HOLBROOK LANDCARE

At the recent AGM, Colin Geddes was re-elected as Chairman and a summary of the previous year's achievements and activities was presented. These included:

- Submission of 15 funding applications, with a total value of approximately \$2.6M. Eight were successful, with a total value of \$1.1M (53% strike rate). Three applications have been advised successful but pending final negotiation and contract, one is pending a decision and three were advised unsuccessful.
- Engaging as an active partner in the CRC for High Performance Soils
- Engaging as an active partner in the Southern NSW Drought Resilience Adoption and Innovation Hub as part of the Farming Systems Group Alliance and driving involvement with Future Drought Fund proposals and other future funding opportunities via the Hub.
- Leading and partnering on Bushfire Recovery Programs in the Upper Murray as part of the Local Landcare Initiative, driving our membership and partnership with Mountain Landcare in the Upper Murray
- Continuing our relationship with a network of Farming Systems Groups across southern NSW to collaborate on successful projects and share knowledge.
- Maintaining member services such as soil testing processing, equipment loan, newsletter, website, SMS alerts for events, weather station and soil monitoring equipment with seasonal outlook information included in the BOM Very Fast Break for Southern NSW
- 106ha of area under management agreements, 34ha for revegetation and 72.4 for protection and restoration completed with 15784 plants going in the ground.
- Commencing two year-long Prograze training groups
- Management of four field research sites, establishment of an additional two sites
- More than 109 one-on-one site visits with farmers
- Conducted or were a major presenter at 21 field days (live) and discussion groups, which directly engaged more than 442 people. Staff also attended and participated in over 90 other events run by other organisations for

networking and information gathering.

Holbrook Landcare currently provides employment for 3 full-time, 6 part-time and 1 casual staff across a wide range of areas of expertise.

PLANT PICK PLATE

The temperature is finally warming up so I am keeping a vigilant eye on the soil moisture of my potted plants as they are



drying out quicker than I anticipated.

While I can keep up with the larger pot requirements, it is the small 3 inch potted perennial cuttings I struck up several months ago that will not tolerate heat and will need to be up potted or planted into garden beds. Surprisingly they have survived, developing healthy roots and sprouting lush new leaves so protection from the heat is a priority.

The dwarf Buxus (European Box) cuttings I have taken from prunings over several years to create a low green border along my citrus grove must be one of the easiest plants to propagate. The younger I have planted in the ground between the older and bushier Buxus, now waiting for all plants to grow into a uniform height. Equally, easy to propagate are cuttings from my beloved Hydrangea. As I have minimal shaded areas in my garden, I have kept only one of my potted cuttings to place with its mother.

That is half of my small potted cuttings now in the ground. The Rosemary propagation are yet to be up potted into larger containers as a temporary move. Suited as a hedge or spot filler, I am yet to decide their permanent location. However, the Russian Sage featuring its tall purple spikes of flowers will feature in the front garden to expand on the cottage style of planting, accompanied by the lush African Daisies. All the Asteraceae family daisies lend themselves to propagation to create colourful enmass plantings. I love duplicating my favourite plants. The process acquiring knowledge, patience perseverance is garden therapy.







