The ceremony was held in the Sydney Town Hall, and the presentation was made by Education Departmental Secretary, Georgina Harrison.







What are you Entering? Flowers, Craft, Photography and/or Cooking?

Every year the local support has been fantastic and we are looking for your support again by entering something in the different sections.

Here are some tips for rose and flower entries:

Read schedule carefully for correct height of stem from top of bottle jg. Iris stem must be a minimum 2cm to maximum 5 cm from top of bottle.

Use bottles provided, and clean if necessary.

Remove any dead leaves or foliage.

If using any paper towelling to hold flower stem firmly in the bottle, make sure that it is neat and not protruding over the top of the bottle.

Cooking Tips

Cakes to be presented on a plate of appropriate size and placed inside oven bag (not Glad wrap or freezer bags). Please use twist ties or bread tags - no sticky tape.

No rack marks on cakes - use linen tea towel on rack and allow to cool.

Icing only on top of cakes - not sides.

Open jam jars prior to entering and check for mould. Cover lids with material or paper so that original brand of product is not visible.

No packet or commercial mixtures to be used.

Glider killings are distressing

Have you seen a Squirrel Glider? When I ask this question more often than not the response can be "only caught on a fence" or "when the cat brought one home".

For those that have meet me you probably know I always have a quite cry when I hear this. It does of course reflect the allusivity of this critter.

Since working on the Burrumbuttock's Squirrel Glider LAMP project I have had more reports of people witnessing them alive and gliding – which makes me so happy.

Really the secret to finding and watching Squirrel Gliders comes down to observation. In fact researchers from Southern Cross University spent twelve months studying the feeding habits of Squirrel Gliders near Brisbane.

From this observational research technique, they were able to determine what Squirrel Gliders were feeding on at different times of the year.

The results were fascinating. Four main food types were regularly recorded which included - nectar/pollen from flowers, arthropods, lerps and honey dew.

It was clear that flowers are the most significant food source, arthropods the second most and when there were no flowers honey dew was very important.

It was also clear that the site had a variety of plant species that were being visited when they were flowering.

If I am asked where to look for Squirrel Gliders, I

suggest look for where trees are flowering.

If the Squirrel Gliders can get to the trees they will come. This second point is important – check to see if the trees that are flowering are connected to either roadsides or other remnant areas where there are trees with hollows – this is where the Squirrel Gliders rest during the day.

There are records of local farmers observing them in their garden where the flowering Gum (Eucalyptus leucoxylon)

grows. As soon as the tree begins to flower the Squirrel Gliders come nightly to feed.

Locally we are still learning about our Squirrel Gliders -what they feed on and where they go. When we monitor nest boxes we do wonder where the Squirrel Gliders have come from and then also where they have gone.

Maybe this is something you might be interested in knowing as well. Is there a location or back yard where you can start to observe? Do you have a standing dead tree that might be a home for Squirrel Glider that you can watch on sunset and see if any animals emerge?

If you do get to observe Squirrel Gliders, you know that I am always happy to hear what you find. The more we learn the better we can understand what we need to do to ensure they stay a local. Give me a call if you have any questions. 0458 240 634.



The passing of Queen Elizabeth II is tremendously sad for the world

British Prime Minister Liz Truss was absolutely correct when she said the Queen was the rock on which modern Britain was built.

The Queen lived a long life devoted to duty that touched the lives of millions, especially here in Australia.

For me her reign is bookended by two defining images: that of a young woman who never expected to be monarch so soon, willingly taking on a lifetime of duty and service – and the grieving head of state, sitting stoically alone during COVID, at the funeral for Prince Philip. Her commitment to duty never faltered.

I met the Queen with my daughter at a reception held in the Great Hall of Parliament House in 2011 during Julia Gillard's prime ministership. Our first female prime minister, the longest serving British monarch and many young Australians for whom the institution of the monarchy must have seemed remote, all celebrated, with real affection what Queen Elizabeth II represented to the Commonwealth and the world.

We have lost one of the most substantial world figures of our time

Queen Elizabeth II: 1/4/1926 - 8/9/2022

Queen Elizabeth II was born on the 21 April, 1926, at 2:40 am.

