Sheds join fire recovery effort

Men's Sheds across the Riverina, South West Slopes and North East Victoria are pulling together to find ways to assist fire-ravaged communities. Two meetings were held mid-January to establish a committee to develop plans to assist. While not wishing to take a lead role, as there are many organisations taking on various roles, the sheds are considering offers of assisting by using their respective skill sets.

Some sheds will support the other sheds with materials or take on work when requested.

One concern that has been raised is the assistance where all sheds can be involved and that is to assist the wildlife with either habitat boxes or watering stations. The watering stations are containers which can be filled by carts and be left behind for thirsty animals. The Henty Men's Shed had representatives at meetings in Wagga Wagga and Thurgoona and their members hope to be able to contribute in some way.

Several Henty Men's Shed members that drop in for a chat have over the past six months been steadily growing. There are regularly up to eight members getting together for chats morning and afternoons.

These will be collected by our District Governor, Omani Ndlovu, who will arrange for their transport to Zimbabwe for distribution to needy schools and colleges. Anyone who has suitable books and/or any laptops or PC's no longer used or needed may consider donating them to Henty club to forward on to District level. Such donations would be gratefully received.

A Lions District Inter-Club Trivia Night in Wodonga in early February will undoubtedly provoke friendly rivalry and all for a good cause; in this case for the Lions Hearing Dogs Program. This amazing project provides safety, comfort and independence to severely hearingimpaired folk by providing trained dogs to match the unique needs of their new prospective owners.

Whilst on the subject of dogs, Henty Lions Club has raised well in excess of \$1,600 towards its local project, Feed My Mate, which was launched before Christmas to enable some farmers to buy a bag of dog cubes, (costing \$45 each). Members are heartened by the generosity of local and district residents. In addition, donations have come from as far away as Tasmania and Western Australia. many farmers in droughtravaged areas of NSW, the prospect of having to surrender (or worse) their working dogs, their mates, is yet another contributor to the impact of the drought on mental health. The total raised is still to be finalised prior to selecting an area in great need.

It is hoped that students

from secondary schools in the district will take up the challenge offered by Henty Lions to compete in the annual Youth of the Year public speaking competition which will be conducted at the Doodle Cooma Arms on Wednesday, February 26. An afternoon of judging will culminate in the final presentation and announcement of the winner after the dinner that evening.

Some members hope to travel to Walwa or Corryong on behalf of Lions to render assistance to those in fire affected areas by helping to clear debris, erect and repair fencing and/or helping in some capacity with supplying meals for the workers with BlazeAid.





Be Water Wise this summer

Permanent Water Saving Rule Reminder

Greater Hume Council is encouraging local communities to remember the watering rule and be water wise as dry conditions continue to place pressure on the region's storages.

Council has joined forces with AlburyCity and North East Water to deliver a community-wide Water Wise message this summer. Although compulsory water restrictions are not in force, Council is appealing to the community to remember that "every drop counts".



Greater Hume has a permanent water saving rule allowing the use of fixed sprinklers only between the hours of 5.00pm and 10.00am.

This voluntary rule aims to increase water use efficiency, reduce water wastage and reduce evaporation losses

Greater Hume Mayor Heather Wilton is also urging residents and business owners to be water wise by following simple steps to cut the consumption rate.

"By avoiding things such as watering gardens in the heat of day or hosing driveways, we can all work together to make a collective difference," she said.

"The outlook indicates we're in for a long period of hot, dry weather which is why it's important we set an example as a community and do our bit to conserve our precious water resources" added the Mayor.

"To assist the community to understand water usage, Council has a fact sheet which explains average water consumption in the kitchen, bathroom, laundry, garden and water consumption of livestock" added Cr Wilton. https://water-and-Waste-Water-Fact-Sheets

There are no compulsory water restrictions in place at this stage, but with major storages falling and a forecast for drier than usual conditions ahead, it's timely that everyone takes simple steps to use a little less of the precious resource in the hope that restrictions won't be necessary in the months ahead.

Top tips to help you be water wise in and around your

home:

Water your garden only between 5:00pm and 10:00am.

Avoid using water to hose down paths and driveways.

Tips to save drips.

Be Water Wise.



Check and fix leaks - fix dripping taps, look for leaking toilets, check for leaks using your water meter.

Bathroom water savers keep showers to four minutes, install a water efficient showerhead and use the half-flush on toilets, use the plug when shaving and turn off the tap when brushing your teeth.

In the laundry - only use your washing machine when full and on eco mode, buy a water-efficient washing machine.

