# Hugh's Smart Fencer wins award

Congratulations to Henty's Hugh McKay, winner of the Australian Wool Innovation Award in the 2019 Science and Innovation Awards for his Smart Fencer invention. award provided Hugh with a \$20,000 grant to build his prototype. These awards are a competitive grants program that provide funding, in several categories, for early career researchers, scientists and innovators aged 18-35 vears that benefit Australia's rural industries.

Hugh's great grandfather, Hugh Victor McKay, invented the Sunshine Harvester in 1885 and it is wonderful to see the desire to innovate continues down the family tree.

Hugh's dislike for fencing on his family farm in Henty inspired him to develop an automatic fencing trailer. It's a project inspired by hours spent fencing on hot days.

"I always thought it was a



very slow, tedious process, moving back and forth up the fence a number of times" Hugh says. "It's probably my least favourite thing to do on the farm, especially in the middle of summer. A lot of effort goes into it and, at the end of the day, if you've done 200 metres, that's a good day's work."

Hugh studied product design and engineering at Swinburne University, and previously worked for Adshel in Melbourne. In need of a break, and with his parents glad of an extra pair of hands during the

drought, he returned to the family farm a year ago. But he couldn't help applying his product design background to the fencing trailer.

Using the Smart Fencer trailer begins with placing your phone or controller where you want the fence to start and end. The system calculates how many posts to load up, depending on post spacing, length and distance.

"Once you've got all your posts in the machine and your wire spinners set up, then you just drive to the beginning of the fence" Hugh says. "It'll pull the fence posts out individually, bang them into the ground, tell you to go forward and build the fence as you drive along."

His Science and Innovation Award project will help Hugh develop a working prototype of his trailer and hopefully get it into production. He estimates that investing in a fencing trailer would pay off within a few years for an average farm, and greatly reduce the time and labour needed for fencing.

# New heights for former police officer

The five-minute speaker for the April Probus meeting was Alan Wilson, whose fascinating life story began in Westernport Bay. He was auditor-general for 11 years until 1974, when he opened the first 7-Eleven store in Australia. His career move killed family life so in 1995 he bailed out, leaving behind a house, subsidised children's education and a \$120,000 package.

Unemployment led to a job offer at a Salvation Army nursing home at \$16,000 a year. In 2000 he became a registered nurse and was eventually appointed to remote services at Tennant Creek. After a sudden move by the resident doctor, Alan was given a "mud map" with the instructions, this "You've gotea," (36,000 square miles.) He stayed 12 years and kept his kit in the back of a Landcruiser.

Guest speaker was Beth Docksey, a retired police officer, commander, superintendent and commissioner of the NSW Police Force, completing 34½ years service. She spoke on her "Trek to Mount Kilimanjaro."

At 5895 metres above sea level, this North Tanzanian mountain is the highest peak in Africa and the highest free standing mountain in the world.

It takes four to eight days to ascend and descend, but the larger climb helped with altitude sickness. With temperatures ranging from -7 to +8 degrees with a wind chill factor and snow on the ground, the team of nine wore thermal underwear with warm jackets and carried many medicines, including Hydrolite.

A crew of 33 (27 porters, waiters, cook and guides) carried all equipment so that the team had only a day pack and three litres of water.

The final six-hour climb was at night until they finally summited at 8.00am, just after sunrise. Various countries flags were left on top where glaciers and lunar landscapes abounded. A rapid descent began with a two-hour slide over rocks during the 1500 metre decline.

The total distance walked was 63 kilometres. Food in the first three days was a little bit of meat, then vegetable and many potatoes. In the mornings porridge was served. Toilets were on the edge of cliffs, no showers, recycling of clothes and the tremendous support of one another were leading factors of this wonderful and successful trek.


Susan and Emily took the ladies for a quick holiday to Japan to visit the beautiful beaches and the lake surrounding Mt Fuji. As soon

# Henty fashion awards celebrate beauty of natural fibres

Rural and urban fashion designers and milliners are invited to showcase their talent in this year's 16th annual Henty Natural Fibre Fashion Awards.

Boasting prizes valued at around \$5000, the fashion awards have grown into a prestigious event attracting high profile designers, with the 2019 entries to be paraded in the Country Lifestyle marquee at the Henty Machinery Field Days on September 17-19 at 1pm each day.

Awards convenor Lyn Jacobsen said the Natural Fibre Fashion Awards grew from the demise of Wagga Wagga's Golden Gown.

"Since the field days are located within a major wool and fibre producing region, it was important an event be carried on to encourage designers to showcase their creativity using the fibres allowed," Mrs Jacobsen said.

"This competition is free and open to all designers, but the fabric in the garment must be at least 70 per cent natural fibre, which can be wool, cotton, alpaca, silk, linen or combinations.

"Garments are judged on visual appeal, creativity and innovation." Mrs Jacobsen said interest in the awards had already been received this year.

