WALLA WALLA BUSINESSES: D.E. LIESCHKE & SON

Past

The Lieschke Family is proud of being able to claim "Walla Walla's Oldest Family Business". Actually, it's a 4th generation business with my father David Ernst Lieschke, myself, my 3 sons David, Anthony and Kim and my grandson Luke (Anthony's son).

Before 1923 (first generation), my father purchased the business in Walla from Otto Scholz. It was a motorcycle and cycle repair business. Dad was born on a farm in Alma Park in 1900 and after a meagre schooling, was destined to clear the farmland of Pine Scrub at Alma Park. His ambition was always to be a steam train driver so he took a correspondence course in steam engineering in 1914-1916. In the evenings after clearing the land all day, he would retreat to the farm's blacksmith and with hand tools only, built a double acting steam engine. The engine was named THE SUCCESS 1916 because it ran under its own steam power, and I still have it as a complete engine.

By 1922, he realized that the external combustion engine (steam engine) was inefficient compared to internal combustion engines (petrol engine) so his mother allowed him to go to Melbourne Working Men's College for one year, and take a full-time course in automotive mechanics. He passed this course with Honours and negotiated with Otto Schulz to buy the business. In 1923, the business started as D.E. Lieschke Walla Walla Motor Garage specializing in all types of motor and cycle repairs.

He was also a sub agent for Fred Blacklock and sold Ford T's and of course any other vehicle he could get his hands on. In 1926, he was appointed the Whippet/Overland dealer in Walla Walla district. He was also able to procure dealer selling rights for Essex, and Willy's Knight vehicles.

These 4-cylinder cars proved to be reliable cars on 1926 standards. Dad always thought the Chevrolet 4-cylinder motor cars were of a very high standard and after various applications to General Motors Holden (GMH) to obtain the franchise, he was finally accepted as a fully franchised dealer in August 1933 when the Great Depression forced other dealers in the district to close. Dad was a sole trader, and was able to survive the depression. Since then, the business has not looked back, although there have been ups and downs. Generally, the franchise has been a winner, although through the war years no new cars were available. After the war in October 1948, GM released the first Holden. The business thrived during the early Holden years having

CUDDLEPIE AND SNUGGLEPOT – WITNESSING A SQUIRREL GLIDER GROW

2020, perhaps a year where we could expect the unexpected. A year where we all had to learn to approach what we considered normal in new ways. For me personally an unexpected opportunity came up to witness the growth of a baby Squirrel Glider from just 1 week after birth to the release of her back into the wild at 6months - an experience and gift it was amongst the uncertainty of the world.

In July 2020 Hazel Cook, a WIRES volunteer, let me know a female Squirrel Glider had come into her care. It had been caught on a fence in barb wire, south of Burrumbuttock. The ultimate hope for any animal that comes



into care is to be able to release them back into the wild. After the initial immediate care given to the Squirrel Glider upon arrival and then a general health check it was discovered that she had a tiny baby glider in her pouch. Hazel estimated the baby was probably only 1 week old. I was keen to learn more about the growth patterns of a young Squirrel Glider and Hazel very kindly agreed to let me photograph the baby every 2 weeks whilst it was still in her care.



This began my personal connection to this little family. Hazel called the Mum Cuddlepie and the baby Snugglepot.

We know that Snugglepot was a female and we also know that she had learnt to be a Squirrel Glider back in the wild. We were able to get images of her catching a cicada off the trunk of the tree she was release in.



Despite the less than perfect state of the world in 2020 remarkable things were still happening in our back yards and paddocks. This experience has certainly given me the extra motivation as a human to advocate, care and work with this creature even more deeply. I feel very privileged to live in their back yard and work on the project I do. Thank you 2020 for this little ray of sunshine.

- 1) At 1 week old Snugglepot was the size of a thumb nail, permanently attached to her Mum's teat and without fur (what is referred to as a "pinky)"
- 2) In a month Snugglepot's body structure was really taking shape and was double the size.
- 3) The 6 week mark was quite remarkable as Snugglepot was showing pigmentation that preceded fur.
- 4) At around 2.5 months the growth was massive. Snugglepot went from little pinky to furred
- 5) Snugglepot was released December 3rd 2020, just under 6 months from birth. Sadly, Cuddlepie could not be released due to the loss of most of her tail.

WALLA WALLA TIMELINE – 1921, ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO!

