
THE STORY BEHIND 'RESEARCH4RINEY'

Catherine 'Riney' Ross was just 28 years old when she was first diagnosed with stage 3 bowel cancer in October 2014. After many surgeries followed by months of chemo therapy and numerous other treatments, the cancer had spread to other organs. Catherine was eligible to undergo an immunotherapy T-cell trial at Peter MacCallum in Melbourne, which sadly was unsuccessful. However it is trials such as these that require much needed funds to continue the research, which in the future will have great outcomes for patients. Active treatment stopped working for Catherine in October last year and she sadly lost her $4\frac{1}{2}$ year battle to this insidious disease on 24^{th} January 2019, aged 32.

According to the Cancer Council of Australia, Bowel Cancer is the second most common cancer in both men and women in Australia. More and more of these people are under the age of 50.

Catherine was a very compassionate and giving person and always thought of others before herself. She was so positive in being proactive in raising awareness and was a great campaigner for: 'You Are Never Too Young'. Catherine was able to promote this through the media with various newspaper articles and radio interviews in and around the Geelong region.

'Research4Riney' is a fundraising body set up by Catherine & her husband Jamie Bell in 2017. Through various fundraisers, with the help



The Jodi Lee Foundation was set up in Adelaide by Nick Lee after his wife Jodi, lost her battle with bowel cancer at the age of 41 in 2010. Each year the foundation reaches millions of Australians through their national initiatives including Workplace Prevention Programs; campaigns like Trust Your Gut, major fundraising events such as The JLF Trek, PR and a powerful social media voice to raise awareness about bowel cancer.

The JLF mission is to empower people to take active steps to prevent bowel cancer and live healthy lives. This is achieved through a number of national initiatives that encourage Australians to screen regularly, know their family history, act quickly on symptoms and maintain a healthy lifestyle.

One of the many fundraising events is an 80km trek, which first started in SA with about 10 people! The treks are now being held in Victoria, QLD and Tasmania, ranging from 100 – 250 people participating.

This year's JLF Victorian Trek is being held around Daylesford and Hepburn on 5/6 September and is being dedicated in memory of Catherine. To date there are about 100 family and friends trekking in the 'Research4Riney' team! The registration fee goes towards organising and running a very well planned and safe event. Each participant is asked to fund raise for their specific number of km and this money goes directly to awareness and research.

The trek offers participants three distances, 80km over two days, 25km or 10km on the second day. Each distance is by no means 'a walk in the park'; it is challenging both physically and mentally. A timely reminder of the hurdles and pain that people with a terminal disease face every day.

A community event is being held in Holbrook, 'Don't Drop The Ball On Health' on Sunday 18th August at the Holbrook Sporting Complex starting at 11:00a.m. This event is supporting Bowel Cancer Australia, Albury/ Wodonga Regional Cancer Trust Fund, Research4Riney and Fight MND. Six hundred numbered tennis balls will be dropped from a helicopter onto the football oval to mark a winner! There will be great auction prizes, delicious food, drinks and kids activities. Another highlight will be the ice slide where we will see four very brave local identities slide into the icy water! The day promises to be a wonderful family outing where the community can come together, raise some money, raise awareness and most importantly think of the many individuals and families in our local area who are dealing with health issues at the present time.

Holbrook Meals on Wheels can help you to stay in your own home by ensuring that your meals make a positive contribution to your nutritional needs. We can support you to make informed menu choices to ensure you are getting a well-balanced meal, designed to nourish your body.

There is a great deal of scientific research that highlights the unique nutritional needs of older adults. Malnutrition can be a problem for older people living in the community for a range of reasons, including having a reduced appetite and/or illness. According to the National Meals Guidelines "It is estimated that 5-8% of older Australians living in the community are malnourished. An additional 35-39% are considered to be at high risk of malnutrition." Malnutrition can cause loss of muscle and loss of strength and mobility, increasing the risk of falls and fractures, also osteoporosis, slower wound healing, increasing the length of stays in hospital and, potentially, reducing an older person's ability to stay in their own home and contributing to premature death. It is much easier to prevent malnutrition than to treat it in older adults.



COOKING WEEK 4 THE YUMMIEST AND EASIEST POTATO & BACON SOUP

(repeated from last issue due to an error)

100g diced bacon

1 large onion, chopped

500g sweet potato, peeled and chopped

500g potato, peeled and chopped

2 Tbsp plain flour

1 Tbsp vegetable stock powder, blend with 5 cups hot water

2 cups thickened cream (if freezing some of soup use Carnation light & creamy milk

Spray a large saucepan with olive oil and allow to heat. Add the bacon and cook for 3-4 mins or until crispy, remove and set aside.

Add the onion and potatoes and sauté for 2-3 mins. Stir in the flour and then the stock, stirring until

combined. Cover and allow to simmer rapidly for 20 mins or until vegetables are tender.

Stir through the cream or carnation milk if using and most of the bacon.

Divide among serving bowls and sprinkle with remaining bacon.

Serve with crusty bread.

PLANT PICK PLATE

I have just heard the new age term "Microwave Gardener". A gardener who cannot wait for a plant to grow and prefer to purchase plants that are well advanced in their growth. For instance a bounty of herbs straight from the nursery to the kitchen ready to pick and plate immediately. Although this is obviously convenient, for me one of the joys of gardening is raising my edible seedling babies from seeds. A somewhat nurturing and meditative process that requires great patience and yes I do talk to them.

Growing my own seedlings allows me to plant heirloom varieties which are of excellent flavour with a soft fleshy texture that you just cannot buy. I eat the Mortgage Tomato and Lemon Cucumber fresh in a sandwich and also preserve in relish and pickles.

The ability to adjust the quantity of seedlings required is a bonus as I plant sweet basil throughout my garden to attract the beneficial insects like bees and deter the unwanted insects such as fruit fly and house flies. In the kitchen I use basil fresh in salads, add to tomato dishes and dry for use in the winter months.

Inspired? Do some research and germinate some seedlings now ready for October planting. Your babies will need to come inside while it is still cold. Recycle egg cartons and a clear plastic cover for the first stage of germination. Provide moisture, light and warmth. Transplant your growing babies into individual toilet rolls then liquid fertilise at half strength. Later plant straight into the garden. The roll will decompose and the roots will not be disturbed.

If you are a "Microwave Gardener" let the nursery do the job for you. The flavours will still be delicious and the growing process equally enjoyable. *Passionate gardener*. *June*




