Railway crossing relocation underway at Henty

Preliminary work has begun to relocate a railway crossing at Henty, which will improve road and rail safety between Albury and Wagga Wagga.

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development and Federal Member for Riverina Michael McCormack said the \$7.2 million project would deliver a new railway crossing around 850 metres north of the existing Williams Rail Crossing, north of Henty.

"This is an essential project for safety, heavy vehicle efficiency and economic development in regional New South Wales – right in the heart of a prime agricultural area," Mr McCormack said.

"This is a great local example of how the Liberal and Nationals Government's \$100 billion infrastructure investment is setting foundations for economic recovery on the other side of the COVID-19."

New South Wales Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Paul Toole said the project would increase efficiency and safety for those using the intersection.

"Relocating the railway crossing will reduce the number of heavy vehicles travelling through Henty's local streets — and mean more efficient trips for local farmers moving grain from paddock to the silo," Mr Toole said.

"About one kilometre of the Olympic Highway will be realigned as part of this work and a new intersection will be built between Grubben Road, Orange Flat Lane and the new railway crossing."

Federal Member for Farrer Sussan Ley said the project would provide safer access


Greater Hume

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to the local grain storage facility.

"The push to relocate this crossing has been a priority due to the number of near-crashes at this location over the years," Ms Ley said.

State Member for Albury Justin Clancy said the project was a great win for the local community.

"It has been a long journey to develop this project and find funding, and in every way this is a great achievement by the local community and its active council," Mr Clancy said.

Greater Hume Shire Mayor Heather Wilton said Council had been a passionate advocate for this project, lobbying for funding and progressing the relocation to this stage. "Council's commitment to serving the best interests

of the people of Henty and their concern for all road users who use this rail crossing has been heartening," Cr Wilton said.

"This relocation project is a great example of how federal. state and local governments can work together for the benefit of local residents."

Preliminary work on the project commenced recently and is expected to continue about four months. Changed traffic conditions will be in place for the safety of workers and motorists including traffic control, lane closures and a reduced speed limit.

The project has been jointly funded, with the Australian Government committing \$3.6 million, the NSW Government \$3.1 million and Greater Hume Shire Council \$500,000.


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Greater Hume Council Library News

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

Community War Memorials Fund

In response to feedback from our stakeholders we have adjusted the NSW Government's Community War Memorials Fund application rounds.

The dates for the 2020/21 rounds are:

- Round 1: Opened Saturday, 25 April 2020 (Anzac Day) – Closes Monday July 27 2020
- Round 2: Opens Wednesday, 11 November 2020 (Remembrance Day) Closes Thursday 11 February 2021

Round 1 is now open. Eligible organisations can apply online for grants of up to \$10,000 to protect, con-

serve or repair local war memorials in New South Wales. Applications close at 5:00pm on Monday, 27 July 2020.

Marie Jacobsen took some to Collie when she was passing through that area, Jim Jacobsen did a round trip, taking in Hay, Ivanhoe and Hillston, while Charles and Bev Fellows from Albury did a trip to Condobolin. Connie and John Ross drove a fully laden vehicle as far as Nyngan, delivering along the way as well as taking several car-

tons to be picked up from Nyngan and taken to outlying areas. As well as these deliveries, Land Transport also delivered free of charge over 30 cartons to Moree, Dubbo, and Tamworth areas.

People receiving these packs were most grateful, and the branch received many lovely "thank you" letters and cards

On top of this, people were so generous with their cash donations as well as goodies which enabled the branch to donate almost \$7000 to the many small townships where it had sent packs, with the money to be used in their towns!

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Book project returns

For many of us the enforced time spent at home has not been wasted.

Yvonne Booth has taken up writing her World War 1 stories after a gap of five years which she started before her husband Graham took sick. "Henty Heroes" will be published with about 150 stories of Henty soldiers whose names are on our Honour Board hanging in the Civic Centre. This is a taste of the stories.

Trooper Richard Walter Crozier (930): 6th Light Horse 5th Reinforcement

Born in Numurkah in 1892 Richard died in Egypt North Africa in the Battle of Romani aged 24. His father, Tom, was a Henty farmer, while Richard was living and working at Culcairn as a farmer when he enlisted.

He departed Newcastle on board HMAT Bakara on May 22, 1915. He was assigned to the 6th Australian Light Horse and remained with this unit throughout his service. He received a minor shrapnel wound to the neck on November 25, 1915 and was sent out to Malta on the Glenart Castle, a hospital ship. He rejoined his unit at Maadi,

Egypt, when fit for active service. He received more shrapnel wounds and was killed in action on August 4, 1916. He is buried at Bir-el-Maler Cemetery. In 1925 a letter was dispatched from Base Records to tell his father, Tom Crozier, that "your son the late 930 R. W. Crozier was interred at Katara War Cemetery, Egypt".

A letter from Tom's other serving son, Trooper Syd Crozier, said, "Do not take it too hard Dad. I was with him to the last. He did not know what happened to him and only lived a little while after he was hit. We were getting it pretty hot all morning and had to retire. We were riding over a little hill and a machine gun got to us. He just said he was hit, rode a few yards, and fell off his horse. He was hit through the heart. I know he would give his life for the cause again if it was wanted. We would all give our lives before we would let the Germans get the canal. All that was left of them have gone back. I captured a German, but I could not shoot him. He would only put up his hands. Dick had no pain at all. He died on the battlefield a good soldier, a good man.

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Private Richard Nicholls Dobbie (3036) - 33rd Battalion, Infantry

At the time of his enlistment Richard was married to Bessie Clara Dobbie and worked at Farmers & Graziers in Henty. He was 37 years old, having come from Ballarat, Victoria, where he was in the Cadet Forces during his school days. He had two young children.

