

VOLUNTEERS MAKE A GREAT COMMUNITY

Holbrook Rotarians honoured three community volunteers Betty Winzer, Lea Parker, and Steven Bunyan with Paul Harris Fellows for their community work at a dinner held to celebrate the occasion. Family members and friends of the volunteers came along to support and acknowledge their work. Responding to the honour, recipient Lea Parker said, "I wanted my children to grow up in a great community and realised it's up to us to create that." Lea became a Greater Hume Shire Councillor in 2018. A year ago, she was an organiser /co-ordinator of the Holbrook Staging Area during the fires and her teams did a great job catering and caring for the people, firefighters and others who passed through the staging area. Previously, Lea spent 11 years on the committee of Holbrook Early Learning Centre, with five years as president during its transition to Long day Care. She was St Patrick's School co-ordinator for the Henty Machinery Field Days and spent three years as chair of the St Patricks Board. Lea was involved in bringing the resilience program to Holbrook and the mental health play Carpe Diem. A strong involvement in sport involved coaching the Cgrade and A-grade netball teams, the netball club treasurer for 4 years, and remains on the marketing and sponsorship committee today.

Listed in the Rural Women's Hidden Treasures Honour Roll in 2011, Betty Winzer loves what she does as a volunteer. Betty has knitted thousands of Scare Bears for young and distressed patients at the Holbrook Health Service and Ambulance NSW and further afield in Albury Wodonga. She was a regular visitor to the Harry Jarvis Wing helping at mealtimes three times daily, and a member and active fund raiser of Friends of the Hostel. She provided support services for the Red Cross and in particular the Holbrook Blood Bank Service. While some ill health and COVID 19 regulations have impeded her work, Betty encourages volunteers in the future to continue her legacy as a helper at the Harry Jarvis Wing. "Feeding people at mealtimes or just reading and talking to residents can really make a difference to their day," she said. Betty's generous nature, kind heart and enthusiastic volunteerism has been a great example for the Holbrook community. She was nominated by the Holbrook Health Service for Volunteer Excellence Award in 2018; was a nominee for Greater Hume Shire



Stephen Bunyan said, "It's always more rewarding to be a giver than a receiver. "I've enjoyed every minute of my volunteering in the community." Stephen's active involvement in the community has included: life member of the Holbrook Show Society and president for five years; member of the Cookardinia and Back Creek Rural Fire Service for over 50 years. He is a foundation member of the Holbrook Sporting Complex, and Holbrook Basketball Club; board member of the Hume Football and Netball Clubs and the Holbrook Australian Rule Football Club; chairman of the Log Cabin Trust and past member of the Rotary Club of Holbrook, Holbrook Landcare, of Maintenance Committee member the Cookardinia Cemetery, and Holbrook Lions Club citizen of the Year in 2015.

Who was Paul Harris? He was a businessman who founded Rotary in 1905. The Rotary Foundation came along later in 1917 and since then has spent more than \$4 billion on life changing, sustainable projects. Paul Harris recognition was established in his honour in 1957 to express appreciation for giving US \$1000 to the Rotary Foundation for humanitarian and educational programs. As a club, we the members donate through our weekly fine money around \$1000 to \$1500 annually to the Foundation. Money that we collect also goes to the eradication of Polio worldwide. Rotarians often designate a Paul Harris Fellow as a tribute to a person who has served the community or the Rotary Club above and beyond self. Holbrook President Jen Parer said we have honour and pleasure in recognising three outstanding citizens as they become Paul Harris Fellows: Stephen Bunyan, Lea Parker, and Betty Winzer.



