



Celebrating Women-Our Stories.





A SMEAR IN TIME FOR BOWEL CANCER

Bowel cancer is the second most common cancer world-wide after breast cancer and the second highest cause of cancer deaths in Australia after lung cancer. Ninety percent (90%) of bowel cancers can be cured if detected early. Rotary Bowelscan kits can be picked up



now at the Holbrook, Henty, Culcairn, Walla Walla, and Jindera Pharmacies during the months of May and June. The cost of \$20 covers pathology and communication letters.

The Rotary Bowelscan program is a screening program designed to detect traces of blood in bowel motions at the time of sampling, particularly blood not visible to the naked eye. Positive results require further examination to determine the actual cause which may or may not be cancer related. A further examination with your GP will determine this. Annual screening is recommended especially for people over the age of 40 years and any age if there is a family history. There have been some cases where a positive result occurred after a negative result the year before with a further examination revealing cancer requiring immediate intervention.

In Australia bowel cancer affects 1 in 18 males and 1 in 26 females. Rotary Bowelscan has a return rate of 80 percent due largely to participants making the decision to participate, and 50 percent of participants are from the 50-74 age group.

The Rotary Club of Holbrook has organised Bowelscan kits to be distributed to pharmacies throughout Greater Hume Shire as a community service to our residents in the shire.

STRONGER COUNTRY COMMUNITIES FUND ROUND 4 FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES FOR GREATER HUME

The NSW Government has announced a fourth round of Stronger Country Communities Fund (SCCF). Greater Hume Council has been advised the allocation will be \$813,249, funding applications must seek a minimum of \$50,000.

Round 4 of the SCCF is now open to all eligible applicants. The objectives of the fund are to boost the liveability of communities in regional areas by providing new or upgraded social and sporting infrastructure or community programs that have strong local support and to deliver enhanced infrastructure and programs that remove barriers to female participation in sport across regional NSW.

"I am excited about the funding opportunities our community and sporting groups will receive through the Round 4 allocation of NSW Governments Stronger Country Communities Fund and urge all groups and organisations to consider submitting an application", said Mayor Cr Heather Wilton.

Mayor, Cr Heather Wilton said, 'female participation in sport and community liveability are the focus for this round of SCCF funding, I urge all community and sporting organisations to consider projects or programs which would be of benefit to the Greater Hume community'.

developing these skills particularly communication, problem solving and working together as a team.

Our Arts program is going from strength to strength. Students have just completed an Observational Drawing and painting of a Protea. Students utilised double and triple brush loading techniques to gain blended hues on each flower petal. Please pop down to IGA to view our latest display!

The next project adds to their repertoire of painting techniques to create texture and pattern to collage an Australian bird of their choice. The next page shows some photos of the students with their works in progress.

Ukulele is going from strength to strength. Mr Carey is the MASTER. He has all students strumming in time and even playing songs!


Writing continues to be a focus for the diocese and our school. Staff continually review our data wall and use this to ensure students are met at the point of need.


Claude was the younger brother to both Toby Liersch, Holbrook and Fred Liersch, Henty.

HELP HOLBROOK GYM CLUB GET FUNDING

Holbrook Community Gym Club is making an application for grant funding under the Stronger Country Communities Fund Round 4.

The purpose of the grant will be to upgrade the gymnasium to include female friendly unisex toilets/ change rooms and showers within the gymnasium building and to improve safety for users of the gymnasium by installing external lighting between the car park and the gym building.

Currently users of the gym have to leave the building to access shower or toilet facilities elsewhere on the Holbrook Sportsground, which is a safety issue for existing users and a disincentive for new users to join the club. The lack of facilities for users restricts accessibility for females, for young mothers

with infant babies and mature people, and also for persons with a disability.

PLANT PICK PLATE

The lush green area at the back of my house is not what I would call "Lawn". It is a combination of natural and sown grasses with mingling various weeds. Many weeds in fact. Action was needed so

I can tolerate some of the broad and flat leaf weeds such as Dandelion, Marshmallow and Milk Thistle, which you can easily mow to control but Patterson's Curse, Bindi and Cape Weed I want to remove by hand. Fortunately, the latter is my only weed concern at present.

After punishing my knees last year, I have now invested in knee pads. These wonderful thickly padded covers with velcro secured straps are like kneeling on ten pillows, so soft and protective while relieving all knee discomfort. I should have purchased the knee pads years ago.

During winter while tasks are not so great, I will be taking this opportunity to service and add to my garden equipment. Clean and sharpen blades, scrub the shovels and hoes then give my "Mums" garden shed a spring clean. I have already gathered up the fallen leaves and added to the compost realising the need for a compost turner, a definite handy tool on my shopping list.

I now realise that using appropriate gardening equipment and utensils of quality, reliability and easy to handle will make my gardening tasks more comfortable. My back, shoulders and knees will thank me.