In the kitchen - capture water from your tap, while waiting for water to warm up or washing vegetables, use it to water your garden or indoor plants, only use the dishwasher when full and on eco-mode, install aerating taps to reduce water flow by 50 percent.

For the pool – use a pool cover, check for pool leaks, consider shade options to reduce evaporation.

In the garden, install a rainwater tank, use greywater when safe and environmentally sustainable.

By using mulch on the garden you can stop water evaporation by up to 70 percent. Minimise lawn area, choose plants and shrubs that are indigenous to our local area and suitable for our climate.

Construct paved areas so that they slope, and make use of water run-off.

Choose the right lawn, one with low water demand and high drought tolerance. Prepare the soil. Don't over water. Don't mow your lawn short, a taller lawn will shade the roots and reduce evaporation and require less watering.

Individually, following these water wise rules amount to a relatively small amount of watersaving, but when we combine our efforts the savings become significant, helping us to collectively make a significant difference

Temporary online membership is available – membership must be validated at a branch library within 30 days of joining online. Proof of your current address such as a drivers licence, rent receipt or rates notice, will be required when you join or verify your online membership at your local branch library. If you do not have any of these, a parent, relative or friend may act as your guarantor. People under the age of 18 require the signature of a

guarantor before becoming a member. Reciprocal membership is available to members of other Public Libraries within NSW. Proof of membership to "home library" is required on joining — conditions apply. Members can reserve, renew and browse items online.

Gardening hints for February and March

February

- Mulch all garden beds to conserve moisture. It's best to use organic material like old manure, lucerne hay or mushroom compost.
- Apply ready to use rose spray to control pest and disease problems on roses.
- Check citrus trees for scale and leaf miner.
- Buy spring bulbs while the greatest choice is available.
- Feed citrus trees with citrus food.
- Put tulip and hyacinth bulbs into the crisper section of the fridge for a pre-planting chill.
- Re-pot container plants with new potting mix.
- Seeds to grow -Snapdragon, Pansy, Primula, Leeks, Silverbeet, Celery, Lettuce.

March

- Autumn is the best time of the year for planting trees and shrubs. They have time to establish before the cold weather really hits.
- Pick pumpkins (leaving a small amount of stalk attached) after stalk browns, then store in a cool, shady, dry place.
- Prune hydrangeas either this month, or wait until mid-winter.
- Plant aquilegias, cyclamen, polyanthus, primulas, pansies and violas in semi shaded garden spots.
- Choose freesias, babianas, ixias, Spanish bluebells for spring bulbs
- Seeds to sow -Cineraria, Nemesia, Sweet Peas, Virginian Stock, Peas, Carrots, Broccoli, Beetroot, Lettuce, Turnips.

A bushfire donation of \$2,110 by Henty Men's Bowling Club/Henty Community Club was made recently. The money was raised at the annual Farmers Fours Bowls Tournament.

One hundred and twelve bowlers from around the Riverina and Albury district competed, playing four games of 10 ends in very smoky conditions. The winning team came from Junee, with long-time supporter Brian Purse playing for them.

It was decided all proceeds from the raffle of the day would be donated to a Bush Fire Appeal with donated goods valued at \$450 up for grabs. All present were happy to participate to the tune of \$1,380. Henty Community Club President, Allison Scott, announced the club would also contribute funds received from recent raffles and a collection taken up on the Sunday evening. This bought the final tally to the \$2,110.

Lyn packs them in

"Chicks With Attitude" is Lyn Jacobsen's description of the true meaning of CWA (Country Women's Association). Formerly of Pleasant Hills, and now living in Thurgoona, Lyn was visiting Probus to relate the story of Pamper Packs for women in drought-stricken areas.

The Henty Machinery Field Days was asked to put together 32 pamper packs for the wives of the men attending, mainly from the Tottenham/Nyngan area. A raffle each day paid for the contents, but more importantly the idea was fostered to include other drought areas at a later date. The result was 675 packs.

Where to go / what to include / how to distribute - were questions to be an-

swered. Lyn started organising, a thing she does extremely well.

It was decided the packs would be sent west of the Great Divide, to no one with a steady income, and decided by postcode from everywhere. Lyn wrote to several companies, visited businesses in Albury and Wagga and spread the message by word of mouth. Every cent given went to the appeal and many promised items began arriving on Lyn's doorstep (or rather husband Jim's back shed). Transport companies from Dubbo, Moree and Tamworth delivered all the boxes, with the help of a few local husbands of local CWA groups.

