Centenary flight lands

On Thursday March 19, 60 people gathered at Trevor Haines' airstrip near Henty for the arrival of the Smith Centenary Commemorative Flight. The four planes landed soon after 10am. The 'headline' aircrafts were the Sea Bear "Southern Sun" piloted by Mike Smith with passenger Tom Lockley and a Pipistrel, flown by Michael Coate. Mike is National Geographic's 2016 Adventurer of the Year.

For the Cootamundra to Benalla leg these two planes were joined by John Daley in a Lake Buccaneer and Louise Humbel in a Jabiru 230. Louise's Jabiru was until recently owned by Tony Henty, of the same family after which the town was named.

The visit to Henty was part of a much bigger adventure for Mike that started in the UK last year. "Southern Sun" departed from White Waltham airfield in midNovember, very close to the original Hounslow Heath field used by brothers Ross and Keith Smith and their Vickers Vimy in 1919.

The brothers were answering the challenge by Prime Minister Billy Hughes, who sensed the importance aviation may one day have, to make the first flight from the UK to Australia. He offered a prize of £10,000, aiming squarely at Australian airmen waiting to return home from the Great War. Many set out and the Great Air Race turned out to be demanding, difficult and finished by few.

The Smith brothers were first to reach Australia. Mike would land in Darwin 100 years later to the day. He had followed the original route as much as modern political considerations allowed. The 1919 flight delivered the first international airmail to Australia.

Over the next decades there would be many record breaking flights between the UK and Australia but more importantly saw the establishment of regular air services between the countries – the famous Kangaroo Route.

After Mike reached Darwin, attention turned to reenacting the Smith brothers' flight from Darwin to their hometown of Adelaide. Made in 1920 they flew via Queensland, NSW and Victoria so the maximum number of people could see the heroes of the air. That flight brought the brothers and their Vimy to Henty. In September, 2018, John Ebsworth of Henty and District Historic Society received a phone call from Tom Lockley. He was researching the flight path of Smith's flight across Australia with a view to reenacting the flight to mark its centenary. Tom said the Vimy had been forced to land in Henty due to engine problems and Tom was hoping that Henty would be able to play its part in the re-enactment. It was very early days with much to be organised, but it was accepted that Henty would participate.

It was only earlier in the week of March 19 that the types of planes landing in

Auxiliary winds up

It is with regret that the Henty branch of the United Hospital Auxiliaries of NSW is closing. Members were few and ageing and the needs of the local hospital have changed.

It has been 78 years since the Henty Auxiliary was formed and over this period only four presidents led the group. For the past 34 years Pam Green has been president.

On looking back through annual reports, the auxiliary played a big part in supplying items like pyjamas for adults and children, baby clothes for the nursery, curtains where needed, even air conditioners and fans and many additional patient and staff comforts. Not to mention the ongoing mending of linen.

Money was raised through street stalls, annual balls,

casserole luncheons and catering events.

The auxiliary had about 30 members until a slow decline over the past 15 years despite many efforts to attract new members.

After the opening of the new Multi Purpose Services (new hospital) several years ago, the hospital needs changed.

The final contribution, approved at the February meeting was \$7,000 for lounge chairs and \$156 for the purchase of a radio by the diversional therapist.

"It is with a heavy heart that I leave, but extend my best wishes to all other auxiliary members," Pam said. "Hold high the lamp of service for the benefit of your hospital."

Hayden Honeywill commence work at the Henty and Culcairn Libraries



World prays together

St Paul's Lutheran Church hosted the annual World Day of Prayer, a global ecumenical movement led by Christian women who welcome all to join in prayer and action for peace and justice.

There were 960 such services held throughout Australia in 2020 with over 50 countries joining in 55 different languages.

This year the service was prepared by women from Zimbabwe, a land-locked plateau country in southern Africa. Sixteen million people live there with political upheaval and a shrunken economy. AIDS is in epidemic proportion and typhoid and cholera kill many women and children. However the rate of literacy is high (92%) but many of the poorer people cannot access schools or afford the fees.

