EXCITING NEWS FROM THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF AUSTRALIAN POTTERY

As part of the Queen's Birthday Honours, Kerrie Ford has been awarded the 'Order of Australia Medal', Kerrie's citation for the honour is: *For service to community history, particularly the study of early Australian pottery.*

Kerrie is the Co-Owner/Director of the National Museum of Australian Pottery in Holbrook, NSW, which with her husband Geoff, they established in Wodonga, in 1995. They relocated to Holbrook in 2006, where they continue to operate their Museum, which is the only Museum in Australia dedicated to 19th and early 20th Century Australian pottery, the culmination of many years



of collecting and research throughout Australia.

Kerrie has spent many years collecting, researching, lecturing and curating travelling exhibitions on and preserving 19th and early 20th Century Australian pottery and has written several books on the subject. An honour well deserved.

NEWS FROM HOLBROOK SUBMARINE MUSEUM

We are always pleased to welcome new members and there are over 70 of us now, and the work of the Friends is always evolving to support the Holbrook Submarine Museum. In this edition there are a couple of new members and changes that I felt worth a special mention. First, we have a new role in FHSM for Morris (Morrie) Jeppesen, who lives at Holbrook. For those who do not already know him, 'Morrie' was the chief Writer at Platypus in the 1980s and has played a major role in submarine administration management and amongst his jobs since leaving the Navy is working for the Greater Hume Shire Council (who own the museum). His living at Holbrook is a great bonus and he has agreed to play a major role with the Friends in the museum, working along with our Vice President Michael Carew. Morrie will be known as the "Friends Volunteer Coordinator" and he has agreed to join the FHSM Committee when a vacancy occurs. Morrie, and Life Member and former Honorary Curator of the

WELCOME THE NEW CURATOR MORRIE JEPPESEN Morrie has been a vital part of the HSM volunteer team for some time. For those of you who don't know Morrie, we thought a brief profile of his background might help introduce him. Morris or as we know him Morrie, joined the RAN as a Junior Recruit in the 17th Intake 1966, had 7 sea postings and worked at various postings including RAN Tactical Electronic Warfare Support Section, Defence Intelligence Organisation and was the Personnel Officer Platypus 86-88. Discharged from full time service in 1996 he became the Rates Clerk at Holbrook Council. In 2000 he got an offer for Reserve time as a Para-Legal at Command Legal at Cerberus. In 2001 he joined Waterhen as the Personnel Officer, then Mine Clearance and Diving Force Element Group Secretary. PLANT PICK PLATE

What to do with excess mandarins? My young Imperial Mandarin tree has produced its first big crop this season. The fruit is on the



small side but sweet, juicy and full of flavour. I searched through my dessert recipe books and selected the following two to share which are absolutely delicious.

Toffeed Mandarins

50 gm butter

1/3 cup (75gm) firmly packed brown sugar

5 medium mandarins (1 kg), peeled & segmented 1 lt (4 cups) vanilla ice-cream

Melt butter in large frying pan, cook sugar and mandarins, stirring until sugar dissolves and mandarins soften slightly. Divide ice-cream among 4 serving bowls and top with warm mandarin toffee. Serve with almond bread.

I think a rich chocolate sauce would be divine drizzled on top.

Mandarin Mouse

4 large mandarins1 pinch nutmeg25 ml brandy

40 ml hot water

pinch cinnamon
 ml icing sugar
 tbl gelatine
 ml thickened cream

Peel and de-seed mandarins, chop finely then mix with cinnamon, nutmeg, sugar and brandy. Dissolve gelatine in the hot water and add to the mandarin mixture. Beat the cream until stiff and fold into mixture. Lightly grease 4 dariole moulds, pour in mixture and chill for several hours to set.

Serve with fresh mandarin segments or my favourite, rich chocolate sauce. This is a fabulous dessert that can be prepared ahead of time.

A traditional favourite, **tangy citrus marmalade** can be made combining a medley of 2 or 3 citrus fruit varieties. Chop skins and pulp then soak in water overnight. Consult a comparable marmalade recipe as procedures, ingredients and quantities vary.

Conserves are not for me so alternatively, I shall just eat lots of fresh mandarins - full of Vitamin C and naturally packaged in bite size portions perfect for a snack. **Passionate Gardener, June.**

Pray There are only 18 total solemnities throughout the Liturgical Year, and interestingly there are seven in May and June alone. Sunday 6th June we celebrated The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ and Friday The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ At the Last Supper, Jesus knew that He was going to leave His friends. So he turned the bread into His Body and the wine into His Blood.

Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus Writers as early as St. Justin (second century) and St. Pope Gregory the Great (seventh century) drew on John 19:34-35 as a metaphor for the divine graces that flow from the heart of the crucified Jesus: "But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs, but one soldier thrust his lance into his side, and immediately blood and water flowed out."

