Thank you to Fe Coleman and Howard Hodgetts for generously opening their garden 'Thurso' to help attract extra visitors to the Show. They had a lot of visitors throughout the day, and it was very convenient for people from town to drop in on the way to and from Burrumbuttock.

Publicity was more extensive this year with high-visibility advertising in the Border Mail, along with article and photo promoting the event, and a bold and beautiful poster. There were at least three mentions about the event on ABC radio in the preceding week. Of course, the Bale Art butterfly outside the Hall by Fe Coleman and Estrella Wiltshire was also great advertising for the event. One woman had travelled from as far away as Yea, Victoria for her local community, to research how our flower show was organised.



Dartmouth Dam overflows...first time in 26 years



It had been 26 years since anyone last heard the roar of water cascading down the Dartmouth Dam spillway in north-east Victoria.

The spill was the fifth since the storage was completed in 1979 and the first since November 1996.

The rare event brought thousands of tourists to the Mitta Valley to see the spillway and local businesses were enjoying the boom after the pandemic.

But the cascade of awe and wonder brought trepidation for those downstream.

Weir keeper Peter Liepkalns (pictured) said he

was acutely aware of his responsibility, having managed the dam for 45 years. "It's not an ideal situation," he said.



He said downstream effects included restriction of generation capacity at Dartmouth's AGL power station.

When you think of it, this storage is the storage of last resort and we're here for drought, for containment of drought water.

Dartmouth Dam is operated by Goulburn-Murray Water on behalf of the Murray-Darling Basin Authority and is the highest structure of its kind in Australia. When full, the dam stores almost four million megalitres with the primary purpose of irrigation and domestic stock use in New South Wales and Victoria.

Mr Liepkalns' job is to manage the storage — which includes upgrading the telemetry systems, maintenance on the structure and releasing water. "We have

daily consultation with the Murray-Darling Basin Authority and look at rain events, and make changes to outflows," he said "Everything is done quite conservatively but once it goes over the spillway, it's out of your control." With a third year of La Nina and potential for flooding, he said he and others were no match for Mother Nature.

Extensive maintenance is required on the spillway after an event. For now, all he can do is keep the gates open and hope the water flows away without too much destruction in its wake.

He said there was about 5,000 megalitres currently going over the spillway each day and anticipated the spill would continue for months. "Water will be going over for an extended period due to the Bureau of Meteorology's outlook," he said. "It's indicating an 80 per cent chance of above average rain until December unfortunately."

Farmers brace for major flooding

Mitta Valley dairy farmer Cameron Patron's land was flooded during 1996 spill.

Mt Bogong's snow melt is yet to flow into Lake Dartmouth.

He said he had already lost access to pastures underwater this year and feared more land would be cut off as water came down the Mitta River.

"We immediately lose acres of country — it's disappointing in a year when the cows are performing the best they've ever done and the price is comfortable," he said. "We're looking down the barrel of losing 250 acres of pastures and we'll have to buy fodder just to function."

1996 spill

Up to 20,000 megalitres a day went over the spillway last time the dam spilled. "In 1996 it was unfortunately impressive," Mr Liepkalns said. "There was a lot of water going over the top, it caused a lot of damage downstream down into the farmers' land. He said it took away their ability to graze cattle, affected grass growth and led to an expensive refurbishment of the spillway. Source: ABC Rural/Annie Brown.

150th Anniversary Celebration

The founding of the Congregation of Holy Cross Lutheran Church Burrumbuttock



Background History

The first Lutheran settlements in the Riverina were formed towards the end of the 1860's, by migrants from Germany. They were finding their comparatively small farms to be no longer economically sustainable and were increasingly unsettled by the religious and political instability in the German states during that time. Initially locating in South Australia, many decided to explore further afield, and several waves composed largely of family groups with some single men headed in their

tarpaulin-covered wagons to the fertile fields north of Albury.

Naturally, the local press took notice of this quite considerable transmigration, with the Albury papers reporting at the time that "about 80 wagons arrived during the end of 1866 and the first half of 1867".

These settlers were not only diligent tillers of the soil who eventually prospered, but they were also earnest Christians. They held lay services in their homesteads every Sunday, and as soon as was conveniently possible, they erected churches and schools.

The congregation at Burrumbuttock was formed in 1872, and the members met in individual homes until they built their first church in 1877, a slab and mud wall construction with a straw roof, on the Burrumbuttock-Brocklesby Road.

By the next decade, a larger building was commissioned, and the present church was opened in 1888. Descriptions of both dedication ceremonies were described contemporaneously in the Kirchenbote, some details of which the Anniversary Celebration on Sunday was replicating:

- It was a fine day after weeks of rain and visitors came from far and near...first we assembled in a member's home, then we moved in procession to the new church....the key was carried....the door was opened....everyone thronged into the new building which was beautifully decorated.... (1877)
- The bush around was covered with buggies, wagonettes, spring carts, saddlehorses....A large festive congregation assembled around the church... the Pastor read a passage from Scripture then opened the door in the name of the Triune God...the Elders presented the sacred vessels to be placed on the Altar... the Congregation then moved into the new church (1888)

What place does the Congregation hold in the community?

The congregation largely reflects the community in which it is based, in that it is characteristically rural in its daily concerns, but with a weather eye on national and international events.

In the frequently turbulent and testing years - socially, politically and economically- since its inception, the regularity of Christian worship and fellowship has provided stability and strength not only to Congregation members, but also to many in the wider community. The church is used regularly for baptisms, weddings, funerals and other fundamental events in community life.

Significantly, the Women's Fellowship group meets monthly with a large membership that extends beyond the Congregation, and through its healthy fund-raising activities, contributes generously to causes locally, more widely in Australia, and also to those in need overseas.

Also, importantly to the community, the Congregation hosts a local Pre-school, run out the hall in the church grounds. Initiated some fifty years ago, the Pre-school has been a continuously and successfully functioning entity serving the community with widespread support. The first teacher was a member of the Congregation, and the school was fully funded by the Congregation. Since then, with additional government funding and parental fundraising, the facility has been regularly upgraded, and has consistently full enrolments.



Local Land Services Media Release Flood preparedness key with more rain forecast

With dams and waterways at capacity and more rain forecast, Local Land Services is urging landholders to use coming days to review and enact their farm emergency plan. Severe weather warnings have been issued for large parts of western, southern, central and northern NSW, with the

weather system moving east throughout the week. Ensuring animals are factored into flood planning, Local Land Services Emergency Management Coordinator Piers Harper said having a farm emergency plan will reduce stress, allow clearer thinking and improve the chances of keeping you and your livestock safe should flood waters arrive. "Planning will not only protect your home, property and business. You also have an obligation to protect your livestock and pets from drowning," Mr Harper said. "Your flood plan doesn't have to be complicated. In fact, it needs to be as easy and straightforward as possible so that if you are away someone else can implement it on your behalf. "The State Emergency Service (SES) has a wide range of resources on its website to help you plan and prepare your property and livestock. "You can also visit the Local Land Services website to download a copy our Farm Flood Readiness Kit." Prepared by specialist emergency management staff from Local Land Services, the Flood Readiness Kit helps landholders identify flood risks and hazards using a simple checklist. There is also a section to record stock numbers, property Information and key contacts to engage in your planning "We encourage you to identify and move livestock to a 'safe' area on your property where they are away from danger but still have access to food and water," Mr Harper said. "You should remove pumps from waterways, secure moveable objects like bale feeders and where possible, move farm equipment to higher ground. "It's also important to store all chemicals securely and out of potential floodwater levels." 