Guest speaker James Male told of his visit to Zimbabwe two years ago when his group was helping the local church transform communities through "Hands at Work." The ongoing mentorship from volunteer overseas visitors was organising and equipping local leaders to effectively provide care for the most vulnerable children, ensuring their access to basic food, security, health and education.

Short and long-term visitors support the "Hands" teams. They work in a community to encourage pastors and care workers (who look after several children), spending time with the many orphans and supporting day to day activities.

Over \$500 was received through an offering for the Bible Society, supporting the Zimbabwean project "Empowering Mothers of Children with a Disability." Judy Zweck led the service, with speakers from all other Henty churches taking part. Next year's service will be prepared by the women of Vanuatu.

History at your fingertips

New technology has allowed the introduction of a "through-the-glass" interactive touchscreen at the Headlie Taylor Header Museum.

Visitors will now experience an increased participation in our history and may choose from a timeline of photographs and stories of various eras from the life of Headlie Taylor, scenes from the blacksmith shop or a selection of short videos. The videos include rare historical footage shot by Headlie Taylor in the 1930s.

In addition, ratings, suggestions and comments can be left in the survey section to enable ongoing improvement of the app.

The public are invited to interact with the

touchscreen, encourage visitors to check it out and help evaluate this technology through the introductory phase and into the future.

This project was supported by a community grant from Riverina Water.

Unfortunately, due to the health risk posed by the Coronavirus situation the touchscreen has been temporarily turned off.





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Goodbye and thank you Henty

The Henty Red Cross is no more, closed after 85 years of service. The members felt that with no young members it was no longer practical to continue. The following history of the branch was written by Sheila Dunn for its 50th anniversary in 1985.

"Henty Red Cross branch started up because of war. In the year 1935 the citizens of Henty decided that there was a need for Red Cross and on June 18 called a meeting which was held in the Henty School of Arts on Tuesday June 18, 1935 at which it was unanimously decided to form a branch of the Red Cross Society in Henty.

"A grim note crept into the 4th Annual Meeting held in 1939. Mr Graham, organ-

iser from headquarters, urged that every effort be made to be prepared to assist in the time of national emergency. A course of first aid and home nursing fitted women to become VAD's. (Voluntary Aid Detachment). A stock of bandages was to be kept at the police station.

"September Meeting 1939 records the outbreak of war and that 8lbs of wool was handed out to members to knit socks. The ladies worked hard, and parcels of pyjamas, shirts, mittens, socks, mufflers, kneecaps, sleeveless cardigans and pullovers went overseas to our men. Dressing gowns, waistcoats and bed socks for hospitals too were not forgotten. No avenue for money-raising was ignored. Meetings were held every two weeks. Sewing of garments and cutting out of garments took place at these gatherings and parcels were packed.

"With the rise of membership and involvement in collecting monies for the prisoner of war fund, the town and district was divided into zones.

"Red Cross ladies collected between them $\pounds 2,976$ – they helped to raise a total of $\pounds 4,200$ and the Henty district subscribed $\pounds 62,000$ to the War Loans. (Note: Pounds not Dollars).

"There were advances made over the years. First the Medical Loans Service to the community of Henty, early in 1948 with the arrival of crutches, and in August 1948 the first call of the Blood Bank on the people of Henty. In 1968, the Mobile Blood Bank Unit began its monthly calls, working at the Henty Hospital. In 1980 the Blood Bank visited three times a year, operating at the Community Centre."

History from 1985.

Isma Zweck-Scott was elected zone representative during this time and received a Special State Award medal for her outstanding services.

Henty Red Cross members decorated floats for the Town Centenary and again in the Henty Show Centenary in 2004 and wore the uniforms of the time.

In the early days of the Blood Bank not only did the members attending "shake" the blood, but supplied homemade biscuits for the donors. In 1991 Telecross came into being in Henty and has continued until the present under


Members visit patients in the hospital and some assist with Cosmetic Care (now Hands On). Wreaths have been laid on Remembrance Day and ANZAC Day.

