#### COMMUNITY THUMBS UP FOR NEW WALLA WALLA CHILDCARE CENTRE

A large number of people took the opportunity to take a peek at the new childcare centre in Walla Walla on Sunday September 8<sup>th</sup>, and was given a clear thumbs up by the community and children.

Greater Hume Children Services partnered with Walla Walla Community Markets to celebrate the near-completion of the new Walla Walla Childcare Centre. The day provided an opportunity for people to take a peek inside the new childcare centre before the new building was open for business.

It was a very successful day with a constant stream of peo-

ple looking at the fantastic centre. All generations had an interest in the centre and feedback from many was very positive, with some people commenting they wish they were a child again! The nature-based playground and natural furnishings were a hit with both the kids and adults.

The building is now finished and the childcare service will transition to the new building as of Monday 16<sup>th</sup> September under the current arrangements Monday to Wednesday.

Families and the community will be able to access the new five days a week service as of Monday 14<sup>th</sup> October, 7.30am to 5.30 pm.

## 80 YEARS OF RED CROSS IN WALLA WALLA

The Walla Walla Branch of Red Cross NSW Division was formed at a public meeting on the 26<sup>th</sup> of September 1939. This meeting was called by Shire Councillors W. M. Odewahn and L. C. Lindner.

Meetings were held monthly at the Literary Institute and CWA rooms. During the war years, the members often worked in conjunction with the Comforts Fund Committee for the welfare of servicemen, particularly those in hospital. A great deal of knitting and sewing was done to this end. The President at the time made an appeal on behalf of the POWs and spoke of the horrors and hardships endured by the men who were in the hands of the Japanese. She asked those in the town who criticised the Red Cross, to make themselves familiar with what the Red Cross has done and was doing for the wounded and the





POWs, and asked members to explain to others the need for more assistance to this very worthwhile cause.

The main sources of income in the early years were from gymkhanas, Paddy's Market, tea stall on Referendum Day, afternoon teas at tennis tournaments and cricket finals, and dance suppers. Members provided the cakes and donated 1/towards the cost of sandwiches.

Some historical snippets of Red Cross activities include:

At a clearing sale at E.A. Paech's property, fifty large loaves of bread, seventeen pounds of butter, twenty pounds of corned meat and six pounds of sausage were

#### LIESCHKE NISSAN ELECTRIFIED

It is certainly exciting times here at Lieschke Nissan Walla Walla with the arrival of the first electric car...

#### The Nissan Leaf

I think it would be appropriate first to reflect back on our family business in Walla before I get too excited on the current new step in the ever evolving car game.

David Ernst Lieschke (our Grandad) in the early 1900's was fascinated with steam and steam engines; he actually wanted to be a steam locomotive train driver. However, along came the internal combustion engine (petrol engine) and Grandad realised this new form of energy would overtake steam. Therefore, he went down to Melbourne to learn all about this new, exciting step in technology. Upon returning home, he started the family business here in Walla Walla in 1923, and it continued from there. Cecil John Lieschke (Dad) joined the business in 1950 and they have seen many changes in petrol engines. I will just touch on a few progressions: points, carbys, distributors, electronic ignition (that was special!!), fuel injection, computers controlling the engine (really).



I say quite often "If Grandad could see the cars today". He would have thought having a radio was special back in the day, but now with all the new technology such as heated seats, heated steering wheel, satellite navigation... this is the new norm.

David, Anthony, Kim and Luke (Luke is the 4<sup>th</sup> generation) are keeping a close watch as cars evolve. It's exciting, the car game never sits still!

Our Motto is "By Service We Grow" and with this in mind, we have sold and serviced motor vehicles for 95 years in Walla Walla, keeping abreast with modern technology as the motor car evolves.

Now it's time for electric cars and here are some interesting facts about the Nissan Leaf:

- The range of the Nissan Leaf is 270km's (based on worldwide harmonized light vehicle test procedures).
- It is surprisingly quick: 0 to 100km/h in 7.9 seconds.
- It has 110kw of power.
- It's quiet, VERY QUIET, whisper quiet!
- You can charge it from a normal 240V power point.
- A quick charging point will charge the batteries in approx. 1 hour (0 to 80% of capacity).
- You can drive the Nissan Leaf using 1 pedal (E Pedal). You have a pedal like an accelerator but when you take your foot off, it slows the vehicle converting this energy to charge the batteries.
- Comes with 5 years unlimited km warranty.
- 8 year/160,000km battery state of health warranty.
- Maintenance costs on this vehicle are minimal (no regular oil changes).