At the time of her birth, her parents, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, were Duke and Duchess of York.

Elizabeth was crowned Queen Elizabeth II on June 2nd, 1953, at 25 years old. She has earned the title of longest-reigning monarch, sitting in the throne for 70 years.

The first prime minister that served under her as Queen was Sir Winston Churchill who was born in 1874. She saw 14 British prime ministers come and go during her reign. She appointed her 15th just days ago. Prime Minister Liz Truss was born in 1975. This span of time really demonstrates how significant her reign was.

She loved animals especially her horses and her dogs. She is thought to have owned at least 30 corgis during her time on the throne. Queen Elizabeth sent the first ever

royal email on March 26, 1976. It was headed "A Message from Her Majesty the Queen" and was signed off with an informal "Elizabeth R". She continued to use this same sign off for every digital communication thereafter.

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She also posted her first Instagram post in March of 2017.

In this post, Queen Elizabeth II shared an image of a letter from Charles Babbage, a 19th century inventor and mathematician, that was addressed to Prince Albert.

She enjoyed many hobbies, including horse riding, pigeon racing and football. Her first pony, a Shetland named Peggy, was gifted to her by her grandfather, King George V.





Three days in Canberra by Colin Wiltshire

When my wife Estrella learned about Canberra's Floriade Flower Festival, she wanted to see it, but we had to wait until last month as it had been cancelled the last couple of years.

Well the acres of flowers, with an emphasis on tulips, were certainly spectacular, even for those who don't necessarily have an acute appreciation of their splendour.

In the 20-odd years since I visited the gardens, they had grown larger and are now complimented with an array of stalls, information marquees, and entertainments, including a ferris-wheel.

But that's not all that has changed in Canberra since then, not much of it for the better, as far as I'm concerned.

We were there for three days, so after the tulips we visited Parliament House, the National Art Gallery, War Museum, the National Museum, General Bridges grave, and did some sight-seeing.

Major General Sir William Throsby Bridges KCB,CMG, was with his men as they were among the first waves to storm the Gallipoli breaches, on 25th April, 1915.

Three weeks later a Turkish sniper wounded him seriously, and three days after that he died. Of the 61,514 Australians who died in WW1, the General's body was the only one repatriated home.

He's buried on the hill above the Royal Military College, Duntroon, the college he helped founder, and of which he'd been commandant.

When I say some of the changes were disappointing, most of them are the result of the huge increase in the number of tourists now visiting the sites.

After Floriade our first stop was the Art Gallery. On entering we were confronted by an attendant who asked if we'd booked in. What! No, we hadn't booked in; no, not online either, or anywhere else. Not a problem. Good! "The girl over there behind the glass will book you in," he said pointing.

A simple process as it turned out, despite the crackling speaker through which we were communicating. I gave her my postcode and she gave me a couple of tickets.

What surprised me about the gallery was the amount of aboriginal art, now on display, galleries of it, in fact.



At the National Museum I saw a device at the entrance which was something new. Wet umbrellas were to be inserted into the top of the contraption, then wiz-bang they're ejected out the side, wrapped in plastic. We dodged the book-in desk, as the attendant was distracted.

O'boy; how visiting the War Memorial is now a hassle. I remember when I was about 12, Dad took our family to the museum. In those days you parked beside the museum, walked 50 yards, passed the bombed Japanese midget submarine, around to the front entrance, and strolled in.

That visit imbedded in my mind, visions of war which have remained with me ever since.

Fifteen-odd years ago I visited the museum again, and nothing much had changed, except the submarine was not on display. However, it was a little disappointing as the 'powers that be' for some spurious reason had lower the lux considerably, especially in the room with the Lancaster bomber.

I can only guess at the reasoning, since the Lancaster's wartime missions were principally night time raids, it was displayed in a like setting. That logic is confounding, if it was the case.

When approaching the museum this time, there were signs to the parking, which directed us into a huge underground concrete cavity, which I estimate had enough capacity for three hundred vehicles.

