CFS researcher to visit

Kristy McMahon, Manager of the Albury-Wodonga Regional Cancer Centre Trust Fund, visited Henty recently, leaving with more than \$11,000 in donations to the Centre.

First stop was Myoora Hostel where she met Mrs Edna Wilson who presented her with a cheque for \$901, being the proceeds of a Fathers' Day raffle she had organised. Mrs Wilson conducts four such raffles each year with all proceeds going to the Regional Cancer Centre.

Next stop was the local coffee shop where Narelle Morey and her band of "Pink Ladies" made a presentation of a cheque for \$10,000 to be used for cancer research. The ladies run regular raffles at the Doodle Cooma Arms Hotel on Thursday nights and have accumulated the funds over a period of time.

While at the coffee shop Margaret Knobel presented Kristy with a cheque for \$100 on behalf of the Henty Craft Shop. At both venues Kristy took the opportunity to explain how funds raised for the Cancer Centre are used before presenting both Mrs Wilson and the Pink Ladies with a framed Certificate of Gratitude.

Several business houses in town have a "Cents for Cancer" jar where people can drop in their small change.

These, along with a number of minor raffles, have so far raised a further \$2,673.

All clear when seen green

The July Probus meeting began with a minute's silence in memory of three members who had passed away in the previous month – Elwyn Kotzur, Eileen Wenke and Eveline Lieschke.

The five-minute speaker, Gary Kenney, spoke about his special glasses. Gary has Irlen Syndrome which causes problems with the brain's ability to process visual information. Sufferers see words upside down, sentences jumbled, running off the page or going in circles. Gary had 12 of the 14 symptoms when diagnosed. This scotopic sensibility was unscrambled by wearing, in his case, green glasses. Different colours work for different people and they can regain their

ability to read.

Guest speaker was Stuart Davidson, now retired, who talked about his time with the Department of Justice, Consumer Affairs, Sheriff's Department and Crime Prevention with the Victorian Government.

Refugees such as the Congolese and Bhutanese in Albury, many of whom spent up to 25 years in camps, have many problems. Stuart's staff were responsible for helping them to assimilate into the community. His team were also responsible for funding a wide range of programs to help other people such as problem gamblers and in crime prevention.

The Victorian Government has spent a great deal of

money on infrastructure to prevent crime such as lighting and CCTV footage. Programs that change people's behaviour such as taking graffiti artists to paint on legitimate areas empowers young people to feel worthwhile. They fund Aboriginal organisations by designing programs with the help elders. For example, they have funded an Aboriginal garden. Aboriginal prisoners provided labour through Wodonga TAFE.

At August's Probus meeting, Kerrie Klemke and daughter Hayley spoke about their trip to Honde Valley in Zimbabwe. Farms with irrigation used to be the food bowl of Africa, but there were many problems such as political unrest, the collapse of agricultural in-

dustry through corruption, violence, alcohol and professionals leaving. The cost of education and health care, inflation and an unstable economy increased many times over.

Hands at Work, an organisation with which Kerrie is associated, has many volunteers on the ground such as care workers looking after the many orphaned children. It costs \$20 per month per child for primary education, basic health care and one meal each day for five days per week.

Buildings wrecked in a cyclone were replaced by Hands at Work volunteers and overseas visitors. The organisation encourages support from Australia.

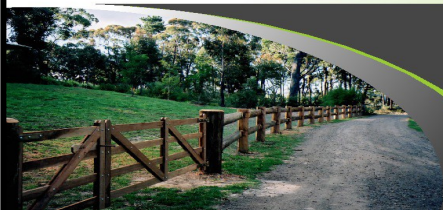

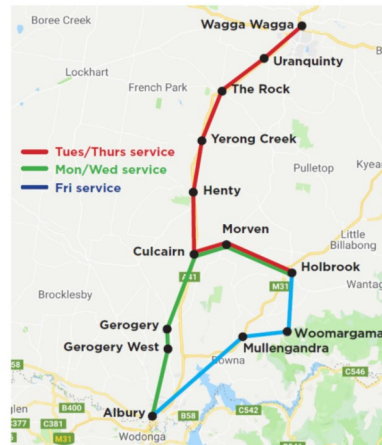

Cause for concern

Farmers cannot be hit with extra tax NSW Nationals Senator Perin Davey has sought assurances that farmers and investors who lease agricultural land will not be hit by new taxes through proposed changes to federal income tax assessment legislation.

The Treasury Laws Amendment (2019 Tax Integrity and Other Measures No. 1) Bill 2019 currently before Parliament proposes to change tax deductions applicable to vacant land to prevent land banking and encourage development of housing, but there are concerns that agricultural land will be caught in the definition of vacant land.

Senator Davey said she raised the issue directly with the responsible minis-

ter, Assistant Treasurer Michael Sukkar MP, after reports that the legislation did not specifically exempt land used for primary production. "This issue is rightly a significant concern for farmers, many of whom lease their farmland either through shared farming arrangements or as part of their business succession planning," Senator Davey said. "While I note that some of the supporting documents with the legislation show the intent of the changes are not to apply to land used for primary production, the fact that there is no specific exemption for this land is cause for concern," she said. "Without clear legal exemptions, we are relying on interpretation and that is not a good enough assurance for the

farmers and farming families that I represent." Senator Davey said while the intent of the law is commendable, the drafting needs to specifically carve out agricultural land from the definition of vacant land. "I have sought advice from the Assistant Treasurer and I wait to be reassured that farmers in my State, and across Australia, won't be negatively impacted by this change," she said.

