BOOK WEEK 2022 AT HOLBROOK LIBRARY

Book Week is always celebration at the library.

Often, during Book Week we invite an author or illustrator of children's books to visit and speak to the local school children. This week we have been really excited to welcome author and illustrator, Sami Bayly. Due to time constraints Sami visited both schools rather than the school kids coming to the library. The children loved listening to Sami talk about her experiences and also got the chance to get some drawing tips and inspiration from Sami.



Sami is a natural history illustrator based in Armidale, NSW, who loves all things weird and wonderful. She finds the beauty and importance of all animals regardless of their appearance, and hopes to share her appreciation with others.

Sami's first book, *The Illustrated Encyclopaedia of Ugly Animals*, won the Children's Indie Book of the Year Award and the Australian Book Design Award for Younger Readers. It was a CBCA (Children's Book

Council of Australia) Honour Book and was shortlisted for an ABIA Book of the Year for Younger Children and long-listed for the ABA Booksellers' Choice 2020 Book of the Year Awards. Her second book, *The Illustrated Encyclopaedia of Dangerous Animals*, was shortlisted for the Children's Indie Book of the Year 2020 and the CBCA Eve Pownall Award, an ABIA Book of the Year for Younger Children and an Australian Book Design Award for Younger Readers. And her third book *The Illustrated Encyclopaedia of Peculiar Pairs in Nature* is again shortlisted for this year's CBCA Eve Pownall Award.

The theme for Book Week this year is *Dreaming With Eyes Open* and so we have set up a tent in the children's section of the library. Inside the tent is a blanket, pillow and a pile of books. Children can crawl inside and read, dream and relax. There are candles (battery operated!) for the children to turn on and place around the interior of the tent. Peyton Galvin (photographed) is enjoying some quiet moments in the tent and very considerately has left her boots out the front!

These days, it's practised around the world as an effective exercise for health.



ROBIN CAROLINE HODGES NEE BUNYAN

Robin Caroline Hodges was the youngest child of John Gordon, and Mabel Agnes Bunyan of Woodlands, Holbrook, born on the 8th July 1931 at the old Holbrook Hospital. Growing up on the family farm with siblings John, Bub and Betty, Robin went away to school at an early age, firstly to Woodstock and then the Presbyterian Ladies College (PLC) Sydney.

A family story goes that at the age of 15, Robin convinced her father she was needed during shearing and after 12 months away, never returned to complete her schooling. Nevertheless, she made lifelong friends at boarding school, her nickname was Bunny, and she loved the reunions.

Robin worked on the family farm, loved her animals especially her horses and relished contact with community through the Presbyterian/Uniting Church, the Agricultural Shows, playing Polocrosse, establishing Pony Club, taking part in local concerts, attending community balls, square dancing and fund raising for the establishment of the local swimming pool.

Robin met her future husband Gresham at a welcome-to-the-district party held at his parent's - Caleb and Grace's property, "Upper Wantagong". Gresham and Robin were married in 1957 and in the early years of their marriage lived and farmed at "Upper Wantagong". Caleb ran a stud of Blairgowrie Galloways and Gresham, Argyle Herefords.

During this time, Marylou was born in 1958, Duncan in 1959 and Rachel, 1963. The young family moved from "Upper Wantagong" to "Binginwarri" when Robin inherited land from her Uncle William Bunyan. Here they operated a mixed farming enterprise of cattle, sheep, and cropping.

Robin is described by her daughters Marylou and Rachel and son Duncan as "our rock". Gresham died from the results of Melanoma in January 1974 when the children were in their early teens, Rachel only 11, Duncan 14 and Marylou 15.

As a sole parent, Robin continued the farm for another 8 years, to avoid uprooting the children, and waited until Rachel finished school. She provided a steady ship during their adolescent years, Pony Club for the girls on Saturday and the Motorcycle Club for Duncan on Sundays.

"We were a close family and built up a strong sense of trust," they said.

Robin took on many administrative roles with Pony Club as well as the Tumbarumba Camp and was bestowed with Life Membership of both Holbrook and the Zone Pony Club.

Robin encouraged Marylou, Duncan, and Rachel to take advantage of opportunities that came their way – to be independent, think outside the box, and make the most life in positive wav.



She followed this advice, and travelled overseas to the UK, the USA, Canada, and New Zealand. Robin enjoyed company, she was warm and genuine in her interest and always up for a chat. She had the uncanny knack of striking up conversations with strangers and being informed of all sorts of random information.

