COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAMPIONS

Member for Albury Justin Clancy was delighted to recognise Mary Hoodless and Holbrook Rotarian Kerry Morton with Community Service Awards on behalf of the NSW Government.

The presentation took place at the Rotary Club of Holbrook's dinner meeting at the RS Club a fortnight ago.

"Both Mary and Kerry are champions of service in their community particularly during and in the aftermath of the bushfires at the start of 2020," Mr Clancy said.

Mary has been a tireless crusader for her community especially advocating for bushfire recovery and health. She is a Jingellic Rural Fire Service volunteer and Jingellic emergency welfare centre's community safety officer and co-ordinator of the town's recovery committee.

Right through the catastrophe they had no mobile phone communication and had to go door to door to pass on urgent messages. At the same time, the community was experiencing ongoing power outages although Essential Energy kept the community abreast of the situation.

As the community safety officer, Mary was responsible for knowing where their vulnerable residents were and getting them safely relocated. She told the Royal Commission into Bushfires of the need for cross border liaison between the RFS and the CFA during disasters — it has been the same for 35 years and a common communication platform should have been established earlier.

During the same fires, Kerry helped set up and run a bushfire staging hub at Holbrook which mobilised Rotarians and a team of volunteers to feed firefighters and displaced families. Kerry says, "volunteering is my passion," and is keen to step up when there is a need. She has been a Rotarian for 12 years; leading the way in establishing a peace pole at the Ten Mile Creek Gardens. She worked with Riverina Water, Greater Hume Shire Council and other Rotarians on the installation of water bubblers in Holbrook's main street and submarine precinct.

BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION FOR MRS GUNDULA HOLBROOK

Gundula Holbrook is the widow of Norman Holbrook and celebrated her 106^{th} Birthday on 1^{st} November 2020. She was born in Austria in 1914. She married Norman Holbrook in 1952, and the couple lived in England until his death in 1976. At some time after that, Gundula returned to Austria, and is now her village's oldest resident.

Her incredible generosity to the town of Holbrook, first visited in 1956, has been the impetus behind the HMAS OTWAY casing and the Submarine Museum happening in Germanton Park. Gundula last visited in 1997, when a Dedication Ceremony/Freedom of Entry was held after HMAS OTWAY was installed in the park. Gundula always remembers the town and the museum



receives a Christmas card every year. The museum runs a hologram with "Gundula" telling the story of Commander Holbrook's submarine B11 in the Dardanelles.



He also later served on the Western Front and was twice further decorated for his bravery.

My great, great grandfather and his brother built a house on a farm out the Culcairn road, it was named after Albert Jacka which was around the time he received the Victorian Cross. Later, my great grandfather and great grandmother lived there and now my pop and nan still live there today. The name is still known as JACKA.'



LEST WE FORGET – JOHN E. TONER

Private John Toner of Holbrook, was twenty-eight when he enlisted in July 1940. In November that year, he was posted to the 2/29th Australian Infantry Battalion, which had just been formed the month before. When Toner along with his battalion had finished their initial training in Victoria, they sailed with the rest of their brigade to Singapore, arriving in August 1941. In the second week of September, the 2/29th travelled to Malaya, where they continued their training.

Japanese forces landed in Thailand and Northern Malaya, on the 7th December, the day Pearl Harbour was attacked. By mid-January 1942, they had advanced to the Muar River, which was defended by an Indian brigade. The 2/29th and the 2/19th Battalions were sent there as reinforcements, arriving on the 17th January. The Japanese attacked the next day, marking the start of the Battle of Muar, the last major battle of the Malayan Campaign during the Second World War, lasting eight days.

The Australian-Indian force struck fierce fighting with the Japanese outflanking them. They did make progress, but with its ammunition exhausted, casualties increasing, and no chance of relief, the combined Australian-Indian force had to withdraw.

Approximately 40 Indians and 110 Australians that were wounded including Toner had to be left behind. They were rounded up by the Japanese and forced to surrender. The men, now Prisoners of War were beaten, tormented and denied food, water and medical attention. At sunset on the 22nd January 1942, the men all except a few who had escaped, were brutally massacred by the Japanese. Private Toner among them, was later buried at Kranji War Cemetery, Singapore.

PORTABLE DEVICE – MOW COVID CONNECTIONS

Did you know your iPad is portable?

Compared to older desktop computers, portable means you are not limited to where or when you can use your iPad or the need to have it set up in a permanent spot in your home. You could enjoy the lovely days we have been having and sit outside whilst on your device. You could bring it with you on outings and take photos along the way. Even message your family or friends when waiting for appointments.

Your iPad has its own battery supply using a lithiumion battery that can last for up to a week depending on how much you use it. The battery icon will display a percentage or coloured area that gives you an indication as to how much is left. Just keep note of when you do plug it in to charge that the little lightning bolt is in the middle of your battery icon. This means it is correctly attached and charging. If your battery fully drains it may take a minute or two before it will light up again on charge, which means you will need to give it 10 minutes before using it again, it can be used whilst plugged in and charging, which is handy if you are in the middle of a video call or game and it is running out.

IPads can be used online by linking to Wi-Fi or mobile data. Meals on Wheels iPads being used locally have their own mobile data sim cards, this allows those who do not have access to the internet to link up and connect with others from the comfort of their own home. When they are out and about the sim card makes the device mobile, just like a mobile phone, permitting the use of the internet, messages and video calls whilst on the move.


