This service is subsidised by government and the ongoing service will be dependent on the use of the service. Pick-up and drop-off from your door to your appointments, transfers in town, as well as very reasonable priced fares make this a great way to get to Albury or Wagga for: medical appointments, work/study, visit family and friends, movies, shopping and access to airport or train stations.

Feathered settler from the south

There are basically two types of magpies in Australia, the black-backed magpie inland of the Great Dividing Range and the white-backed magpie on the coastal side of the Great Dividing Range. Uncommon to see them the other way round, especially, or never in Henty. But if you have noticed some white-backed magpies in the area around the corner of Rosler Parade and Comer Street, the first one came from Melbourne as a baby that had fallen out of its nest. Its tree had been cut down. My nephew rescued the bird and gave it to his mother (my sister) to bring with them on a visit to Henty, many, many years

I had the baby magpie and named him Dakes, He was outside in a walk-in cage and fed worms and meat. After a while during the day I opened the door of the cage and he came out and stayed with us all around the garden, going into the cage in the evening. The door to the cage was shut to

protect him against cats. He became a wonderful companion. If we were outside at dusk and we hadn't put him in his cage, he would nestle down to sleep on the clothesline under the veranda. As he grew he found most of his own food.

Dakes started to fly south for the day and return in the evening. After several weeks he didn't return at all. Maybe it was breeding season? Three months later in the middle of the day he flew in, had some meat, a drink then flew away south. We suspected he stayed around south of Henty, near the golf course area.

Over the years I have noticed several whitish backed magpies in that area, and definitely a beautiful white-backed adult. On walking passed him, I've called 'Dakes! Dakes!' and he turns to watch me and doesn't move away - he's even taken some steps towards me. Magpies can live for 25 to 30 years, so I'm saying it is Dakes.

Court project nears end

Construction is in progress for two new netball courts, which have been repositioned to the west side of the football oval. The works include the construction of two concrete courts, installation of new netball rings, laying of a new court surface, line-marking, equipment storage, seating, court lighting and fencing.

This project was made possible by funding through the NSW State Government and the NSW Stronger Country Communities Fund and recommended by MP for Albury Justin Clancy. It aligns with the scheduled amalgamation of the football and netball club. Current trends in the sport and recreation environment, highlight this as a key to ensuring many sport

and recreation organisations will have a future that benefits their community members. The love of netball in Henty is second-tonone, with over 150 players, coaches, umpires and volunteers.

The courts have been built in closer to the football oval, for the convenience of and players, spectators families. Other benefits include the removal of the dangerous crossing between the football oval that had two roads and carpark to reach the netball courts. Given it is a family club this creates a major safety issue when kids are crossing to see parents.

The club's president Amelia Bourke said, "This project would not have been possible without Justin Clancy and his government. As a club we are so appreciative and excited for the new-life that these facilities will inject into our quality of netball."

Local trades were central to completing the work. "This is a great example of locals working together in our community. It's because of their hard work and persistence that Henty netball players and their families will benefit," Ms Bourke said. Also acknowledged was the outstanding support from the football club and other groups.

"I would also like to thank the wider community for their support and hard work they have put into gaining this grant," Ms Bourke said. Additional shelters and seating will also be installed across the new courts, which will cater to both junior and senior training and competitions. The upgrade is expected to take a couple of months, but will be completed for use for the 2021 winter season.

The new courts will still honour Nancy May, who was one of the key founders when the club was first established. The court's official opening will be Saturday, April 10 2021 with an invitation extended to Mr Clancy. All members of the community are welcome to attend.



2021 Henty Machinery Field Days back with a bang

Southern Australia's single biggest agricultural event, the Henty Machinery Field Days, is back in 2021 with a bang after last year's forced hiatus.

The agribusiness super event which attracts more than 60,000 visitors each year, was forced to cancel the 2020 event due to COVID-19 – the third time the event has been cancelled in its 58 year history.

The field days are scheduled for September 21-23 with exhibitor online applications opening on March 16 and online ticket sales for visitors to open in late July.

HMFD chief executive officer Belinda Anderson said the Cooperative's Board gave the green light for event planning to go ahead in February.

