Greater Hume Citizen of the Year - Murray Jones

In 2020 Murray took in 150 head of cattle and four different peoples' horses during the bushfires, delivered the last of the Holbrook Rotary hay to fire victims at Batlow, worked around Covid 19 distancing and associated restrictions at the Jingellic Hub to assist fire affected people and assisted with a grant application for a sculpture at their showground entrance.

Murray's contribution during this time is revealing of his caring attitude towards our rural communities and their people.

Murray has been involved in many events and community service in Holbrook and further afield and has fostered many community projects. Well known for his love of all things motorcycle, Murray has had strong involvement in areas of youth, sport, motorcycles, bushfires, and Rotary.

He was part of the committee that built the extension to the Holbrook Pre-School, Cub leader in Holbrook for over 10 years, and instigated and ran Kanga Cricket (with Peter

Hogan). Murray is involved in the Holbrook Motorcycle Sports Club (life member) and developed the successful Riverina Interclub series covering disciplines of Dirt track, Motorcross, and Enduro, involving clubs from areas of the Riverina and beyond and is the driving force behind the Cookardinia Vinduro event. Murray received an award from the Motorcycling NSW for services to the motorcycling community. Murray organised a trail ride to raise funds for a Holbrook Bike Club member who is a tetraplegic, at Talbingo raising \$8000.

In 2019 Murray was recognised with an award for 40 years of service with the Rural Fire Service. He is a committee member of the Holbrook Football club, the Holbrook Boating and Angling Club, the Billabong Native Fish Restocking Group.

As the Rotary Club of Holbrook's Community Service Director, he initiated the white good and waste pick-up in Holbrook in 2018 and 2019. He assisted to build a chook yard for residents of the Holbrook Aged Care hostel, co-ordinated the painting and maintenance of the pergola at the Harry Jarvis Wing of the Holbrook Hospital and undertook dismantling a shed for a bereaved resident. He is always available to help at Rotary's many catering events and wields a mean pair of tongs over the barbecue plates.

Murray is strongly supported by his family who are often part of the organising team or workforce for his various projects.

In 2020 he was presented with Rotary International's Paul Harris Fellow for his terrific community work at the Holbrook Club. In the past 2 years he has organised some adventure 4- wheel drive days around the Upper Murray and Woomargama National Forest and on Australia Day 2021 he organised a fundraising Poker Run for bikes and cars starting and finishing at Holbrook.

Holbrook Lions Club Citizen of the Year - Margot Pitzen

Margot is well known as an active community minded person. As a real estate agent, she is one of the first to welcome new residents to the Holbrook region. Her ability to multi-task is apparent with the many different caps she wears. This mum of three spent a number of years in the Lions Club, actively involved in the P&C at Holbrook Public School, a Phys Ed Teacher & Fitness Trainer. Often giving her time freely to support people to reach fitness goals & improve their quality of life. Margot has mentored several up & coming fitness trainers in our community, willingly supporting them with her extensive knowledge as they gain their qualifications. With voluntary roles on raceday, MC'ing charity events, pre-season training sessions & co-ordinating donations for those in need. During the 2020 fires, Margot was instrumental in helping co-ordinate a team of people catering for fire fighters. Always there to assist with the Triathlon, but recently stepping into the main role, we know George would be grateful to see the Holbrook Triathlon continue on. But if you're looking for her, you'll probably find her at the pool. She simply says "The most important thing is that kids have the opportunity to learn to swim, and parents take it."

Margot is an extremely generous person who is always willing to drop everything to help others. Whether it is delivering food, flowers or support for those going through difficult times. She does many things for many people that most of us don't know about.

At community events she is generally volunteering somewhere. There is always time for others in Margot's world. She is a great community person who is generally at the forefront giving to individuals and the community in general. If you ask her about an idea or something that needs to be done her answer is always, "We can make that happen".

Margot responded humbly and concluded by saying "Volunteering your time in a small community is necessary & satisfying, but volunteering your skills gives you opportunity to change the way people think & behave by inspiring them & persuading them to consider something they've never considered before.





Daniel showed many qualities good during the Green Valley Bushfire near Albury in early 2020. The crews had various fires spot iump containment lines at around 10pm the Cockatoo on Trail in the Woomargama National Park. Daniel reluctantly left the Group Captain at the spot over and drove

along the fire line in a Cat 9 to go and retrieve the new crews and direct them to where they were needed. During his time in the RFS he has learnt the priceless value of human life and the pain when it is lost and to give compassion where it is needed. Daniel's good communication skills were shown on the second day of the Green Valley fire, he was regularly on the radio to Firecom giving them hourly weather reports, when the Group Captain was otherwise occupied. He also provided situation reports of the fires activity when the fire broke out. With crews assisting from around Australia co-operation was needed even though he hadn't worked with these crews before.