Now I could carry on about the car but the best thing to do is come down and see us at Lieschke Nissan and have a look and a drive – make no mistake when you drive a Nissan Leaf, it WILL change your perspective about Electric Cars!



purchased.

At a clearing sale at Brae Springs, one hundred large, high tin loaves of bread had to be sliced to make sandwiches (there was no slicing machine in those days).

On another occasion, catering for a special sheep sale at the property of Alan Klose, netted a profit of nine pounds, four shillings and two pence.

On the 28<sup>th</sup> of May 1953, a float representing the Red Cross was

displayed in the Coronation Day Procession. British Flood Relief Appeal raised ninety six pounds, fourteen shillings and three pence.

During the Annual General Meeting on the 31<sup>st</sup> of July, 1945, the guest speaker concluded in saying that Red Cross was one way of obeying the commands of The Master.

The Annual General Meeting on the 30<sup>th</sup> of July 1946, saw fifty two members in attendance.

Across the years, there have been card parties, trading tables, jumble

stalls, and raffles where one prize was a duck (not stated dead or alive).

On reading through the older minute books, there were hard, but enjoyable times in that everyone grouped and worked together to raise money for this very important and worthwhile cause. Today, we still embody this legacy and will continue to do so in the future.

After eighty years of Red Cross in Walla Walla, we do not have fifty odd members. However, when called upon to help out, our members are always willing to lend a hand. In this way, I'm sure we will continue to grow stronger. Has a lot changed since the early days of Red Cross? Not really.

In summing up the differences across the past eighty years, we are still having street stalls, Christmas Hampers, Melbourne Cup events, assisting in hospitals and developing countries, and working in areas affected by war, flood, fires and bombing. We continue to work together, and as the guest speaker said many years ago: Red Cross is one way of obeying the commands of The Master.

#### WALLA WALLA **HISTORY**

#### The Alma Park Pig Story, or is it just a porky?

From the The Land, 21st April 1933, p10.

"What may be regarded as 'hard to believe' did happen to a farmer at Alma Park. He bought two suckers at a sale. They were each bagged in a single bag, but when about three miles from home, on (sic) pig got out of its bag. All effort to regain it proved futile. The remaining sucker was safely put in the sty. Next day all searching failed to trace the lost pig, but to the surprise of the owner, he found it in the sty with

its mate the following morning. It is often told of how a cat or dog will, instinctively, find its way to certain places, but this is the first occasion on local record in which a pig has followed its mate.

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE LOCAL POLICE



Hello Everyone,

Every few years the New South Wales Firearms Registry conduct what is commonly known as a 'Firearms Audit'. This involves your local Police visiting those in our community who have firearms registered to their name to ensure that the records held by the Firearms Registry are correct. Checks are also conducted on the storage facilities used by those permit holders to store their firearms to ensure they are safe and comply with the legislative requirements set out by the Registry.

Over the next twelve months Police in the Murray River Police District – which includes your local Police – will be contacting all those within our area that have firearms registered to them. We will be making appointments to attend the location listed as the storage location and checking all the firearms and safes for all categories of Firearms Licences. These are Categories A,B,C,D, and H. We will also be checking those classed as Collectors and Dealers.

If you have any of the listed categories of licence and have firearms registered to you name, you can expect a call, so please be prepared. Make sure your safe complies with the legislative requirements; failure to comply could see your firearms seized, your licence suspended, and criminal charges laid. Firearms safety is your responsibility and the New South Wales Police Force take it very seriously.

If you are unsure, or would like to double check to make sure you have everything right, you can find out what is required on the New South Wales Police Force website www.police.nsw.gov.au/

If you do not have internet access, please give us a call and we will happily provide you with a copy of the information you require.

There is no set pattern to who we contact and when. Everyone will eventually be checked, however if you would like to get yours over and done with, feel free to give us a call and we will be more than happy to come out and check.

Your local Police are here to help you, all you need to do is call.
