*Vida Pearson's extraordinary linocuts and handpainted images of Australian birds and wild flowers will be part of the 2018 art show. Vida, from Haddon, Victoria, has been a long-time exhibitor since participating as the feature artist many years ago. Much of her work incorporates colourful native plants and animals and the Holbrook art committee is excited that she has entered five linocut images this year.

In 2017 Vida's artworks were featured in the 2017 Australian Geographic Art Calendar. The Wildlife Art Society of Australasia voted Vida the Wildlife Artist of the Year in 2015 and 2014.

*Well known Canberra artist Isla Patterson is a multi-



award-winning water colourist specialising in portraying nature and life in the Canberra region, the outback, wildlife, seascapes and overseas scenes.

Isla has held over 20 successful solo exhibitions and participated in many shows including Holbrook. She has paintings in collections all over Australia. Isla has paintings in many unique embassies in the ACT; for a book written by Dorothy Hart titled International Treasures, Canberra's Embassies. Her commissions include paintings for Jason Placemats, paintings of international building models at Cockington Green and the Canberra Times building.

*Vicki McKoy was born in Albury, NSW into a family that loved the great outdoors. Her love of the bush evolved from an early age and the sketch book became her constant companion.



Today, Vicki is a traditional landscape artist painting in oils for the past 20 years. Her subjects are from everyday life, from the quiet fishing spot on the Goulburn River to the thunder of hooves on the high plain. "Every painting tells a story," she says.

Vicki has her own studio at Howlong, NSW where she lives and teaches others with a passion for art. She believes working on location is a learning experience – the constant changing colours and light sources "teaches you to work quickly". When that is not possible, interpreting a photograph is a skill in-itself. Over the years Vicki has won many awards and is a welcomed and regular exhibitor at Holbrook.

*Diana Garth is an impressionist whose traditional medium is oil. Diane started painting in 1980 primarily using oils and progressed to other mediums such as mixed media and watercolour some years later.

She is actively involved in the Combined Art Societies of Sydney holding the position of resource officer and is an exhibiting member of the Royal Art Society of Sydney (extracted from profile www.02artfinder.com).Local school art will also be on exhibition including two pieces from former Higher School Certificate students.

A small sample of our wares will be for sale in Holbrook outside the quilt show at the Anglican Hall on Saturday 13th October.



GETTING ACTIVE IN HOLBROOK

Holbrook residents who would like to be more active are invited to come to a new Tai Chi class starting on Monday 15 October.

HOLBROOK LANDCARE

Funding Received to Continue Recycling On-Farm Plastics: Holbrook Landcare has been successful in a funding bid through the National Landcare Program Smart Farms Small Grants. The project, "Embedding a Recycling Culture for Silage Wrap and On Farm Plastics" will continue on from where the original Hay and Silage Wrap Recycling Project left off.

Part of this project is to extend recycling availability for on-farm plastics throughout the Greater Hume Shire. The grant includes funding for extra drop-off points at Culcairn, Mullengandra & Burrumbuttock.

The environmental impact of providing an alternative farm plastic waste solution for landholders is significant, as the plastic waste has previously been buried or burnt on-farm. Over the last 18 months approx 20 tonnes of silage wrap and twine has already been dispatched to Plastic Forests, in Albury, for recycling, and the uptake of participation continues to increase.

We are delighted that the Greater Hume Shire is supporting this innovative recycling program, which has already generated interest from many other shires and groups across the country, including other REROC members!

HISTORY QUIZ

Who am !? I died in Henty in 1935, my son had an Albury menswear shop, and was the first president of the Albury and District Football League. He founded the Albury Rovers (Holbrook played a prominent part in the League).

Ron Nolan won the Best & Fairest Medal [the Stavely Medal] in 1936, playing for Cookardinia, Jim Kendall won the Carlton Brewery Medal in 1938, playing for Holbrook, runner-up in the medal count in 1939.

The war cut the season short in 1940. After the war in 1947 Charlie Craig, the Cookardinia captain won the Carlton Brewery Medal, with Eric Heather and Brian Brennan close behind. Brian Brennan won the medal in 1948 and in 1949, he tied with Des Donkin in 1950. Another local mentioned in the Holbrook team in 1950, was Ron Trescowthick.

In 1951 Holbrook defeated Culcairn in the Grand Final, 12.19 [91] to 9.8 [62] Ron Bunyan and Brian Brennan were equal second in the medal count. In 1952 Ron Bunyan, of Cookardinia, won the Baz Medal.

News from the National Museum of Australian Pottery

Over the last twelve months we have been busy at the Museum, with an increase in visitor numbers and bus groups.

We have just received back six very early and important pottery pieces which we were requested to be lent to the National Gallery of Victoria for their short term exhibition: Colony Australia 1770-1861 / Frontier Wars, which to all accounts was a great success.

On Thursday evening 20th September, we were invited to a VIP tour and official opening at the National Museums of Australia of their exhibition 'Rome: City + Empire exhibition' which was a most enjoyable evening. This is an amazing exhibition not to be

The Collection at our Museum is still increasing slowly with two very early and important pieces recently added, call in, or bring some friends and come and see them.

