## What! An earthquake in Burrum!

For most of us the earthquake last Wednesday 22 September, at 9.15am started as a bit of mystery, even confusing, since we've never experience, such an event before. While Australia has had the odd quake including the Newcastle shocker in 1989, which killed 13 people, we don't expect them, or consider them seriously.

Unlike people living in places like along the San Andreas Fault in California, or Tokyo, who are familiar with the sound and the feel, and who know straight away what's happening, most of us took some time to recognised the reality.

I was in the kitchen and heard a rumble, as if someone was rolling an empty drum down the footpath, out front. I went to the window but couldn't see anyone; then there was a rattle in the ceiling.

The idea of the quake was a thought, but in Burrumbuttock, that remained difficult to accept. There was no more evidence outside the house, so I returned to eating breakfast, but before doing so, felt the call of the water closet.

Peering into the thunderbox, I noticed the water level there was lower than it should have been, which meant the mystery had washed water out the back of the bowl.

So, it must have been an earth quake, but I'd felt nothing, no vibration or movement.

Meanwhile, Estrella who was lying awake in bed, knew exactly what was happening, as soon as it began. Such events are not unusual in the Philippines, with the big 7.7 one killing an estimated 1000 in 1990. She'd felt quite a few tremors before. The light above her bed swayed, and the mattress beneath shook a little.

However, the most amusing story of the confusion caused by the incident, is the tale of three retired gentlemen, who were digging a post out of the ground. Well, at least one of them was digging, while the other two were there merely in an advisory capacity.

When the **5.7** magnitude reverberations resonated about their endeavours, none let on they were aware something happening. Digging did not pause, the advising continued, and for all intents and purposes everything was normal, nothing had happened.

A few minutes later a phone rang, and a wife wanted to know if the digger had felt the earthquake, and if he was okay.

A rye smile turned to his companions. "Yes, love, I'm fine", was possibly his comment. When the apparent was blatant, there was relief, and a touch of embarrassment. All had felt the quake but understandably none considered the possibility of an earthquake in Burrumbuttock.

This left them to seek alternative explanations. Maybe their age, which combined is around 200 years, says a lot about their reasoning, and the deductions they reached.

The digger decided he'd suffered a dizzy spell, which was a private and personal matter; advisor number one who has some sort of heart issue anyway put it down to his existing ailment, and deemed it confidential; while advisor number two found the answer in a surge of vertigo, supposedly because he's experienced it before.

When daylight shone on the facts, it triggered some amusement, but it demonstrated how we humans want an answer for most things, especially if we think it has health implications, no matter how spurious.

### Church gets a makeover.

Work is underway on the Holy Cross church, to correct a problem which has dogged the building pretty much ever since it was erected 133 years ago.

The moving clay soils have constantly caused cracking in the brick work, and over the years remedial actions have been necessary at regular intervals. This latest repair work will fill crack, repair plaster and a fresh coat of paint will finish off the job. Henty contractor Uwe Stroh, said he expected to take five or six weeks to complete the work.

Some indication of how extensive is the problem in area, is seen in the fact that over the years, three manses have been built, so great has been the damage to the previous structures. The first one was past saving, and the second one was

Uwe Roth has about six weeks of work to bring the plaster work back to a good condition and paint the interior of the Holy Cross. Most of the furniture was removed before he started work

erected, but by 1956 it needed repairs, and the current manse went up in 1975.

The first extensive renovation to the church was completed in 1938, in readiness for the church's Golden Jubilee. At the time internal and external repairs and painting were carried out, as well, carpets were laid, drapes were hung, and the altar and furnishings were remodelled.

In 1955 extensive cracking called for another extensive renovation. In 1977 the problem was back and more work was undertaken. However, it seems this latest problem convinced the building's committee they needed to carry out more substantial remediation, if they were to halt what appeared to be a persistent and increasing problem.

Each of the church's corner buttresses were secured and tied together with steel beams, then steel bars ran from corner to corner, one along the walls at ceiling height and others at floor level, tying the whole building together.

However, this significant work, while it has fortified the super structure, it has failed to prevent some cracking. Colin Wiltshire



## Burrumbuttock Hotel memorabilia returned to its rightful home

There was a very significant picture of the Farmers Inn Hotel in the 1880's that has been missing from the Hotel for over 20 years.


It would appear that the publicans at the time Michael and Debbie Green (licensees from 10/5/2002) decided that when they moved to Tasmania to live, they took with them memorabilia from the hotel which included this picture. Locals were very disappointed that this piece of history was taken.

