The photograph was taken in 1914 on the Taylor family farm "Emerald Hill" now known as "Wattle Grove" at Henty and shows Headlie Taylor smoking his pipe and standing behind the comb of his third prototype header which was about to

be exhibited at the Henty Show in September 1914. Headlie's dog sits patiently on the grain box. A draught horse team would have been used to pull the machine, the four miles through to the Henty Showground.

This image was kindly scanned from the original glass negative by Museums Victoria who hold a considerable Taylor/McKay collection at their Scienceworks Museum Spotswood Victoria.

From little things, big things grow

From humble beginnings, an idea born out of a request from the CEO of the Henty Machinery Field Days Committee has triggered the most amazing response. Lyn Jacobsen from Pleasant Hills Branch of CWA of NSW was asked to do 32 "Pamper Packs" for the wives and partners of the 32 farmers from the Tottenham and Nyngan areas. They were sponsored to come to the field days for a respite from the day-to-day battle facing families and communities in the drought-ravaged areas of NSW. At short notice, with help from CWA members and business houses, the committee's wish was realised.

Lyn thought, why stop now? Consequently, 500 "Christmas Pamper Packs" were assembled in Albury last Monday for women "doing it tough" in the severely drought-affected areas of NSW in time for Christmas. The packs, mostly medium-sized brown paper carry bags, are filled with everyday necessities such as shampoo, conditioner, toothpaste, hand cream, soap, cosmetics and so on. There is also a small, personal gift to make the ladies feel special and know that they are being thought of. Most of the bags have been decorated by the students from Thurgoona Public School and a message of love and encouragement accompanied each one.

From a trickle to an avalanche, the outpouring of generosity and kindness continued. In addition to CWA branches in the Rivierina and Murray Groups, Lions Clubs have joined in, plus an overwhelming response from businesses, church congregations, fam-

ilies and the general public in our towns and all areas between Wagga and Albury. Together, you have contributed an incredible variety of toiletries, cosmetics and extra luxuries like jewellery, candles, perfumes and books. Money donated has also enabled the women to receive an extra measure of pampering!

Incredibly, there was even a generous contribution from as far away as the United Kingdom because the donors, who have an Australian bank account, contacted one of their relatives in Australia to find out how to make a donation. One renowned capital city jeweller offered 100 pairs of earrings for inclusion in some of the packs.

Some packs have been taken to the Dubbo area and were gratefully received, while Land Transport Company is kindly delivering packs to some of their depots. In addition, three vehicles carrying nearly 300 packs between them are heading for Ivanhoe, Condobolin; also to Gilgandra and on to Nyngan. Packs are to be distributed to surrounding areas which are facing the greatest hardship. The Drought Support Person in Condobolin said that the need in that area is great. Arrangements have been made for 90 packs to be trucked to Moree and Tamworth, and distributed from there.

This generosity of the people in our local area is all the more remarkable given that this is a challenging year for many of our own farmers, small busi-

nesses and the general public and yet so many have reached out to help others who are facing much tougher conditions. Our heartfelt thanks and gratitude to everyone for the donations and all that went into the assembling and final distri-

Many of the wraps have been displayed in the Wagga Wagga City Library before going on to the storage facilities of the Wagga coordinator. A new display will be placed in the Henty Creative Gallery for the December-January showing.

Henty-Culcairn Uniting Church took a bus to Tumburumba recently to celebrate worship with the local congregation. Several smaller parishes no longer have permanent ministers so the churches are sharing resources. over time. Hips and knees are the most common joints affected. Risk factors are overweight, family history, altered leg alignment and previous injury.

Bone health covers osteoporosis – the silent disease. Probus discussed preventing and managing this – sun exposure (a few minutes per day in summer and 2-3 hours per week in winter), weight bearing exercises, strengthening exercise and fall prevention.

Five-minute speaker was Greater Hume Council li-

brarian, Susan Kane, who outlined the services available in the Council’s libraries including such things as Food for Fines and Tech Savvy courses for Seniors.

A letter was received from Michelle Godde requesting different organisations to decorate Christmas trees depicting the work of their organisations. These will be displayed in the old library from December 14.

Next Probus meeting is a Christmas lunch commencing 11am at the Henty Community Club on Wednesday, December 11.



The new kinder students for 2020 have enjoyed their time at St Paul's Henty thus far. The new students engage in learning activities each Friday and the transition will be smooth next year from their involvement this term. The K/1 class have really enjoyed being the 'big kids' and guiding the new students into the school.

As a vital part of community service, the students in 2/3/4 visited the Henty Hospital week to engage with the residents and provide a dose of happiness. The school is delighted it can visit the inpatients and support the town in such a positive way. The students in K/1 will also visit later in the term. The Year 5/6 class visited the residents of Myoorra Hostel, and spent time chatting with them.

St Paul's students were excited to participate in basketball coaching recently and are looking forward to the coaching sessions to be held throughout the term. The grant received from Sporting Schools Australian has provided a professional to coach the students and provide funds to resource the sports shed with new equipment. These training sessions are being held in the Henty Lifestyle Centre.

The senior students have now completed their project-based learning, *What's My Business* with the final goods being sold. Every student shone and contributed in such positive ways. Some were in business together, others by themselves. The overarching theme was to learn about those living in poverty and design a way

the 5/6 students could positively enhance their way of living. Students raised an incredible \$1180.00 throughout the term.

All money raised will go to the Australian Lutheran World Service "Gifts of Grace Appeal". Originally the aim was to raise \$350.00 with the hope of buying: a long drop toilet, a farming kit, solar lamps, chickens and water filters. This was a very sensible goal and these items would have made a huge difference to families living in poverty. The larger goal was to purchase a biogas digester for \$808.00.

Going into the final market, this was still the plan, however, after counting the money and re-evaluating the difference that could be made, students opted to purchase: an animal farm set, a goat, a piglet, job sets, clean water for 105

students for a whole year of schooling, special care sets and seeds. Students were incredibly thoughtful with their decisions and they looked for the things that would have the greatest impact on people's lives.

The Year 5/6 class have all shown great maturity and compassion. The school says it cannot begin to express how truly proud it is of its students and the amazing businesses that they created. It has been so exciting to experience students developing their ability to use the four Cs of 21st century learning: collaboration, communication, critical thinking and creativity.

This term the Year 5/6 class have started a new major PBL, focusing on the subjects of: health, English, Christian studies and mathematics, and smaller


planned to provide for families to stay and connect with others.

Snakes Alive

What To Do

Snakes may enter back yard residential and rural home gardens in search of water, particularly during long, dry periods. Snakes are most active from October to March when they sun themselves or when they move in search of food or water.

If you see a snake, move pets and children away until the snake moves off. To reduce the chance of snakes staying on or returning, and in preparation for times when snakes are most active (spring and summer): keep lawns and gardens well maintained remove piles of wood or other debris from the yard or store it off the ground ensure pet food and water bowls are not accessible to wildlife enclose compost heaps to reduce mouse populations (a food source for snakes).

Avoid Being Bitten

Snakes are naturally shy and their first form of defence is to move away from danger, including humans. If provoked or cornered, a snake may attempt to protect itself by striking. People are most likely to be bitten when attempting to kill snakes, which can strike very rapidly if aroused. To avoid being bitten: move away and let the snake go on its way never try to kill or handle a snake. Be alert at all times in the bush, especially in the early morning when snakes are more likely to be sunning themselves. Cover up with trousers and enclosed shoes when bush-walking and gardening in overgrown places. Avoid walking through long grass.