NSW RFS Southern Border Team declares early start of Bush Fire Danger Period

The Southern Border Team will start the Bush Fire Danger Period (BFDP) a month early this year due to ongoing warm and dry conditions. The early start to the BFDP effects the local government areas of Albury, Greater Hume, Federation and Berrigan. The NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) is urging residents to prepare now for what could be a long and protracted fire season.

While 1 November is traditionally when the bush fire season officially commences, the **Southern Border Team** began the fire season on Monday 1 October 2018.

NSW RFS Superintendent Pat Westwood is urging residents to make and discuss their bush fire survival plan. "This is to ensure all members of the household know what to do on days of increased fire danger and what to do if their home is threatened by fire," Superintendent Pat Westwood said. "Residents should prepare their property by removing flammable materials from their yards, clearing leaves from gutters, checking hoses can reach all around the house and where appropriate, conducting hazard reduction activities.

Superintendent Pat Westwood said with warm and windy conditions becoming more conducive to the spread of fire, people need to be extremely careful when using fire and need to be aware that if they are planning on burning timber, that it must be extinguished by 1 October and then monitored to prevent any flare ups.

"Never leave a fire unattended and if a fire does escape, it is essential to call Triple Zero (000) immediately so that emergency services can respond accordingly and minimise the damage," Superintendent Pat Westwood said. Resident must be aware that if they light a fire, they are responsible for that fire.

"During the Bush Fire Danger Period any person wishing to light a fire will require a permit, free to obtain from the NSW RFS."

On days of Total Fire Ban all fire permits are automatically revoked. To check the Fire Danger Ratings for your area visit www.rfs.nsw.gov.au or contact your local Fire Control Centre.

"OXTON"

The Gowan family built the Oxton homestead in 1912 from bricks fired in a kiln just west of the tennis court. They established a cottage garden close to the northern veranda, bordered by two evergreen Fortuniana roses which in those days were used as root stock for new roses. They bloom in October with a cascade of fluffy white flowers. The shrubs around these two roses were all planted by the Gowans. In 1975 the Gowans sold Oxton and we, Ian and Prue Paton, bought the homestead section together with 300 acres. We renovated the homestead, moved the existing tennis court out 10 feet, terraced the steeply-sloping western lawn and extended the garden out into the sheep run where the original fence still stands (just). Establishing the garden has not been easy. The soil is either bottomless sand requiring, like shearers, constant feeding, or pipe clay which tree roots are unable to penetrate and so grow along the surface. Water is reticulated down from dams on the hill, i.e. no pressure and contains a brown-staining algae making sprinklers undesirable. It's enough to make you give up, and sometimes I do, but then the bug bites me and off I go again.

Over the years I've been lucky to have had advice from garden designers Michael Bligh, John Patrick and Fiona Brockhoff to tweak my ideas or to send me off in a different direction. Garden design is, for me, of prime importance. The shape of the spaces are as important as the planting. These designers taught me the unifying effect of repetition and the importance of leaf shape and colour rather than the flowers alone.

lan loved the garden and took a keen interest in everything, except weeding. In later years he took over the vegetable garden and it gave him much pleasure to provide food for the table as well as to give away his produce to all and sundry. Sadly he died 10 years ago. Opening the garden this year has forced me to reestablish the vegetable parterre that our daughter Fiona laid out many years ago.

Our son Andrew, an Arborist, is always there with his expertise for the big tree and pruning jobs.

I must thank our son and daughter-in-law, Hamish and Abby, for supplying me with their wonderful lentil straw mulch as well as for the use of their large mower, two things without which I would be lost.

And finally, thank you to my dear friend, Lyn Colquhoun, who was my inspiration to create this garden.

Unusual plants include:

Chinese Plumbago around both verandas. Glorious autumn foliage and delightful cornflower blue flowers Mahonia aquifolium behind the young Liquid Amber. Beautiful holly-like leaves and sprays of lemon flowers. Mexican Tree Daisy against the northern corner of the house and the stone wall. Grows to 15 feet and has trusses of huge white daisies in winter. Frost tender. Pittosporum tobira beside the tree daisy. Unusual olive-coloured leaves, fragrant flowers.

Persimmon (astringent) in front of sunroom Chinese Weeping Elm on the front terrace *Orchard:*

Dwarf Non-astringent Persimmon

Medlar (about to topple over) Stunning autumn foliage, almond-tasting fruit. A bit yucky.

Fig with black fruits

Blood Plum

Granny Smith Apple

Pear trees in the old orchard planted by the Gowans. "May your marriage last as long as a pear tree".

Roses include:

Aloha, a climbing rose in front of the Mexican Tree Daisy

David Austin 'Charles Austin' along the western veranda 'Sally Holmes' in front of the pencil pines

Mutabilis large evergreen rose beside olive. Flowers open yellow and mutate to pale pink then deep pink. My all time favourite.

Apricot Nectar near path

Reine des Violettes beside olive on peninsular. Flowers contrast well with the olive.

Albertine over tennis court. (Do not grow it; its thorns are too vicious).

