ABOUT THE BUSH

Clocked that cuckoo call?

Unlike those quaint cuckoo clocks of yesteryear, our native cuckoos have a variety of interesting calls – none of which sound like the clock, which mimics the call of the northern hemisphere Common Cuckoo.

Like their northern cousins, Australian cuckoos are also brood parasites – relying on other birds to raise their young. They move south in spring to seek out the nests of unsuspecting warblers, honeyeaters, or thornbills to lay their eggs and let the host parents do all the hard work raising cuckoo offspring.


We have six species of cuckoo in bushland around our region. Most would know the incessant mournful call of Koels – a few of which are regular summer visitors to Culcairn. These large cuckoos parasitise Noisy Friarbird or Magpie-lark nests, and once the eggs hatch the young eject the eggs and chicks of their hosts.

Fan-tailed Cuckoos can be heard calling along Billabong Creek during winter. Their call is a descending trill, and these grey and cinnamon birds lay their eggs in scrubwren or thornbill nests. Shining and Horsefield's Bronze Cuckoos are small iridescent green and bronze summer migrants with beautiful, barred chests and under-tails. Both species have a piercing mournful call and parasitise the nests of fairy-wrens and thornbills.

Black-eared Cuckoos migrate south from northern Australia in spring and use the nests of Speckled Warblers in direr parts of our region. These cuckoos tend to call only during the breeding season, much like their bigger, caterpillar-eating relative, the Pallid Cuckoo, which also visits in warmer months. The target hosts for this species include Willie Wagtails, Rufous Whistlers and Black-faced Cuckoo-shrikes.

HUME BANK HERE TO STAY

Hume Bank has confirmed that their Culcairn branch is here to stay with current operating hours. Head of Community Impact & Partnerships at Hume Bank, Ben Foley said "We acknowledge that the reduction of our branch operating days from five to three could have inadvertently signalled that we were considering a permanent closure of our branch. This was not our intention, and we should have been clearer.

"As our customers continue to change the way they do their banking, we need to change with them. Many customers want enhanced digital services and are using less cash, which means transactions in branches continue to decline. We are committed to finding sustainable ways to provide local branch banking that meets the requirements of your entire community, including local businesses. We will investigate options to increase availability of services outside of regular business hours" Mr Foley said.

TRADITIONS OF THE ARAN SWEATER

The three Islands, Inishmore, Inishmaan, Inisheer, lie 30 miles out in the Atlantic Ocean from Galway, Ireland. Barren and rugged they support a remarkable community of about 2,000 people who wrest an arduous livelihood from the sea and soil. Stoical Aron fishermen risk their lives every day as they set out in their fragile boats into heavy seas. They seldom learn to swim. - accepting both life and death as inevitable.

To keep husbands warm and dry in the cold sea spray, Aran women created a sweater of wool, spun from the wool of small native sheep. It was originally spun with goose quills. Seaters had distinctive family patterns, with religious and folk symbols, many inspired by the carvings found on Irish stones and crosses.

Cable stitches symbolised the fisherman's ropes and were often combined with the Diamond pattern to join livelihood with prosperity.

Honeycomb patterns stand for thrift and are thought to be lucky. Irish Moss stitch invokes wealth. Trellis represents the small farm houses and their stone walls. Zigzag, combined with the Bobbles, stands for rocky outcropping. Patterns universal to all, assembled in a special individual way, served as a family signature.

Aran sweaters, worn and treasured, loved for their rugged warmth and sophisticated designs, are a unique contribution from these three tiny islands to the world. Ruth Scheetz

Probus meeting held at Henty on 13th July 2022. Our President Yvonne Booth introduced us to Margaret Pumpa from Culcairn and Margaret has been welcomed as our newest member. We welcomed more hand knitted hats to send off for seafarers. Thank you all for your effort.

Jeannie has talked more about a possible bus trip to Corowa on October 19th and home via a viewing of the newly painted water tower at Walla Walla.

Kate Finlayson was our five minute speaker and told of a ten week teaching assignment at Bogabilla - 10 hours and 32 minutes from Henty. Population of Bogabilla 551 people, where the centre of the town is the Wobbly Boot Hotel, and no town supermarket.

Kate learned about Indigenous people's culture and history and the difficulty of living in border towns during the Covid lockdowns. Thank you, Kate, for sharing a little of your experience.

After morning tea our speaker was Ben Hooper accompanied by Peter Campbell, to talk to us about Avondale Place Respite Centre being built at Henty. The hope is to give respite care in a familiar town for those in need of care and shortterm relief for carers.

Work has been started on a 4-bedroom home and on the adjacent block are to be at 4×2 bedroom units for independent living. This project is community driven and financed.

Training for employment is to be for community members. Mercy Connect is to be responsible for operations. Funding is 75% of where it needs to be, and both Lockhart and Greater Hume Councils are involved. There have been grants from State Funding as well as most generous local funding.

ATTRACTING MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES TO RELOCATE TO THE MURRAY REGION FOR LIFESTYLE AND EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

There is 2 Information Sessions for community members and prospective employers within the Greater Hume Shire on:

- Tues 23 August at Holbrook Library @ 5.15pm to 7.00pm

As part of a NSW Government pilot program to work with local communities to attract migrants and refugees to resettle in regional NSW, the Greater Hume community are invited to information sessions to learn more about this local project.

The focus for the three year pilot program is for people living in Western Sydney with the skills and aspirations to move to the region for employment and lifestyle opportunities. The overall aim is to provide migrants and refugees with the information and support they need to relocate to the region, and support Greater Hume communities to welcome newcomers and help them to thrive in the long-term.

Those that attend these consultation sessions will be updated on this pilot program by Murray GROW Taskforce members.

Hear how your community can make a difference by being involved, as well as have any questions answered, and hear your feedback, to ensure that there is locally led design and decision making occurring.

Co-Chair of the Murray Taskforce, Andrew Kotzur of Walla Walla said, "The NSW GROW program becomes a win-win for communities in terms of increasing diversity and clearly for businesses, it's an opportunity for prospective employers". It's no secret that there's a shortage in the workforce, but it's not without challenges, because housing is also very challenging now. Individual communities can't do this on their own, but working with Red Cross, Council, other support organisations together with the community and employers we are hoping to find solutions. encourage any business or community member to attend one of these sessions and hear about the potential benefits for the project within Greater Hume Council area" he added.

The NSW GROW Murray pilot program was formally launched in Walla Walla late June by the NSW Minister for Multiculturalism, the Hon Mark Coure.