Packing was a nightmare. Set out on separate tables were soap, shampoo, toothpaste, hand cream, lip gloss and something special and beautiful, they were placed in brown paper bags decorated by children from Thurgoona Public School and CWA members.

Three street stalls to raise money for the appeal were held in Albury. Scones and muffins were the go. Left over goods were put in separate boxes for distribution by the CWA. Only Yarrowitch and Walcha were missed out, but that was soon fixed. What a story.

Note: On the first day of the Royal Easter Show 4,804 scones were made.

Others are knitting trauma teddies as a separate activi-

ty.

Tips for pets during thunderstorm season

The loud noises associated with summer thunderstorm season is one of the most prevalent phobias in animals, and result in tens of thousands of them demonstrating destructive behaviour, escaping from their properties and injuring themselves.

Quick tips

The following information

is appropriate for domestic pets, especially cats and dogs, but may be useful for other domestic animals too. Horses can also become extremely anxious from loud noises and escape - we recommend you consult your equine vet for advice on preparing your horses.

 Do not punish your pet for exhibiting this behaviour during times of stress.

- Attempt to engage, distract and reassure your pet that everything is OK, but don't 'force' this if it becomes particularly distressed.
- Provide access to a safe area where your pet may feel more at ease. Animals usually indicate their preferences

such as under a bed or inside a wardrobe. Allow it to go where it wants to feel safe. Close bird cages, rabbit hutches and other fixed enclosures and ensure the pet door and windows are closed and locked.

Make sure that your boundary fences and gates are secure and that your pet cannot readily escape through

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Cross hatching

Something of an oddity has been the discovery of a breeding pair of parrots producing rare hybrid young. The parrot pair were spotted in Wagga visiting some caged birds in an aviary. The hen is a King Parrot and the cock is a Superb Parrot.

The pair had been visiting the aviary for some months before disappearing for a number of weeks.

It does not appear that the birds have been caged previously as they are without bands and readily take flight if approached.

When they next appeared, they returned with three young, each with partial traits of its parents.

The family of five have been returning to the aviary for most of the summer and remain regular visitors.

There appears to be no recorded discussions about such a union, though King Parrots have reportedly paired with other Australian parrot species.

It will be interesting to see what colour patterns will develop when the young mature

In the meantime, the visits of the family will be recorded and photographed and the hope is they will keep returning.

them or over them.

• Ensure that your pet wears identification, particularly a microchip. In the unfortunate event that your pet should escape from your property, it will run blindly away without regard to where it is going. When it eventually calms down it will probably not know where it is or how to return. A microchip gives you the greatest chance that you and your pet will be reunited.

• If you know that your pet is extremely fearful of thunderstorms and fireworks, consult your vet to see if he or she can prescribe medication that will calm it in known times of stress.

Dates for the Peter Mac craft group are April 22, May 20, June 17, July 22 (Knit In), August 19, September 16, October 28 and November 18.



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Henty to reprise role in historic flight

This year Henty will be an optional stop for pilots reenacting the flight from Darwin to Adelaide of the first aircraft to fly from the UK to Australia. Brothers Ross and Keith Smith made the epic flight in 1919, ending in Darwin.

Six aircraft and their crews took part in the air race. They then flew south, visiting state capitals and regional towns on their way home to Adelaide. There were many forced landings including one in Henty on February 25, 1920 when the pilots and two crew stayed the night.

Pilots pursued prize

Following World War I, the Hughes Government in Australia was keen to develop civil aviation "with a view to stimulating aerial activity the Commonwealth Government has decided to offer £10,000 for the first successful flight to Australia from Great Britain in a machine manned by Australians".

The announcement of the Great Air Race, as it became known, would entail a flight of almost 18,000km. Those entering the race had to pay £100 (pounds) entry fee and a plane (usually financed by a wealthy backer). Almost all of the entrants had military experience.

The race conditions were drawn up by the Royal Aero Club of London and one of the requirements was that the race had to be completed within 30 days and before midnight on December 31, 1920. Within five

months six crews had paid their £100. The crews were all military men.

Recommendations from the British Air Minister, Winston Churchill, the Vickers Aircraft Company made available to Ross Smith its newly developed, twinengine Vimy heavy bomber aircraft. Vickers also established landing fields and fuel depots along the way.

Smith's aircraft was given lettering of "G-EAOU".

Captain Ross MacPherson Smith, of Adelaide, was a 26 year old highly decorated pilot and World War I veteran. In 1914, he had enlisted in the 3rd Light Horse Regiment, landing at Gallipoli on May 13, 1915. In late 1916, he transferred to the Australian Flying Corps. For his skill and valour, he was twice awarded the Military Cross and was a threetime recipient of the Distinguished Flying Cross. In Smith 1919. was alsoawarded the Air Force Cross. His flying exploits during the war earned him the designation as an "Air Ace" with 11 confirmed victories.

