## Steven is going places

From a very young age, Henty driver Steven Richardson always wanted to be a truck driver. You could say that it was in his blood being the third generation to be a driver in his family. Steve undertook a diesel mechanic apprenticeship after leaving school. Now a fully qualified diesel mechanic, Steve gained his multi-combination licence and started driving before his 21st birthday and he has now been driving for two years.

Steve was nominated for the award of "Young Driver of the Year" for the Livestock, Bulk and Rural Carrier's Association and Safe Work NSW. Having qualified as one of the finalists, Steven was then announced as the winner of the award, "Young Driver of the Year" at their annual conference in Griffith.

The prize was a \$5,000 trip to America to see how things operated in the

### Centre fulfils a heartfelt need

It is noted that recent estimates indicate that the Henty and District Lifestyle Centre is now catering for some 7,000 individual visits annually. These estimates are based on the use of the Centre by those undertaking self-defence and karate; yoga; dance; physiotherapy; the gymnasium; and arts and crafts.

The gymnasium has considerable weights available to the Community and received funding from the NSW Premier's office with the assistance of Mr Greg Aplin, MP.



The Centre's Committee Members have held a number of working bees to keep up the maintenance reguired on the Memorial Hall. Some glass from broken windows has been replaced, others will need attending to when the putty to hold the panes in place is replaced. The Hall is receiving further repairs to its 60 year-old floor. Also, a pair of hand rails is being installed at the main stairs to the gymnasium for safety of patrons.

Two bins are to be located at the rear of the Hall will facilitate the recycling of scrap metal. This is a fundraiser to support the gymnasium's acquisition of additional equipment. The bins will remain there until full. Additional bins will be sourced if there is a positive demand for the service.

# Residents to have their say in major community survey

Residents of the Greater Hume Council will be able to have their say about the Council in the 2019 Community Survey about to be conducted.

Mayor, Cr Heather Wilton said feedback from the survey will inform the Council about its performance and guide the development of priorities for future spending. Priority areas identified through the survey results will be considered in the development of Council's next long term Community Strategic Plan, a key document of the organisation, that then flows into Council's actions in the four year Delivery Program.

"Through this survey, residents are able to provide their views on the importance of key Council services and their satisfaction with Council's performance in delivering these services" said Mayor, Cr Wilton.

Residents 18 years and over will be selected at random for the telephone survey which will commence from the first week of April.

"The survey is expected to take about 15 minutes to complete and only completed surveys will be used as data. Council asks that residents receiving a call agree to take part in this important survey", Mayor Wilton said.

On completion of the telephone survey, the survey will be available for local residents who were not contacted to complete online via Council's website. A paper copy of the survey will also be available for those residents who do not use computers or are not connected to the Internet. The paper survey will be made available at libraries and Council's offices across the Council area.

The survey will be completed by IRIS Research, an independent market research consultancy with more than 30 years' experience specialising in local government.

Recently, a seat was installed in the Henty Cemetery in memory of Graham Booth. The seat is between the lawn and monumental graves and will allow for reflections and contemplation by those visiting or passing by.





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# Council's Draft Code of Meeting Practice goes on public display

Amendments made to the NSW Local Government Act 1993 provide for a new model code of meeting practice, which was prescribed in December 2018.

Since then Greater Hume Council has prepared a draft code of meeting practice that incorporates the mandatory provisions of the model code as well as a number on non-mandatory provisions.

Councils and committees of councils of which all the members are councillors must conduct their meetings in accordance with the code of meeting practice once adopted by Council.

One important change is that Council will be required to webcast meetings of the council and committees of which all members are councillors by 14 December 2019. To meet this requirement it is proposed that audio visual recordings of meetings will be posted on Council's website.

Council is exhibiting the draft Code of Meeting Practice for a period of 28 days commencing on Monday, 4 March until Monday, 1 April 2019. The draft Code of Meeting Practice may be viewed at any Council office, or on the Council webs it e greater-hume.nsw.gov.au.

Written submissions from the community will be received until 5pm Monday, 15 April 2019 via the Have Your Say portal on Council's website, or by email to mail@greaterhume.nsw.gov.au, or write to Council, PO Box 99, Holbrook NSW 2644.



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#### Look back at pioneers

For her five-minuter at the last Probus meeting. Joyce Gardener spoke about her ancestors involved in the trek from South Australia to Jindera. Joyce's greatgrandfather Johan H. Goessling played a significant role in Jindera's history in 1868.

A request was sent to the Adelaide Lutheran parish for a pastor to oversee the church and school at Jindera for a year. From Groveland to Jindera, Pastor Goessling travelled via Melbourne, Echuca, Castlemaine and Ballarat and through forests along the Murray. He stayed in the Jindera-Wodonga until 1876, accomplishing the building of the first oneroom school, which was attached to the pastor's house.

The main Probus speaker was Herb Simpfendorfer, accompanied by Ron Krause, who shared the video of the Walla Walla 150th street parade on January 28. There were 137 items in the parade, consisting of sulkies, wagons, lorries, unicycles, pennyfarthing cycles, threewheeler bikes, farm machinery, old cars, floats from the community and sporting clubs and even a pooper-scooper to clean up

after the animals.

A program of events kept everyone entertained with 10 different tours available. A beautiful book of coloured photos is available for \$30, celebrating the journey and the weekend of activities.

At the Probus annual meeting, Jeannie Kenney was elected chairperson for a second term. Kevin Fogarty replaces David Muller as secretary and Heather Colliss remains the treasurer.

Connie and John Ross entertained the meeting with a PowerPoint presentation on Canada and Alaska. From Vancouver with a population of 2.5 million to the Northern Lights in the Yukon, beautiful photography taking in clear lakes and mountain streams was displayed by the Rosses. Travelling through Jasper National Park, Lake Louise, the Butchart Gardens and using the "Rocky Mountaineer" as transport, Connie and John spent 24 wonderful nights in a scenic wonderland.

The service allows rural and regional access to services that may not be available face to face locally. Highlights from meeting held on 20 March at Carabost:

A new draft Waste Strategy was tabled, which reviews Council's current waste practices and plans a range of strategies to ensure that the service remains affordable and accessible for ratepayers, remains sustainable, and minimises the impact of waste on the environment. Council will soon conduct a workshop to discuss the strategy and then endorse the draft. The community will have an opportunity to Have A Say when the final draft waste strategy is placed on exhibition for public com-

Council confirmed support for the endeavours of the Henty Local Area Health Committee to establish a multi-function specialist dementia unit at Henty. Council support will include lobbying for funding, assistance with the acquisition of a suitable site, and developing a strategy to help the community prepare a business case for the project.

Commiserations to our Section 1 team, with Burrumbuttock ending our quest for a fifth premiership in a row. We are very proud of all our players and look forward to next season.



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
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