January. Messrs Dechert & Tummel took over the former Griffith Bros. store at Walla Walla, selling clothing, Manchester and general drapery products. Only a couple of adverts appear in papers over a sixmonth period, before they ultimately sold the business, to Mr. H. G. Wenke in August.

January. The new silos, FARM-ERS AT WALLA REFUSE TO USE THE SILOS. "They allege the silos are damp" as reported in Sept. 1920. For the 1920-21 season all deliveries to Walla were once again to be in bags, as the silos had been deemed not fit for use back in November.

February. Mr. K. J. (Jack) Lieschke sold his Commission Agency business situated at what is now 62 Commercial Street to Mr. Jim Kirwan. Along with the commission agency, this business also sold Deering and McCormick lines of machinery. On this block there was a large shed which housed an office, and a depot Mr. Lieschke sold the block of land along with the buildings in 1924. (Mr. Kirwan did not own the land or shed.) This business was where Elders are now in 2021.

February 1st. The first meeting was held by the Walla Walla Progress Association in the School of Arts, (Town Hall). After 5 committeemen were elected, the first item of business was a concern that the loads of hay being carted to the chaff mill were causing damage to the telephone and telegraph lines. This was to be brought to the Postal Inspector's notice, also the bad state of the railway crossing heading north on Commercial St, the Railway Department were to be notified. This association was an early version of the current Walla Walla Development Committee. (WWDC)

February. Following the closure of Walla's first Private Hospital, "Kiora", on William Street in 1913, and before the opening of the second Private Hospital, "Walteena" on Queen Street in 1923, the Doctor's Residence was being used as the hospital. One room was especially built back in 1903 as a convalescing room, containing two beds. In 1921 it was known as Dr. Finselbach's hospital, Dr. Finselbach being the resident Doctor at that time.

March. Two haystacks that were soon to be cut for chaff, were burnt at Walla Park, after one was struck by lightning and the ensuing fire spread to the second stack. About 300 tons of hay was destroyed, a third stack was scorched. Mr. Paech had the haystacks covered by insurance.

May. Walla Subdivision Football Club "re-formed," too late to enter a team in any competition that year, so they would play only social matches. Prior to 1921, Mr. George Schnaars allowed the use of his paddock (farm 29) on the left of Schnaars Road, just over the bridge on Kangaroo Creek. A working bee was organised to get the ground in playing order. Club colours were maroon jumpers with gold band and white shorts.

June. A new school was to be built at Hickory Hill, on the Walla subdivision block of Mr. Gus Heynes. The Minister for Education had approved of the work being

carried out by the Departmental Day Labour Staff and was to be put in hand early in the financial year. By 1922, the new school was ready for use. The teacher in 1922 was Miss. Butler. A garden was planted for the students, and a shelter shed was added in 1924, paid for by funds raised by sports days, concerts evenings and picnic days. This is now a vacant block with some trees.

June. The Alma Park school briefly closed due to lack of numbers. For nearly 7 years, the district children were taught in a subsidised school, the teachers were appointed by responsible parents. In 1923 an advert was placed for a teacher for a "subsidised school at Alma Park for six pupils".

July. The Sunrise Provisional School had been closed for a fortnight, owing to the illness of teacher, Mr. Dunn. Sunrise was on the Walla - Henty road.

Mid 1921. The new current Sports Ground was deemed too wet, Mr. E.G. Wenke was there to help; he offered the paddock where the Golf Club had their new links. A suitable area was cleared nearby and levelled in a few weeks, ready to play footy once again. This area is still quite visible off Morgan's Road just south of the Railway Line, east of the road; note the circular clearing.

July. Mr. B. Dalwitz left Walla and moved to Temora. His carrying business was to be continued by Mr. E. Rawson. The Catholic congregation used to hold events like dances, a bazaar, etc. in Mr. Rawson's depot. This was on two blocks where the old newsagent/Wiesner's open shed is now in 2021.

August. "The plasterers are busy putting the finishing touches on E. D. Heppner's private dwelling, and when completed it will be one of the most up to date, commodious and substantial residences in the district. It is of reinforced concrete, and Mr. Heppner asserts it will last a century." The concrete walls were reinforced using old or discarded plough shares from Mr Heppner's business, according to some, the house was not expected to last. In 2021, this house is the offices used by PJN, not long to go until the century Mr. Heppner asserted! (This item mistakenly appeared in last year's February Newsletter.)

