

OPPORTUNITY TO TALK HEALTH IN HOLBROOK!

Murrumbidgee Primary Health Network (MPHN) is providing Holbrook an opportunity to share their stories about health in our region in an effort to learn more about what is working well, what can be improved and ideas to better support communities in addressing health needs.

MPHN will be visiting Holbrook, on Friday, 4 October between 10am and midday at The Ten Mile café on Albury Street as part of its annual Conversations on the Couch.

MPHN CEO Melissa Neal said Conversations on the Couch forms part of MPHN's yearly Health Needs Assessment.

"Each year we look at the various sources of information available to us about the health of our region including data and feedback from community, to help us identify any new or emerging needs for us to consider as we plan our activity for 2020 and beyond," Ms Neal said.

"We already know what data is telling us about the health needs of the Murrumbidgee and it's important for us to know and understand from locals what people are actually experiencing.

"This is the second year we are getting to our communities for Conversations on the Couch, which had some great in depth discussion with people about what is important to people about health, and how things could be improved

ART & GARDENS @ HOLBROOK

The Rotary Art Show and Open Gardens will showcase Holbrook and the wider community with a kaleidoscope of cultural activities and family entertainment.

Visitors from around the region are invited to enjoy Holbrook's gala occasion with friends and family at the weekend of October 12th and 13th. Experience what country artists are creating at the Rotary Art Show and enjoy the beauty of five open gardens in the countryside and town.

A start to the festivities will be the official opening of the Art Show on Friday 11th October at the Holbrook Hall, opening at 6.30pm. Catering on the night will include a selection of Pfeffer wines and a feast of fantastic finger food.

Family entertainment will include the markets, jumping castle and face painting on the Saturday at the Anglican Centre in Young Street; rides on the Miniature Railway around Ten Mile Creek; more than 250 works of art and photography at the Rotary Art Show in the Holbrook Hall; primary and secondary students' art from local and regional schools; five open gardens and free entry to the community garden.

Gardens open to the public include Jody and Rob Martin's 'North Billabong'; Pam and Neil Seymour's 'Braeside', Little Billabong; Heather and Phil Julian's 'Annandayle'; Michael Elvins and Ron Miller's Malabar Park; Chris and Troy Musgrave's 'The View' in Holbrook; and the Community Garden in Frampton Street.

Entry to the gardens will be \$5 per garden or \$25 for gardens and entry to the Art Show over two days. **Lunch** will be available at 'North Billabong' on Saturday October 12 catered by the Adult Horse Riding Group and lunch will be catered for by the Holbrook Hospital Auxiliary at 'Malabar Park' on

'The View' – Bardwell Street, Holbrook

A creative use of farming and shearing implements, wagon wheels and horseshoes give Troy and Chris Musgrave's garden a strong rustic appearance. Located close to the Ten Mile Creek, a highlight of the new section of the garden displays cast-iron shapes on the corrugated iron fence. An eclectic mix of bird baths and birdhouses, fishpond, rocks, the odd chandelier and candelabra are standouts among gardens of spring bulbs, Bearded and Dutch Irises, some 80 roses, and organic herbs.

Chris and Troy describe the front of the garden as a blend of natives and cottage garden shrubs and flowers – Crepe Myrtles, Bottlebrush, Wattles, Grevillia, Correas, Columbines, Love in the Mist, Salvias, Rosemary, Allspice, Borage and Comfrey to name a few. Flourishing Citrus and Fruit trees surround the raised vegetable gardens at the back of the property and their young trees include Japanese Elm, Maples, and Liquid Ambers.

Chris said the soil was heavy clay that she and Troy have built up with heaps of sheep, cow and chook manure and mulch.

'Malabar Park', 53 Malabar Road, Holbrook

'Malabar Park' is a work in progress on the banks of the Ten Mile Creek just east of Holbrook. Developed from a bare 12 acre paddock nearly 20 years ago, it now includes two orchards, a vegetable garden, chook yard, a dam with two islands plus large areas of natural bush with walking trails and pathways as well as many wombat holes.