These and the other 16 solemnities are feast days of the highest rank celebrating a mystery of faith. Catholic schools are the vehicles in which this mystery of faith is nurtured.

Live Our Frost Free Friday Milo mission drive continues to be popular, particularly as it has been quite fresh in the mornings. This student led initiative has really brought social justice to the core. In 4 weeks the students have managed to raise just shy of \$300. There is a lot happening within our service! Our iPad project is finishing up and participants are now able to use their iPads independently. Congratulations to you all, Ruth did a great job instructing everyone to be able to peruse their interests.

Our new social programme "Sconeversations" will be commencing in July. The programme will be restricted to 8 participants and is open to any seniors in the community who would like to participate. You don't need to be meals on wheels service users. Aimed at people who wish to come together and talk about issues of the day, maybe share a hobby, and enjoy scones and conversations. Sconeversations will be held in Holbrook And Culcairn on a week about basis.

We also have a "Cooking For 1 or 2" programme commencing soon. It will be just what it says, a small group cooking session bringing people together to socialise and learning affordable and simple recipes suitable for 1 or 2 people. We will cook together and share a meal at each session. At the end of each block of sessions participants will have some skills and recipes to be able to cook meals at home.

Also available to our service users in Holbrook a daily HOT MEAL delivery with your choice of meal from our large menu, 1 course or 3 courses, its up to you! Don't forget TAKE-AWAY TUESDAY – Pie & Chips or Fish and Chips fresh from Holbrook Bakery available for delivery every Tuesday and SUNDAY PUB ROAST – Freshly cooked Roast Pork or Beef and baked vegetables, delivered each Sunday ready for lunch. And of course along with all our deliveries a friendly smile and a chat to check all is well.

MEALS & TRANSPORT IN HOME CARE PACKAGES.... Yes, your Home Care Package provider can provide Meals on Wheels and other services as part of your Home Care Package, if this fits into your budget. If there are not enough funds available in your budget, you are still able to purchase Meals on Wheels separately and not associated with your Home Care Package. You may be eligible for meals under Commonwealth Home Support Program.

Your Home Care Package **entitles** <u>you to choose</u> a **meal service that best suits you,** under the principle of Consumer Directed Care. You have

every right to discuss this with your Home Care Package provider, and they are obliged to ensure that your choice can be catered for, if this fits into your budget. After discussions, your provider should agree to provide Meals on Wheels as part of your Home Care Package, because Meals on Wheels are available in every Local Government area.

There are no free meals. The whole meal cost will come out of your Home Care Package funds. Under Consumer Directed Care your Home Care Package Provider cannot force you to use their preferred supplier. The choice of meal supplier is entirely yours. Many of the cheap or free meals offered will not meet the National Meal Guidelines and are often of poor nutritional value. Be careful not to sign contracts and always remember, if it seems too good a deal it generally is.

The price will vary depending on your menu selections. Meals on Wheels meals are reasonably priced, and the majority meet the National Meal Guidelines which were designed to ensure a healthy eating program for over 65's. There is no delivery charge to you. Delivery is paid out of your Home Care Package.

You never have to sign a contract with Meals on Wheels. We can provide as many or as few meals as you require.

Remember: We are MORE THAN JUST A MEALproviding a wellness check, social contact and a nutritious meal. We also offer outings, social groups, and nutrition support for our service users. Our volunteers tell us they enjoy supporting their community and building relationships with other volunteers and clients.


MEN'S SHED Hi from the Men's Shed.

LEST WE FORGET – ROBERT D. HAWORTH

Private Robert Haworth owned the property "Cambewarra" near Holbrook. He joined the Australian Imperial Force in June 1917 at the age of twenty-three.

Having set sail aboard HMAT *Euripides* a few months after enlistment, destined for the Western Front, Haworth had to disembark in England having fallen ill with influenza. He was admitted to the Sutton Veny Military Hospital until his recovery.

In April 1918 once Haworth had recuperated from illness, he proceeded from Dover to Calais to join his battalion, the 4th. The 4th Battalion had been raised within a fortnight upon the declaration of war in August 1914. It served at Gallipoli until the evacuation, going on to fight on the Western Front until the end of the war, taking part in operations against the German Army, mainly in the Somme Valley in France and around Ypres in Belgium.

On the 10th July 1918 in the vicinity of Merris in France, Haworth was acting as a runner when returning from delivering a message he was fatally shot by a sniper. A witness claimed Haworth had told him earlier that day that he had a feeling something was going to happen to him.

He was buried where he fell by the men of his company and a cross was erected. Although his grave has not been found, Private Robert Haworth is commemorated at the Villers-Bretonneux Memorial in France.
