Locust activity has been slowly ramping up across the Murray, with some banding already observed, said Murray Local Land Services Team Leader, Peter O'Shannassy.

"We're urging landholders to be vigilant and report any banding and swarming to their Local Land Services office," Mr O'Shannassy said.

"Our staff and local farmers have already started spraying in the Savernake, Rennie and Mulwala areas following sightings of bands reported by the community."

Bands are small at this stage and likely hard to see due to the amount of vegetation in paddocks, however reporting is essential to manage the issue.

"We expect Murray will have locusts at all stages, from hatching to laying adults, scattered across much of the district," Mr O'Shannassy said.

"However, they are generally not being detected until they cross open ground, like roads."

Controlling banding locusts now will help reduce their impact later in the year

If not controlled, plague locusts can cause significant damage to crops and pastures by consuming all in their path.

"Bands are there now to be controlled, which will help lessen their impact on emerging crops in the autumn," Mr O'Shannassy said.

"This is why community reporting is essential — reports are used to forecast locust movements, breeding, impacts and required control strategies."

Local Land Services biosecurity staff are trained in the identification of locust biology and control, and available to help landholders implement control measures with advice and pesticides

On-ground treatment by landholders once locusts begin to 'band', is by far the best and most effective treatment option to limit new swarms.


Locusts observed in the Murray area.
