Avondale Place making progress

Plans have been drawn up and lodged with council for Henty's proposed respite care centre and the public are being invited to information sessions to find out more.

Two open community forums are being planned for Wednesday, October 20, 2021, - one in the afternoon and one in the evening.

Members of the Henty Local Health Advisory Committee (LHAC) will be present along with representatives from Mercy Connect, an Albury-based respite care and disabilities service provider. Mercy Connect will provide information on how services and programs work and what could be available to the community, employment opportunities within the disability and respite sector and how volunteers can participate to support such services.

"Avondale Place will hopefully be the hub for a range of services being provided to our community which are not currently available. With that comes opportunities for employment and for volunteers to support the delivery of these services," LHAC chairman Mick Brougham said.

Plans for both the respite care centre and the independent living units will be on display during the forum.

Get the jab so Henty can open for business

Henty and district residents have been urged to do their bit to protect their community and get Australia "back to business" by being COVID vaccinated.

"We are very lucky in our community. We have both the Pfizer and AstraZeneca



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available at the Henty Medical Centre and appointments can be made nearly every day of the week," Henty Local Health Advisory Committee chair Mick Broughan said.

"If you want your church, your footy and your business to operate as normal in 2022 you need to do this."

"It is also about protecting your community. This latest COVID variant is highly contagious and leaves people very sick and possibly leads to death."

Mr Broughan said while it might be your choice as to whether you get vaccinated or not, it is also a business or community group's choice as to whether they allow nonvaccinated people to enter.

"Life will be quite restricted for the unvaccinated and there will be conditions placed on your movements." The LHAC has been advised it is likely conditions will be placed on hospital and aged care facility visitors in 2022 regarding vaccination status. Henty Medical Centre advised there is ample supply of both AstraZeneca and Pfizer vaccine available. Make an appointment on 02 6929 3760.

ACT! A Collaborative Toolkit, Preparing older people for Emergencies



Meals on Wheels Holbrook-Walla Walla

Following the devastating 2020 bushfires in NSW, Holbrook Meals on Wheels investigated the ACT! Toolkit and decided that it could benefit older people in our area prepare for bushfire and other emergencies. Thanks to a successful grant application to the NSW Government Bushfire Community Recovery and Resilience Fund, managed by Greater Hume Council, we are very excited to be able to provide older people living in the Greater Hume Council area, assistance to plan for bushfire and other emergencies

Using the ACT! Toolkit, the project aims to strengthen the emergency preparedness of vulnerable older people living in towns, villages, and rural locations in the council area.

What is it?

"ACT! А Collaborative Toolkit for Emergency Services and Home Support providers". Developed as a partnership between key emergency services, other experts in the field and Meals On Wheels (MOW) NSW. It was initiated in response to an overrepresentation of socially isolated people (aged 65 and over) dying in residential fires, but was broadened to ensure an all-hazards approach. It initiates conversation to develop an emergency plan for vulnerable people.

Key get ready messages Individual resources have been developed to help older people think about what they need to do to prepare for emergencies. The key messages on emergency preparedness include:

- Know your risk
- Plan now for what you will do
- Get your home ready
- Be aware
- Look out for each other

The project will support us to empower older people to make decisions about preparing for fire and other emergencies, by building on their knowledge of local risks, initiating, and supporting individual discussions around what they can do to prepare, providing concise, practical information and linking in appropriate supports, if required.

Emergency Preparedness refers to the steps people need to take before, during and after a natural disaster or other emergency. It involves thinking about how they will manage if essential services they rely on are no longer there. For example, utilities, transport, food supplies and supports such as community based aged care services, home nursing and personal care. The ACT! discussion tool helps prompt discussions with older people and refer them to good information such as NSW Rural Fire Service, Fire and Rescue NSW and Australian Red Cross.

We will support people to think about their plan, pre-

pare an emergency box and we will make referrals to other services for assistance where that may be required.

We are delighted to be able share this toolkit with our community, thanks to the NSW Government Bushfire Community Recovery Fund and Greater Hume Council! If you, or someone you know would like help to discuss a plan or would like more information, please call our office on 0260363677.

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Henty Sportsground Playing Surface Upgrade

Council is aware that there has been some discussion around the performance of the playing surface and effectiveness of the drainage at the Henty Sportsground following the upgrade of the playing surface.