Her family believe Robin was a woman of tremendous strength and faith, non-judgmental, welcoming and had a way of building trust. She had a special interest in helping young families with baby sitting and her focus and interest was about young people. She assisted with the Show Society's Miss Showgirl Competition and took on the role of Peter Rabbit at the Early Childhood Centre as well as helping at the Holbrook Public School.

Her community work and interests included Crafty Hands and Meals on Wheels. She loved chocolate, meringues, porridge with cream and brown sugar, whiskey, bubbles, the smell of cut grass, haymaking, baby animals, dogs, cats, and her horses Nelly, Jerry, Chinook, and Fury. She wore bright colours – purple, red, pink, and green, she had a favourite purple hat, and her favourite outing was meeting with friends.

Robin had a quirky sense of humour; loved musicals and knew all the words to songs in Sound of Music, Mary Poppins, Mama Mia, and White Christmas; she enjoyed happy shows - Paddington Bear, Ice Age and Madagascar. No violence!

She had a great love and pride in her family – Marylou, Rachel, Duncan and his wife Joanne, their children Gresham and Caleb and great grandchild Zac.

A memorial for Robin Caroline Hodges was held at the Knox Church, Holbrook, at 11am on Friday 12th August, followed by refreshments at the RS Club. Robin passed away on 9th July 2022 at the age of 91 years and 1 day.



ABOUT THE BUSH Clocked that cuckoo call?

Unlike those quaint cuckoo clocks of yesteryear, our native cuckoos have a variety of interesting calls – none of which sound like the clock, which mimics the call of the northern hemisphere Common Cuckoo.

Like their northern cousins, Australian cuckoos are also brood parasites – relying on other birds to raise their young. They move south in spring to seek out the nests of unsuspecting warblers, honeyeaters or thornbills to lay their eggs and let the host parents do all the hard work raising cuckoo offspring.

We have six species of cuckoo in bushland around our region. Most would know the incessant mournful call of Koels – a few of which are regular summer visitors to Culcairn. These large cuckoos parasitise Noisy Friarbird or Magpie-lark nests, and once the eggs hatch the young eject the eggs and chicks of their hosts.

Fan-tailed Cuckoos can be heard calling along Billabong Creek during winter. Their call is a descending trill, and these grey and cinnamon birds lay their eggs in scrub wren or thornbill nests. Shining and Horsefield's Bronze Cuckoos are small iridescent green and bronze summer migrants with beautiful, barred chests and undertails. Both species have a piercing mournful call, and parasitise the nests of fairy-wrens and thornbills.

Black-eared Cuckoos migrate south from northern Australia in spring and use the nests of Speckled Warblers in direr parts of our region. These cuckoos tend to call only during the breeding season, much like their bigger, caterpillar-eating relative, the Pallid Cuckoo, which also visits in

warmer months. The target hosts for this species include Willie Wagtails, Rufous Whistlers and Black-faced Cuckoo-shrikes.

If you'd like to learn some of the calls of our local cuckoos, download the free "Bird Call Xeno" app and search for your bird by its common name. Happy twitching!


Be aware that Round 1 of consistency commences on the **4**th **September**. Please put your name on the entry form in the office ASAP.



Take as much as you would like but please just leave the area tidy.

PLANT PICK PLATE

Gardeners who have sown their vegetable or flower seeds into punnets should by now be seeing some germination of green shoots.



On day three the Roquette and Lettuce, who share a punnet, were the first to sprout. By day seven they had rocketed to tall 2.5 cm dual leaf seedlings. Sweet Basil and the Tommy Toe Tomatoes followed on day six, then close behind were two shoots of the 5 Colour Spinach. Bringing up the rear is the Mortgage Tomato on day ten with the Capsicum, Egg Plant and Sunflowers yet to join the race. It is usual for the tiny tiny seeds to always germinate quickly whereas the larger seeds take their time and not all the seeds will germinate. I sprinkled extra and will just keep the number I require of the strongest to pot up or plant into the vegetable patch.

The delicate green leaves are reaching for the sun so I have removed those punnets from the container and placed on a tray on the window sill where they will get some morning sun. As they toughen up the seedlings can withstand more sun but the soil must be kept moist.

Keep an eye on the best before date of your seeds. I am eagerly awaiting the arrival of my new supply of which most will be directly sown into the garden together with the established seedlings I have raised when the air and soil temperature significantly warms up in Spring.
