#### **HOLBROOK COMMUNITY GYM**

The past 6 months have been a busy time for the Community Gym in Holbrook. The installation of new pathways and the replacement of all external doors has been funded by the Riverina Water Community Grant.

The pathway has been a great success, enabling all our members to access the Gym safely especially over the winter months. It also facilitates members with disabilities to use the Gym with their scooters or walkers. One of our long-term members, Kel Lyons, uses the Gym daily and loves that he can access the Gym on his scooter and does not have to be concerned that he may slip or become bogged. He also finds the new glass doors let in so much more natural light.

The Gym also updated its sled track and purchased a ski machine, squat rack and exercise bike. The facility has well used weights, cardio & boxing sections. The club's focus is to enable its members to exercise in a safe and friendly environment, with very affordable memberships. School students, from the age of 14, only paying \$50 for the year,



with a one-off joining fee of \$10. Adults have the option of paying an annual membership of \$110, half-yearly of \$75, or quarterly of \$40, and a joining fee of \$20. We welcome all new members. Once again a huge thank you to Riverina Water.



I have heard people blame God for the Covid Pandemic but, we have to remember that there is a human element involved in what we are experiencing.

At a recent meeting we decided to plan for a Combined Churches Lunch on August 15<sup>th</sup> depending on Covid restrictions. Today a man knocked on my door and asked for a small donation towards the local swimming pool. I gave him a glass of water.

## PLANT, PICK, PLATE

One thing I have learnt from my gardening studies is that it is a waste of time and energy nursing a sick plant. It is



more productive to remove and start again. This was the case with my dwarf pear which suffered from leaf curl every year despite my control methods. This was not the only reason why I wanted to remove it. I have an appreciation for the form and shape of a regular fruit tree, the wide wine glass shape is visually appealing and sits well in my garden.

Subsequently, a replacement plum was my choice. The Japanese varieties are more suitable to our temperate climate than the English cultivars so my first selection was the "Santa Rosa" which is self pollinating. Not so said the nurseryman, it is a partial self pollinator therefore a companion will provide a greater, more reliable crop. Hummm! I didn't have space for two. Plant two close together was his advice and prune one side on each tree flat, planting back to back and they will be happy. As the trees grow I must keep the distance between the plums pruned flat to allow air flow which will help to prevent disease.

I arrived home with my favoured "Santa Rosa", a large purple plum with pink flesh, as well as its companion "Mariposa", a true blood plum with dark red skin and flesh. Having already prepared my location, which involved the incorporation of compost and well-rotted manure into the soil, I planted my Plums in holes 50cm apart and pruned as advised. The advantage of growing two separate trees as opposed to two grafted on one root stock is that one side will not be accidentally over-pruned. My two distinct trees which will make for ease of pruning in the following years.

"COOKING FOR 1 or 2" & "SCONEVERSATIONS"

Unfortunately, due to the current Covid circumstances are both on hold temporarily. They

Cooking For 1 or 2" is just what it says, each session a small group cooks an easy, quick and nourishing meal, including a main meal and dessert. At the end of each block of sessions we hope participants will have some new skills, have met new people and have some recipes to try out at home.

A purely social morning aimed at people who wish to come together and talk about issues of the day, maybe share a hobby, and enjoy scones and conversations. #### **WE R OK AT ROTARY**

Conscious of the mental health issues following the bushfires, the club catered at events aimed at informing our Upper Murray neighbours on health issues, feed and farm aid, and financial assistance. They supported Blaze Aid, provided fencing materials, and donated funds towards a respite package for fire-affected residents given time out in Albury.

## **LEST WE FORGET – FINLAY MACDONALD**

Sergeant Finlay MacDonald of Holbrook was the son of Alexina Kelly (formerly MacDonald), and the late Donald MacDonald. Finlay left his job at Yarra Yarra Station (near Holbrook) upon the outbreak of World War One to join up, enlisting in early 1915 at the age of nineteen.

Posted to the newly raised 17<sup>th</sup> Battalion, MacDonald left Australia in May, bound for Egypt where the Battalion trained for three months until it was sent to Gallipoli, landing on the peninsula in late August.

Upon evacuating Gallipoli in December 1915, MacDonald and his Battalion returned to Egypt for further training before proceeding to the European battlefields in March 1916, taking part in defending and securing sectors of the front.

While fighting in Flanders, Finlay was awarded the Military Medal for conspicuous gallantry. On 12<sup>th</sup> - 13<sup>th</sup> March 1917 he led a patrol into enemy's lines under machine gun and sniper fire. He captured a trench, and established posts there. MacDonald showed splendid poise and daring, setting a fine example to his men. He brought back valuable information regarding the condition of the enemy's line and strength of its garrison.

Later in the year, on the 20<sup>th</sup> of September while participating in the successful Battle of Menin Road, MacDonald was killed in action. Having no known grave Sergeant MacDonald is commemorated on the Menin Gate Memorial in Belgium.