As it would happen the current licensee Mardi Klein's son, went to school with the Baker Family and they were friends of Michael and Debbie Green. The Bakers went on a holiday to Tasmania and stayed with the Greens.

The Greens announced that they had a photo of the Burrumbuttock Hotel and no longer wanted it so they gave it to the Baker family to return to Albury/Burrumbuttock which they have done. It was reframed by Jim Marshall and now proudly hangs up in the Burrumbuttock Hotel.

The back of this photo has been signed by publicans/licensees from 1880 to this current day.

Mardi Klein has been the longest licensee of the Farmers Inn Hotel commencing 14/9/2007.



Note the kerosene street lamp on the post, which would help to show if farmers were all "Inn" or a night out to have a few in".

The donor of this historical record, Otto Schilg, desires it to be a fixture in this modern building in memory of our Pioneers, and also as a tribute to the owner of this 1960 model hotel, Mr. Bert Seston of Albury for his confidence in Burrumbuttock, which Burrumbuttock, which in Abbo language means "The backbone of a





### Wirraminna News

Spring is in full bloom now, and the weeds are growing even faster. However, they have not had as much attention as they should because it has been a big planting month. We received the specially ordered plants for replanting the Nelder. Instead of the Radiata Pines, which were a relic of the Paper Mill's enthusiasm for locally grown woodchips for their paper machines, we are planting samples of five vegetation systems

that grow in the drier parts of our region. Seems appropriate as the pines were gradually dying because of the droughts of the last 20 years.

We have been funded to plant these representatives of the regions to the west and north of us, which are being predicted to be the in the climate that we will have in 30-50 years. The challenge has been to find plants which, although in some cases are same species that already occur locally, are grown from seed collected from the drier end of their range, for example Deniliquin or Parkes. There are not many plant nurseries in those areas that can supply these plants. So, Paula Sheehan, who applied for and won the funding, has very generously put in a lot of time chasing the plants we need. We are still short of some species we wanted but Paula has managed to find seed, so next year we hope to have the plants.

The planting is designed to reflect the original "Nelder" wagon-wheel pattern with five broad spokes, each representing a plant community from the west and north of us. The first spoke is a Boree/Cooba woodland. These wattles are common north of Deniliquin, where it is generally too dry for Eucalypts. We hope to have quite a few saltbushes when we can get them. We have used a gravel mulch to make the area look drier and to discourage many of our local high rainfall weeds. The next spoke is a Cypress Pine/Buloke woodland, also in gravel, which is a common western woodland community. Then we have planted Grey Box, mixed with Bimble Box, with some beautiful Wilgas, which occur west and north of here. The last two spokes are Yellow box and White box, which are common around here, but we have used plants from further west, on the basis that the trees growing in the drier areas will be better adapted to drought. Less obvious than the trees, is the understory: shrub species that are better adapted to future environmental conditions. All the species choices have

been based on published descriptions of these plant communities from west and north of here.

It has been a huge job to get all these plants together and we greatly appreciate the help Paula has given us. Sue has also put in a lot of thought and research to come up with the species we need. This is a long-term project. It will need a few years for the plants to grow and a sense of the different plant communities; even longer for there to be any indication that the seed sources from out west and north are better adapted to our changing climate, but gardeners and vegetation restorers have to learn to be patient. Business dealt with at the meeting included:

Council resolved to write to the NSW Government to withdraw the Environmental Planning and Assessment Amendment (Infrastructure Contributions) Bill 2021 from NSW Parliament. Additionally, Council will call on the NSW Government to undertaken further consultation with the local government sector on any proposed reforms to the infrastructure contributions system. Council will also seek a meeting with Justin Clancy, Member for Albury, to discuss the likely impact the Bill will have on Council, our community and ratepayers.

Cr Doug Meyer OAM was voted as Deputy Mayor which was put to open vote at the Council meeting. Council resolved to submit an amendment to the Greater Hume Local Environmental Plan 2012 –Zoning and Minimum Lot Size Changes for 151 – 159 Pioneer Drive Jindera and 1037 Urana Road Jindera to the Department of Planning, Infrastructure and Environment to facilitate large lot residential land and seek a conditional Gateway Determination.

The draft Jindera Residential Land Use Strategy will be re-exhibited, following requests from three landowners seeking inclusion in the strategy.

Following on from the postponement of the 2021 elections, Council agreed the meeting schedule for the remainder of the calendar year and January 2022 (below).