After his enlistment in September 1916, Private Dobbie's wife became very ill. Because of this he lost his unit, but was able to return in October 1916.

In May 1918 he was gassed in France and sent to Southern General Hospital, London. Mustard gas caused blindness (usually temporary), swelling of the eyelids, vomiting, burns and blisters to the skin. The British, French and Germans were all using gas as a weapon of terror. About 3% of gas casualties were fatal, but this figure is misleading. Many soldiers returned home after having been gassed and suffered then with chronic bronchitis and skin rashes. Death often followed.

Richard Dobbie was killed in action in the field on August 22, 1918. His grave is at the Beacon Cemetery, Bay-sur-Somme, a mile SW of Morlancourt.

Close off unused rooms

Rather than trying to contain heat throughout your entire home, shut the doors. This will keep heat in the rooms which are most in use.

Use a draught snake or plastic draught stopper To ensure cold air doesn't seep into the rooms you're trying to keep warm.

Use thick curtains Switching to heavy curtains will help protect your interiors from losing heat through your windows.

Let the light in

During the day open up your curtains and let sunlight inside. Close your curtains as soon as the sun begins to set to retain the heat you've brought in during the day.

Turn off your bathroom fan

Exhaust fans in your bathroom and kitchen pull the rising hot air from the ceiling of these rooms sucking out the heat. During winter use them frugally and make sure to switch them off when you're done.

Dress warmly!

It sounds straightforward, but <u>often it's easier to warm yourself</u> rather than your whole house. A warm pair of ugg boots and a snug jumper could save you hundreds in heating and energy bills!

Despite our isolation we have been able to knit, knit, knit and those isolated at home have continued their knitting and crocheting too, ready to add to the high pile of wraps at the Uniting Church Hall.

It's been a time for cleaning out cupboards during the lockdown so packs of wool have been delivered regularly to those waiting, after having been sorted by the co-ordinators. Keep on keeping on!



Students adapt to remote learning

These are indeed strange times that we have in education at the present.

Students at Henty Public School have spent weeks where their learning has been taking place at home. Due to the COVID-19 restrictions, the school is like



other educational institutions and has been operating remotely.

FAQs on COVID-19 (Coronavirus)

Below is an extract from NSW Health of Frequently Asked Questions concerning COVID-19.

What are the symptoms?

Symptoms of COVID-19 include fever, cough, sore/ scratchy throat and shortness of breath.

Other reported symptoms of COVID-19 include loss of smell, loss of taste, runny nose, muscle pain, joint pain, diarrhoea, nausea/vomiting and loss of appetite.

In more severe cases, infection can cause pneumonia with severe acute respiratory distress.

What is the difference between COVID-19 and the flu?

The first symptoms of

COVID-19 and influenza (flu) infections are often very similar. They both cause fever and similar respiratory symptoms, which can then range from mild through to severe disease, and sometimes can be fatal.

Both viruses are also transmitted in the same way, by coughing or sneezing, or by contact with hands, surfaces or objects contaminated with the virus. As a result, the same public health measures, such as hand hygiene (hand washing), good respiratory etiquette (coughing into your elbow or into a tissue and immediately disposing of the tissue) and good household cleaning are important actions to prevent both infections.

The speed of transmission is an important difference between the two viruses. Influenza typically has a shorter incubation period (the time from infection to appearance of symptoms) than COVID-19. This means that influenza can spread faster than COVID-19.

While the range of symptoms for the two viruses is similar, the fraction with severe disease appears to be higher for COVID-19. While most people have mild symptoms, approximately 15% of people have severe infections and 5% require intensive care in a hospital ICU. The proportions of severe and critical COVID-19 infections are higher than for influenza infections.

Will the flu vaccine protect against COVID-19?

No, but it is more important than ever to get a flu vaccine this year. Flu vaccination reduces your chances of getting influenza, which means it also reduces the risk of you having two potentially serious infections, influenza and COVID-19, at the same time.

People are encouraged to discuss with their GP or other immunisation providers how to organise to get their influenza vaccination with the physical distancing requirements and other measures in place to minimise potential exposure to coronavirus.

People not eligible for free flu vaccine can consider also to get vaccinated through many pharmacies. Children under 5 years can also access the free influenza vaccine through community health centres and local councils that immunise children.

Council news

COVID-19 restrictions have changed the way Council can run its monthly meeting. The May meeting was conducted with seven councillors and some participating Zoom, two councillors and four officers participated in the meeting room, to comply with social distance measures.

Business dealt with at the meeting included:

Councillors received budget report updating the financial position of Council as at 31 March 2020. The budget review has revealed that a cash deficit is projected to be \$146,789, due primarily to the impact of COVID-19 impacting a range of services and the impact of record low interest rates on Council's investment returns.

Issue 62

Council formally acknowledged the generous contribution of all volunteers across the council area, as part of National Volunteer Week 2020. It is estimated that there are over 400 clubs, community groups, committees, events and service groups across the shire. Council thanks all volunteers, who are the vital link for important community work to be carried out right across the shire.

Council accepted tenders for the new rail level crossing works linking the Olympic Highway to the GrainCorp facility Henty West. A tender was approved for \$1,003,657 (ex GST) for rail signalling and associated work and another tender was approved for \$668.682 (ex GST) for the track and civil construction work. This will be the largest road/rail infrastructure project undertaken to date in Greater Hume, with the total project funding of \$3.1 M by NSW Government, \$3.6 M funded by the Australian Government and Greater Hume \$500,000.



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
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