PLANT PICK PLATE

Up until now I have wanted to plant more and more into my extensive productive garden. I love picking daily fresh produce for my next meal and to preserve for later. Circumstances have changed and sadly I have decided to shut down my garden for the time being. Sure, I have planted the long growing garlic bulbs as previously written about, but once the summer crops have finished and removed, layers of cardboard will cover the soil to help prevent weed growth. This does not mean I will cease gardening, I am simply undertaking a "garden downsize". Smaller gardens can be extremely productive with the benefit of less weed growth and maintenance. I have a used 2 x 1 mt raised vegetable garden container and have reinvigorated the soil with the addition of well rotted manure, compost and lime. Obviously, as with my large garden, I want to grow as much as possible so compact, guick growing vertical vegies are what I have planted. Perennial Spinach, Cos Lettuce, Spring Onions and a few strawberry plants consume most of the space with herbs of Chives, Basil, Parsley and Lemon Thyme filling the rest. Room allows for progressive plantings of Spring Onions and also the super quick growing Radish and Asian Greens in between. Spring Onions are so underrated and a worthy inclusion in all gardens. They are quick growing all year round, extremely versatile and have a pleasant modest onion flavour. Oversized spring onions can be sliced and sauteed as a brown onion while the younger give a fresh crunch to mash, gravy and soups when finely sliced and sprinkled on top. Raw or cooked, the Spring Onion provides a freshness to any meal and will be a renewed vegetable in my downsized garden. Passionate Gardener, June.

Cricket History created in Holbrook!!

On the weekend of 13th & 14th March, when the Holbrook Cricket Club hosted the U13's & U16's Grand Finals of the CAW Hume at the Ten Mile Cricket Ovals.

Junior Cricket Semi Final 6.3.21

Another local derby saw Green v Gold vie for a place in the Grand Final. Green won the toss & batted first, making 6/214. Solid effort from Hamish Livermore (33), Harry Greenhill (33), Nick Robards (29), Ned Harrison (29) & Rory Gulliver (25). Gold bowlers Cooper Glass, Isaac Bennetts, Tom Parker, Will Glass all taking 1 wicket each. Gold worked hard in the run chase. Cooper Glass (46), Issaac Bennetts (21), Eli Toll (23), & Ryder McKillop (18), but fell short 8/167. Green wickets to Robards 2/12, Harrison 2/8 and Jack Pitzen taking 2 behind the wicket.

Grand Final played on the Leo Mackinlay Oval Holbrook Green met their match against Culcairn, proving too strong on the day. Culcairn won the toss and batting solidly from the start 6/172. Wickets and catches were shared throughout but our boys couldn't reach the target and Culcairn won by 38 runs. Steve Bennett from CAW Hume spoke highly of the Holbrook players & coaches and the strength of junior cricket at the presentation.

U16's played on the Peter Stead Oval

Holbrook took on Henty in the Grand Final played over Saturday & Sunday mornings, with both teams having excellent wins in the previous

weeks' semi-finals. Henty won the toss, & elected to batt, & were bowled out for 106 in the 35th over. Skipper Ben Parker with 4 wickets & spinner Jett Liddell with 3 were the pick of the Holbrook bowlers. Flyn Scholes, Aiden Cox & Charlie Morton completed the wicket takers. With five overs left to batt, Parker & Hamilton Black had Holbrook off to a great start to be 0/20 at stumps. Unfortunately, on day two the wheels fell off, & the home side was dismissed for 94, 12 runs short. Parker (52 not out), Black (16) & Will Jenkyn (9) were the only batsmen to show any resistance to the Henty attack. Ben Parker was named Man of the Match, a great effort in a losing side, while Aiden Cox was the leading run scorer in the U16's competition for the 2020/21 season.

In the Senior Grades Henty defeated Brocklesby/ Burrumbuttock at Paech Oval Henty in the A Grade, & Oaklands won a thriller by one run against Osborne at Oaklands to be B Grade premiers.

