A flex draper offering more capacity, speed and flex has won the coveted 2022 Henty Machine of the Year Award.

The MacDon FD2 Flex Draper, entered by MacDon Australia Pty Ltd, impressed judges with its innovation, design and engineering.

Highly commended was the John Deere See & Spray™ Select entered by Hutcheon and Pearce.

A total of 22 machines and equipment at the cutting edge of agricultural tech-

nology were showcased in the Henty Machine of the Year.

Announced on the opening day, this award is presented to the most outstanding new piece of agricultural machinery exhibited at the field days.

It was judged by an independent panel of five regional primary producers on Monday September 19 and presented at the field days opening on September 20.

Judging criteria include the machine's purpose and suitability, scope of application, construction (durability and design), ease of maintenance and service, ease of operation and adjustment, availability of parts and overall value for money.

Judge Warren Scheetz said the award this year incorporated both 2021 and 2022 entries, and the job to select a winner was a difficult one.

"Competition was extremely close over a broad range of areas between all entrants," he said.

MacDon listened and worked with farmers, in the most challenging real-world conditions to result in more sizes, durability and harvesting innovations.

MacDon national sales

manager Kari Sattler said harvesters represented a large investment and needed to keep working.

"Farmers are taking on more country every year to keep in the game and in doing so you need to be able to operate fast to beat the weather, get the quality grain in the headers as quickly as we can and keep it moving," Mr Sattler said.

"We also understand it's not always easy harvesting, not all our crops are standing so if it's flat on the ground, we need to scoop that up.

"This machine is designed to cut at less than an inch off the ground to eliminate obstacles such as rocks or sticks from bouncing over so as not to cause damage to the combine or make our samples dirty reducing

quality.

"The fact this machine can cut so low yet stay so light on the ground, even in mud it really shines as it floats on top.

As a regional resident, Mr Sattler is a long term fan of the Henty Machine of the Year Award.

"You see some up coming brands really having a go and I've always thought one day we will get on that list, and here we are."

Book Week – Celebrated in Greater Hume Council with author Sami Bayley

Book Week – Celebrated with Author Visit by Sami Bayley Book Week is always a celebration in our libraries. This year, author and illustrator, Sami Bayley was invited to come and talk to the local school children in Henty, Jindera, Culcairn and Holbrook. Due to time constraints Sami visited the schools. The children loved listening to Sami talk about her experiences and also got the chance to get some drawing tips and inspiration from Sami. Sami is a natural history illustrator based in Armidale, NSW, who loves all things weird and wonderful. She finds the beauty and importance of all animals regardless of their appearance and hopes to share her appreciation with others. Sami's first book, The Illustrated Encyclopaedia of Ugly Animals, won the Children's Indie Book of the Year Award and the Australian Book Design Award for Younger Read-

ers. It was a CBCA (Children's Book Council of Australia) Honour Book and was shortlisted for an ABIA Book of the Year for Younger Children and long-listed for the ABA Booksellers' Choice 2020 Book of the Year Awards. Her second book, The Illustrated Encyclopaedia of Dangerous Animals, was shortlisted for the Children's Indie Book of the Year 2020 and the CBCA Eve Pownall Award, an ABIA Book of the Year for Younger Children and an Australian Book Design Award for Younger Readers. And her third book The Illustrated Encyclopaedia of Peculiar Pairs in Nature is again shortlisted for this year's CBCA Eve Pownall Award. With this year's theme for Book Week being Dreaming With Eyes Open, Holbrook Library had set up a tent in the children's section. Inside the tent was a blanket, pillow and a pile of books. Children could crawl inside and read, dream and relax. There were candles (battery operated!) for the children to turn on and place around the interior of the tent.

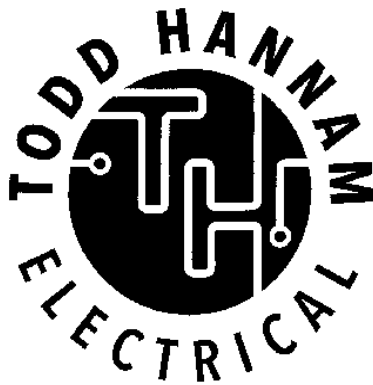

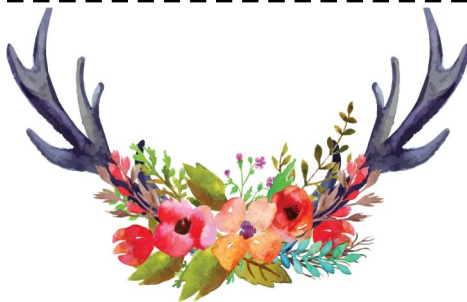
Women bowlers set for season

Club nets grant money

COVID keeps wraps at home

Knitting and crocheting still make beautiful rugs measuring about 100cm x 180cm. The finished article, about the size of a single bed, is donated to Wrap with Love for distribution around the world.

