HOLBROOK RS SUB-BRANCH VIETNAM VETERANS' DAY SERVICE



The Holbrook Sub-Branch of the Returned and Services League of

Australia conducted a memorial service at the Cenotaph at 11:15 on 18 August. President Jeremy Locke led the below service:

On 18 August, we commemorate Vietnam Veterans' Day on the anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan in 1966. The Vietnam War was Australia's longest military engagement of the 20th Century.

The arrival of the Australian Army Training Team Vietnam in South Vietnam during July and August 1962 marked the start of Australia's involvement in the war. By the time the war had come to an end, almost 60,000 Australians served during a decade of conflict between 1962 and 1972. Tragically, 521 of them died and 3000 were wounded.

The Battle of Long Tan was a significant moment in Australia's war in Vietnam. On 18 August 1966, in a rubber plantation near the village of Long Tan, Australian soldiers fought one of their fiercest battles of the war.

The men of Delta Company, 6th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment, faced a force of some 2000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops. The battle was fought in wet and muddy conditions during a heavy tropical downpour.

By the end of the day, 17 Australians had been killed in action and 25 were wounded, one of whom died a few days later. This was the largest number of casualties in a single operation since the Australian Task Force had established its base at nearby Nui Dat the previous April.

In 1969, D Company returned to Long Tan to erect a memorial cross and commemorate the battle. Over time, this day became synonymous with all those who served and died in the Vietnam War. In 1987, then Prime Minister Bob Hawke made this official, announcing that Long Tan Day would now be known as Vietnam Veterans' Day. For its actions in this battle Delta Company 6 Royal Australian Regiment was awarded a US Presidential Unit Citation.

On this day, we commemorate all the battles fought by Australians in Vietnam, from large-scale operations to platoon and section-level

encounters. We remember the sailors of the Royal Australian Navy who supported land operations, and members of the Royal Australian Air Force who served in combat and transport roles.

On Vietnam Veterans' Day, we pause and reflect on the bravery, teamwork and endurance that Australians displayed throughout the war. It's a day when we recognise all who served in Vietnam. We honour those veterans who:

lost their lives during battle

returned home wounded, ill or injured

lost their lives in the years since they returned and

still carry the physical and emotional scars of their service.

We also pause to reflect on the impact of service on our veterans' families.

The service concluded with the laying of a wreath, the Last Post, Minute Silence, Reveille and the National Anthem.

HOLBROOK SUBMARINE MUSEUM NEWS

For those residents who haven't been through the museum for a while, there have been several changes to the museum with several exhibits refreshed.

A temporary exhibit on the Japanese midget submarine attack on Sydney in WW II. In the rebuilt control room of Otway is a soundtrack of a submarine attack on a surface ship and a video of a conducted tour of a Collins class submarine. In the Oberang room is a monitor with pictures of the crew at work and play and the Oberons at sea.

The HSM is run by a volunteer Museum Committee and functions as a Section 355 Committee of Council. The committee meets four times a year and directs the budget and direction of the museum. The HSM is always looking for volunteers for the committee and the running of the museum.


Learn: Children are now fully immersed in their roles for our Aladdin production which we will

FROM THE ANGLICAN CHURCH

A colleague of mine, Rev Scott Mudd, recently wrote an article for his local town newsletter called the "Coolamon Chronicle." Scott highlighted the excess business of our modern life and the need to slow down. We live in a society that is driven by performance, deadlines, and time management. Most workers will tell you that they are time poor and nearing burnout, and even those at home feel driven to do more and more, and are concerned about their future.

When I was a youth in the 1960s the world was vast and communication about events in countries overseas were usually several weeks away, if not months. Today we have instant access to world events via electronic media. A lot of what we receive is negative, we tend to live into the things that are causing hardship to others, and this compounds our situation.

I am encouraged by several things when I have deadlines and begin to feel overwhelmed. In Matthews' Gospel Jesus said, "Do not be anxious about tomorrow as today has enough troubles of its own." And a bit earlier Jesus said, "Look at the flowers and the birds, they do not worry, and our Heavenly Father gives them everything they need," and He cares for you even more than them. I had a mentor when I first went into ministry who often said, "You are a human <u>being</u>, not a human <u>doing</u>, therefore take time to BE still and stop doing things for a while." I am also reminded of the chorus in a song I often listen to which goes, "God's in control."

The main things to take into each day are; remember to spend some time just being you, do not let the worries of tomorrow spoil your day, and above all trust Jesus to get you through the day because, even though evil ravages the world, He will have the victory in the end.

PLANT PICK PLATE

There are certain circumstances in life where you can explain your actions by quoting a well known



saying, for example, "Its better late than never". This is the one I said out aloud, for my ears only, when realising that I had neglected by strawberry row during the winter by letting them do their own thing. By this I mean sharing their plot with weeds such as oxalisis, onion grass and others.

I should have cut them back 3 weeks ago. So on one of our few recent sunny days I headed to the strawberries to remove all leaves, old and new fruit, the runners and then cut the plants down to about 2 cm from the soil. The weed companions were also uprooted and this provided an opportunity to remove the hibernating slugs, slaters and curly grubs.

I sprinkled pellets of complete fertiliser and a dusting of lime as my soil test indicated a slight acidity. Hopefully this will sweeten the soil and the fruiting berries. Emptying the well composted material from my compost bin onto the plants has a three fold benefit – improving the soil, feeding the new growth and creating a mulch to keep the soil temperature warmer until summer arrives. I distributed the compost thickly and watered well. With that task done and while the sun was still shinning, it was time to spray my stone fruit trees for curly leaf. Continual inspection of your trees are essential as this must be done at bud swell, preferably twice. No earlier, no later. This is one gardening job were "its better late than never" does not apply.

I placed a frost cover over the strawberries to assist with quick regrowth and my tender loving care, albeit late, will produce large and juicy, red strawberries in summer.