Upgrading the playing surfaces of the four most used grounds; Culcairn, Henty, Holbrook and Jindera over one summer period was very ambitious, however, with the funding available through the Drought Communities Fund it was a once in a lifetime opportunity to achieve lasting improvements to these grounds.

The Henty Sportsground was sprigged in December and Council is of the view that the playing surface has been adequate in the first year of its refurbishment. Council, however, acknowledges that the playing surface and the drainage from the sportsground proper can be improved.

It has always been the intention to undertake further improvement works after year 1 and to a lesser extent year 2 to ensure the playing surface will stand up to the rigors of winter sport.

Works planned post football and netball season include:

Additional surface inlet pits installed around the perimeter of the ground to assist with the removal of surface water.

Trevor and I took our cameras to a Bullenbung Campdrafting Competition to photograph horses in action. I met a couple whose son was competing. They began discussing how their cameras would not take the photos our cameras could capture. I offered to take some photos of their son and email them later. I was then shown a photo of a precious pony, Nimbus, who was still at home. Be prepared this Spring

Excerpts from MLHD Spring, thunderstorm Asthma Alert


Murrumbidgee Local Health District (MLHD) clinical nurse consultant for asthma and respiratory, Robyn Paton, said asthma flare-ups traditionally increase in Spring due to high pollen counts, in conjunction with thunderstorm-related weather conditions.

The key message for people who wheeze and sneeze when preparing for spring is to visit their GP or respiratory specialist for an assessment of their lung health, obtain a current prescription for preventer as well as reliever medication and a written Asthma Action Plan, and then use them.

People experiencing asthma symptoms need to use preventer medication each day plus reliever medication as required. They should not rely on symptomatic treatment such as Ventolin if they have breathing problems.

If they have hay fever and sinus these conditions also need to be discussed with their doctor to determine appropriate treatment.

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Hats off to Aussie ingenuity

You are probably familiar with the old proverb, "necessity is the mother of invention", which traces its origin back to the ancient Greek philosopher, Plato, who said "our need will be our real creator". Could it be that our geographical isolation has contributed to the amazing number of inventions and innovations that have originated in Australia and have gone on to make a difference? There are far too many of them to include here and those mentioned below are listed in no order or significance;

many of which we may often take for granted.

When it comes to hats, the many versions of the iconic Akubra felt hat, still manufactured in Kempsey, NSW, have been around for over 140 years. Each one is made from the softest underbelly fur selected from 12-14 rabbit skins. These days, the skins are imported to ensure sufficient continuity of supply.

Long ago, our indigenous people came up innovations like the woomera, (used for launching a spear), fish traps and weirs, boomerangs and of course, the didgeridoo among other contributions.

Should you decide to host a barbecue in the backyard some time, you may well use a wine cask or maybe a set of Splayds (1946), versatile eating utensils which can be used as a knife, fork or spoon. The Stay Sharp knife comes in handy too. Fancy a Vegemite sandwich perhaps, circa 1922? Don't forget the Aerogard, another "first" for the CSIRO, (Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation). which was founded in 1916.

It's great to relax while you are listening to music, courtesy of your wi-fi, introduced in 1992. The Hills hoist, invented in 1945 which bears the name of its creator, Adelaide mechanic, Lance Hill and the Victa mower are a familiar sight. A modern version of the first refrigerator, developed in Geelong in 1855, keeps your food and drinks cold or maybe they're in an Esky, developed in the 1940s.

Looking forward to a shower later? In 1953, a CSIRO team, founded in 1916 and at that time, led by Roger Morse, vastly improved the early solar panels available for hot water systems. The dual-flush toilet (1980) is a more recent addition in many homes.

The inventor of the first electric drill way back in 1889 called Melbourne home. A much lighter, portable version exists today for industrial and domestic use.

Australia led the way in the film industry with the creation of the first feature film in "The Kelly Gang" in Melbourne in 1906.

Perhaps a holiday destination beckons? When boarding an airliner, we seldom think about the indispensable black box flight recorder (which is in fact orange and not black). This device was invented by Dr David Warren in 1958 and is installed in every commercial airliner in the world. To enhance passenger safety when a quick evacuation from a plane is necessary, there's another Aussie invention, the inflatable escape slide, which also becomes a life raft if necessary.

