STORY OF A RESCUED SQUIRREL GLIDER AND SHORT FILM TO BE MADE

In early August local farmers Jill and Brendan Mott discovered a Squirrel Glider caught on an old barb wire fence along their driveway. Their quick thinking and action lead them to carefully untangle the little Squirrel Glider, contact WIRES (NSW Wildlife, Information and Rescue Service) and transport him to the Family Vet Centre in Albury.

The delicate rescue was followed by nearly six weeks of further care and treatment co-ordinated by dedicated WIRES volunteer Hazel Cook and the vets at the Family Vet Centre. Hazel said "The issue for Squirrel Gliders is when they are trapped in the barb of the fence by their flying membrane (the skin between their hands and feet). The blood supply to the delicate skin here is compromised and the fine membrane starts to die back – then it keeps dying back to the place where there is normal tissue that can heal. The risk is the unique gliding membrane will be so damaged that the animal may not be able to properly glide again. This would mean the natural mode of travel would be highly compromised and ability to move around the trees to find food and shelter severely altered. If Gliders are caught on another part of their body the recovery is very different. It is also hard to know just how much membrane is required for the animals to be able to be

returned to their natural habitat and survive".

The young male did recover and despite a slightly less than perfect membrane, was ready for releasing back to his home ground.

It was a fortunate crossing of paths that Jill had with Lou Bull (local Squirrel Glider Project Officer) where Jill shared her story of rescuing the Squirrel Glider, that the idea was sown to create a film about the Glider.


On September 11th Hazel, Jill, Brendan, kids, and local film maker Darren Grigg were able to witness and film the release of this young male Squirrel Glider back to where he was found.

When released, the Glider very easily scampered up the tree and into a hollow. As twilight settled in, we were treated to the sight of him climbing to the very top of the tree and successfully gliding towards trees along the roadside – a distance of at least 25m. It was comforting and reassuring to see that gliding was still possible and the

WALLA WALLA HISTORY

Walla Subdivision/Alma Park

Rural Bush Fire Brigade.

The early years, 1909 – 1914.

The beginning of the Walla Subdivision Fire Brigade goes right back to the early days of the sub-division of the Walla Walla Estate which occurred in February 1909.

In January 1910 at a Culcairn Farmers & Settlers meeting, it was mentioned that the Walla Subdivision was happy to contribute to a fire cart just purchased by the newly formed Culcairn Bush Fire Brigade. The feeling from this meeting was that the Walla Subdivision should purchase one of their own, and that by the commencement of the next fire season, 1910-11, Walla Subdivision should have a fully equipped brigade. **This was the first reference to a step towards forming a fire brigade at Walla Subdivision.**

On December 5th, 1910, "Mr. R. Thompson, sec. of the Walla Subdivision F. & S. Association, requesting a grant from the council for the purpose of forming a bush fire brigade". Council then resolved to grant a subsidy of £15 (\$30) per year. Cr Hermann Paech was a prime mover to change council's attitude towards forming and then supporting Bush Fire Brigades.

By December 1910, Walla Sub had had a fire brigade 16 years before the Walla Walla township had any organised fire defence.


1914 was the last mention of Council financial support of the Shire's fire brigades, and indeed any mention of brigade activity on Walla Subdivision for about 15 years.

November 1938, The NSW State Government Bush Fire Advisory Committee requested Culcairn Council to take steps to organise bush fire brigades in its area. One of the brigades to come from this direction was the Walla Subdivision Bush Fire Brigade one year later.

1939 – A brigade is formed at Walla Subdivision.

On November 9th, 1939, at the Walla Subdivision Hall; a meeting was called by Mr. J. Crawley regarding forming a fire brigade. 18 prospective members were present. Mr. Crawley read a letter from Culcairn Shire Council "proposing the organisation of a Bush Fire Brigade at Walla Subdivision." This was supported by the men present. Election of office bearers was then held; Mr. Crawley was elected president, Mr. Bill Godde elected Sec-

retary. Mr. Kohlhausen moved that the annual levy be flat rate of 10/- (10c). Crawley was then duly elected as Captain, Mr. G. J. Kotzur, Vice-Captain. A committee was elected to purchase necessary equipment and see to the insurance for private trucks used to move brigade equipment. "Messrs J. Crawley, T. Klemke, and N. R. Shoemark offered their motor trucks to transport equipment wherever it was needed."

