Alligator Weed Surveillance: Recently HLN staff helped out on the Alligator Weed Surveillance on Mountain Creek coordinated by Greater Hume Council and NSW DPI.

The creek was extensively surveyed from the Station down to Fairburn Rd bridge. Unfortunately plants have been detected downstream of the township for the first time.

The plants have been marked and control program is in place.

NSW DPI are asking downstream landholder on the Mountain Creek to be aware and on the lookout for it – Alligator weed is a highly invasive weed that can choke waterways but also impact land on the floodplain. It is a Weed of National Significance and it must be eradicated.

LEST WE FORGET

Whilst I have researched and written my “Lest We Forget” articles, it was never difficult to find a Holbrook soldier’s name, his battalion or squadron’s number. I knew what colour eyes he had, his height, and what occupation he held when he enlisted. Rarely did I come across any newspaper clippings. I couldn’t tell you his reasons for joining up. Little could I find about his childhood. Who knew his hopes, fears, last thoughts, if any. Yes, he too laughed, and faced hardships, worked his fingers to the bone, and perhaps was not appreciated for his efforts.

Who can say he fully understood what was going on around him, understand what he’d gotten himself into? Did he wonder what difference, he, one man could make in all the madness of war? Perhaps he felt he had to do his bit, that joining up was the right thing to do. Or had he been tossed a white feather on the street? Who can say it was his choice?

For he who died, a memory lived on. However, for he who returned, why had he survived when those he loved as brothers were killed before his own eyes. Why did he live, and they did not? He had been occupied with war, but returning home, surely such thoughts were not far. What kept him alive? Mateship? Luck? Providence? What was the meaning of it all? Many he knew made the ultimate sacrifice. But perhaps those who paid the ultimate price *were not* those who shed their blood in death, but those who shed their tears in life. The mothers who waved their sons goodbye, and daughters too. The children who grew up with a father whose war did not end with a signature, or with the call to cease fire. Every memory was a battlefield in which each day he fought upon; some days he overcame, some days he did not.

He had returned home to a place where everything had changed, or was it that home was the same, and it was just he who had changed?



He returned to family, to friends who asked questions, who could not understand what he had gone through. No community, no home, no one, was left untouched by the cruel ways of war. None could return to the days before the war, but everybody had a choice of how to go on.

Little Billabong Cemetery

Through the efforts of Elin Humphries another headstone has been discovered at Little Billabong. James Walter Morley was a Rabbit-trapper on Hillside Station and reported missing, his death and that of Albert Martin about two weeks before [another rabbit trapper] had made the news all over Australia.

Sergeant Morris went searching for James Walter Morley and found a pea rifle with an empty shell, nearby a human skull and a thigh bone, around it Morley's 11 dogs lay around the bones that had been gnawed. About a fortnight before Constable Smith [Culcairn Police] went searching for Albert Martin missing on Thugga Station and found Martin's several savage stag hounds guarding a pea rifle, a hat with a hole in it, a shin bone and ribs.

Vegetable Week is a great way to garnish kids' excitement about vegetables and encourage healthy eating habits, which will carry into adulthood!



Thank you to Mrs Dionysius, our School Chaplain, for registering our school for this very fruitful cause. Over 14,000 NSW primary school children crunched their way through fruit and veg during this week.

Wonder Recycling Rewards for Schools: We have recently entered the Wonder Recycling Rewards for Schools program. This program has been created to collect and recycle bread bags at school and earn points to spend on sporting equipment for the school. We are asking all families, and community members, to help us fill four collection boxes by Friday, 7 July 2023.

All we need to do is:

PLANT PICK PLATE

It can sometimes be difficult to determine when certain fruits are ready to harvest in our home gardens.



While some are obvious, developing softer skins and changes in colour, others remain firm ripening after the pick. This is the conundrum I face with my aged Pomegranate. I have found very little written about this ancient tree and its unique fruit to guide me.

I know that you must harvest the fruit before it splits, but at what stage is this? I survey my Pomegranate from my window looking for a change of colour and I regularly examine the fruit closely, yet I still cannot gauge the correct time to harvest. However, I have read that harvesting is between February and May when the fruit is a deep orange/brown. In a hot and dry Mediterranean style climate the fruit will become a rosy pink or even red if the weather conditions are perfect. We have experienced a cooler and wetter summer than usual so the orange/brown colouring on the fruit is all I can expect. I cut a Pomegranate open. Rather than the ruby pearls clustered inside the tough thick skin, they were translucent. Just as juicy and succulent, but lacking in flavour and clearly not ripe.

The harvest may not be palatable this year so I will admire the Pomegranate tree for its structure and form. A small tree that would compliment most gardens but beware of the long needle sharp thorns. Apparently, it is highly adaptable to all but the coldest climates and the attractive, bright orange summer flowers pop against the small dark green leaves of this compact tree. The ruby pearls inside the fruit are unmistakable and highly sought in culinary dishes, described as "a flavour like nothing else". So true.

Passionate Gardener, June.

The best way to juice pomegranates is by pulsing the seeds in a blender just until the juice starts to separate from the seeds. Make sure that the inside seeds do not get crushed.