COVID-19 has allowed hundreds of rugs to stay in Australia in women's shelters, with Aboriginal groups and local charities. Transport costs overseas have greatly increased. The Afghan Association of Australia has collected 120 wraps for 50 families arriving in Australia in August/September. Hammond Care, which deals with

palliative care or in-home care patients are very happy with colourful wraps. Even doctors and nurses have commented on the variety of patterns and colours.

Myoora has been in lockdown because of COVID so there has been no knitting at the hostel on Tuesdays. However, the needles are still clicking here and in Henty homes. Pam Green is still sewing the squares into wraps which are sent to the co-ordinator in Wagga Wagga. We have another 21 ready to go, totalling 96 for the year.

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Lions sizzle for Resilience Day

In early September the Lions Clubs of Henty, Holbrook and Culcairn combined to cook and serve a sausage lunch at Billa-bong High School for their Resilience Day. Over 1,500 sausages were served to primary and high students, staff and visitors.

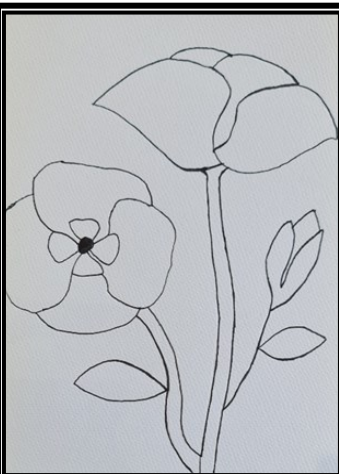

Dialling up old memories

At the August 10 meeting club president Yvonne Booth welcomed our guest Graham from Belmont Probus. He has been visiting his cousin, local new member Margaret Pampa. Graham's father had been assistant station-master at Culcairn when Graham was about 10 years old, so in the district playing tourist and rekindling old memories.

Graham was most impressed with Greater Hume Council's sparkling public toilets.

Joan Wood was the five-minute-speaker. She had worked as a telephonist at Culcairn, Henty and Holbrook. The telephone exchange at Culcairn closed in 1969. When Joan joined the PMG, women were forced to resign if they got married and from 1953 to 1969 she could be only a temporary employee.

Telephonists played a vital role in an era before direct dialling. Phone calls to the UK needed to be booked a week in advance. Other distance calls took time and patience for connections. Joan was able to remember names and phone numbers from the days of party lines - and for some club members too.

The club thanks Joan for sharing her memories and

the happiness that she shared with us. Everyone had lovely time,

After morning tea, the new Greater Hume Mayor Cr Tony Quinn spoke. He spoke of being born the fourth son of the family at Cobram. He said the drought in 1944/45 forced his parents, who had 80 draught horses, to pick up the pieces of their lives and start over again. Cr Quinn learned wool-classing and went to Wagga Wagga Agricultural College. He played sport and learned that he could and liked to win.

Cr Quinn married in 1972. He is very proud of the family he and his wife have. There were lots of discussions, questions and answers. Cr Quinn was invited to lunch and generously accepted, giving club members more time to get to know him. Tony is a student of political history. He votes on issues and moves with better ideas. He also volunteers each week at Vinnie's Club. Vice President Beryl Meyer thanked Cr Quinn for his talk and presented him with a Probus pen.

Frances Fifield was the five-minute speaker. She told of growing up on a farm at Urangeline east, the youngest of eight children. Frances was six months old when her father died as a result of an accident. Her mother kept on farming and raising her children.

After schooling at Urana and Wagga Wagga, Frances went to Albury and the Mercy Hospital to start next day on four years of nursing training. She went on to St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne to study midwifery. Then to Henty where she met her Richard.

Frances became community nurse to Lockhart and was involved in child and family health for over 30 years. Long service leave was to be in Perth, but then came COVID-19. So she did twelve months of testing for COVID and vaccinations. Along the way, Frances and Richard raised three children.

After morning tea, Neil Parker introduced the meeting to James Male, who had been in a group of Christian men to go to Zimbabwe for two weeks as part of Hands at Work Africa.

Zimbabwe was formerly Rhodesia and had been seen as a food bowl. Now it

has problems feeding its people. Inflation in the country is quoted as 300% per year. There is extreme poverty. Half a million children have been orphaned due to HIV/AIDS.

James Male felt challenged that we in Australia have so much while in Zimbabwe they have so little. The roads were in such condition that it took one and a half hours to travel 25km. Meals were maize with fish or beans. Maize was bought at harvest time when it was cheapest.

He said there seemed to be 150 children in each care group and they were fed one meal per day. Many grandmother's were raising children on their own. Some had many children. Women are also doing farming, growing food. James' wife Geraldine is an advocate for Hands at Work Africa and is planning her own visit to Zimbabwe.