Ross Smith's brother Lieutenant Keith Smith, a pilot in the RAF between 1917 and 1919 was his assistant pilot. Mechanics were sergeants Walter Shiers, also from Adelaide and James Bennett from Victoria. Both mechanics were renowned for their significant skill with fixing engines. Smith left England on November 12, 1919 for Darwin. Twenty-three stops were recorded before touching down in Darwin after almost 28 days.

The trip from Darwin to Sydney was plagued by mechanical problems and a split propeller. The aircraft landed in Sydney on February 14, 1920. Following several celebrations, the crew left Sydney on February 23, 1920 for Melbourne, Victoria. The crew were given an official reception at Parliament House in Melbourne where Smith was presented with the £10,000 prize money. Smith later flew on to Adelaide where celebrations continued.

The newspaper report of the day, printed below, indicates the forced landing at The Rock and at Henty, NSW.



The Rock got a surprise visitor

Border Morning Mail and Riverina Times (Albury, NSW), Wednesday February 25, 1920

Landing at the Rock — Tuesday

Sir Ross Smith and party, in the Vickers-Vimy machine landed here today at about 10 minutes before 1 o'clock. Inquiries elicited the information that the compulsory landing was due to a minor engine trouble. The mechanics got busy and the machine was in readiness to start off within an hour. As soon as it became known that the machine had come down, people flocked to the scene, and they had a fine opportunity of viewing the famous aeroplane at close quarters.

Sir Ross and Sir Keith Smith were greeted with hearty cheers, and among the large number of people who met them was Mr G W Ashford, Minister for Agriculture, who was at The Rock in order to deliver an

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electioneering speech here this evening. There was the greatest excitement when the machine rose into the air and flew away in the direction of Henty.

Mr Norman, of The Rock Hotel, promptly invited the aviators to make use of his accommodation, but the offer was declined by Sir Ross Smith with thanks. He said they preferred to stand-by in order to push on as soon as flight was partible. Many other residents displayed great enthusiasm bringing along fruit etc which the airmen gratefully received.

Sir Ross Smith's arrival took The Rock quite by surprise. He apparently for some reason or another altered the proposed route from Cootamundra to Melbourne and local residents had no idea he was coming this way until they heard the great buzzing noise of the machine. He circled twice above the town before descending.

Sergeant Cameron, who is in charge of The Henty police station, was the first man to arrive on the scene when Sir Ross Smith and party made a forced landing at Henty recently. He has a memento in the form of a watch trinket made from a piece of brass from Sir Ross Smith's machine.

a landing the greatest excitement prevailed.

Intelligence had been received that the aviators had experienced engine trouble at The Rock, but had expressed the determination to push on if at all possible and their arrival was awaited with the greatest interest.

After circling the town, the plane descended in a paddock in the vicinity of the Henty Cemetery, and a good landing was accomplished. Sir Ross Smith, when questioned, was not inclined to discuss the trouble, but the mechanics who promptly got busy, said that minor engine difficulties were responsible for the forced landing.

During the afternoon the gigantic plane was inspected with great interest by a large crowd of residents and people who motored in from the surrounding district. The famous airmen, it was ascertained after in the afternoon, had decided to spend the night at Hotel Henty, and to resume the journey to Melbourne tomorrow. If all is in readiness, they will leave at about 9 o'clock.

Later Smith recalled the landing at The Rock and at Henty.

Barrier Miner (Broken Hill, NSW) Saturday 28th February, 1920.

Captain Ross Smith's — Flight to Melbourne

"The closest call during the whole of the trip was the incident at Bon Accord where the machine touched the trees and the defective oil pump".

In explaining, in an interview at Menzies Hotel, the mishaps which prevented their arrival in Melbourne

on Tuesday, Sir Ross and Sir Keith Smith both declared that on Tuesday they had had the "closest call" of the whole trip (says the "Argus.").

They said that in ascending after their forced descent at "Bon Accord" they had to rise out of a comparatively small field which had tall gums around it. As they approached this fringe of trees, they realised that it was going to be a close thing. The outside edge of one wing of the plane actually caught the branches as they passed, but luckily the impact was not severe enough to cause a disaster. "If we had struck another foot farther in, said Sir Smith, nothing would have saved us from turning over, and if we had done that we should not have been here to tell the tale". As it was, he pointed out, they had had to do the whole of the last stage that day - 236 miles from Henty - on one engine only.

