Respite Care project at Henty

Research is underway into extending the health care services offered in the Greater Hume and Lockhart shires to include a respite care facility.

To be located at Henty, members of the Henty Local Health Advisory Committee (LHAC) are currently investigating the feasibility of such a facility. A private donor has offered to fund the building of such a facility, however community fundraising is underway to support the cost of background research.

"We are looking at the development of a purpose-built centre which caters for people with a range of conditions needing respite care. This is not to be an aged care respite facility," Mr Broughan said.

At this stage, it is anticipated such a centre could be community owned with the provision of the care services contracted to an experienced provider.

The centre could potentially offer care to people impacted

by physical and mental disabilities, autism, chronic disease, cancer, early onset dementia and conditions such as chronic fatigue.

Preliminary investigations suggest the building could comprise a residential style respite care centre and a small number of independent living units, designed for people who can live relatively independently with some supervision.

"Currently families and carers of people with these challenges can only access respite care in major centres like Wagga and Albury, which brings further challenges in terms of travelling, transport and regular interaction with their loved ones in care," Mr Broughan said.

Research is currently being undertaken into potential sites, building design, community needs, government regulations and how such a facility would viably operate.

Mr Brougham is keen to hear from community members who would like to have input into such a centre, particularly those who currently or in the future would utilise such respite care.

"Any expansion of health care services in our community makes our shires better places to live. At the same time this would potentially create jobs and attract people to live in the area," he said.

Heroic effort praised

The book launch of "Henty's Heroes" on Sunday, May 23, was a great success with more than 150 people sitting down to a lunch of bully beef and apple roly poly/bread and butter pudding.

Nineteen beautifully decorated tables graced the auditorium at the Henty Civic Centre with place mats of soldiers on one side and the Great War major events program on the other, place cards with slouch hats made from a penny, Gallipoli crosses and table names of wartime battles.

A display of World War I memorabilia by Daniel and Noelene Haines was outstanding because it showed the farm implements of an ordinary man leading into the instruments of war.

Brad Booth, MC for the luncheon, and son of the author Yvonne Booth, kept the program interesting and alive. As was the custom in 1914, the audience sang God Save the King, Father Ken Dale recited Grace and a

newly formed choir excelled themselves with the singing of three World War I songs.

Three short snippets of a DVD "War in the Trenches" was shown throughout the program. The DVD was purchased by Yvonne Booth and her late husband Graham on a visit to Memorial Museum Passchendaele 1917 in Belgium.

Mr Justin Clancy MP, Member for Albury, told a story about his Uncle Patrick and gave credit to Yvonne for her diligence in writing the book.

Highlight of the luncheon was the visit by Her Excel-

lency the Honourable Margaret Beazley AC QC, Governor of New South Wales, accompanied by her husband Mr Dennis Wilson, her official secretary Colonel Michael Miller and an aidede-camp. She provided an explanation of Henty in 1914 at the beginning of the War compared with the years of battle and the return home of soldiers. The Governor praised Yvonne and thanked her for creating this social history for all to read, for her extensive research and commitment to the project.

Judy Zweck's book review encouraged people to purchase the book by relating stories of soldiers, their com-

Calling all those good backyard ideas for Henty Field Days

Farm inventors, backyard tinkerers and students are invited to showcase their innovative ideas in the Agri-Innovator of the Year Award at the 2021 Henty Machinery Field Days.

The entries must meet the criteria of having a practical on-farm application, be based on an original idea of the entrant and not be in full-scale production at the time of entry.

HMFD chief executive officer Belinda Anderson said Agri-Innovators was aimed at tertiary and university students, farmers, backyard tinkerers and innovators.

"Entries can be any agribusiness invention, ranging from a mobile phone app or computer software program to the largest tillage machinery," she said. "This year's entrants will receive exposure to the agricultural market place and the opportunity to network with potential manufacturers."

Temora farmer and the 2018 Agri-Innovation winner for an auto sheep feeder, Justin Dunn, encouraged all aspiring inventors to enter their concept in the Agri-Innovators Award.

"At some point you have to take off – it may be not finished or perfect, but you will never get to that point until you have it out there commercially," he said.

The Shepherd received nationwide media coverage from the win at Henty with around 50 units sold after the event and went on to win the NAB Agribusiness Award of Excellence at the Australian National Field

Days.

At Henty, The Shepherd was a solar-powered new generation smart feeder incorporating automated technologies. The units are now fitted with a 4G remote camera with a 300 degree view, and also a SMS re-

mote controller which sends alerts via text message.

