Despite the grey skies and the threat of rain, a crowd of over 400 were present at the Walbundrie Recreation Ground to attend Greater Hume Council's Australia Day celebrations

In her Mayoral Address, Councillor Heather Wilton reminded those present that the words of the popular song—"I Am Australian"

We'll share a dream and sing with one voice

"I am, you are, we are Australian

epitomized what it is to be an Australian.

Daniel a member of the RFS since he was 12 demonstrated his commitment, reliability, and optimism during the Green February-March 2021



It is hoped to be able to extend the system to the Columbarium and Greater Hume Council has agreed to tidy that area and remove several dead shrubs. An official "turning on" ceremony will be held on a date to be advised and all are invited to come out and maybe "get wet." Our Festival of Possibilities will be coming back in a brand new format. It will still be as big and as fun as it was two years ago so make sure you keep your eyes out for that on our socials.


MHFA Ambassador Program

Grants for cancelled agricultural shows and field days

Farrer MP Sussan Ley recently announced one-off 'recovery' payments to local agricultural show and field day organisers helping to cover eligible expenses for cancelled events during 2020.

According to Ms Ley nearly every show or field days was 'scratched' in the electorate this year; not only a blow for each town and local community, but also to that district's economy.

"It's estimated agricultural shows and field days contribute more than \$1 billion to Australia's economy each year, but they rely largely on financial assistance from sponsors and attendees."

"The Agricultural Shows and Field Days program allows my local show groups to recoup some of their yearly costs such as rates, rent or insurance through to affiliation fees, or even just keeping the power on."

"The funding in excess of \$220k for Farrer was replicated Australia-wide and part of \$34 million in support for committees and organising bodies to deal with cash flow pressures and forced cancellations."

"Many business exhibitors and community groups rely on 'their show' to generate sales or raise funds, so I truly hope this money ensures everyone can be back on deck in 2021," Ms Ley said.

Grant amounts were based on eligible expenses and attendance/size of the event

The Henty Machinery Field Days Co-operative Ltd received \$70,000.00.

Committee aspires to improve support

As a follow-up on ensuring the community has access to transport, many people who access transport to Albury have had initial and positive discussions with the service provider, Aspire. The plan is to continue to have a service that allows residents with additional needs to access services outside of Henty.

In addition, the Henty Local Health Advisory Committee, (LHAC), is exploring options to run programs at Henty and the possibility of providing some form of respite for carers and their families, in the future. The committee is very keen to hear

Gardening tips

February

It's still pretty warm outside, but there are some tasty treats you can plant out this month. Try silverbeet, leeks, spring onions, brussel sprouts, bush beans, broccoli, cauliflower and celery, but wait until the end of the month.

Lettuce is lovely at the end of February, but because the days are still quite hot, consider popping the seedlings under some shade cloth, or a more established plant to protect its sensitive foliage from the sun. Even try growing in partial shade.

Still too hot for most herbs,

but lemongrass will take the heat if planted out now. Basil is happy to go in now as well, so why not mix it up and try some purple Thai and lemon basils, as well as our old favourite, sweet basil.



Why not try some lovely flowering plants in your patch as well, like nasturtium, verbena, petunias and marigolds. These guys are great at attracting pollinators and beneficial insects to your patch, and they look great as well.

March

Pansies are an oldfashioned favourite and a

One foggy morning — artist sheds new light



'One Foggy Morning' is an acrylic painting $26cm \ x \ 38cm$

We continue in this edition with another contribution by local artist, Gwen Bullock.

It all began when Trevor actually took a photo of these three, one very foggy morning, near Kempsey. I

loved their colours and characters and the idea of the challenge to paint the foggy background. The sun was just catching their feathers and giving a fabulous shine to their colours. I saw the hen and the middle rooster so intent on some

activity in front of them and then the dear rooster at the back relaxed down and just waiting for the others to tell him the story! I began my artwork with an apricot under painting. Over this I painted various washes of blues and scraped out the tree trunks and some branches to reveal the under painted apricot. The roosters and hen were under painted in the same red/brown colours to unify them before I carefully painted them in detail. I finished the roosters with some gold paint on some feathers that reflected the gold I had noticed in real life. I made sure that the closest foreground fence did not have sharp edges to give depth to the fencing. This was a painting I certainly enjoyed working on and I am glad it is being enjoyed in a new home.

close relative of the popular viola. They are a small annual that can be planted now to flower in late autumn to spring. Their flowers come in a variety of styles, most with black in the centre, and can be bicoloured, frilly and even striped. The flowers add a cheery appearance to any garden bed, pot or hanging basket, and love the full sun. They will still grow in partial shade, but may not flower as well. They are great for a garden that needs colour.

Paper Daisies will add a burst of colour to any garden, big or small. This Australian native comes in a range of colours, including white, pink, red, orange and yellow, and yes, these flowers do actually feel like paper.

Try growing everlasting daisies from seed. Prepare the soil by removing weeds and aerating the ground lightly. Keep the seedlings moist during their two to three week germination period.

Lavender is an easy-togrow flower that instils peace, creates a blanket of colour and has a serene fragrance that is unsurpassed. The silvery-grey foliage provides a delightful foil for the flowers, which can be blue, purple, mauve, pink, white or green. Lavender is best grown in neatly clipped hedges, in pots, in a herb circle, knot garden or courtyard.

Gardenia flowers stand out against their dark, evergreen leaves. They give double value as the flowers always fall 'butter' side up in a floral carpet around the tree. This is a lovely evergreen shrub for a sunny to light shade garden.