"Slip, slop, slap", the slogan reminds us don't forget the zinc cream (1940) for skin protection on those hot summer days. Need to navigate accurately to a particular location? Many travelers rely on Google Maps, which first saw the light of day in 2003, thanks to a Sydney-based company.

Where would we be without polymer, (plastic) bank notes, introduced in 1988, another CSIRO success. Ever heard of Ugg boots? They too are an Aussie invention.

When it comes to sport, Australia can lay claim to the origins of the games of Australian Rules and polocrosse Who can forget Ben Lexcen's concept of attaching a winged keel to a rac-

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ing yacht and the day the "Australia II" sailed into history in the 1983 Australia Cup.

The safety of babies travelling in vehicles has been greatly enhanced with the invention of the baby safe capsule and if you happen to be driving a utility, well, the prototype came off the assembly line of the Ford Motor Company at Geelong in 1934.

In the field of medicine, in the 1930s Alexander Fleming and Howard Florey's research produced the antibiotic, penicillin. Patients with heart problems are grateful for the security provided by an electronic cardiac pacemaker, invented by Sydney's Mark Lidwill in 1926.

The ultrasound scanner (1961) built by and developed by Kossoff and Robinson-Taylor and the invention of the amazing bionic ear, first transplanted in a patient in 1978 are two more contributions of enormous benefit to mankind.

It seems appropriate at this time to include another Australian invention, the first anti-flu medication which was used to combat the last pandemic, the Spanish flu, which caused such devastation 100 years ago.

From a rural perspective there have been many and varied Australian inventions which continue to benefit Australian farmers here and their counterparts abroad.

"Click go the shears", that song familiar to most Aussies brings to mind an innovative, improved mechanical handpiece designed by the indigenous inventor David Unaipon in 1909. Another of his creations was a centrifugal pump. In 1888, Frederick Wolseley's shearing machines made their appearance in Australian woolsheds.

The Dethridge water wheel, which measures the volume of water to irrigators made its appearance in 1910 and went on to serve the agricultural sector well for over 100 years.

The first Stump Jump plough, to clear virgin country owes its origins to the ingenuity of South Australian inventor, Richard Bowyer-Smith in 1876.

Other innovations in agriculture include Ridley's stripper harvester (1843) and of course, Henty's Headlie Taylor, a local farmer who revolutionised the way grain is harvested with his header harvester. He built the first machine in time for the 1911-12 harvest and demonstrated his third prototype of the header at the Henty show in 1914 and the rest, as they say, is history. Australia's first pneumatic air seeder made its appearance in 1956.

Aussie ingenuity and appli-

cation have resulted in countless inventions and innovations over the years, many of which we take for granted, which have gone on to contribute greatly to a better way of life both here and overseas.


Get fit for free

Field days looks to March 2022

The Henty Machinery Field Days Board regrets to announce the 2021 event will not proceed this year due to COVID-19, but is investigating the option of rescheduling to March 2022.

The Henty Machinery Field Days is the nation's largest field days and outdoor agricultural event, with an economic value of more than \$92 million and were due to be held on September 21-23.

Henty Machinery Field Days chief executive officer Belinda Anderson said the decision to look into rescheduling was based on the recommendation from NSW Health around the current challenge faced by NSW and the possibility of the virus being transmitted into regional areas. "HMFD has been advised that we are able to operate under the 4sqm rule, however, NSW Health has strongly recommended the event be rescheduled," Mrs Anderson said.

"We also have considered the possibility of introducing the Delta strain of COVID-19 to the area and the impact this would have on our community. This was a risk we were not prepared to take."

Mrs Anderson said border restrictions had also played a significant part in the decision to cancel the September event, with 50 per cent of exhibitors booked in from interstate.

"Six weeks from the event seems like a long time, but an event of this size does not happen overnight and we owe it to those business-

"The majority of visitors come from within a three hour drive of Henty signifying there is a great representation from Victoria.

"Snap lock downs will still be possible in September and HMFD cannot risk a repeat of what was seen in Victoria and Queensland on the eve of major agricultural events.

"HMFD management is investigating the option of rescheduling the field days to March 15-17, 2022, and will be contacting exhibitors and key stakeholders regarding this option."

Mrs Anderson appealed to exhibitors to be patient as management determines options for refunds or the rollover of fees to the 2022 event.