As to be expected, the brigade bought equipment for brigade use, as well as purchasing equipment so that members could buy at a reasonable rate for their own use, eg. burning off, clearing, cleaning up rubbish etc. as well as assisting with brigade commitments.

1950 - Alma Park amalgamates with Walla Sub.

October 30th, 1950, Alma Park joined with Walla Sub to form the "Walla Subdivision – Alma Park Rural Bush Fire Brigade." Fees were now 10/- for every landholder up to 50 acres, and 2/- for every 100 acres or part thereof after.

October 1952 the NSW Bush Fire Advisory Committee gives each brigade within the Culcairn District a specific colour, according to the *brigade minutes* the colour given to Walla Sub was "Light Slate", but in effect the Culcairn District called it "Blue".

November 1953 was big moment in the brigade's history, the **first fire truck is purchased** for the brigade from Mr. Gibbon of Walbundrie on recommendation from G. J. Kotzur who had inspected the truck earlier.

October 1954 the brigade purchased a second truck, this time from Seaton Motors, for £335.

2004 – A new name to keep up with the changing times.

In October 2004 the General Meeting considered a name change for the brigade. A motion was put forward, after discussion it was decided to vote to change the name from Walla Subdivision and Alma Park Bush Fire Brigade to just "Alma Park Bush Fire Brigade."

In August of 2005, Marg Wehner from the RFS reported that the Alma Park Fire Brigade was the largest in area in the fire district.

So, at the 2015 annual meeting, correspondence from Group Captain Noel Shippard, outlined a plan; a replacement fire truck within one year, and a fire shed within five years. Preliminary discussion proposed that: 1. The old tennis reserve was a good location; 2. Shed should be solar powered; and 3. Would have self-contained water tanks.


The 2018 Annual Meeting closed at 8:45, followed with a "look over the Fire Shed plans." Now there was at least something to look at!

2019 - Finally, a New Fire Shed, and the Brigades' 80th Anniversary.

From day one, the brigade has relied on members to store and look after brigade-owned equipment, whether it be like in the early days, knapsacks, fire beaters and rakes, to rudimentary pump/tank units, through to upgraded technology with better pumps, larger tanks, trucks, quick fill pump and the associated protective equipment required by the modern fire fighter. Up until mid-2019 the two trucks had been stored for much of their time since 1953 in the sheds of Ron and later John Wiesner, also Cecil and later Derek Kohlhausen, among others in the earlier years. Part of the storage deal was to maintain and run these units, to keep them in condition, ready for action. In the case of one of the current trucks, start-up first thing in the morning of an expected bad fire day to get air pressure into the brake system.

In 2019 work started on building the New Fire Shed; the road entrance had been in place for a year or two. The block of land had been set aside from block 51 in 1908 as a "Proposed Reserve" during the survey work done in preparation for the breakup of the Walla Walla Station into farm blocks in 1909. This block had hosted tennis and cricket for many years until about 1974 when The Centrals Tennis Club finished up.

In early 2019 the concrete pad was laid down, the shed was constructed in June by a local Albury contractor, and the finishing touches put in place over the ensuing months. The shed is designed as a storage for two fire trucks with plenty of space for other equipment owned by the brigade; while still allowing space to hold meetings and brigade functions as well. The RFS put up the entire funding of the building, this being part of an ongoing infrastructure program undertaken by the RFS over many years right across the state of NSW. The furnishing of the shed came from grants offered by the Government. The two self-contained tanks for water supply mentioned in the 2015 minutes, have been installed, as was the building's 100% solar power reliance, all on the old "Tennis Court Reserve", or as it was always known in years past, as the "Walla Subdivision Reserve".

On November 9th 2019 the Walla Subdivision Bush Fire Brigade, 1939 to 1950; the Walla Subdivision & Alma

Park Rural Bush Fire Brigade, 1950 to 2004; and finally the Alma Park Bush Fire Brigade, 2004 – onwards; celebrates 80 years of constant volunteering, overseeing a large area of solely farming and rural communities. It is a testament to the need, but more likely the perseverance of those who helped set up and initially operate as a fledgling band of volunteers with limited funding in tough times, to an organisation now with much more at their disposal to be fire ready in a modern, politically correct and more demanding world.