Sweet peas are fragrant annual climbing plants that never fail to bring charm to a garden. They will happily clamber up any support you care to give them, from fences to walls or trellises, tripods or teepees. There are even newer dwarf varieties that are deal for planting among other small flowers or will tumble gracefully out of a hanging bas-

Be water wise this summer

- Water your garden only between 5:00pm - 10:00 am.
- Avoid using water to hose down paths and driveways.
- In the laundry only use your washing machine when full and on eco mode, buy a waterefficient washing machine.
- In the kitchen capture water from your tap, while waiting for water to warm up or washing vegetables, use it to water your garden or indoor plants, only use the dishwasher when full and on eco-mode, install aerating taps to reduce water flow by 50 percent.
- For the pool use a pool cover, check for pool leaks and consider shade options to reduce evaporation.
- In the garden, install a rainwater tank, use greywater when safe and environmentally sustainable.

- By using mulch on the garden you can stop water evaporation by up to 70%. Minimise lawn area, choose plants and shrubs that are indigenous to our local area and suitable for our climate.
- Construct paved areas so that they slope, and make use of water runoff.
- Choose the right lawn, one with low water demand and high drought tolerance. Prepare the soil.

Don't over water. Don't mow your lawn short, a taller lawn will shade the roots and reduce evaporation and requires less watering.

Individually, following these water wise rules amounts to a relatively small amount of watersaving, but when we combine our efforts the savings become significant, helping us to collectively make a significant difference.

Indoors, Outdoors and Beyond the Gate

Highwayman opened up the outback

After the arrival in Australia of the first Europeans, the perennial question was what lay over the mountains and in the unknown expanse of the interior and how could they could get there?

In 1813 Blaxland, Lawson and Wentworth found a path across the Blue Mountains. Later, Sturt helped solve some of the riddle of the inland rivers. Over the years, intrepid explorers such as Leichhardt, Eyre, Kennedy, Burke and Wills and others unlocked many secrets of this vast and at times, inhospitable continent.

It is said that one of the last, great explorers was Leonard Beadell, OAM, BEM and FIEMS (Fellow of the Institution of Engineering and Mining Surveyors), Australia.

Bushman, surveyor, road builder, artist and author, he constructed over 6,000 km of roads in some of the most remote and isolated areas in central Australia. His Herculean efforts gave access to over 2.5 million square kilometres.

Born in 1923 in West Pennant Hills, near Sydney, Beadell received his primary school education at the Ryde and later, Gladesville public schools before completing his secondary education at Sydney Grammar in 1939.

Joining the Scouts while in primary school was to have a profound influence on his life. His pack scoutmaster, John Richmond took him on many bush survey trips and taught Len the intricacies of the theodolite, a surveying instrument for measuring horizontal and vertical angles, and much about astronomy.


These skills were to serve him well in his army service in the 8th and 3rd Field Survey Company in New Guinea from 1942. Upon his return in 1945, Len was involved in the surveying and construction of Woomera prior to his discharge from the AIF. Work on Maralinga followed. He helped construct an airfield and a secret nuclear bomb testing facility for the British Government.

Beadell is best remembered for the appropriately named Gunbarrel Highway. He tried to make it as straight as a gun barrel. In often extreme conditions he endured the desert heat often far from medical help. On one occasion he nearly died of thirst while building that track. This hardy pioneer overcame mechanical

breakdowns, punctures, isolation and sometimes, near starvation when supplies and parts didn't arrive on time. Breakdowns could take months to repair. The rough bush track was completed in 1958. The site for the Giles Meteorological Station was determined by him while constructing the Gunbarrel.

Len, "scrub-bashing" in the true sense of the word, would conduct the initial survey ahead of his crew in the convoy behind. Once the line of road was established a bulldozer would cut a track through the spinifex and mulga scrub. Finally, a grader formed the road. Len built other "highways" and added a personal touch. The Anne Beadell Highway named after his wife, the Connie Sue Highway named after his daughter. The Gary Highway and Jackie Junction reflect the names of his younger children. Beadell himself was honoured with a mountain in the Gibson Desert and something truly out of this world - asteroid 3161 Beadell.

Beadell's roads opened up the remote, arid country for pastoralists and travellers alike. All of his roads are still in existence. Fourwheel drive enthusiasts

today owe much to Beadell and his teams. Intrepid travelers on the Gunbarrel can pause at the Beadell Tree and view one of the most remote plaques in Australia.

In 1994, Beadell was named the Australian Geographic Society's Adventurer of the Year. He was a rather shy, often solitary man with a big heart, a sense of humour and an enduring love for the bush. Beadell died at Elizabeth Vale, South Australia, the following year.

Pets and phobias

With the continuation of the hot weather there is also an increased chance of thunderstorm activity.

The loud noises associated with the summer thunderstorm season is one of the most prevalent phobias in animals, and result in tens of thousands of them demonstrating destructive behaviour, escaping from their properties and injuring themselves.

Cats, dogs and other domestic pets are often especially vulnerable, however, this problem often affects other domestic animals too. Horses can also become extremely anxious and escape:

Do not punish your pet for exhibiting this behaviour during times of stress. Attempt to engage, distract and reassure your pet that everything is OK, but don't 'force' this if it becomes particularly distressed.

Provide access to a safe area where your pet may feel more at ease. Animals usually indicate their preferences such as under a bed or inside a wardrobe. Allow it to go where it wants to feel safe. Close bird cages, rabbit hutches and other fixed enclosures and ensure the pet door and windows are closed and locked.

Make sure that your boundary fences and gates are secure and that your pet cannot readily escape through them or over them.

Ensure that your pet wears identification, particularly a microchip. In the unfortunate event that your pet should escape from your property, it will run blindly away without regard to where it is going. When it

eventually calms down it may well not know where it is or how to return.

A microchip gives you the greatest chance that you and your pet will be reunited

If you know that your pet is extremely fearful of thunderstorms, consult your veterinarian to see if he or she can prescribe appropriate medication.
