## Get Ready for the Heat

Murrumbidgee Local Health District is reminding people to take the risk of heat related illness seriously with temperatures in the region expected to reach into the high 30s this week for several days in a row.

The district's Acting Director Public Health Alison Nikitas said that while heat related illness may affect anyone, certain groups are particularly vulnerable. These include older persons, people with a chronic medical condition, people who live alone, and infants and children.

"Heat puts a lot of strain on the body and can cause dehydration, heat exhaustion and heat stroke. It can also make underlying health conditions worse. However, being prepared and taking some simple precautions can reduce the risk of heatrelated illness," Ms Nikitas said.

"In this extended period of hot weather we need to keep in contact with elderly friends, neighbours and relatives, and also be mindful that babies and children can overheat and dehydrate quickly."

Simple steps to minimise the risk of heat-related illness include:

- Drink plenty of water, and carry some with you when you're out.
- Eat smaller, cold meals such as salad and fruit.
- If you are travelling, take water to drink in case you break down or are delayed.

- Avoid alcoholic, hot or sugary drinks.
- Plan your day around the heat. Stay indoors between 11am and 5pm and minimise physical activity.
  - Keep the sun out of your house by shading windows with an awning, shade-cloth or plants. Shut curtains and blinds, and use fans and air conditioning where available.
- Take cool showers or baths or put your feet in cool water.
- Seek out air-conditioned public buildings such as libraries and shopping centres.

Emergency Physician Dr Peter Chigwidden encouraged people to be aware of the early signs of heat related illness, and to seek medical care early.

"Headaches, vomiting and particularly things like confusion and an altered mental state are things to be concerned about, and signs that you should come to the emergency department so we can institute some cooling measures and rehydrate you with some fluids," said Dr Chigwidden.



Their workload is immense, the pressure to perform well all the time makes it a struggle to cope in their restricted environ-

ment

At present an oil tanker is berthed at Kurnell at a place where only a supply barge can reach them so the mission has organised for the captain of the barge to deliver SIM cards and goods to the crew who are confined to their ship.

At Christmas many seafarers were buying their own Christmas gifts as a compromise, being expensive to post gifts. Electrical goods, Christmas decorations, food and clothing were the most popular items.

Last Christmas a gift of "sunnies" was given to all who visited the centre. After all, if your sunnies go overboard there is no shop to replace them.

A shell landed in the street, only a few yards off. During World War I, the diggers were rarely safe, even when they were tucked up in bed, miles away from the front line.

This book provides a glimpse into a private's experience on the frontline. It is based on the war diary of Private Charles Robert Lumsden Smith, but is set within the broader context of World War I, the events that led up to the outbreak of war, the battles in which Private Smith fought, and others that influenced him or the outcome of the war.

It is the story of one man, amongst the hundreds of thousands of young Australians, who fought in a war that changed the face of Europe and spawned the nationalism that set the foundations for the next world war.

#### The Author:

Anne is a retired science teacher who started her working life as a medical scientist. She followed a passion to become a teacher and taught Science in the western suburbs of Sydney before taking up a position at a large independent school in the city where she taught for thirty years

Retirement brought time to

write, first about her children and the remarkable journey they shared in The Gift of Adoption, and then about her parents' experience of World War II in No Ordinary Life. Her latest book, Private CRL Smith, tells another family wartime story; this time about a young Aussie on the Western Front during World I.

You won't find his name amongst the heroes written about in the history books, but he was one of the many unsung heroes of a war too willing to sacrifice young lives.

### 161 wraps a record year

A busy year in 2022 with about 25,000 wraps distributed. 14,000 stayed in Australia and have been donated to flood victims; also to indigenous folk, women's shelters and aged care facilities. Increased shipping costs have caused numbers to fall in individual distributions.

Wraps have gone to Syrian refugee camps, Fiji, Solomon Islands Lebanon, Tonga and Armenia and a small number to Ukraine.

There were 22,500 wraps received in 2022, 161 of which came from Henty, our best ever donation. This year the warehouse at Mascot will be shared with Wayside Chapel.

Busy fingers have continued to knit and crochet over the holiday period. If you are interested in helping, squares should be 10" or 25cms. The best square to knit starts in a corner with three stitches. At the beginning of every row increase until the side measures 10" then start decreasing by 1 every row until three stitch-

es remain and knit them together.

Since 1992 Wrap with Love has wrapped more than 414,000 people with love and warmth. It is a non-profit organisation. It has annual membership fees, but relies on donations to cover ongoing expenses. It is a non-denominational, non-racial, non-political organi-

Wrap with Love celebrated its 30<sup>th</sup> birthday last year. Henty and Culcairn have been knitting seriously since 2000.

Probus had their January 11, 2023 meeting at the Henty Community Club.



### Cool lunches that tick all the boxes

Healthy lunchboxes are a really important part of the school day, with healthy snacks being front row and centre to enabling our kids to learn better, concentrate for longer and enjoy playtime with their friends.



Murrumbidgee Local Health District (MLHD) Health Promotion Officer, Megan Mattingly reminds us that good eating habits, when established early. really do set up better learning opportunities, not only while at school, but for later in life. "Young children love to learn about healthy choices and to be involved in selecting and packing healthy options in their lunchbox, which also increases the likelihood that they will actually eat the food they are packing with their parent or carer," Megan said. "It all means that kids have the long-lasting energy to participate in physical activity, the ability to focus and concentrate better, and play with their friends, leading to better learning outcomes."

"Healthy lunch boxes do not have to be expensive or difficult and include items from the five food groups, while limiting more processed items that are high in added sugar and salt. Megan has a smorgasbord of tips to consider when packing a nutritious lunch-box, including:

### A water bottle, piece of fruit or serve of vegetables for Crunch and Sip:

- In season and fresh is cheapest. Some summer fruits are strawberries, melon, peach, nectarine and grapes. Small tins of fruit are also good: those with no added sugar in the syrup
- Raw vegies such as carrot sticks, cherry tomatoes, cucumber and capsicum, cob of corn or salad cup

# A cereal/grain food and fruit or vegetable for a recess snack:

- Vegetable sticks or piece of fruit, rice crackers with hummus dip.
- Savoury pikelets, rice cakes or plain popcorn
- Broccoli florets, water crackers and salsa dip
- A slice of fruit loaf and ½ cup 4-bean mix

### A healthy selection for lunch

- Boiled eggs, beans or lean meat such as beef or chicken, tuna or salmon with a salad sandwich, roll or with cooked rice or pasta
- A piece of fruit or vegetable
- A serve of reduced fat dairy such as cheese, yoghurt, custard or milk.

### A water bottle

- Pack a water bottle or two and refill at school bubblers or water fountains regularly (which will close only if there is COVID-19 transmission in the community).
- Water will quench thirst better than anything else, hydrate children all day and is best for healthy teeth.

If flavouring water, try some citrus slices or mint. Don't pack soft drinks, cordial or fruit drinks

### An ice pack or frozen bottle of water.

 Don't forget to use icepacks or a frozen bottle of water in a cooler bags in lunch boxes during hot weather.

 Keeping the food cool in the lunchbox is important to stop food from spoiling, which could make a child unwell, and it will be more appetizing too.

We encourage parents and carers to keep occasional foods such as biscuits, cakes, sweets, chips for other occasions rather than school lunches as they really have limited nutritional value.