Owners Michael Elvins and Ron Miller said the emphasis has been on growing plants requiring low water usage, sustainability with recognition of basis permaculture principles, nurturing native grasses and an interest in growing a wide variety of bush tucker and edible ornamentals. They welcome over 90 species of birds throughout the year, the occasional echidna and kangaroo and the wombats.



PLANT PICK PLATE

Spring has arrived. The birds are chirping, bees buzzing and bugs are munching. Yes already. I discovered a plump green caterpillar on my beautiful broccoli head which is a timely reminder to check my leafy greens regularly and pick off these little creatures.

Spring signifies a wake up from the winter hibernation for all sorts of bugs and pests. Apparently a solution of soy sauce and water under a plastic pot or bucket with ground access will attract earwigs which then drown. The same system with beer will control snails and slugs but I prefer a gumboot garden walk for the latter. However the main pest on my radar is the Queensland fruit fly which could attack this seasons fruit on my trees as well as the tomatoes and

capsicums. Although the latter are not planted yet and the trees are just budding into flower, the fruit fly will be emerging from the soil to start its life cycle. Gardeners need to start control



methods. If you had fruit fly last year, paint an insecticide on the lower trunk of the tree for a month. The most popular method are baits that you hang in the trees to capture the fruit fly. Make your own using a milk bottle with lid. Cut small U shaped openings in the top third of the bottle on 3 sides, folding the flaps back and hang with by the handle.

There are many recipes but this is the one I am using this year. Dissolve ½ cup sugar and 1 tspn vegemite into 1 It of hot water. Allow to cool before adding and mixing 1/2 tblsp Cloudy Ammonia (supermarket cleaning section), ½ tspn vanilla essence and 1 tspn dishwashing liquid. Quantity makes 3 - 5 traps, replace fortnightly.

In addition, after pollination, I will net my trees for additional protection and hopefully reap a bounty of fruit.

IAN SCOBIE DIES IN HOLBROOK AT 95

Stalwart of the Holbrook community for 67 years, Ian Scobie has died in the Holbrook Hospital at the age of 95. Ian arrived in the area to help a mate fight the 1952 bushfire and stayed. He married his wife, Robin, in Yackandandah in 1954 and is survived by her plus his five sons Graham, Duncan, Jim, Rob and Stuart.

Ian was born in the Broken Hill area in 1923 where his grandfather had been the State Member from 1901 to 1917. The family of ten children moved to Hanwood during the Depression before Ian signed up for the Merchant Navy in World War 2. After the War he attended Hawkesbury Agricultural College then assisted his brother, Walter, to establish a farm at Wantabadgery.


That placed him in reasonable proximity to the huge bushfire of 1952 which burnt from Holbrook to the coast. His first work was at Kildrummie Stud on the edge of town and from there he worked on Table Top Station and Woomargama Station before buying his own farm at Little Billabong in the

1960's. From the very beginning Ian was involved in the local community with him joining the RSL in 1952, serving at President for 25 years, becoming a Life Member in 1992 and also serving as a Board Member of the Holbrook RSL Club for 15 years. He was also granted Life Membership of a number of other organisations such as Billabong High Parents and Citizens and the Far South Western District Council of Parents and Citizens. He was instrumental in the establishment of Billabong High School in Culcairn.

Ian also served three terms on the Holbrook Shire Council including Shire President in 1970 and 1971. He was also heavily involved in various health organisations including Southern Riverina Health Council, Greater Murray Area Health Service Advisory Board and the Holbrook Older Men New Ideas group. He was awarded a Paul Harris Fellowship from Rotary plus an OAM.

His funeral will be at the Uniting Church in Albury Street, Holbrook, at 2pm on Monday 16th September and all members of the community are invited to attend.

The storage problems that we have had in the past are now behind us with the delivery of our storage container. Overall we have raised some more money for our new shed and we thank our supporters for that.




