P2 FACE MASK – SMOKE PROTECTION

Murrumbidgee Local Health District advises that NSW Health is distributing P2 masks to hospitals, multipurpose services, recovery and evacuation centres and pharmacies in fire affected areas.

Members of the public are able to obtain masks from recovery and evacuation centres and pharmacies.

These face masks may be helpful for people returning to their properties in burned areas or for people whose only option is to work outside.

Where ever possible, people should avoid smoke by staying indoors with the windows and doors shut and minimise vigorous exercise outdoors.

P2 masks can reduce the amount of smoke inhaled but will only do so if used properly and a good fit is achieved. Please ask when collecting if you are unsure how to fit it correctly.

P2 masks can make it more difficult for people with a pre-existing heart and/or lung condition to breathe. Please talk to your doctor to see if a P2 mask is suitable for you.

PLANT PICK PLATE

I recently came across a gardening book written by Don Burke published in 1984 titled "The Lazy Gardener". He noted quirky anecdotes and gardening advice throughout but the one that caught my eye related to his tips on landscaping your ¼ acre block. The clothes line was to be located front and centre in the backyard but near the backdoor, with the vegetable patch hidden at the back of the block preferably out of sight. My memory recalled this era and I imagined the vegies located behind the shed, beside the chook run and opposite the old dunny.

Thankfully due to the downsizing of the average house block in recent decades the clothes line has been pushed to the side and the vegetables elevated to within a few steps of the back door. Even the mobile chicken coups have brought the chooks to within a glance of the kitchen window and the dunnies are now non existent. Now that 2020 has arrived its time to rethink the position of the vegetable patch. Bring these beautiful plants to the front garden where their brilliant colours and strong structural forms show off your excellent gardening prowess and can be admired by passers by. Integrate flowers beside vegetables for added visual impact while also ensuring pollination and happy bees.

The next step in elevation of the vegetable patch is to the nature strip. Although this has been successful in some city councils as community projects, I don't think our neck of the woods are ready for or need the extra space provided by these verges. However, in the decades to come when the ¼ acre blocks could be split into 2 and sold off it would be beneficial to utilise this waste piece of land as a productive community or personal garden.

FUTURE OF HOLBROOK EARLY LEARNING CENTRE ASSURED

The Holbrook Early Learning Centre approached Greater Hume Council in December to take on the operations of the Holbrook centre as the task of operating the facility in the highly regulated and ever changing childcare industry had become increasingly difficult and the task of meeting all of its obligations too great for volunteers.

Jane Hayden, Branch Manager from the Department of Education stated that "The government's priority is to ensure that families have ongoing access to child care in Holbrook and we will continue financial support through the Community Child Care Fund irrespective of whether the child care operator is the Holbrook Early Learning Centre Incorporated or a new provider. My team will work with the Holbrook Early Learning Centre and any new provider to ensure regulatory processes are prioritised to support continued operation of the child care centre".

During January, Council commenced discussions with the Australian and New South Wales education departments to facilitate the transfer of operational approvals from Holbrook Early Learning Centre to Greater Hume Council. Council is progressing as quickly as possible on all of the requirements with both State and Federal Government to bring the centre under our Greater Hume Council Children Services as well as completing all of the necessary recruitment and planning required to get the centre up and running as soon as possible.





Every drop counts: Water usage set to rise as hot weather takes hold in southern Riverina

Riverina Water is urging the community to be vigilant and conserve water where possible as the scorching summer weather continues.

During the daylight savings period, sprinklers and irrigation systems are not to be used from 10am to 5pm. This is a permanent water conservation measure, which is followed by water restrictions if daily water usage reaches certain trigger points.

"Our region is extremely fortunate in that we have access to safe and reliable drinking water, through dams and groundwater," Riverina Water Chair, Councillor Greg Verdon, said.

"However, it does not mean we are immune to the ongoing drought and hot conditions.

"Water usage was higher than average in November at more than 1600 megalitres – about 300 megalitres • higher than the same period in 2018 and 2017.

"Water restrictions start when daily water usage exceeds 90 megalitres a day or 600 megalitres a week.

"I urge each of you to be mindful of your water usage, or water restrictions may come into force.

"Please adhere to the permanent water conservation measure and do not use sprinklers or irrigation systems from 10am to 5pm."

If water restrictions are implemented:

- ◆ The sprinkler ban will extend from 7am to 7pm
- Swimming pools can only be topped up and not filled from empty
- Hosing paved areas is not allowed
- Vehicles cannot be washed on hard surfaces

If water usage continues to exceed 90 megalitres a day, more stringent restrictions will be implemented.

Greater Hume Council is also encouraging local communities to remember the watering rule and be water wise as dry conditions continue to place pressure on the region's storages.

To assist the community to understand water usage, Council has a fact sheet which explains average water consumption in the kitchen, bathroom, laundry, garden and water consumption of livestock.

Top tips to help you be water wise in and around your home:

- Water your garden only between 5:00pm 10:00 am
- Avoid using water to hose down paths and driveways
- Check and fix leaks fix dripping taps, look for leaking toilets, check for leaks using your water meter
- Bathroom water savers keep showers to 4 minutes, install a water efficient shower head and use the half-flush on toilets, use the plug when shaving and turn off the tap when brushing your teeth
- In the laundry only use your washing machine when full and on eco mode, buy a water-efficient washing machine
- In the kitchen capture water from your tap, while waiting for water to warm up or washing vegetables, use it to water your garden or indoor plants, only use the dishwasher when full and on eco-mode, install aerating taps to reduce water flow by 50 percent.
- ◆ For the pool use a pool cover, check for pool leaks, consider shade options to reduce evaporation
- In the garden, install a rainwater tank, use greywater when safe and environmentally sustainable.
- By using mulch on the garden you can stop water evaporation by up to 70 percent. Minimise lawn area, choose plants and shrubs that are indigenous to our local area and suitable for our climate
- Construct paved areas so that they slope, and make use of water run-off
- ♦ Choose the right lawn, one with low water demand and high drought tolerance. Prepare the soil. Don't over water. Don't mow your lawn short, a taller lawn will shade the roots and reduce evaporation and require less watering.

Individually, following these water wise rules amount to a relatively small amount of water-saving, but when we combine our efforts the savings become significant, helping us to collectively make a significant difference.


