

MOVEMBER

Warning: This story mentions suicide

The month of November is also known as Movember. The Movember movement was started in 2003 when two Australian mates, Travis Garone and Luke Slattery, decided over a few beers at a Melbourne pub to start growing a moustache for a joke. The idea was that since moustaches were going out of fashion, maybe they could grow one and raise money at the same time. They found 30 other male friends willing to take up the challenge.

There are three main issues affecting men that Movember aims to address: 1) approximately 10.8 million men around the world will be diagnosed with prostate cancer with the rate of diagnosis set to double in next 15 years; 2) Testicular cancer is the most common cancer amongst men worldwide with diagnoses having doubled in last 50 years and 3) The suicide rate among men is 3 out of 4 suicides (most die when younger than 44 years old) and one man dies from suicide every minute of each day. On average, men die 5 years earlier than women and many die from preventable causes.

Money raised through Movember funds groundbreaking projects to address male-specific cancer treatments and research as well community projects to engage men into maintaining good mental health. So far, 1,250 projects for improving men's health outcomes have been funded with 6.9 million participants. The motto of Movember is: Grow a Mo, Save a Bro!

In 2009, researchers at the University of Michigan identified 25+ different

types of prostate cancer. The Global Action Plan was launched in 2010 to accelerate prostate cancer research outcomes though global collaboration. Movember funding meant that the prostate cancer genome mapping project was completed. In 2008, it was discovered that testicular cancer has a genetic link and is more prevalent in some families. The Prostate Urine Risk Test was developed in 2020 which identifies patients needing follow up treatment within 5 years.

From its humble Melbourne beginnings, Movember is now truly a global movement. From 30 Mo Bros registered in 2003, there were over 6 million Mo Bros in 2021! A year after its inception, Movember had 480 Mo Bros (and Mo Sisters!) registered who raised \$54,000 to fund 6 projects including sending the biggest cheque ever received to the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia (PCFA). In 2005, PCFA became the first official benefitting charity to be associated with Movember when 9,795 Mo Bros and Sisters had raised more than \$1.2 million. In 2006, New Zealand joined Movember and BeyondBlue became the second official partnering charity followed by Prostate Cancer Foundation NZ. Canada, Spain, UK and USA joined in 2007 and 73 projects were funded by the \$AU32 million raised. Since then, other countries such as Ireland, South Africa, Finland, Netherlands, Czech Republic, Norway, Belgium, Denmark, Singapore, Hong Kong, Switzerland, Austria, France and Germany have joined. Other benefitting charities across the world include various cancer councils and mental health initiatives.

Movember Men's Health Awareness Month

Movember Australia funded a 3-part ABC TV series in 2017 titled 'Man Up' which was about gender stereotypes, the pressures of manhood and why so many men resort to suicide. In the USA, a similar documentary investigated how to improve resilience in males of different generations including boys and men of colour, returning veterans and men currently serving with the military as well as first responders struggling to cope. Family Man, an online parenting tool aimed at new dads was launched by Movember Australia in 2021. Movember projects aim to make men and boys understand that bottling up fears and problems is detrimental to their own mental health and should not be viewed as less 'manly'. Open communication and seeking advice or assistance leads to better solutions and hopefully prevents suicide.

The specific reason behind the moustache growing is that it would start a conversation from friends, family, co-workers etc about why a man is suddenly growing a moustache when they are no longer common and that in turn, would lead to discussion about men's health issues. There are a few rules but the main one is that participants must be clean shaven on the morning of November 1st. What happens to the moustache after November 30th is an individual choice with most men shaving it off but some may keep theirs.

BURRUMBUTTOCK'S SQUIRREL GLIDER LAMP PROJECT ON TARGET TO DOUBLE THE SQUIRREL GLIDER POPULATION

In 2014, a population analysis of Squirrel Gliders around Burrumbuttock estimated that only 500 animals existed in the local area. If nothing was done to help this animal they would likely keep declining in numbers and disappear form the local area. To ensure Squirrel Gliders had a future, threatened species ecologists calculated that doubling the population to at least 1000 would be required. From this baseline work the development of the Burrumbuttock Squirrel Glider Local Area Management Plan (LAMP) emerged.

Recent analysis of the work completed for the project revealed that this unique plan is on target to achieving the goal of doubling the population. It is a project that has involved



population. It is a project that has involved local landholders, local community, local contractors, and local organisations.

Prior to any on ground work it was estimated that:

 There was 5023 ha of habitat that was considered suitable for Squirrel Gliders and this was made up of 115 individual patches averaging 43 ha in size.

Since on ground works have been implemented:

• Suitable habitat has increased to 5399 ha and this is made up of 83 patches of 65 ha average in size (so larger connected patches)

This means that Squirrel Gliders will remain in the local area and thrive well into the future. A great outcome for all involved in the project. The strength in this project, it's achievements and on going commitment of those involved comes down to a love for seeing this enigmatic creature not only survive but thrive in the landscape.



WEEDS AT WALLA WALLA

Weeds of interest just now include:

Hairy panic is now up and about. We all know what it looks like when it produces stalks, but do we recognise it when small? It grows where very little else grows, like bare patches of soil, even where there are a few bits of soil on concrete, for example. See my photo of small plants taken on Nov 11th. Since they grow very fast, they could be much bigger when you read this. There are still heaps of dry stalks from last year in hiding spots in Walla, because the heaps were not taken away. There will be bigger heaps early next year, by the look of it.



Bindiis are yet to be seen. A very small plant from last year is shown in the photo below. Bindiis do not muck around. A few days after this photo was taken, flowers appeared on the plant. Keep an eagle eye open to see them, then be a destroyer!

Paspalum has started growing in many places. See photo. It spreads out, and smothers other plants, like lawn. Its worst feature is its horrible sticky seed pods that are on the end of long stalks. Walla can do without paspalum. It can be dug out with a strong narrow hoe, or a mattock. The lawn or grass under the paspalum plant will bless you many times when you remove its smotherer.

Sticky weed is not yet finished growing bigger and bigger. It is an absolute nuisance. It climbs up on fences and inside bushes and even climbs up trees, as is happening in the photo (below). The are many healthy specimens in Walla Walla just now. Pulling them out is easy, roots can be left there, as the plant does not grown from roots, only from seeds, so get them to the tip right now.
