RAAF leads Anzac service

Young people made up the largest group of participants for the service at the Henty Memorial Park this year. Children from the pre -school, public school and three high schools, joined with ex-service personnel and family members for the march.

The beat of the snare drum and the skirl of the pipes was heard across the community, setting a very formal tone for the service.

The piper and drummer from The Scots School Albury set the pace, with a row of RAAF cadets and trainers from the Forest Hill base of the RAAF added a most professional touch to a warm community gathering.

The legend of Anzac began

107 years ago at Gallipoli and has been remembered each year since, and as guest speaker, Flight Sergeant Stuart Myles said, "Gallipoli is extremely relevant for today's Australians for both its reality and myths".

"Australians have since gone on to serve in every major conflict spanning the last two centuries", he said.

Flight Sergeant Myles said Australia had made a significant contribution to United Nations peacekeeping operations. He said he was filled with pride with the work of the members of the RAAF contingent at the service, who along with many others had recently returned from assisting with the flood relief program.

"These members were all given 24 hours to return home to pack two bags. They were not told where they were going and were not told how long they would be away. They asked no questions, and simply did what was asked of them", he said.

"They displayed the true embodiment of the Anzac spirit and went to help their fellow Australians in times of need", he said.

Loud enthusiastic applause resulted, a most unusual sound at an Anzac memorial service.



Flight Sergeant Myles reminded us that "Your own community here in Henty and the entire Riverina region is rich with the history of men and women who have served".

Those attending the service appreciated the contribution of the contingent provided by the RAAF Wagga Wagga Base Commander, Group Captain Jeffrey Howard.

At the completion of the service the crowd made short work of a sausage sizzle provided by the Bendigo Bank and cooked and served by members of the Henty Development Committee and the Lions club.



Probus meets new police officer


The Henty-Culcairn Probus meeting for April was held at Henty Community Centre.

The guest speaker was Sen-Constable Daniel Davila. He is Henty's new policeman and lives with has wife Ana and sons Samuel and Domenic. Daniel has come from Sydney. During the COVID lockdowns he was posted to Holbrook and found that he liked the feel of the country. He wanted a quieter town to raise the children and he searched until he found Henty.

Daniel has a beautiful collection of stories to tell. He loves history and old things and Rugby League. His par-

On Wednesday May 11, Probus met at Culcairn. There was a slight technology challenge. The microphone did not work, and there were many apologies due to illness.

She told of a lack of water, dirt roads and her father riding horses or camels. She spoke about him having Aboriginal trackers. Eleanor's father dealt with cattle stealing.

There were unique dangers. A policeman was speared

on Groote Eylandt. Darwin was bombed in 1942 leading to the evacuation of women with children to Alice Springs.

Eleanor's father became a superintendent of police in 1956 and in 1964 the Commissioner of Police. He was the first Commissioner to have come through the ranks in the Northern Territory. He received many awards and his family is most proud of his achievements.

After morning tea Probus had Lily Bones Gonscak speak about her time as an international ballerina. She brought her partner Jan Gonscak to show slides to illustrate her talk. They are two lovely people, both very qualified in their fields of dance and acting.

Lily trained in ballet from a small girl and a slide showed her leaping through the air with no more weight than thistledown. To make ballet look so effortless, dancers must practise every day. The training was likened to

Guests are welcome to attend meetings.




Greater Hume Council's new General Manager


Ms Arnold expressed her delight at having the privilege to lead Greater Hume Council in this next excit-

My portrait study challenge

We continue in this edition with another contribution by local artist, Gwen Bullock.

To teach myself portraiture - 30 sketches of each of our four grandchildren (over one set of 30 days for each child).

So some questions now. Did it work and why? What did I learn? What happens now?

Why did it work?

I began this challenge (self constructed and self imposed) on March 18 and completed it on November 24.

So that is way more than four months you might say. Sure is. First lesson - life gets in the way... as the saying goes. So here comes the first reason the challenge worked - flexibility. Other reasons, in short, are:

Setting myself up with an easy to carry anywhere A4 visual arts diary for each child (so just one book at a time) and a snap lock plastic bag with a refillable 2B pencil, refills and kneadable eraser.

I printed my photos, chose 30 (that covered many different ages, perspectives and expressions for practice), bundled them in no specific order and I pasted them in my Visual Arts Diary as they came off the pile. My discipline was then to just sketch the next photo to stop any procrastination.

Four grandchildren - once one set of sketches was complete I had no other option than to do the same for each grandchild!! (I will give the books to our grandchildren when I have finished with them). This was the main single point that helped me work through difficult periods.

Encouragement through Facebook and friends and family, especially the interest shown by my grandchildren. Thank you everyone.

As I sketched I gradually worked out an approach system/process that I felt comfortable with and took away some of the fear of starting each sketch.

Otherwise - did I find it an overwhelming task? Yes, many times, but the finishing post and our grandchildren are so worth it. The goal was to learn how to sketch small portraits freehand. I'm happy. Still much to learn though.

I also understand that increasing the size for more serious portraits will mean learning much more about details of facial features.

What happens now?

Painting portraits. From the beginning of the first few portraits all I wanted to get my teeth into was to paint them. I had to be really strong here because I knew if I started the portrait painting it would stop me from completing the original challenge.

I hope my expression of my experiences here can give others encouragement to see their pathway to personal artistic (or other) goals.

What did I learn?

"This competition is free and open to all designers, but the fabric in the garment must be at least 70 per cent natural fibre, which can be wool, cotton, alpaca, silk, linen or combinations.

"Garments are judged on visual appeal, creativity and innovation."

To be announced on the final day, the winner of the supreme garment made with natural fibres will receive \$1,000 in prize money plus a Bernina 325 sewing machine valued at \$1,499, courtesy of Bernina Australia and Sew Fab, Narrandera.

The winners of the best knitted or crocheted garment, millinery and accessory will receive \$500 each sponsored by Fox & Lillie Rural and Henty Machinery Field Days.

Bernina Australia and Sew Fab are donating a Bernette 44 Funlocker valued at \$750 as an encouragement award for the best garment by a student designer.




The HPS Community Garden has now been complet-