He has the qualities of commitment, reliability, open mindedness, positivity and optimism. Daniel used his problem solving skills at the build a bridge and get over it program at the Borambola Sport and Recreation Facility. The program is funded by REROC and the local councils and gives potential civil engineers the opportunity in high school to attend the camp and build a model bridge using craft items on a piece of cardboard. Daniel has always been one that enjoys serving the community to the best of his ability. Daniel has been a member of the Rural Fire Service since he was 12. He has volunteered on behalf of Billabong High School for the Culcairn Aged Care Home, Culcairn Primary School and Culcairn Pre-school. He has played football for the Holbrook Football Club and Bgrade cricket for the Holbrook Cricket Club and is a junior player at the Rosewood Cricket Club. When his mum was a member of the Country Women's Association he would help at bull and clearing sales with catering. Daniel currently works at Holbrook IGA as a shop assistant and is fairly well known amongst its customers

ANGLICAN NEWS

Everyone has faith, but what is faith? St Paul wrote in the Book of Hebrews chapter 11, verse 1, that; "Faith is believing that something is real, and that you have it, even though it has not arrived yet." Faith is like ordering something on line, or ordering your groceries to be home delivered. "You ordered the groceries, you believe that they are on their way, but they have not arrived yet." Faith requires you to believe and trust in people to do the right thing, e.g., that when you turn the water tap on water will come out.

I enjoy having discussions about God. For example, people often say to me, "I do not believe in God, or that I am an agnostic." Faith and belief go together like the cracker and cheese ad on TV says, "You can't have one without the other." An atheist believes, that they do not believe in God, and I think that take a lot of faith? An agnostic hopes there is a god, but would not recognize that god if they met it, that also takes a lot of faith.

PLANT PICK PLATE

Summer is the season of the Barbeque. There is nothing better than relaxing in the warm evenings with a glass of wine while HE does the cooking. Like so many other pursuits in life, if you learn it you will be expected to do it. I am thinking back here specifically to



shearing, crutching and chainsawing all of which I refused to even try. I am perfectly happy to let the BBQ be the domain of the male.

Even more enjoyable is to harvest the vegetables from your garden then cook whatever you have. So fresh and flavoursome.

My garden has a bounty of varied produce at present. Carrot, zucchini and egg plant can be sliced lengthwise. A capsicum can be quartered, seeds removed, while sweet corn cobs char beautifully whole. Halved large tomatoes seasoned with chopped fresh basil and black pepper can be placed on the grill towards the end of cooking along with the delightful baby cos lettuce cut in half lengthwise, drizzled with olive oil and charred flat side down until just warm. So good.

Accompany all these delicious vegetables with your favourite meat, or not, for an appetising meal. I prepare a sauce to drizzle over using my home made chilli infused passata sauce to which I add a dash of Worcestershire sauce, a little sugar and a squirt of lemon or lime for zing. Of course cheese is always a great accompaniment to vegetables. Crumbled fetta or shaved parmesian dispersed on top provides a salty contrast then chopped spring onion for crunch.

Picture, I, relaxing back, feet up with a glass in my hand enjoying the summer evening (swatting the flies) while HE the BBQ king cooks. I would have it no other way.




What a remarkably different start to school this year than last year. Last year we sweltered through a heatwave and this year we have been blessed with a cooler change and guite a bit of rain to boot.


B Grade Rd 10: Holbrook travelled to Walla & came away with a much needed win.

LED STREETLIGHT PROJECT TO PROVIDE LONG-TERM BENEFITS

Work to upgrade more than 863 streetlights to energy **efficient technology is nearing completion** as part of a major energy efficiency project that will save hundreds of thousands in electricity bills and reduce greenhouse gas emissions for the ratepayers of Greater Hume Council.

The switch to LED technology is seeing a 213 MWh per year reduction in power use, delivering savings of approximately \$67,000 each year in maintenance and electricity costs.

Director of Engineering, Greg Blackie, said Greater Hume Council was committed to becoming more sustainable, and the LED upgrade is just one initiative in Council's strategies to achieve energy and operational efficiencies in the next 10 years.

"Streetlighting is a significant expense for Council, costing around \$150,000 each year, and with more than 863 streetlights across Council's footprint, the upgrade will go a long way to reducing costs and providing significant long-term savings," said Mr Blackie.

"LEDs are far more energy efficient, require less maintenance and have a significantly longer life." Mr Blackie said LED streetlights consuming around 17 watts each will replace existing highenergy lights consuming between 50 and 100 watts. "Council is investing approximately \$434,000 to complete the bulk upgrade, with the costs expected to be recouped within a period of 6 years."

Essential Energy streetlight manager Adele Finch said the organisation continues to work closely with councils across its distribution area and is committed to providing information and services that are appropriate to Councils' needs and those of the communities they serve. Miss Finch acknowledged the valuable input from the Southern Lights NSW Project, whose partners are working closely with Essential Energy to ensure the successful delivery of the project.

"Public lighting plays an important role in providing safe, secure and attractive public areas for both pedestrians and motorists."

"The new LED streetlighting for Council will not only provide a more reliable, better quality lighting service, but will deliver savings of more than 50 per cent in energy consumption.

"This type of light also provides future potential for other 'smart' applications to be added and will allow Essential Energy to more effectively manage the streetlight network and respond more promptly to potential outages," Miss Finch said.


