A Special meeting of the Development Committee was held on 27th August 2020, we had two items on the agenda

SKATE PARK

Exciting news – The Greater Hume Council advised we will now be getting a brand-new skate park, made from all cement. We will not now be getting left over parts from other replaced parks.

We were guided by what was discussed at the Open Community Meeting. We will apply for 4 projects we think worthy and will improve our town for locals, visitors and businesses. WALLA WALLA HISTORY

Three Early Descriptions of Walla Walla (Ebenezer)

Firstly, in December 1875: Here we have the first known recorded description of Ebenezer; albeit brief, it does give some insight into the village at this time. The Jindera correspondent to the Albury Banner wrote: "I paid a visit a day or two ago to Walla Walla, [note "Walla Walla" not "Ebenezer," as expected, it was still 2 years until the PO was opened and the town name officially changed to Walla Walla] and I was much struck by the thriving appearance of the place. About six and twenty [26] selectors are gathered together within a comparatively small area and make up almost a township of themselves. They hold from 100 to 1000 acres each and all seem to be getting well. They on a church, and a capital school attended daily by between 30 and 40 children. The school is conducted by Mr. Zelius (sic), who teaches both German and English, and the progress made by the pupils as displayed at the recent examination, gave every satisfaction of the parents and friends of the children. The crops in this direction look very healthy and promising, both wheat and oats. ... A Post Office is badly wanted in this locality, the residents having at present to take turnabout in doing duty as letter -carrier to the nearest station, seven miles distant." Australian Town and Country (Sydney), Journal 25th December 1875, p18. No businesses yet, just one church and one school.

December 18th 1884: The Correspondent for the Albury Banner made a visit to Jindera and Walla Walla regions, here is an edited version of what he wrote: Heading north from Jindera, the crops are looking very poor, not worth the farmers taking them off. However, further near Walla there were what looked like passable yields. Walla district averaged 14 bushels per acre for wheat, better than other areas because they were sown a little later. Oats, however, did not yield as good, thus, most was cut by binder.

A visit was paid to Wiesner and Kilo, machinists and blacksmiths they had made numerous improvements. Our correspondent was shown a screw-cutting lathe just imported from England, now in full operation and turning out excellent work. This firm have now completed eight of their new popular strippers and are working long hours making others.

A visit then to the congregational

school conducted by Mr Zilius, who was also the postmaster, showing off his students writing and arithmetic books, which reflected credit on both pupils and teacher. It was then off next door to the church, an interesting observation, "I strongly recommend the Rev. Pastor Egan to impress upon his congregation the advisability of erecting a more suitable place of worship, the only recommendation of the present building being its extreme cleanliness." Albury Banner, 19th December 1884, p13. So, by 1884 the first church, now still only 12 years old but as other reports and observations tell us, the wattle and daub walls and thatched roof were then in need of serious repair, however, every effort was made to keep the interior as clean and presentable as possible. In 1884 we have one business, one Post office, one church and one school.

August 1890: Walla's first butchering business started off as a partnership between Joe Wiesner, Pannach and Ernst Mickan. Situated in the corner of Mr Ernst Wenke's block, about where the back of the Sportsground is now, access was up a lane known as Hennersdorf Lane just south of the Heppner Blacksmith business, now part of PJN. By early 1891, Joe had left the butchering business, and continued with blacksmithing. Pannach and Mickan then continued on the butchering business, advertising in local papers from time to time for staff.

A snapshot of Walla in August 1890, starting at the South end: Gartner and Heppner's agricultural implement factory and blacksmith works, employing ten men. An "immense iron building, about 100ft long." Opposite was W. Wiesner and Co. store, adjoining the new Hotel, built by W. Wiesner and recently

opened, Mr. H. Voss licence holder. Behind the Hotel was the sale yards, owned by W. Wiesner, and used by numerous selling agents. Also, in the same vicinity was a baker, bootmaker (August Wegner) and tailor. A saddler (Peter Boorberg) intended to start as soon as his shop was completed. Behind the blacksmith works was the Abattoir*/ Butchery owned by Joe Wiesner, Traugott Pannach and Ernst Mickan. "A short distance from the Hotel is the Public School, in charge of Mr. Hunter. There are between 50 and 60 children on the roll. Next to the school is a pretty building, the Lutheran Church." Also, near the school was the Post Office Albury Banner, 8th August * - Elsie Grosse described 1890, p16. this business location as the "killing yards" in her 1959 90th anniversary of Walla booklet. In 1890 we have at least nine businesses, plus the PO, Church and school.

An interesting statistic from 1890, is that there were just 25 German families in the Walla town area. This included the extended families of German farmers who may have had sons at home on the farm as well as their own young families, all counted as part of the "one" family. There were also about 6 non-German families, and numerous single men, mainly itinerant workers of varying nationalities, coming and going as work permitted.

The above correspondent also went on to say that the main street of Walla was the "perfect quagmire," and the road from Gerogery to Walla took three hours to negotiate, with a good horse and a light buggy! It was August!