With the 2019 field days drawing more than 850 exhibitors on over 1200 sites, Mrs Anderson is expecting exhibitors numbers to be in excess of 850 for 2021 on the back of strong interest.

"We are back with a bang this year," she said.

"Agriculture was recognised as an essential industry during the pandemic and we experienced an exceptional year where commodity prices and yields combined to allow a sustained recovery for the sector from the drought."

Mrs Anderson said the Board and staff were working hard on planning for a COVID-safe event, with the field days operating on a 2sqm per person rule under current NSW Health restrictions.

She said public entry would operate on a contactless system with patrons prepurchasing tickets on-line and scanning a QR code at the entrance gates, while exhibitors would be encouraged to use EFTPOS facilities.

Mrs Anderson said there would be an additional level of sanitisation of amenities and COVID Marshalls to monitor social distancing in order to protect the health of patrons, exhibitors, volunteers and staff.

"Henty this year coincides with the NSW and Victorian school holidays, and 2021 marks 60 years since the field days were conceived as a one day header school at the Henty showground in 1961," she said.

"The field days will have all the usual attractions including the prestigious Henty Machine of the Year



Award, the working sheep dog trials, Country Lifestyle pavilion, Farm Gate Produce Market, Baker Seeds agronomy trials, helicopter joy rides, live entertainment, the Natural Fibre Fashion Awards and vintage farm machinery display.

"We will be seeking to reinvigorate the popular Agri-Innovators Award for innovative inventions from farmers, students or backyard tinkerers."

The entries must meet the criteria of having a practical on-farm application, be based on an original idea of the entrant and not be in full-scale production at the time of entry.

Also back this year will be the exhibitor awards for Best Outdoor Large Commercial, Best Outdoor General, Best Indoor (Country Lifestyle and Farm Gate).

"The year off has enabled us to sow down the field days site with a specialist pasture mix including fescue and cocksfoot varieties recommended by David Leah, technical extension agronomist with Seed Force Australia," Mrs Anderson said.

According to the Tractor and Machinery Association of Australia, 2020 delivered the strongest year of tractor sales since the 1980s.

"We expect the strong demand for all agricultural machinery, livestock handling equipment and fencing materials to continue through 2021 and, combined with the focus on regional Australia with the public's keenness to get out and about, will auger well for a successful 2021 Henty Machinery Field Days," Mrs Anderson said

The not-for-profit HMFD Cooperative enabled fundraising of more than \$350,000 to regional sporting clubs, community organisations and schools from the 2019 Henty Machinery Field Days.

The system was extended to the columbarium at no extra cost thanks to the generosity of Dylan Boers from Thinkwater.

Henty Lions Club president Julie Colley introduced the participants Clarissa Peasley, Skye Bakic and Tim Lowe. The students made their presentations to a panel of three judges comprising of Alison Campbell, Jeannie Kenney and Stephen Colley, along with members of the Lions Club. The competition involved each student attending a 30-minute interview by the panel in the afternoon discussing their achievements followed by the evening public speaking competition comprising of two impromptu topics and a fiveminute prepared speech of their choice.

The first impromptu topic related to whether everyone should be required to have the COVID vaccination and why.

Clarissa supported people having a choice about whether to have the vaccination. She outlined her concerns about frontline healthcare workers being required to have the vaccine and about further mutations of the virus and the ability of the vaccination to protect people. Both Tim and Skye supported COVID vaccinations in order to reduce the number deaths and infections.

The second impromptu topic was "If you could time travel which direction would you go and why?" Although travelling to the future would provide the opportunity to see how our world progresses, all three students opted for travelling back in time. Clarissa

spoke of going back in time to when her grandfather lived wanting to experience and appreciate the challenges and difficulties he faced in order to provide for his family. Tim outlined visiting some of the major historical events such as battles, the space race, the rise and fall of countries power and influence and also finding out more about his own family history. Skye also chose going back in time to learn about history and about correcting past mistakes and thereby improving our future. She spoke of witnessing the period associated with women's and indigenous rights and to see how they have shaped our future.