August. Mr. H. G. Wenke took over the I.X.L. Store, formally Griffiths Bros. store operated for a short time by Messrs Dechert and Tummel, Mr. Wenke was ably assisted by Mr. J. S. P. Giersch who had relinquished his General Store in 1920. The store retained its IXL name, it was the former stone building beside the Hotel.

August. Before the start of the Line Competition, which Walla was influential in starting in 1924, Walla Walla Football Club chartered a Special Train to convey team and supporters to Brocklesby on Saturday; a full train of 250 people made the trip. Walla won, 4 goals 9 to Brock's, 4 goals 6.

September. The new Concrete Silos repair work completed. Due to issues with water lodging within the base of each silo, portions of the silo bases had to be removed and rebuilt. At the Walla silos, water was found to be 1 foot deep in the channel that runs under each silo, and hundreds of dead mice and numerous dead pigeons

also had to be removed. The silos were now ready for the 1921-22 harvest.

September. The Walla Football Club were premiers again, losing only one game for the season. Playing for the Carter's Cup, it was their third premiership in a row.

October. The Catholic Church opened in Market St. The right Rev. Dr. Dwyer; Bishop of Wagga officiated. Before then, Catholics met at Rice Hall. When this was demolished in 1920, they worshipped in the Baptist Church, also in Market St. This new church was an "imposing feature on the Walla landscape."

October. Walla Golf Club was formed. A meeting had been called in early October to gauge interest which proved to be very strong. "Through the courtesy of Mr. E. G. Wenke a nine-hole course has been laid down in his paddocks, where the state of the ground lends itself to an ideal course ..." 50 – 60 members and nonmembers attended the official opening of the Walla Golf Club on the 26th.

October. Walla Cricket Club voted to form a 2nd team, teams to be known as North Walla and South Walla. This decision was going to weaken a chance of a premiership, but with membership at a high, at least twice as many players now had the chance to get a game.

October. Cricket Match at Walla. Married Vs Singles, the Singles won by an innings and 130 runs!

November. The Sherwyn school had now been closed for 8 weeks, the Education Department said that there was difficulty in getting relieving teachers, parents were worried that these breaks were interfering with the progress of the children concerned. These interruptions were not an uncommon occurrence on the schools of the Walla Subdivision, it was often a case of the isolation and often crude accommodation being a drawback, or if a teacher became ill, it was not easy to find an immediate replacement. In one case a teacher enlisted for active duty in WW1, so he suddenly had to leave. Due to the war and immediately after, teachers' services were at a premium.

November. Walla Subdivision Cricket Club formed. They were called the Centrals and played on numerous home grounds over a period of years, one being on a paddock east of the Walla Subdivision Hall, another being the Walla Subdivision Recreation Ground on the Walla – Alma Park road.

December. The Shipard home at "Bona Vista", Walla Walla, also operated as a school. In 1921, 6 children attended, and a Miss Kroeber, from Albury, was the teacher. The school inspector had only recently visited, according to a letter by 10yo Vivienne Shipard to the Uncle Jeff Column in 1921.

It appears this school operated between 1921 (maybe earlier) and 1924, Miss. McEachern was the teacher in 1923. The Shipard children then attended Walla Public School from 1925.

In 1950, I was accepted into the business and I worked with my father until his death in January 1977. Therefore, I was privileged to grow up with the Holden vehicles and have witnessed every make and model of Holden vehicles until my retirement.

In 1963, we were accepted as the Walla Walla Branch agency for NRMA Goods and Services which included 24 -hour roadside service. Although this meant very late nights, with a system of rostering, we have been able to keep the motoring public on its wheels.

In 1977, my son David came into the business. In October 1983 we purchased the Holden dealership in Holbrook. David became Dealer Principal there. My son Anthony came into the business in December 1981, and after doing his Auto Engineering course and various other short courses, and after my retirement in 2008, he was accepted as the Dealer Principal for General Motors Holden.

Nissan Motor Company accepted the Lieschke family as dealers in 1977. In January 1985, my son Kim came into the business after doing his Auto Engineering course and various automotive courses. He is now currently Dealer Principal for Nissan.

Over the 97 years we have been in Walla, many and various building programs were undertaken which included the purchase of adjacent properties and other nearby properties. In my retirement I have been able to pursue my hobby of steam engines and I am in the process of building a model traction engine.