Help with the Regional Seniors Travel Card

Recently, library staff have had a lot of enquiries about this card and how to obtain it. After assisting many seniors who struggle with computer use, staff discovered that seniors can simply call 13 77 88 rather than using a computer. Eligible seniors must be receiving the aged pension or be a Commonwealth Seniors Health Card holder and be living in a designated regional area of NSW.

You will need to have your personal details at hand, including address and phone number plus the number and expiry date of your pension or healthcare card.

Ipads now available to be loaned from Greater Hume Council Libraries

Greater Hume Council was one of 24 organisations to receive funding to deliver innovative programs to help older people connect with each other, through online engagement or other methods that maintain social distancing.

Ipads are available to be loaned from any Greater Hume Council Libraries for people who are over 60 years of age. The Ipads can be used to download library resources, play games, or access other communication technologies with the support of trained facilitators to encourage online interaction for people who are lonely or isolated, living at home or in Age Care Facilities.

Smear in time saves lives

Bowel cancer is the second most common cancer worldwide after breast cancer and the second highest cause of cancer deaths in Australia after lung cancer.

Ninety percent (90%) of bowel cancers can be cured if detected early.

Rotary Bowelscan kits can be picked up at the Holbrook, Henty, Culcairn, Walla Walla, and Jindera pharmacies during the months of May and June. The cost of \$20 covers pathology and communication letters.

The Rotary Bowelscan program is a screening program designed to detect traces of blood in bowel motions at the time of sampling, particularly blood not visible to the naked eye. Positive results require further examination to determine the actual cause which may or may not be cancer related. A further examination with

your GP will determine this.

Annual screening is recommended especially for people over the age of 40 years plus and any age if there is a family history.

There have been some cases where a positive result occurred after a negative result the year before with a further examination revealing cancer requiring immediate intervention.

In Australia bowel cancer affects one in 18 males and one in 26 females.

Rotary Bowelscan has a return rate of 80 percent due largely to participants making the decision to participate, and 50 percent of participants are from the 50-74 age group.

The Rotary Club of Holbrook has organised Bowelscan kits to be distributed to pharmacies throughout Greater Hume Council as a community service to our residents in the shire. awards have grown into a prestigious event attracting high profile designers, with the 2021 entries to be paraded in the Country Lifestyle pavilion on September 21-23 at 1pm each day.

Awards convenor Lyn Jacobsen said the Business Development Award was creating excitement among designers with new entrants planning on participating.

The new award has been sponsored by JMP Developments, Wodonga, for \$500.

"Since the field days are located within a major wool and fibre producing region, it was important an event be carried on to encourage designers to showcase their creativity using the fibres allowed," Mrs Jacobsen said.

"This competition is free and open to all designers, but the fabric in the garment must be at least 70 per cent natural fibre, which can be wool, cotton, alpaca, silk, linen or combinations."

"Garments are judged on visual appeal, creativity and innovation."

To be announced on the final

day, the winner of the supreme garment made with natural fibres will receive \$1000 in prize money plus a Bernina 325 sewing machine valued at \$1599, courtesy of Bernina Australia and Sew Fab, Narrandera.

The winners of the best knitted or crocheted garment, millinery and accessory will receive \$500 each.

Bernina Australia and Sew Fab are donating a Bernina Overlocker L450 valued at \$1099 as an encouragement award for the best garment by a student designer.

"Designers may supply their own models, however, we do have Year 10 students from Billabong High School who are given modelling tuition leading up to this event," Mrs Jacobsen said.

Boasting prizes valued at around \$5500, the fashion







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
Netball courts open

The easiest way to create a wrap (which measures 101

cm x 180cm or 40 inches x 70 inches) is to make 28 squares which measure 25 cm x 25 cm (10 inches x 10 inches). Starting with casting on three stitches, increase one at the beginning of each row until you have 70 stitches. Then decrease one at the beginning of each row until three stitches remain then cast off

Becoming a Councillor



Councillors - ordinary people with an extraordinary passion for their community

On Saturday, 4 September 2021, Greater Hume Council will conduct councillor elections to elect nine councillors to serve for a three year term.

A constitutional referendum will also be held for electors to consider whether the Council area should continue to be divided into wards.

Why stand?

If you care about what happens in your community, want to improve services, make the roads safer or support local businesses, consider becoming a councillor.

By standing for council, you'll have opportunities to:

- help your community
- · improve infrastructure
- improve planning and amenities
- · build engaged communities.

Being a councillor provides an opportunity to represent your community's views on vital decisions that affect people's daily lives. It is also an opportunity to develop new skills and work with a diverse range of people.

Councillors serve their communities by listening to people in the local area and then representing those views on council.

What's it take?