A big crowd was in attendance & a very enjoyable & successful night was had by all. OLDER MEN'S GROUP MEETING

A public meeting about the needs of older men in Holbrook and district and how to meet them, will take place on 15th April at the Holbrook Returned Services Club. According to organisers, numerous social issues affect men differently to women so there is need for a safe, male only environment in which older men can exchange ideas and views, plan activities, support each other and take more control of their lives. The formation of OM:NI groups which stands for Older Men, New Ideas, is in response to issues which affect older men. Recognising that men have special concerns during older age, OM:NI urges men over 50 to share their views and experiences with others in a friendly discussion. The OM:NI aroup organisations says that groups are autonomous and follow a program derived from the wishes of the men themselves. Many groups have begun as self-help discussion groups and expanded to take on community work. The organisation believes that there are benefits in improving the health of Older Men, reducing isolation and encouraging public recognition of the positive contribution that Older Men can make to their families and communities. Many OM:NI members are veterans who benefit from sharing experiences in a climate of trust and mutual support.

The meeting is sponsored by the Murrumbidgee Primary Health Network, an Australian Government Initiative.

The public meeting starts at 10.30am. A light lunch will be served at no charge. All older men are invited to attend and wives are invited to bring their husband and sons and daughters to bring their father.

ARE YOU EATING ENOUGH??? It is important to eat a variety of foods as no one food will provide all the vitamins and minerals your body needs. Different foods contain different nutrients. For example, spinach and other green leafy vegetables contain folate; oranges contain vitamin C; bananas provide potassium and wholegrain bread contains thiamine. Red meat is good for protein, iron and zinc. Dairy foods are excellent for calcium, zinc and protein. Variety is important, so is food enjoyment.

There is now evidence that being overweight is not necessarily associated with higher mortality in people over 65 years of age.

GREAT NEWS FOR MOST OF US: It seems that older people have better health outcomes if they are heavier rather than thin. The health benefits of actively trying to lose weight, especially by restricting calories, are uncertain. Deliberate weight loss in older people can lead to muscle loss, loss of ability to function properly and loss of independence.

THE GOOD NEWS IS -WE CAN HELP YOU. Having meals delivered should not be seen as a last resort. KNOX CONGREGATION TO CLOSE

A Service of Remembrance and Closure for the congregation of Knox Uniting Church will be held on Sunday 11 April.

The congregation decided last year that it would be best to close the formal entity within the Riverina Presbytery, so that management of the real estate and other assets will be the responsibility of that presbytery. Ownership of the buildings remains with the Uniting Church Property Trust, and it will be their decision in the long term as to what happens with these buildings, which includes the Knox Church itself, the church halls, and the manse. This was of course a difficult decision! Members of the Uniting Church will still enjoy the support of the Southern Region community minister, Rev Yvonne Ghavalas, who is based in Wagga, and the Presbytery Minister, Rev Nigel Hawken. Members of the congregation with the support and guidance of these ministers will work out how best to proceed in the future. They will continue to meet, every second Tuesday of each month at 11am. Rev Yvonne will lead us with her wonderful story telling as we study, pray, and talk, followed by lunchtime laughter and conversation.

The beautiful Knox church remains available for baptisms, weddings, and funerals, and the Hall will still be available for community use. The Centenary of the building of the spired Knox church was held in 2000. The original church is now the hall, opened in 1873 as the Presbyterian Church in Germanton, and now used as a worship and community space. The other buildings that form part of the Knox block are the Manse (leased since 2004), the Mary Lundy hall which was originally built in 1929 as the Sunday school, and the toilet/ storage block. In 1977 the Uniting Church in Australia was established, and the Presbyterian congregation in Holbrook has been a congregation of the UCA since then.

Chair of the Congregation, Jenny Parer, said that the load of running a congregation had become too much for the small group of ageing parishioners. "There hasn't been a minister for many years, the last one was Russell Dancey who began his ministry in 1996, followed by Judy Harrison, a lay minister, in 2004.

"This has been a very difficult decision, and a long time in the making. However, being realistic, and perhaps being pushed along by the effects of COVID19, we think this closure has become inevitable. We hope that the change will be a positive one, sometimes it takes a big change to move us along and do things in a different way. The Uniting Church is certainly looking at ways it can "do church" differently and this could breathe new life into us."