That should have been an omen. Since work was going on at the front of the museum, we had to enter through a side door, which once again was guarded by attendants. "Have you booked in." No!

"I'm afraid you must have a booking before you can go in." "No, you can't book in here, you need to book online, there's no alternative." "You're got to be joking." "No Sir, I'm not, however I can give you a 40 minute pass, and let you in now, but just for 40 minutes".

Estrella and I talked about for a moment, and decided to come back tomorrow. It took a bit of arranging but we arrived back at the specified entry time of 11.20 a.m., had our QR code scanned, submitted to a bag search and were allowed in.

There was no Lancaster, or submarine, and many of the WW1 dioramas were gone. They were the displays which captivated me as a twelve year old.

Parliament House is certainly an impressive place, as it should be, but gaining entry was not simple, as it should be, with bags and persons scanned.

We spent some time just wandering about, admiring the building, then it was into the House of Reps' chamber, after more security checks. Bags, phones, implements, and sundry matter, had to be deposited in the luggage room, then us through another scanner.

In the chamber the members were offering condolences to the Royal Family, and stressing the significance of the king in Australian's constitution. Ten minutes of that was enough.

Despite the protocol, or the humbug, of visiting all these places, one thing stood out.

It was the courtesy and helpfulness of the staffs. We did not strike one incidence of impatience or dismissal, rather the staffs were not just courteous but on a number of occasions when we apparently appeared indecisive, we were approached and offered assistance.

Considering the numbers of people the staffs must deal with each day, it's a big thumbs up from us.

On the other hand, the city's traffic light control algorithm needs ditching. I've driven in cities from New York, to London and Tokyo, and never encountered such an archaic system. The time spent waiting for red lights to change, was more than irritating.

has an uneven surface. There is no signage for the track

.Families cannot use it if they have a pram or other children's toy like a small scooter, therefore they cannot completely walk the full triangle of the track around the village.

This project could be staged in three parts - with the Village entry section being Stage one of the project, the footpath from school to preschool being stage two, and the final section being upgrading the connecting track from Howlong Road to Urana Road.

It was expressed that it would be advisable to eventually remove the wattles, given that they will need to be cleaned up in seven to ten years' time by council, due to their shorter lifespan. It would be better to plant something that will survive the longer term.

Motion: That the Burrum Walking Track along Urana Road be widened and asphalted to enable inclusivity for prams and wheelchairs, signage erected, and in this process, the entry to the village be tidied up by removing untidy vegetation as necessary, replacing with squirrel glider feeding trees, such as eucalytpus maculata.

Possible new village entry signage could include a sign in keeping with the ethos of the village like the Wirraminna gabion sign, or 'Home of the Burrumbuttock Hayrunners'. Cr Jenny O'Neill advised these unique signs are usually funded by money from the community.

Howlong Rd footpath from School to Preschool

The Forum has received two letters of support from the Public School and the Preschool supporting the construction of this footpath to ensure the safe passage of children between the two educational facilities, especially those with special needs and disabilities. This could also be Stage two of the walking track.

Is there still 'Villages Votes' money available for Burrumbuttock?

Asphalting the track opposite preschool up to start of track could be done with this funding.

It appears that the Forum can prioritise the footpath, after consultation with the residents. A letter could be written to each resident.

Roundabout at main intersection to slow traffic – not the solution. Down the priority list. There would need to be more traffic data such as near-misses or a fatality as a result of an accident. At this stage, minimal data has been collected. We could possibly source statistics from the police re speeding fines.

A zebra crossing was suggested for children who get off the bus at the store then run across to the park to get their bikes.

Brocklesby Road approach to village – Wally Bruckmann requested that the speed restriction sign be relocated further out on the west side of the waste transfer station.

There is a rise in the road and traffic is still speeding coming down the hill towards the village. Due to subdivisions, there is now increased traffic flow entering Brock Road from Beatrice Road. There could also be a 'Concealed driveway' sign erected to alert motorists of Beatrice Road.

Motion: That the road traffic committee investigate the need for the speed restriction sign to be relocated further out on the west side of the waste transfer station on Brocklesby Road.