Children not free from trauma

During our lives we are exposed to traumatic experiences. Events that are emotionally painful and can result in us feeling overwhelmed and unable to cope. The loss of a loved one, accident, serious illness or moving to a new location are some events that may cause us to experience trauma, causing physical, spiritual, psychological and emotional harm.

Some believe that children are protected from trauma as they are too young to understand, however, a growing body of research is identifying that children are affected personally and when traumatic events are experienced by their caregivers.

It is now known that the brain experiences rapid and significant growth during the early childhood years. When trauma is experienced it is processed by our bodies sensory systems through the brain, impacting hormone levels and activating biological stress systems. It can lead to changes in brain development and the way a child's brain is wired, resulting in constant feelings of danger and fear.

Due to the significant impact traumatic experiences can have on the young it is important to recognise the need for support. Given time and support, recovery is possible. An important thing to consider is how we behave when experiencing traumatic events, with children often observing and modelling themselves on those around them. We also need to consider our responses to the feelings and behavior of children as our reactions have an enormous impact on their ability to cope.

While there still needs to be research to identify specific interventions and the optimum timing of these, there are still many anecdotally identified strategies we can draw upon to support young children. A high priority is self care, as it is difficult to support the needs of others when you aren't acknowledging your own needs. Being self aware also provides us with the opportunity to share and model strategies we personally utilise to comfort ourselves.

Limiting exposure to traumatic experiences seems an obvious strategy, however, this can be difficult at times with media coverage. Instead look for the positive and uplifting. Answer children's questions honestly using language they are familiar with. Check they understand and clear up any misunderstand-Acknowledge your ings. child's feelings by naming them and talking about them.

As a family, keep to your regular routines as the pre-

dictability and consistency can be reassuring and comforting. Encourage eating well, getting enough sleep and being physically active regularly. Where possible don't make significant changes such as your expectations of the child for example, expecting them to sleep through the night. Endeavour to keep connected with people, family, friends and your community.

Most importantly, if you feel you need further support ensure you reach out. Parentline provides counselling and support for parents and carers by phone. You can also ask your family doctor for advice and referral. Your child's school could provide information and links to services they are connected with. If your child is five years or older they can be encouraged to reach out by using Kids Helpline that provides both telephone and online counselling.

With four children and eight grandchildren she has managed to complete a course at Charles Sturt University in Social Welfare and later specialising in people with disabilities. Guest speaker Jeremy Carr

spoke on "The Vitality Pro-

gram" helping older people stay in their own homes. The program, concentrating on exercise, nutrition and cognitive support, consists of an eight-week group session following individual oneon-one interviews. You may be surprised to know that after 65 we need 20% protein in each meal which is a building block for muscle mass. You can only use 30g of protein at any one time.

You can influence the brain in many ways, by challenging the way we think, through social activities and being active. The program, which is free, is for smaller towns and interest at the meeting was keen and enthusiastic with most of those present signing up.

Greater Hume Council meetings

As he walked through a door he heard a voice call out "Close the door! Were you born in a tent?" His reply "Well, not me, but my father was". Jeannie Kenney called out, "So was my father". After further investigation it was revealed that both fathers were born in the same hospital tent in Manangatang in Victoria five days apart. Jeannie's father was the first child born in the tent and Russell's the fourth.

Must have been a busy place.

Russell then spoke of his time in the NSW Fire Brigade at Narrandera and Henty. Times have changed. There were no automatic fire alarms, only a pump, hoses, water and branch lines with nozzle. Six firemen had telephone lines to their houses. They had a brass helmet with a number inscribed on a plaque, a pure wool coat (red neck) and long boots.

For his first fire in Henty a notice was chalked on a board as to where the fire was. Kids on bikes read the notice and raced the firemen to the burning premises because their engine was too slow to get moving.

Nowadays firemen are supplied with advanced firstaid kits, breathing apparatus and defibrillators. The First Responders,

(Community First Responders) need much praise for their work as we have no local ambulance. They can reach the spot quickly to record such things as blood pressure on to forms to give the ambulance when it arrives. This is a great service to the community available in both Henty and Culcairn.