The five minute prepared speeches provided an opportunity for the students to deliver on a topic that they had researched and prepared for and to feel confident on their chosen subject. Tim's subject was the changes to communication technology from World War I to World War II. He provided examples of the limitations of early communication technology used in World War I such as carrier pigeons, Morse code and telephones. World War II saw improvements in radio communication, radar, and the faster fighter planes such as the Spitfires and Messerschmitts. Advances were also made with codebreaking by the British such as the Enigma code.

For her presentation Skye spoke on the question young people are often asked on what career they wish to follow when they get older. It's a vexing question as most young people would have difficulty in deciding. Instead of focusing on this question Skye suggested the question should be "what can I do to improve the world". There are now opportunities to have different careers during our working lifetime and we shouldn't be defined by one particular career. Instead the importance of values should

With ANZAC Day coming up I feel it fitting to write about this painting. We had been discussing a window display for the Henty Creative Gallery. We had a display for ANZAC Day 2018 and were thinking of some new display items for 2019. This was Friday morning and we needed to do the display on Saturday. I said to Yvonne Booth that I should have painted something for the display, but it is too late now. Yvonne simply said, "If you really want to do it, you

will find a way" and so the challenge began.

Firstly, the design idea which actually came quite quickly two different poppies on a slightly abstract background. 
Skye was judged the overall winner and will represent the Henty Lions Club at the Zone/Region competition to be held at Numurkah on March 28.

Something new is coming to the community of Henty. Something that will excite families who have babies and pre-schoolers. That something is called Mainly Music.

child's development. It provides school readiness skills – like literacy and numeracy. It enhances social skills – especially when children need to negotiate the sharing of toys and play space. It helps the body and mind



Did you know that music enhances the educational capabilities and development skills of babies and children? A 2016 study at the University of Southern California's Brain and Creativity Institute found that childhood musical experiences have the ability to actually accelerate brain development. It's true. Particularly in the areas of reading skills and the acquisition of language.

But not only that. Music enhances all areas of a

work together – like when a child is marching.

The Brainwave Trust (NZ) states that, "attachment is the lasting emotional bond that a child forms with a specific person that provides safety, comfort, soothing, and pleasure. Almost all children will develop an attachment, but the nature of attachment varies, depending largely upon the care-giving style of their parents. Children who are securely attached are more

likely to be resilient under stress, have better relationships, and enter school ready to learn." Within a Mainly Music session there are lots of expressions of attachment. Lots of moments when parent and child will connect, laugh, cuddle, spend time looking at each other's face, smiling and enjoying close time together.

But not only that. The Mainly Music sessions are fun. They bring together families in the same season of life and provide 30 minutes of music, enjoyed by grown-up and child alike. There are scarves and puppets, simple percussion instruments and Lycra panels, hats and pictures. There is jumping and tapping, hopping and rolling, dancing and clapping. Eat/ play/chat is what follows the music. After a simple snack and refreshment, toys are provided for free play. While the children play the grown-ups are welcome to stay for a cuppa, morning tea and enjoy a chance to chat to others.

Actually not only that. One mother recently wrote, after working through some tough times in life, 'It's not mainly music you see. It's so much more than that. Music is just a small part of it. It's mainly everything else that awaits you when you arrive at the session. It's mainly everything else that's so vital and important to people just like me".

In 1933 he was finally accepted by General Motors Holden as a franchise dealer. Through the depression and war years no new cars were available and two year waiting lists were common for new cars. In 1948 the first Holden was released. 24-hour service through the NRMA began in 1963 and the Holden dealership in Holbrook was purchased in 1977 with son David at the helm.

During Cecil's retirement he is pleased to continue with steam engines, building scale models. Karen Kotzur moved a vote of thanks to Cecil and presented him with a Probus pen.

139 wraps for the year



Mavis Buckley gave a fiveminute address about her life. She grew up in Green Valley, Sydney, where her father was killed in a bicycle accident, leaving a young family.

When Mavis and her husband, a mechanic, moved from Macquarie Fields to Kiama, he bought a boat called May B then a bigger boat to satisfy his fishing pursuits with his mates.

The couple undertook many wonderful trips in their motor home which saw them travel on and off for 10 years around Australia.