To stand for council, you'll need:

- passion, commitment and time
- an interest in your community
- · an interest in local government
- to be prepared to learn and be accountable
- being able to talk to people in your community and take account of different views when making decisions
- time management and organisational skills
- · problem solving skills
- teamwork skills.

You need to be able to commit time to reading council business papers, attending meetings and representing council at some events. The time you need for this will vary across the year, but it may be 5 to 10 hours each

What you will need to know

If you're thinking about standing for council, you need to know about:

- responsibilities of councillors
- · conduct and behaviour
- · where to get help.

What support will you receive?

Once elected, you will receive council-based training and other support to help you understand and be successful in the role.

Greater Hume Council meets expenses and provide tools to help councillors carry out their role. Council also provides support to help councillors who have young family members, a disability or other special needs.

To recognise what councillors do for their community, they receive an annual fee from the council (paid monthly). The annual fee paid to a councillor is \$12,400 per annum. The fee is counted as income for tax purposes.

How do you stand for election?

To be eligible to stand for election you must:

- be at least 18 years of age and an Australian citizen
- live or own property in Greater Hume Council area
- be on the electoral roll
- not be disqualified from standing from office, e.g. if you have committed certain offences.

A proposal nominating you as a candidate then needs to be submitted by:

- at least two eligible people enrolled for the same ward or area you are being nominated for, or
- a registered officer of a registered political party.

You must complete some forms and officially lodge them between Monday, 26 July 2021 and 12 noon on 4 August 2021.



Information for Candidates

Candidates and groups must register with the NSW Electoral Commission (NSWEC) before accepting political donations or incurring expenditure for an election.

All candidates and groups must appoint an official agent at the time of registration and notify the NSWEC of the agent's appointment.

Registering for an election is a separate process from being nominated as a candidate for an election.

The Electoral Commission NSW provides advice about becoming a candidate and registering to vote in the election.

bility are the focus for this round of SCCF funding, I urge all community and sporting organisations to consider projects or programs which would be of benefit to the Greater Hume community'.



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Girls good deeds

Acts of kindness, no matter how small, can go a long way in providing support encouragement to those who are feeling isolated in our community. Tips for winter

Heaters need to be checked every year, no matter how old they are. Make sure there are no exposed wires or loose connections on the cables.


Gas heaters must be vented adequately as the carbon monoxide produced when the gas is burnt is odourless, colourless and deadly. It is particularly important to have gas heaters serviced regularly by a qualified tradesperson to ensure that there are no carbon monoxide leaks.

- Heaters should be placed on a flat, level surface.
- Never use a gas heater or barbecue made for out-door use inside your home.
- Always supervise children and pets when heaters are in use.
- Keep heaters well clear

from items that might burn. A minimum of onemetre clearance from clothes, bedding, furniture, curtains and other combustibles is recommended.

Regular maintenance of **fireplaces**, combustion heaters, flues and chimneys must be undertaken by a qualified person a minimum of once a year (at the start of winter) to ensure that the heater or fireplace works properly and safely.

- Place a mesh screen in front of your fireplace to prevent sparks and wood falling out.
- If you have a fireplace in your home make sure the chimney is clean, and its properly ventilated.
- Never use petrol, oil or kerosene to help light the fire. They could cause an explosion.



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Artists get metal lesson

The Henty Men's Shed hosted a training course last month for members of the Henty Active Arts Group.

The group asked if the Men's Shed could take them through safe use of machines. The six-hour course was designed to help with the cutting of old corrugated iron sheets into art pieces.

The four participants brought their own safety

metal cutting and edging



equipment, boots, gloves and goggles, along with some tools and corrugated iron, but most importantly their lunch.

Two members of the shed explained the safety provisions with use of powered tools, ranging from handoperated, battery-operated larger bench machines. The powered tools included electrical and compressed air cutters and nibblers.

The participants were introduced to each of the machines they might use, and demonstrations were given on correct handling procedures

After the safety section of the program participants explained what they hoped to make with the corrugated iron. The art pieces ranged from flowers and petals, animals and an Anzac Day memorial.

The value of hearing protection was evident as metal screamed as it was cut and ground into finished pieces, offcuts were dropping on the floor, and the participants were able to say at lunchtime they didn't have a cut - thanks to

Refueled and refreshed the four participants pressed on with their projects. It was a real sense of achievement that a few hours later they looked at their finished pieces.

Tools were collected and returned to vehicles, the shed swept and thank-yous extended. All were delighted with the day and there was a clear intention to make more art pieces at home.



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Equine Action

We continue in this edition with another contribution by local artist, Gwen Bullock.

One of my wonderful Workshop students, Stephanie, arrived to class with some thumbnails (small, often pencil, compositional sketches) and colour trials she had been working on following a workshop lesson. Stephanie agreed that the thumbnails ARE really helpful. It reminded me of my experience in this regard.

