IPADS TO BE USED TO COMBAT SOCIAL ISOLATION FOR GREATER HUME SENIORS

Greater Hume Council was one of 24 organisations to receive funding to deliver innovative programs to help older people connect with each other, through online engagement or other methods that maintain social distancing. Grants were available for organisations to create programs that foster social inclusion for seniors.

Greater Hume Council will use the \$22,860 funding to purchase 30 Ipads to loan across the Council area to seniors who are aged 65 years and over, or 55 years and over for Aboriginal people.

The program to commence in July, will use the Ipads and communication technologies with the support of trained facilitators to encourage online interaction for people who are lonely or isolated living at home or in Age Care Facilities. Greater Hume Council will work with a number of service providers to deliver the program to a range of seniors throughout the shire.

The NSW Government has awarded more than \$700,000 in funding for projects that reduce social isolation for seniors during COVID-19. This includes \$100,000 from the Ministerial Advisory Council on Ageing (MACA) for projects that support their work plan. These grants aim to combat social isolation for seniors during COVID-19, while maintaining the current social distancing advice. It provided one-off grants for organisations to provide quality social connection opportunities for seniors.

AGEING WELL WITH VITALITY

The Vitality program is a free service offered to seniors to assist community members to age well. The program is funded by the Murrumbidgee Primary Health Network. The Vitality program involves individual sessions with a Physiotherapist, Dietitian and an Occupational Therapist. During these one on one sessions the clinicians will provide personalised advice on ways to improve physical, nutritional and cognitive reserve. By building these reserves the health research suggests that we can improve many signs related to ageing and prevent or halt frailty. The program has been operating within the Murrumbidgee region since 2016, over 1000 people have participated in the program. The University of Notre Dame in Wagga conducted an independent evaluation of the program which identified; the program had a significant positive impact on frailty scores suggesting, it achieves the aim of improving the ability of successful ageing. 87% of participants agreed it improved their quality of life 85% agreed their overall health improved 81% agreed it improved their physical health. In addition, participants have recently made the following comments about the program; "It's just wonderful for you. It makes you feel good" Dianne N. "It's so easy to do things now that the program made me aware" Ron T. "I can look at things a bit differently, and understand things a lot better" Paul G. "I didn't realise how important protein in my diet is to staying strong" Wendy M.

The program has some eligibility requirements such as being 65 years of age or older, or >55years of age for those of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island descent, and a referral from your GP is required to participate.

coloured with natural dyes. Nowadays, we can create the tangram puzzles from anything.





TRAVELLING TALES THROUGH HOLBROOK AT LADY GAIL'S BOOKSHOP & CURIOS

A lady and her husband drove through Holbrook on their way to a family wedding in Melbourne. They had passed my shop, nearly to the dual section, when she said to hubby, "Please turn around. I need to go to that bookshop!" "What for?", he said. Knowing she had one shot at an excuse, she says, "Some books for the grandchildren." His weak spot. Back they came. "Do you have a children's section?" As I am showing her, she spots a book. She starts telling me how as a child, she received this book, called Fairy Book For Christmas. It was her favourite. They lived in Albury then. Her father got a transfer with his job and by the end of the Christmas holidays they had moved to Sydney, her treasured book, never to be seen again. She reached out for the book she had spotted. She opens the book to a page where there is a fairy (not a coloured plate but a heavy black outlined picture that was the way in the 1960s). She snaps the book shut. I look at her face. She has gone deathly white. Slowly she opens the cover and hugs the book to her chest. Her maiden name Catherine A. was written there. When she saw the way the fairy was coloured in with crayons, she knew it was her book. It still gives me goose bumps.

BOOK REVIEW The Queen of Bloody Everything by

Joanna Nadin I really liked this book. You do need to read the blurb on back before you start it so you understand how the story is being told. As soon as I began, I felt I would really enjoy, as lots of laugh out loud moments, with an upbeat pace. I would love to spend a night out on the town with the author because you can tell she is very funny, witty (in a British Bridget Jones kind of way), a great writer and her love of Young Adult and Children's literature shines throughout the pages. The story does become a bit heavier the further along you read but I liked Dido, the main character a lot and wanted to keep reading, willing her to make good choices as the story follows her from 6 years old into her thirties. It is about Dido and her mother Edie, who move from London to an inherited house in suburban Essex. The family next door are exactly the kind of family

I have read mixed reviews, some not happy with the plot, some feeling it a bit contrived, some disliking certain characters, some loving them, so clearly, this book is not for everyone but definitely for me

ANGLICAN NEWS

People sometimes ask, "What does a Priest do?" Basically, a priest is responsible for nearly everything that happens in a parish which is a geographic area, but has no authority except for what happens in church services.

Using the pyramid structure, the priest is at the bottom of the pyramid, next is the community, then the church people, and at the top is the Parish Council. The priest is involved at all levels in the parish, especially with the Parish Council which is responsible for the management, decision making, finances and governance of the parish.

Priests have to; prepare church and other services, choose hymns, write sermons, organise the people involved, etc. Priests are a public figure representing the church and often attend and speak at public gatherings. They visit the hostels and hospitals and people who are in need of support.

A priest's ministry is to the whole community, not just the church and its people. Each year clergy must attend the A.G.M. of the Diocese, attend conferences and have a retreat time, meet regularly with their area boss the Archdeacon, ours is in Wagga Wagga, run a parish, etc. I often say "I have a ministry of many meetings."

