ABOUT THE BUSH

Something to croak about - introducing some of our local frogs.

The stock route out the back of my place has been loud with the evening calls of male frogs competing for the attention of would-be female admirers. Our wet winter has meant there are plenty of puddles and flooded paddocks for frogs to hang out in and start breeding as the days grow longer.

We have more than 10 frog species that can commonly be found in backyards around the Culcairn area. Several of these won't start calling until the nights warm up, and all of the frogs you do hear are males – females are largely silent.

Amongst the anuran vocalists audible at the moment plains froglet are the (Crinia parinsignifera) and the common froglet (C. signifera). Both are tiny mottled brown-grey frogs that tend to hide at the base of rushes or grass clumps. One has a repetitive "mwaah" call while the other has a ratchet call sounding like a spray paint can being shaken repeatedly.

The common spadefoot frog (Neobatrachus sudelli) is a little bigger (up to 50mm) with splotchy olive-green, brown and yellow warty skin. Its call, a slow pulsed trill, sounds like "crawaw-aw-aw-aw". The spotted marsh (Limnodynastes tasmaniensis) is a beautiful medium-sized frog with orange and olive-green blotches on a creamy-brown skin. Unlike the other three frogs, these don't tend to call en masse, but their distinctive "uk-uk" call does stand out amongst the background chorus.



To learn more, download the free phone app, FrogID, which has descriptions, pictures and calls of all our frogs. You can record frog calls and then submit these through the app to get identifications back. And while you are out listening for frogs, do keep an eye out for

any dead or lethargic frogs - there are big concerns about a wave of frog deaths that have

recently been detected across eastern Australia. Please email any records of dead or dying frogs to calls@frogid.net.au - this scientists help understand the extent of the issue and hopefully help stop our frogs from croaking it!

IN YOUR GARDEN

Spring is here...with longer, warmer days and lots more sunshine. We have also been fortunate to have some intermittent rain to keep plants (and weeds!!) ticking along.

Vegies—As the soil warms up it is time to plant potatoes. Hill them as they grow and they should yield well. Beware the late frost which could burn the new leaves.

More sowings of peas-sugar snap and climbers. It is still too early to plant out unprotected tomatoes. cucumbers or pumpkins. However, grow them in pots in a frost free place and they will be ready to put out next month.

Onions, garlic and leeks should be developing well. Caulies should be maturing by now and broccoli continuing to grow. I grow the variety that keeps sending side shoots after you pick the main head, very productive, as the plants produce for months.

Try growing some Borage, a tall herb with a blue flower. Grow from seeds sown directly or plant in pots. Bees of all varieties love this plant and will be attracted to your garden.

Cuttings from Natives—Collect cuttings early morning or in the evening, 8-12 cm Remove bottom leaves until only 2 or 3 leaves remain at the top of the cutting. You may use a hormone powder to promote root growth but I use honey which I find works well. Just dip the bottom of the cutting in the powder or honey and place it into a good propagation medium, which should hold moisture, but be free draining. Place in a warm, humid position which receives filtered sunlight. (Under a glass or polythene cover is effective) Cuttings take 4-10 weeks, depending on the species. e.g. Eremophila (Emu Bush) and Thriptomene soft tip cuttings can be taken Sept -

Spring is repotting time—Change the potting mix in your pots. Use the best potting mix you can and remember to always wear gloves when handling potting mix.

Fruit Fly—Get out fruit fly traps now and be prepared for warmer months.

Make a trap with an empty plastic drink bottle. Make medium sized holes all the way round, 1/3rd of the way down.

Use a mixture of—2 tbs each of cloudy ammonia and sugar, ½ cup of water and a few drops of a prepared fruit fly control.

Screw the lid on and hang the bottle in a tree. Check regularly for dead flies and replace the liquid when necessary.

Magnolias are flowering in all their beauty now, pinks, whites, dark and light flowers. There will be one to suit a spot in your garden. Fertilize roses now for amazing blooms in the coming months.

Get on top of weeds now so your garden will be at its best coming into Summer. Enjoy your time in the Garden, Margaret Pumpa

MURRAY RIVER WIRES

We are now entering our busiest time of the year, going into spring and the mating season for most of our precious creatures.

At the moment we are receiving frequent calls about Barn owls being attacked by Ravens and Magpies in unprecedented numbers. We do not understand why this happening as of them, as are well nourished and healthy. Most of the Owls can be rehabilitated in care being fed, wounds treated with TLC and kept warm and safe. Unfortunately, some do not survive. If you find Owls on the ground during day or being attacked please call Murray River WIRES.

Echidnas are busy, strolling casually in most inappropriate places looking for a mate. If you are concerned about their safety and it is safe for you, just walk behind and shepherd them off the road. They will move at speed to their safe place off the road and in their own area. It is not advisable to put them in your car, they are proficient, professional diggers and will dig into car seats and up behind the console, glove box etc in among the wires! If concerned about Echidnas call Murray River WIRES.

Kangaroos caught in fences = severe (mostly fatal) injuries. If found do not approach the distressed animal. If it is possible try to throw a towel (or something similar) over its face and call for help. Please look for a joey that may be nearby. If possible stay nearby to guide us to the animal or mark the spot so that we can locate it quickly.

Baby possums found on the ground without mother, both ringtail and brushtail. Carefully note location, so that it may be released to its own area at a later date. Wrap the joey in something warm and soft, ring Murray River WIRES.

Ducklings are being found separated from their mother and sometimes in swimming pools and unable to get out. If found without their mum, gather them up into box or basket and leave them in the open so that their mum may come back and collect them. Place them in a safe area away from cats, dogs and humans. Observe from a distance to ensure their safety and to allow mother duck to come and collect her brood. If you have a pool place a log or piece of wood into the pool, this will assist them to get out of the water. Please do not place ducklings in water as their feathers are not yet fully waterproof.

Please do not try to feed small native animals commercial animal foods, milks etc. This can/will cause severe damage and may even result in death. Each animal has specific nutritional needs at every stage of their lives (just like us).

COUNCIL NEWS

With the postponement of the Local Government elections, Cr Heather Wilton will continue in the position of Mayor until the 4th of December elections. However an election for the position of Deputy Mayor will be required at the September meeting. Further the following meeting schedule was adopted for the period September 2021 – January 2022:

- Wednesday 15 September 2021
- Wednesday 13 October 2021
- Wednesday 10 November 2021
- Wednesday 1 December 2021
- Week commencing 10 January 2022

Community grants from the Bushfire Community Recovery and Resilience Fund (BCRRF) have been approved to the value of \$26,190.36 for the Wantagong and Wymah/Bowna RFS Brigades along with Holbrook Meals on Wheels. Council will contribute \$600 to the Southern Sports Academy for the 2021/2022 year to support three local athletes that are attending the Academy.

The Community Engagement Strategy for the Community Strategic Plan Review was approved. The strategy outlines various ways the community can engage with Council to assist in the review and development of the Community Strategic Plan. Council will be seeking feedback from a variety of stakeholders to understand the key priorities for the shire.

Greater Hume Council is an active member of the Murray Taskforce for the NSW Growing Regions of Welcome Pilot program. The taskforce will guide the strategic approach to newcomer attraction and retention, community welcome, employment and support service coordination.

Council has appointed Fulton-Hogan to the Spray Sealing Works for Greater Hume and Lockhart at a cost of \$1,747,867.08 exc. GST.

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