A lovely lunch of cold meats, salads and dessert, provided by the Culcairn Bowling Club followed, the highlight of which was the cutting of the 25th anniversary birthday cake. A group of foundation members from 25 years ago held ribbons attached to the knife and Joan Pitson, as the eldest of the group and still an active member, had the honour of actually cutting the cake.

Term one turns green

This year Stage 3 students at St Paul's Lutheran Primarv School have been entrusted with the very special role of guiding and teaching Stage 2 students. They will help them to understand all about Project Based Learning (PBL). In the wake of all of the bush fires and natural disasters over the summer break, the school decided it would focus on sustainability and global warming as the driving topic for this term, incorporating learning in science, mathematics, English, Christian studies, geography and health.

To kick off studies, students looked at the words resources and sustainability and what they meant for each student individually.

They then looked at the three different pillars of sustainability, that need to come together in order to

ensure a sustainable future for society. These pillars are environmental, economic and social sustainability. Students then were tasked with gaining an understanding of environmental sustainability problems globally. Some of the main problems students continually found were society's dependence on plastic, the overuse of energy (in particular electricity), the waste/overuse of water and depleting water resources and the way that rubbish is collected and placed into landfill. In order to begin finding solutions to the problems globally, students had to first understand their problem locally.

This began our investigation and research phase of our unit. Students then began critically accessing the sustainability of the school, finding things that we were do-



ing to support a sustainable future, and also finding things that could be improved. Students were placed into groups and assigned an area on which to focus. This allowed them to practise collaborating and communicating with their peers, while thinking critically and creatively about a specific problem. Over the following weeks, students worked hard to understand their problem within the school context.



They planned projects, conducted data investigations, collecting data to inform their knowledge, proposed solutions to the problems and thought about how they could present their solutions to the community. Each group was challenged to think of solutions that incorporated the 3Rs, reusing, recycling and reducing.

We are now at the phase where students will be presenting their ideas and plans to principal Kaylene McClure for approval. This is a formal event and each group has created a professional proposal. Students are editing and practising these in order to begin presenting in Week 8). Mrs McClure will provide constructive feedback to students in order for groups to fine-tune their plans before being able to begin the construction phase. During the construction phase, students will find that not all of their plans will run smoothly. They will need to critically reflect on their ideas and adapt to challenges in order to complete their projects and prepare for our sustainability expo later in the term.

To conclude this unit, the school will celebrate what students have learnt and achieved by hosting a sustainability expo. Each group will need to prepare a stall to showcase their learning journey. This will be part of the reflection phase of this unit, where each student will think about the challenges that they faced and how they overcame these hardships. This phase is a great opportunity for students to reflect upon themselves as learners and leaders. They will develop a greater understanding of their individual learning needs, while also learning about the ways that they can complement and support the needs of others. Our expo will be held on Friday, May 1 from 2pm to 3pm in the school hall. The school invites the wider community to come along and see what the sustainability groups have achieved.

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Barrie award handover

Back in 1985 John Barrie, owner of the Barrie Timber Yard and Sawmill which was located where Myoora Homestead now stands, walked into the office of then public school principal Kevin Fogarty. He presented him with a cheque for \$2,000 to establish the John Barrie Memorial Trust Fund in honour of his father. Mr Barrie later increased the sum to \$5,000.

Mr Barrie wanted the annual interest from the Trust Fund used to provide a \$100 award annually to the boy and girl who, in the opinion of the staff, best epitomised the values of leadership, academic achievement, citizenship, sportsmanship and initiative.

In later years interest

rates had been too low to provide sufficient funds to make the awards and the school's P & C Association has provided money to keep them going.

Initial members of the Trust Fund were Kevin Fogarty, Lewis Robins, Bruce Morison and Bill Hannam. Kevin has remained a trustee for the past 35 years with Noelene Bedggood appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the deaths of three of the original trustees.

It has now been decided to pass responsibility and ownership of the trust to the P & C Association to manage as trustees.