"Early interest from regional TAFE students has been strong for this year's encouragement award," she said.

To be announced on the final day, the winner of the supreme garment made with natural fibres will receive \$1000 in prize money plus a Bernina 325 sewing machine valued at \$1499, courtesy of Bernina Australia and Sew Fab, Narrandera. The winners of the best knitted or crocheted garment, millinery and accessory will receive \$500 each.

Bernina Australia and Sew Fab are donating a Bernina L450 overlocker valued at \$999 as an encouragement award for the best garment by a student designer.

"Designers may supply their own models, however, we do have Year 10 students from Billabong High School who are given modelling tuition leading up to this event," Mrs Jacobsen said.

# Reminder — electric blanket safety checks

- Regularly inspect your blankets for wear or damage.
- Look for scorch marks, kinks, creases or lumpiness which may indicate a problem.
- Check for damage where the cord attaches to the controller and the blanket, and check the switch for cracking, discolouration, heat marks or other damage.
- If you find any signs of damage, have the blanket checked by the manufacturer.

- Always test your electric blankets at the start of winter when you take them out of storage.
- If an electric blanket is more than five years old, have it checked by the manufacturer.
- Turn the electric blanket off when you get into bed. Do not leave it turned on overnight.



#### Jindera Multi-Purpose Hall

Council is proposing to develop the Jindera Multi-Purpose Hall to provide Jindera and surrounding residents with a modern public facility suitable for indoor sports and catering for community functions with disabled access throughout. 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# Young legs stretched

Autumn is the perfect time for X-Country.

On a beautiful autumn day, the very last day of school for Term 1, St Paul's School "ran" the annual Interhouse X-Country. All students complete regular training sessions for the three weeks leading up to the X-Country, running around the school block.

finally the littlies and their 1km track. There were some amazing times recorded and an awesome display of service towards others. This was shown when nearly all of the year 5 and 6 students raced with the 5-6 and 7 year olds as their buddies, encouraging them





This year, we were lucky to have a small group of St Paul's College students arrive early to help mark the track and then they set up an Easter egg hunt to surprise the students before the races even began. These College students, as well as friends from Billabong and school parents then volunteered to stand on checkpoints and timekeep to keep our carnival running smoothly.

We start each X-Country with the oldest students running the 3km track, then the 2km event and pushing them on and ensuring they kept to the track.

Finally we finished up the day with a healthy barbecue, cooked up by our volunteers, and some socialising before the much awaited results were tallied.

This year Mundawaddra came out victors on the day in a tight competition.

Congratulations must go to all the children who displayed a commitment to train and then run the event. This effort was rewarded with an invitation

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to compete at Riverina Sports Association level. Here, the students compete against schools from Wagga Wagga through to Albury. A squad of 13 students accepted this invitation and raced on a much colder autumn day. Three of these students were placed in the top ten and await an invitation to the State competition.

# Start of the flu season

With the official start of the winter flu season, NSW Health is urging people to get their flu jab as soon as possible to protect themselves against the potentially deadly infection.

NSW Health's Director of Communicable Diseases, Dr Vicky Sheppeard, said flu vaccines are now available at GPs, Aboriginal Medical Services, and for children, at most council and community health services that routinely provide childhood vaccination services

"Vaccination is your best protection against the flu, so we encourage everyone who can to get vaccinated as soon as possible," Dr Sheppeard said.

"We've seen abnormally high numbers of reported flu cases across Australia over the warmer months leading into winter, so we are urging people to act now and get vaccinated.

"It's important to act now because it takes about two weeks for the vaccine to become fully effective, and children under nine years of age having the shot for the first time require two doses, one month apart."

The first of the 2019 weekly <u>Influenza Surveillance</u>

<u>Reports</u> shows that the flu season has commenced early in the year, with 856 confirmed flu cases for the week ending 12 May, higher than the 812 notifications in the previous week.

"There are plentiful supplies of influenza vaccine and we urge parents of children under five years of age and others vulnerable to influenza to visit their GP as soon as possible," she said.

The NSW Government is spending a record \$22.75 million on state-wide immunisation programs which will assist with flu prevention this season. This includes \$2.6 million for free flu shots to children up to five years of age and a \$1.5 million immunisation and influenza awareness campaign.

The NSW Government has invested approximately

\$130 million in the 2018-19 Immunisation Program budget, including Commonwealth and state vaccines.

Flu shots are also free under the National Immunisation Program, for pregnant women, people over 65 years of age, Aboriginal people and those with medical conditions such as asthma, diabetes and heart problems.

Vaccination is the best protection against the flu, but the following steps also help prevent the spread of influenza:

- Cough and sneeze into your elbow;
- Clean your hands;
- Stay home when sick.

"We urge everyone to get the flu jab to build immunity in the community and beat the flu bug this winter – it could save your life," Dr Sheppeard said.