Trevor Bedgood gave a vote of thanks to James and Geraldine and presented a Probus pen.

Probus sends its best wishes to those who are ill, and look forward to their return to good health. Next Probus meeting will be Wednesday, October 13 at Henty.

Lois Biti recently donated a box filled with beautiful baby booties and Mary Harvey a collection of baby cards. Thank you to Peter Campbell for the wheat.

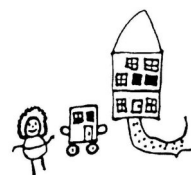

During COVID hundreds of beanies have inundated Peter Mac so a request was made “no more please.” So Henty’s are now being sent to the Seamen’s Mission.

Another large postal bag (about 50 beanies) is ready to go. The beanies are all colours, plain and striped, cuffed and uncuffed, knitted and crocheted, small and large. They are being supplied by individuals, church groups and Probus members.

At any one time there are a million seafarers sailing the seas. The beanies can be given to the sailors on vessels container ships to cruising liners, often put into care packs to these men of the sea or sometimes sold in their gift shop.

Recently a group of seafarers visited the Sydney Mission and shared their stories. From the Philippines seafarer Gerritzmann was preparing to join his container ship heading to New Zealand. He had to leave his six-months pregnant wife and six-year-old son to help support the family financially. Another seaman, Hector, had not had shore leave since 2019, was able to stay in touch with his wife through wi-fi. Leigh, a new cadet, was preparing for his first ship, knowing it would be hard work and long hours, but he aimed to support his ageing parents.

Plough’s link to bushranger

It may look like a rusty plough on a pole, but a rare collectible installed at the Henty Machinery Field Days has a unique link with the notorious bushranger Ned Kelly.

Ned and his gang used

plough discs from single furrow horse drawn ploughs to make their armour and the plough discs carried the manufacturer’s mark of Lennon.

To mark 40 years of the Henty and District Antique Farm Machinery Club, a

Lennon single furrow horse drawn plough was unveiled atop a pole at the club’s display site at Henty Machinery Field Days.

Surviving members of the original foundation committee were at Henty on Wednesday, September 21 to see the dedication of the plough on the pole. They were Max Hogg, Kerry Piestch, Rob Jones and Trevor Terlich.

Dating back to 1903-1906, the plough was manufactured by agricultural implement maker Hugh Lennon, of Spotswood, Melbourne.

The Irish engineer emigrated to Victoria in 1859 with a “broken down constitution and a good character” and saw the need for good agricultural machinery in the young colony. He produced a plough suitable for dry farm-

ing on the northern places made from wrought iron to minimise repairs.

Great-granddaughter Mrs Fay Powell, Albury, and great-great grandson Geoff Powell, Hobart, were on hand to unveil the plough made by their ancestor.

Geoff Powell was thrilled to see work put into restoring the plough and the installation on its pedestal, saying the model was now quite rare.

“The Lennon plough had been manufactured in our family since 1866 and to see one in this condition is wonderful,” Mr Powell said.

“The single furrow plough was donated to the Club by the estate of the late Colin Schroeter, a vintage machinery enthusiast from Table Top.

Recently I attended the Australian Pastel Expo in Caloundra Queensland. Developing my portrait studies was my aim when making my program choices at the expo. Over four days I attended two full day

workshops and eight two-hour demonstrations by internationally recognised Master Pastellists from Australia, Scotland, the United States, Canada and New Zealand. As art is a solitary occupation, the camaraderie, social events (yes they were also included) and the sincere support of those who attended, were

welcome changes. A great meeting place and addition to the expo was the Marketing room also known as the Lolly Shop - just imagine many open boxes of colourful pastel sticks!

Such experiences revitalises my enthusiasm to challenge myself even more into the future.

Spring vegies to plant

Before you start planting your batch of spring vegetables, it's important to choose the right spot to do so. A sunny sheltered position is best, but if there isn't a suitable part in your garden to plant some vegies then try planting some in pots that can be moved around to chase or escape the sun.

Vegetables that are ideal for spring planting include:

- Tomatoes
- Carrots
- Capsicums
- Beetroots
- Cucumbers
- Zucchini and squash
- Eggplants
- Green beans
- Broad beans
- Chillies
- Lettuce
- Potatoes
- Pumpkin
- Sweet corn

The best thing about this selection of spring vegetables is that some will grow and be ready for harvest before others, so you can enjoy your leafy greens in spring and summer salads and begin harvesting your pumpkins once the weath-

er eases off in autumn. You can also harvest and re-plant several times during spring and summer to keep the fresh goodies coming in.

Make sure your new crop of vegies isn't destroyed by pests. Regular checks should be made as your seedlings establish, but considering your vegies are plants that are to be later consumed, you will want to be careful when selecting an insecticide to make sure that it is non-toxic. There are many insecticides available with all-natural ingredients.