Wraps pass 1000

Wrap With Love in Henty has celebrated its 1000th wrap since 2003. It started with just a few people after Children's Magistrate Barbara Holborrow spoke to Henty Rotary at a large meeting in the Memorial Hall. The numbers increased during the following 16 years.

In 2018 26,718 wraps were on the move from around Australia, sent to countries such as Armenia, Cambodia, Fiji, Iraq, Philippines, Syria and Vanuatu. World Vision distributed 14,536. They have a wonderful partnership with Wrap With Love, a partnership loved and appreciated. In the past 14 years, Wrap

With love had donated 127,500 blankets, an extraordinary achievement by an extraordinary group of people.

Divin, an orphan from North Burundi, now stays warm and sleeps well at night and is thus able to concentrate on his schoolwork during the day. Zohra (8) from Afghanistan looks at her blanket, a smile on her face, and says, "I am looking forward to using it tonight." Sufiullah (10) says, "This is for me? I have never owned a blanket. Can I take it home?"

Ladies (and one man so far) are knitting in Henty, some at home, others with the Peter Mac Group, and an annual event in the library. You need eight-ply yarn and size 4mm needles to make a 10in square. The Myoora hostel residents also knit every Thursday afternoon under Pam Green's supervision. They have reached 100 wraps. Henty done and dusted

A crowd of 55,000 flocked to the 2019 Henty Machinery Field Days to inspect the “agribusiness supermarket”, showcased by 830 exhibitors across the 105 hectares.

Held on September 17-19, the 56th annual field days featured 14km of outdoor shop fronts on over 1200 sites.

Despite tough seasonal conditions along the eastern seaboard, visitors responded from every state in Australia, seeking out the hot ticket items of hay, tillage, compact tractors and stock handling equipment.

With many regional cereal and oil seed crops due to be cut for hay this week, mowers, rakes and tedders were at the forefront of inquiry and sales.

for cropping machinery,” Mr Scheetz said.

Mr Scheetz said HMFHD hosted 33 farmers from the Southern Nyngan Agricultural Group over two days.

“These people have had three years of back-to-back dry periods with no cropping, they are doing it quite tough and our hearts go out to them as well as those right through to the Queensland border,” he said.

“A lot of people still wanted to tie up the dogs for the day, put the fencing gear away and come to have a day out with their mates.

of the Year Award being presented to Bruce and Heath Hutcheon, Coolamon Chaser Bins, Coolamon, NSW, for the Spreader Chaser.

In other awards, the CRF SUPA Bin 42000 from Clear Ridge Fabrication, West Wyalong, NSW, won the Greater Hume Council Award for the best new Australian designed and built agricultural machine.

Australian Men’s Shed Association men’s health project officer Stuart Torrance was “blown away” with the response by farmers to the free health check-ups.

He said hundreds of check-ups were carried out per day across the field days.

“We did blood pressure and body mass index checks using a body spectrum analysing machine, and look at people’s coping skills to ensure their mental health,” he said.

As Swagman Tours sales manager Michael McFarlane said, “there was plenty of interest in the agricultural tours at Henty. One thing I’ve learnt with the field days is farmers will come from five to six hours away to check out the machinery and equipment, and contacts to make – it’s great they make that effort.”

Reading between the lines

The branch railway from Henty to Rand celebrates its centenary on May 17 next year. The last freight to traverse the line, a wheat special, ran on June 17, 1987.

The line was originally built to facilitate closer settlement, a major government priority at the time and production of wheat. The old branch line was never very busy. A rail motor provided a service for a few years, but it was mainly slow mixed trains, made up of freight wagons and passenger carriages, that provided a lifeline on one or two days each week.

In the final years the only traffic was irregular wheat specials that served a

handful of silos along the line.

Railway historian Neville Pollard has written a comprehensive history about the line which will be published in Australian Railway History journal starting in May next year. He is looking for additional photos to augment the story.

New law targets activists

The Liberal-National Coalition Government's tough new trespass laws to protect farmers from the unlawful actions of animal activists have passed the Federal Parliament, with NSW Nationals Senator Perin Davey speaking in favour of the legislation. Senator Davey said animal activists who use the personal information of family farmers to incite trespass now risk imprisonment of up to five years. "We've all heard stories about farmers whose properties have been vandalised and whose families and workers have been threatened; in fact, I know several dairy farmers and pig farmers whose businesses and operations have been directly impacted by activists and vandals," Senator Davey said. "This Bill makes it a criminal offence to publish material, via a carriage service like the internet, if you intend to incite trespass, property damage or theft on agricultural land," she said. "It is absolutely critical that the Coalition Government continues to support our farmers and workers in the agri-

culture industry, and these laws send a very clear message to animal activists: if you incite farm trespass, you risk jail." Minister for Agriculture, Senator the Hon. Bridget McKenzie, said anyone convicted of the offence would face up to five years in prison. "Australians expect the farmers who feed and clothe us – and many millions around the world – should not be harassed, or worse, as they go about their work," Senator McKenzie said. "The time has come for activists to understand that they just can't descend on someone's home and place of work, interfere with their business and steal their animals. "We're not banning protests – we're banning militant animal activists from inciting others to break the law." The Government amended the Bill to include adding wood processing facilities to coverage under the Bill. The Bill will be presented for Royal Assent through the regular process.

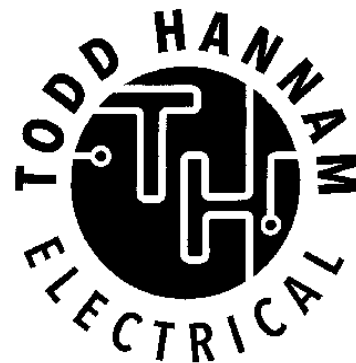