We humans learn best when we are READY to learn. When things make most sense to us because they have been added to a base knowledge that is then able to understand the new.

I certainly went through I'm not going to do multiple attempts/preparations of the painting. One go will do!

The pastel, Equine Action, pushed me through some of those best steps. The final pastel was the 13th drawing of this subject. The process included - sketch 1- the back half of the horse was ok, 2 - next sketch, the front was ok, 3 - now sketch the two ok parts together, 4 - keep that original, trace it, 5 - transfer to practice paper to do colour testing, 6 - pastel in the colours, 7 make some adjustments, 8 redraw, 9 - trace the revised drawing, 10 - enlarge onto good cartridge paper as reference, 11 - trace, 12 transfer to final pastel paper surface and 13 - pastel final painting. Now I routinely do my notans, value thumbnails, colour thumbnails, final sketches and transfers. By the time I come to the final painting it is (almost mostly!) just step up, with confidence, to the easel and enjoy the final process!! Maybe the Commended Award at a Major Art Exhibition for Equine Action suggests the process is worth the effort!

Tragic story told

The induction into Probus of Glenys Miller and Warren Berkery took place in April with "A Five Minute" from Beryl Meyer on her life story.

Yvonne Booth provided details on the book launch of Henty's Heroes scheduled for Sunday May 23 at the Henty Community Club. The Governor of NSW, Margaret Beazley, will be in attendance.

A new singing book was launched thanks to Joyce Gardiner and Kevin Fogarty.

The chairperson of the Albury Wodonga Regional Cancer Centre Trust Fund was an outstanding guest speaker. Michelle Hensel (Barbara Godde's daughter) who has been chairperson since 2019 related her journey with cancer starting with her own experience of breast cancer at 37 years of age and her time with Bravehearts on the Murray raising \$70,000.

In 2007 her father Barry's lung cancer took over the family's activities. Then her oldest son Brandon in 2011, a student studying sports management at university, started to experience a sore neck and pins and needles in his arm. A scan by his neurosurgeon

found a tumor wrapped around his C3, C4 spine. The financial, emotional and psychological strain turned the family's life upside down.

Moving to Peter McCallum Cancer Institute, Brandon was advised to maintain his identify and to stay connected to the point he kept up his cricket to the grand finals

Radiation and chemotherapy (12 hours per day, seven days a week) made it hard for the family to keep life as normal as possible. But Michelle was firm in her belief to never underestimate the things in life with a cancer patient.

After 12 months without cancer it returned in 2013. With chemotherapy even on Christmas Day when the whole family accompanied him to hospital, Brandon kept up his beloved cricket. He died a sportsman. He died at home.

Michelle now has a cross section of business people helping her raise money for the Trust Fund. Last year, they raised over \$1 million with funds spent on:

- Wellness (wig centre, massages, physical consultations - \$200,000)
- Education (cancer bags,

- equipment, upskilling of staff) \$300,000)
- Research
- Medical treatment

Encouraged to support any events, Michelle explained the Sunshine Walk when 400-500 participated in a 20km walk to help raise funds.

Kevin Fogarty collects small change at Henty business counters for charities and banks between \$200 and \$300 every couple of months. Lots of charities collect money for good causes, but keep in mind the Albury Wodonga Regional Cancer Centre Trust Fund gives every single cent to cancer patients at the Cancer Centre.

May's Probus meeting saw two more new members inducted. Shirley Klemke was introduced by Eleanor Wilson, and Ian Cummins was introduced by his wife Maggie and Jeannie Kenney.

"A Five Minute" was a most interesting talk by Warren Berkery who claims Henty citizenship from the mid-1980s though he only moved here permanently in recent years. His ventures into wireless, Woomera and Kerry Packer's business with television in the Olympics, royalty tours and worldwide sport should lead to more speaking engagements in the future.

From Culcairn's NSW Fire and Rescue, Barry Fisher, Captain, and Donna Simmons, Deputy Captain, were present to "Demystify the Defibrillator". Several automatic electronic defibrillators were available to view closely so we could see exactly how they can be used.

In your home safety checklist, it is important to have a working smoke detector. If a fire occurs turn off the power service and do not put water on to the fire. Ring a First Responder if you feel unwell. An agreement with the NSW Ambulance allows the Fire Brigade to carry out many activities. So far this financial year 297 calls have been made in Culcairn.

A wooden spoon printed with "Keep looking when Cooking" was given to all members as a reminder to be aware of cooking activities in the kitchen.

Barry and Donna were thanked by Garry Kenney and presented with Probus pins after which a soup and sandwich luncheon was enjoyed.



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