Moved—Banners erected at Public Hall corner – Fleur Hall reported that the two banners advertising the Flower Show and the Public School were obstructing motorists' views of oncoming traffic from a northerly direction along Urana Road. They need to be located further back from the intersection

Level of interest in opening up more housing blocks in Burrumbuttock. the Forum sends a letter of request for more housing blocks, then council would approach landowners.

The developer would have to put sewerage in. The village sewerage system will have to upgraded in the future. Further investigation is needed into this issue. Why want the town to grow? So the school and preschool survives.

The Burrumbuttock NBN tower is now functional.

The Recreation Ground is applying to upgrade to energy-efficient LED lighting through 'Stronger Country Communities' grant money totally \$105,000.

In summary, the Forum will send a letter with a list of priority projects for the Village and state that the Forum fully supports the Multipurpose Centre Recreation Ground project; however we believe that it does not belong in the priority list. Endorse.

Wet seasons: Perfect time for planning farm water security





With many areas at or nearing peak high water levels Murray Local Land Services said now is the perfect time to plan farm water security to ensure water infrastructure can accommodate high levels.

In conjunction with the Australian National University's (ANU) Sustainable Farms team, Murray Local Land Services will hold a series of free, farm water security field days across the Murray region during October, on local properties to showcase farm water options.

900ha cattle property owner Marcus Richardson carried out works to enhance his farm dams after attending a Sustainable Farms field day in 2017 and will host the Table Top field day.

"The benefits of the work we saw at the field day were obvious," Mr Richardson said.

"The dam had been fenced, with a hardened access point constructed to provide stock with access to water.

"The dam's surroundings were fully vegetated, with a grassy buffer zone to capture sediment and dung.

"The dam was clearly working well and it was very aesthetically pleasing – and it motivated me to consider something similar for my own dams.'

Local Land Services Project Manager Paul Simpson said the events will give producers the fundamentals to improve water security and quality, biodiversity and livestock production.

"These events will allow producers to visit properties already working to secure their water supply and quality whilst enhancing biodiversity and improving production.

"We will then look to follow up and invite attendees to smaller workshops where they can tailor farm water plans to the needs of their properties."

Neil Hamilton, who operates a property at Maragle near Tumbarumba, will also host one of the field days.

"We have a small farm that had very little infrastructure in place. We're now fencing off paddocks, introducing rotational grazing and reticulated water to the paddocks," Mr Hamilton said.

"Improving farm biodiversity and water security isn't hard

"It improves our resilience during tough times, increases biodiversity and reduces pests.

"We'd love other landholders to see what we've done, learn from our experience and take away ideas to improve their own land," Mr Hamilton said.

Elise Wenden, who operates a sheep property at Lowesdale near Mulwala, will also host a field day, sharing

her experience of returning some of the property to its original state as a wetland.

"Our whole farm plan identified that an area of our property was best suited for use as a wetland, returning this area to its natural state has had enormous benefits in terms of labour, production, and ecology," Ms Wenden said.

"Instead of trying to turn the land into something it's not, we're using it for what it's intended for.

"I hope people attending the field days see the importance of working with the land that you have and using each area for the purpose it's best designed for," she said.

The field days are part of Local Land Services 'Farming Forward Program' and are supported by the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund.

We started the project in the middle of the pandemic, so naturally we were over-budget and over-schedule, but it was completely worth it when looking at the finished build.

Thank you to all the volunteers: the endless meetings, the working bees, the donations.

From the countless hours of labour at working bees to the donated loads of gravel using their own trucks to the weekly meetings when things ramped up: your contribution does not go unnoticed. I think it is a testament to our great community, one of which I feel privileged to be a part.

Thanks to Jessica I'Anson for the huge work she did in organising the grant. Without it, nothing may have started.

Thanks to David Schilg for the design of the building and everyone who contributed changes to create the marvellous building we have now.

There were some difficult decisions to make, and we managed to pull it all together.

Many thanks to John Babbs, our draftsman. Not only did he put up with us changing the plans on many occasions, he also fully donated his time. For this, we cannot thank him enough, a wonderful contribution.