We are also required to spend time in prayer, read the Bible, study, and reflect on their self-care. Love our spouse and children and support them, and have a personal interest that has nothing to do with the daily grind (motorcycles for me), have one day a week off, and take four weeks annual leave, and so on. Ministry is complex and you have to be well organized, disciplined and committed to the calling remembering, "it is not about me, it is about inviting people to love the one who loves me, i.e. Jesus Christ." A Joke goes: "Being a Christian does not pay well, but the superannuation is out of this world."

Council resolved to submit to Department of Emergency Services Levy. A tender for flood mitigation investigation and design works was accepted for the townships of Jindera and Walla Walla totalling \$109,845 (excl GST) was accepted. It is expected that the project will take 12 months to complete, and once completed Council will be then eligible to apply for grant assistance to implement improvements to drainage infrastructure to reduce future flooding in those towns.

In relation to relaxation of restrictions due to COVID-19, at this stage all Council services have resumed with the exception of use of public access computers at libraries and mobile library services.

All other facilities may be open with restrictions and if in doubt please contact Council.

Under the COVID-19 Local Government Economic Stimulus Package, Greater Hume is eligible to take up


the grant of \$199,988 to offset the increase in the Council did, however, resolve to complain to the Office of Local Government with regard to the requirement that councils remain a part of the joint organization (JO's) for a period of two years in order to be eligible for

We can support you to make informed menu choices to ensure you are getting a well-balanced meal, designed to nourish your body, assist you to attend appointments and assist with shopping. Our meal service is government subsided for eligible participants; for example, a My Chef large meal will cost on average \$7.00, petite meals from \$4.70, desserts \$3.00 and soup from \$2.50.

Shopping support is available either accompanied or unaccompanied locally or to larger centres if required. Assistance to attend appointments is also available. Social distancing is being practiced and we are regularly cleaning and disinfecting our office and vehicles so that we all remain safe and well.

Nutrition: There is a great deal of scientific research that highlights the unique nutritional needs of older adults. Malnutrition can be a problem for older people living in the community for a range of reasons, including having a reduced appetite and/or illness. According to the National Meals Guidelines "It is estimated that 5-8% of older Australians living in the community are malnourished. An additional 35-39% are considered to be at high risk of malnutrition." Malnutrition can cause loss of muscle and loss of strength and mobility, increasing the risk of falls and fractures, also osteoporosis, slower wound healing, increasing the length of stays in hospital and, potentially, reducing an older person's ability to stay in their own home and contributing to premature death. It is much easier to prevent malnutrition than to treat it in older adults.

The Covid-19 pandemic is far from over, remember to stay home as much as possible but don't forget to use your body and exercise if you are able. The provision of a meal each day can be an enabler that can improve opportunities for increased participation in life's other roles, such as meeting friends or engaging in activities. Home delivered

meals also have the added advantages of providing an opportunity for social interaction and the potential to monitor a person's health and well-being – they are 'More than Just a Meal"!

My wife is really mad at the fact that I have no sense of direction. So I packed up my stuff and right.

PLANT PICK PLATE

Some of the easiest plants to grow are cactus and succulents which are native to the hot dry arid and humid tropical regions of the world. However, they have adapted to cooler and wetter temperate areas although cold winters like ours will kill them if left exposed.

I have placed my larger succulents, the Agave, Aeonium, Jelly Bean and others in my small hot house to keep them protected and happy over winter.

The young Curry Plant and Lemongrass are also there and love the humidity provided by the plastic enclosure.

A few months ago I brought my Crab Claw cactus inside for warmth and positioned it in morning sun with all day light. Surprisingly, the plant thought it was in it's native Brazil and immediately produced flower buds on each of its hanging claw arms, emerging into beautiful elongated salmon pink flowers. Short lived but stunning while they lasted.


Likewise, the Carrion cactus also living in my hot house thought it was in it's native South Africa producing a single speckled purple and lime green 5 pointed flower at the tip of a purple arm. Again beautiful and short lived.

Obviously, weather protection is a must for these varied and unusual plant groups so my inside Crab Claw has been joined by two friends, a newly potted Jelly Bean and an Aloe pup which have both developed roots rather quickly. There is a danger of over watering during the winter therefore keep the soil on the dry side to avoid root rot.

Researching the names and origins of my collection of Cactus and Succulents has been enlightening and fascinating, discovering the unique single and multi flowers produced by each plant family when given the prefect growing conditions.

In our climate we can only try to imitate this.






HOLBROOK SHOW SOCIETY NEWS


In spite of the lack of events and meetings, all has not been completely quiet with the Holbrook Show Society. We have had to put our AGM on hold for the moment until we can get together for a meeting but have been applying for quite a few different grants, with the aim of improving the facilities at the Sporting Complex.

So far, we have been partly successful with funding through the NSW Govt's Showgrounds Stimulus Funding. This funding is for electrical upgrades in all of the livestock sheds. Work began on this last week and the upgraded lighting and power will greatly improve safety in these buildings, while also providing us with the capacity to operate equipment such as cattle blowers during shows. We were also fortunate to secure some Drought Resilience Funding, in conjunction with the Holbrook Football Club, to be used for a community social afternoon later in the year. When we are in a better position to set dates for this event we will let everyone know what is being organized. Several other funding applications have been lodged which will assist with a variety of other infrastructure improvements, however the results of these have not vet been announced. We are waiting and hoping that we will be able to continue to build on what is currently available so that additional users and activities can be attracted to Holbrook.