When they had been in the air for about an hour on Tuesday, they found that the oil pressure in one engine was defective. Instead of giving a 40lb pressure all over the machine, it went down to 15lb when the oil heated and with such a low pressure as that there was a great danger of the machine becoming heated, in which case, nothing could

have saved them.

After their landing at The Rock, where they had made partial repairs to the valves, the oil worked better for a few minutes, but again, as soon as it became warm with flying, the pressure went down below the safety point.

At Henty they realised that they would have to abandon further flying that day, and they set to work and were all working on the machine until darkness came. They removed the oil pumps from the defective engine, and for their last stage that morning they had had to lighten, their load very largely, as it was apparent that without a proper overhaul, they could not improve the oil flow. They therefore left behind all their personal effects and lightened their petrol load by three-quarters of a

Almost as soon as they rose for their flight to Melbourne yesterday morning, they shut off the defective engine at once and never used it again. It was not surprising that this defect, should have arisen, they said, seeing that they had had on their whole trip about 175 hours in the air without a proper overhaul, and no machine was supposed to do more than 100

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

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hours in the air at the most without such treatment. Now that they had got the machine to a well-equipped aerodrome, they expected to be able to set their machine fully to rights within a week or ten days.

When asked as to their aims for the future, the airmen said that they had no plans for further flights at present, except that they intended in 10 days or a fortnight to fly to their own State; South Australia. Their greatest joy that day had been the accomplishment of their full purpose.

Messrs Vickers-Vimy had asked them when they set out to allow the people of Sydney and Melbourne to see the machine, and so

they had had a feeling of greater satisfaction that day than at any time during their flight, for at last they had done all that they had intended to do when they left London. They had arranged to divide the Commonwealth Government's prize of £10,000 equally among the four of them. What they would do next, after they had had a good holiday, sit home for a month or two, they had not decided.

Sir Keith Smith's diary for the whole flight shows a total flying time of 175 hours to cover altogether 13,500 miles (21,726km).

Council news

Public meetings of Council are now streamed live, recorded and published on Council's website.

While meetings are open to the public, Council recognises that not everyone can attend in person. Live streaming gives all community members the opportunity to watch and listen to meetings, either in real time or at their convenience, giving greater access to Council decision making and debate. Business dealt with at the meeting included:

Approval for a dwelling, carport, garden shed and shipping container to be installed at 1685 Gerogery Rd, Gerogery was granted.

Council also granted approval for a transportable dwelling to be constructed in King Street, Brocklesby.

A Free Waste Facility Access Day will be held on 5 April 2020 at all facilities in the shire. Patrons will be asked to provide evidence that they are a resident of the shire, and be able to dispose of rubbish and waste free on that day, with fridges, freezers, mattresses and tyres to be at half price for the day, and a limit of 2 tyres only at the reduced price per household. The free access day will be widely promoted to the community.

Council adopted the Hours of Operation for Pools Policy, which will result in all pools being opened one extra hour on extreme hot days where the weather is predicted to exceed 40 degrees. The policy also deals with what actions will be taken in the event of adverse weather and other issues that might impact the safety and welfare of patrons and staff. You can read the policy on Council's website.

Recently it was announced that Greater Hume received \$1 million under the Drought Communities Extension Program. Council considered a report recommending the allocation of \$800,000 to the upgrade of playing surfaces at Culcairn, Henty, Holbrook and Jindera sportsgrounds, a further \$25,000 to a place making study for Culcairn and the preparation of a mandatory adverse event plan. Council will receive another report in February regarding the remaining allocation of \$150,000.

Council will take the lead role and advocate for sustainable levels of state funding for library services across Greater Hume. Council will also lead a deputation to the Member for Albury, Justin Clancy, and write to the Minister for Arts and Shadow Minister calling for bi-partisan support for CPI indexation of state funding for NSW libraries. Further, Council will promote the message for sustainable funding within the community and be involved in any actions proposed by the NSW Public Libraries Association.

Council will take formal steps to acquire a crown land roadway which runs across the Brocklesby Recreation Reserve.

Council accepted an offer to permit a licence to graze Council land in Baird Street, Culcairn.

Council deferred a decision to relinquish the section 355 committee managing the Walbundrie Hall, to enable further consultation with the community.

Council will undertake preliminary investigation for a potential purchase of land in Holbrook and it will offer the property at 11 Wattle Street, Culcairn for sale by private treaty.

The next Council meeting will be held on 19 February at Culcairn.