<u>Present</u>

Vehicle diagnostics is now carried out by plugging in our computer into the vehicle and communicating with the diagnostic system. This will give us a trouble code or DTC which will allow us to look at the data coming from the engine sensors to the vehicle computer. This certainly helps with the vehicle diagnostic process.



Automatic transmissions are an area of huge change. We are now selling vehicles with a CVT (Constant Variable Transmission). This transmission has an infinite gear selection depending on vehicle speed and engine load. This is a little different to the 3 speed Hydromatic auto behind the Holden grey motor in the 1962 EK Holden. The CVT is designed to keep the engine in its torque range to give best possible power and fuel economy.

Engines with smaller capacity are being used together with turbo charges to do the job of larger engines. A 1.4L turbo engine is not uncommon in the current market giving plenty of power and good fuel economy with less pollutants

We currently sell: 1) New Nissan vehicles; 2) Used cars all makes and models and; 3) Green field and Cox mower agents. We also have a fully equipped workshop (see below) with trained factory staff to service all of the above.



With our current 7 mechanical staff, we have a combined 148 years of mechanical experience on all different types of vehicles ranging from hatchbacks to school buses. Last year we invoiced 4,012 Repair Orders for service/repair work on vehicles.

Future

As of June 30th, 2020, GM decided to no longer manufacture right hand drive motor vehicles and therefore ceased manufacture of the Holden cars. This was a 'blow' to us as a family as we were their dealers in Walla Walla for 87 years.



With the Holden manufacturer leaving Australia, I believe Australia will miss out on a lot but what else can a manufacturer do? – either go broke or build where labour is cheaper. We haven't made any decisions yet on a replacement motor vehicle franchise but I can assure you that we will remain in business in Walla Walla-selling Nissan vehicles in volume, including the Nissan Leaf Electric cars.

Electric cars are becoming more and more popular, not as a hybrid but 100% electric. Electric, hybrid and hydrogen powered vehicles are gradually being brought in by manufacturers. The cost of production has been expensive and hence high retail price has been a factor in slow uptake. Manufacturers are always improving production methods and the cost of these vehicles is gradually coming down. Infrastructure for refuelling/charging these vehicles is a major factor with a country the size of Australia. The NRMA is working to place filling/charging stations across NSW and other States. Nissan also has Hybrid models including the Pathfinder with more models to be released in the near future.

Autonomous/driverless vehicles are on the roads now testing the technology which may be fool-proofed within a decade. But I am sure both you and I would be hesitant to sit in the passenger seat right now and be driven around by a computer!

Come into the Walla Walla Post Office and sign the petition for better water pressure. The more signatures we get, the better chance we have to get this issue sorted. The water pressure from the Swimming Pool heading south, is very low to non existent.

WEEDS AT WALLA WALLA

When we were kids, some of us used to say "sick, sicker, sickest". Others said "sick, dying, dead". It is interesting to know which of these is used by bindii plants. I found out the other day it was the latter. I bent right down with ear close to a nice mature plant in Market St. I had given the plant a dose of spray, so it was in its death throes, and I heard: "sick, dying, dead".

With that mystery resolved, we can continue to hunt them down, and show no mercy. They must go. They can never have a symbiotic existence alongside of the good people of Walla Walla.

We can also concentrate on other weeds that need our attention, to point them in the direction of dead and gone. Fleabane is rampant everywhere. If not mowed, it stands straight up, has floppy leaves. Mowing does not kill it, it grows new shoots from lower down. It is usually easy to pull up, but difficult to kill with spray. Chipping at ground level works perfectly.

Hairy panic is now going to seed, and continues to be an annual nuisance. Paspalum is also now going to seed, and I would love to see it gone from our town. It has those very long seed stalks, with sticky seeds at the ends, which stick to clothing, and pets' hair. It hates being sprayed. Chipping a few cm below ground level sends them to an early grave. I

have eradicated it from various areas around town, but it will take a few more years to see the last about five hundred expired. There is also some khaki weed, under control, about 20 patto plants, under control, about an acre of water weed (with small fat leaves), and a hectare or so of wire weed (it looks like wire going across the ground). Neither of these are under control). I have seen a few bathurst burr, which are now in the great beyond. Heliotrope is growing nicely just now, but too many to easily control. Quite clearly, the growing time for nasty weeds is yet to finish.

As a final thought, what is a better way to say "bad, badder, baddest"? Patto plants might know.