Mme. Gregoire Staechelin over gateway to formal rose garden, removed last year to reduce work.

Crepuscule over gateway as above.

COUNCIL NEWS - SEPTEMBER MEETING

Highlights of Council decisions taken at the monthly meeting held on 26 September 2018:

- Cr Heather Wilton was elected to the position of Mayor for the ensuing 2 years until September 2020.
- Cr Doug Meyer OAM was elected as Deputy Mayor for the coming 12 months until September 2019.
- In response to a Notice of Motion from Cr Meyer regarding Jingellic Road, Council requested that a report be prepared including the necessary steps, possible funding partners and a financing model to consider the upgrade of this road from Holbrook to the Shire boundary.
- Council granted approval for the demolition of the commercial building at 95 99 Albury Street, Holbrook which was affected under the Loose Fill Asbestos. Preservation of the historical nature and heritage of the building's façade was seriously considered however retention would result in significantly increased costs to fully remove all asbestos. As the future usage or demand of the building cannot be fully assessed within a realistic timeframe the approval of demolition was approved by Council and will allow Public Works Advisory to complete their program as required.
- Council resolved not to proceed with the Draft Greater Hume Council S7.12 Fixed Development Consent Levy Development Contributions Plan 2018 and to hold a workshop to incorporate the wording of the resolution determined at the August meeting to adopt a policy that if a solar farm project is developed in the shire, the Section 7.12 contribution be expended on rural and regional roads.
- The Council Meeting schedule was set for the ensuing 12 months including a meeting at Walla Walla in November 2018 and Carabost in March 2019.
- A report was provided to Council recommending actions regarding land availability and residential land development opportunities and constraints in the Shire. Staff will be preparing reports on subdivision opportunities.
- The Draft General Purpose and Special Purpose Financial Statements were adopted and referred for audit as required.
- Council resolved to write to the NSW Treasury Corporation and the Office of Local Government strongly condemning the introduction of investment policy financial covenants and seeking meaningful consultation with the local government sector regarding the review of the current OLG Investment Order.
- Council approved the 2018/2019 Christmas/New Years office closure period to commence Monday 24 December 2018 and then reopen Wednesday 2 January 2019.
- Council determined to finalise plans for subsequent tender for the construction of a health service premise in Holbrook.

Next Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 17 October at Holbrook.

BILLABONG HIGH

It is with great pleasure and pride that I announce that this year's NAPLAN results are the best the school has achieved in over six years. In fact, our NAPLAN comparison records don't go back far enough to indicate any previous year that was better than this year's results.

Our year groups are compared to state average for all schools, and to a 'similar school group' made up of schools from around the state with similar socioeconomic contexts to us.

Our Year 9 group scored higher than the similar school group in all five categories. Our Year 7 group scored higher than the similar school group in all five categories, and scored higher than state average in 'Grammar and Punctuation'.

The school has not achieved an average score above state average in any category, in any year group, in more than six years. These results are extremely positive and undoubtedly affirm the direction the school is taking. However, it is sobering to think that the school has consistently achieved below state average results for so many years, and despite these recent positive results, today remains below state average for NAPLAN and HSC performance. In short, there is plenty more work to do. As a principal who has taken on the difficult task of leading culture change at Billabong High School for the past three years, I again commit to continuing this journey to improve outcomes for our students. I am proud of the staff who are working hard to embed a culture of excellence, and I am proud of the students who are stepping up to the higher expectations and achieving the results that our school community is capable of. Although culture change can be challenging to some people in the community who do not know any different, I am confident that when we continue making the difficult but necessary decisions for the advancement of our students, learning outcomes will continue to improve. MENTAL HEALTH CARER EXPERIENCE SURVEY ROLLS OUT IN MURRUMBIDGEE



The NSW Mental Health Carer Experience Survey is now available for the family and carers of people who access public mental health services in Murrumbidgee Local Health District (MLHD).

The survey is an Australian-first set to transform the carer experience of mental health services across NSW.

"The survey will provide accurate and timely feedback to MLHD about the way carers are supported by mental health services. The feedback will improve health outcomes for people living with mental illness and their carers," said Family Friendly Mental Health Strategy Coordinator (MLHD) Helen Sheather.

"Understanding the experiences of family, friends and other carers is a vital part of ensuring they are fully supported throughout their time with our service.

"The survey asks for responses about the carer's own experience and recognises the unique perspectives carers bring to the care of the person they are supporting," Helen said.

The survey will also provide information to ensure the perspectives of family and carers are included in the development, planning, delivery and evaluation of mental health services.

"This feedback is highly valued and plays an important role in improving the quality and experience of the services we provide," Helen said.

Family and carers will be offered the survey when they come into contact with any of the inpatient or community mental health services across the health district. The survey is anonymous and can be completed at any time and more than once. Staff can assist with the completion and return of the surveys.

Initially the survey will be paper-based however an online version is in development. It is being translated into 26 languages.

The Mental Health Carer Experience Survey is designed to be an ongoing strategy to enhance the experience of family and carers.

"Regular reports on the data collected will assist individual services to better support, advocate for and meet the specific needs of family and carers at all levels of the service," Helen said.