A keen, enthusiastic youth officer for Greater Hume Council, Emily Jones spoke at the February Probus meeting about being an ambassador for traineeships in regional towns.

Her life-changing journey began at school when she commenced the three-year course. Her speech, drama, music, Miss Show Girl up to state level, Year 12 schoolwork and social activities as background, Emily would encourage anyone to seek a council traineeship. It offers job security, learning on the job and ending with a certificate to prove your worth. With this on

the job experience there are long-term gains.

After winning the title of NSW trainee of the year Emily spent a week in Sydney for judging at national level where rigorous teaching for personal development and public speaking took place. Emily gave credit to her training manager Susan Kane who nominated her for the award.

Emily's fellow contestants hadn't heard of Henty as they were all from citybased regions. She finally got through to them when she sang the Henty Field Day song.

Hilltop plans expansion

At a recent fish-and-chip night at the Henty Community Club, Alice Glachan spoke about Hilltop, Albury's accommodation for cancer patients and their carers, and sometimes families. Alice is the finance co-ordinator for fundraising for the Stage 2 development. The evening was sponsored by the Lions' Club of Henty.



Hilltop Stage 1 was completed in 2012 at a cost of \$5.2 million. The facility provides 20 modern motel-style rooms with ensuite, lounge and kitchen facilities, communal

area, library, barbecue and children's play area.

Accommodation is safe, comfortable and available to all regional cancer patients. Stage 2 plans include a gymnasium and 10 additional accommodation suites. Construction has begun on Stage 2 with the community being asked to raise 25% of the required funds. Gifts to assist with furnishings and equipment are also possible.

Patients from as far away as Melbourne and Ballarat can use the accommodation for a night or up to four nights – Monday to Thursday, but may stay the whole week if treatment necessitates it. The cost is very reasonable. Plans for a Stage 3 development are in the wind.

Alice encouraged those present to tell at least three people about Hilltop, therefore trebling the number who could speak about fundraising for the accommodation. Donations may be given to any Henty Lions' Club member or directly to Hilltop. All gifts are tax deductible.

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Harnessing horse power

when he was a toddler staying with his grandparents in Kent Town, South Australia. In New Zealand in 1977, he got a job on a Clydesdale stud with owners Fergus and O'Conner using horses on their dairy farm. In 1979 he bought a Clydesdale gelding and worked it on district farms, as well as a means of transport. At this time harness makers were becoming scarce so Mark taught himself to make basic repairs.

Mark Porter's fascination

with harness horses began

In 1980 he met Keith Munro, a retired collar and harness maker, who gave him a couple of collar mallets which he still uses today, and a lot of helpful advice. The best collar makers were in Australia, so off to Melbourne he went.

Charlie Sagar, who operated Sagar Saddlery Supplies taught Mark the basics of saddlery, such as hand sewing and cutting out and introducing him to many harness enthusiasts around Victoria.

Mark was introduced to Tim Peel at the Melbourne Show in September 1981. Tim agreed to take on Mark as an apprentice at Camden in NSW, initially for six months, but it lasted for 15½ years. During that time Mark made all sorts of col-

lars, from pony to the heaviest dray collars, and unusual collars for donkeys, camels, goats and broncos for the outback. The harnesses he created were light, single-horse harnesses, coach-pair harnesses up to heavy delivery team harnesses, camel or horse pack saddles.

On the Peel family property was grain – the cereal rye – used to fill the collars. Both pure bred Clydesdale horses and part draught horses were used on the farm.

In March 1988 Mark purchased a property at Cobbitty, then after moving to the Riverina in 1995 he established his business as Asterisk Horse Collars and Harness. For 17 years he operated his Currawarna shop on the banks of the Murrumbidgee. Since October 2018 he has been located in Henty.

Asterisk Horse Collars and Harness has made collars and harnesses for clients all around Australia and had exported to New Zealand and Ireland. Mark's philosophy is to manufacture traditional Australian-style harnesses to the highest possible standards, using traditional, natural materials such as leather, straw and natural fabrics wherever possible and utilising tools and methods that have been developed over 150 years or more.

Permits are available from all Greater Hume Council offices.



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


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
