Easter eggs, also called **Paschal eggs**, are eggs that are sometimes decorated. They are usually used as gifts on the occasion of Easter. As such, Easter eggs are common during the season of Eastertide (Easter season). The oldest tradition is to use dyed and painted chicken eggs, but a modern custom is to substitute chocolate eggs wrapped in coloured foil, hand-carved wooden eggs, or plastic eggs filled with confectionery such as chocolate. However, real eggs continue to be used in Central and Eastern European tradition.

Although eggs, in general, were a traditional symbol of fertility and rebirth, in Christianity, for the celebration of Eastertide, Easter eggs symbolize the empty tomb of Jesus, from which Jesus resurrected. In addition, one ancient tradition was the staining of Easter eggs with the colour red "in memory of the blood of Christ, shed at that time of his crucifixion."

This custom of the Easter egg, according to many sources, can be traced to early Christians of Mesopotamia, and from there it spread into Eastern Europe and Siberia through the Orthodox Churches, and later into Europe through the Catholic and Protestant Churches. Other sources maintain that the custom arose in western Europe during the Middle Ages as a result of the fact that Western Christians were prohibited from eating eggs during Lent, but were allowed to eat them when Easter arrived.

Alma Klein, local Jindera resident, celebrates 100 years!!!



Alma Mary Klein, born March 21, 1921 in Laidley Hospital - her farming family lived in Ropeley East, a locale near to Gatton in SE Queensland.

Her heritage is very strongly German and the Lutheran church featured strongly in her upbringing. Her memory spans her family having the first car in their district ('the Essex' - it had roll up blinds instead of windows, the landing of man on the moon, using an iPad to FaceTime during Covid Lockdowns ... and everything in between.

She is the 'middle' child of 7 in a close-knit family and her mother had difficulty imagining partners good enough for any of her daughters! A pen pal friendship with a young soldier serving in New Guinea seem innocuous enough so was allowed. A meeting on the railway platform in Toowoomba between the young soldier and his 'Rosebud' proved fatal to her mother's desire to keep her middle daughter home.

So ... Alma moved south with her 'rich southern grazier' (huh!) husband in 1949.

Her honeymoon was the 2 week bus trip from Ropeley to Jindera, taking in the Blue Mountains.

She settled in with her newly acquired extended family in Jindera and formed her own family unit with Albert Klein and their 2 sons and 2 daughters.

Life centred around the large Klein extended family, the farm and the local Lutheran Church and Lutheran school. During those decades she was a prolific letter writer, never missing a single week posting letters to her parents and siblings.

She maintains she never missed Queensland but sorely missed her family - the letters and parcels going back and forth over those years kept the family connection



strong into the next generations. She wrote weekly to her children while at boarding school in Melbourne and those letters were eagerly awaited, arriving on the same day every week over a 12 year period.

She devoured books, sewed (her childhood wish was to be a sewing teacher) and cooked (scones, kuchen and donuts live in memories).

Trips 'home' to Qld were rare but regular and lengthy (usually 6 weeks when kids prescribed schoolwork was completed in the first couple days leaving them to run barefoot all winter while she and Albert simply enjoyed family visits, gossips and card playing). Adventures over 1000s of kilometers of dirt road with tantalising treats waiting at the other end. Sacks of fresh peanuts, sweet potatoes and home smoked German Wurst (oh especially the Wurst) filled the car boot for the return to Jindera over those dirt roads

These visits increased in frequency and length until, in retirement, 3 months every winter was spent with Qld family!

Years were reassuringly peaceful with just enough drama to keep Alma and Albert on their toes.

Children left school, moved, married, un-married, grandchildren (9) arrived and suddenly great grandchildren followed (all 14 of them).

Alma never left Jindera, enjoying the close fellowship of the 12 Klein sisters-in-law, a friendship that exists to this day. Her memory has never lost those wonderful people.

The Queensland connections remains strong with multiple birthday greetings arriving from each of her sibling's families. She is their 'Auntie Al'.

Alma was absorbed into the community of Jindera Gardens hostel in 2008, making and remaking friends there over the following years. She has enjoyed the fellowship and is thankful for the unbelievable care and love that is extended to her by both staff and residents.

Her advice re making the century

2021 ANZAC DAY DAWN SERVICE CANCELLED




We are excited that one of the towns long standing





Highlights from meeting held in March at Holbrook.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, Council currently permits 10 people to attend the public gallery. Meetings are recorded and available for viewing on Council's website <u>https://bit.ly/35uKFxX</u> Council will continue to hold the monthly meetings at Holbrook Library Complex.

Business dealt with at the meeting included:

Council resolved to forward a planning proposal to activate changes to the Greater Hume Local Environmental Plan 2012, which will result in changes to zoning and minimum lot sizes for four parcels of land at Culcairn.

Council resolved to reconsider projects which had been identified for funding under the fixed development consent levy development contributions.

Council consented for an intensive livestock (sheep feedlot) at Humpreys Road, Bungowannah subject to 19 conditions of consent.

Council resolved in accordance with the Greater Hume Community Participation Plan to place the draft Jindera Residential Land Use Strategy on public exhibition for 28 days.

Council resolved to continue to detail the unrestricted cash line in its financial reporting and that Council write to the Office of Local Government expressing its objection to the removal of the line from the financial statements.

Council will provide public notice of its intention to lease a small public road reserve (out the front of) the Woomargama Hotel and subject to no objections, enter into a 5 year li-

cence with the licensee of the hotel.

Council will undertake shared footpath projects in Urana Street, Jindera and McBean Street, Culcairn, and footpath and kerb and channel in Jindera Street, Jindera and that all landowners be notified of the amount of their contribution to the projects.


Council accepted an extension of works to Stage 1 Drainage Work at Gerogery, in order to complete the drainage works on the western side of Main Street. The tender amount was \$117,125 (ex GST) with the current contractor being awarded the additional works.



Highlights from meeting held in February at Holbrook.

Council will continue to hold the monthly meetings at Holbrook Library Complex.

Business dealt with at the meeting included:

Council recognised through a mayoral minute the passing of Mrs Gundula Holbrook and Cr Lilliane Brady OAM.

Council resolved to recognise the loss of amenity of "Receptors" and acknowledge loss of Prime Agricultural Lands as significant aspects in consideration of determination of the Culcairn Solar Farm development before the IPC on that occasion in coming weeks.

The General Manager has been asked to present a detailed report on financial support provided by Council to medical practitioners located in Greater Hume currently and over past years at a future meeting.

Council approved a change of use and partial demolition of a metal fabrication and retail display of manufactured goods business in Holbrook.

Council approved a development application for Extractive Industry at Wantagong.

Council refused a development application for subdivision at Henty.

Mr Peter O'Dwyer was selected as Council's appointee with planning expertise and Cr O'Neill was nominated as its Councillor representative on the Southern Regional Planning Panel.

Council received and noted the 2017/2022 Delivery Plan and 2020/2021 Operational Plan review report to 31 December 2020 and

approved the Interim Budget Review as at 31 December 2020.

The Gilchrist Property Group was endorsed as the preferred tenderer of the proposed Multipurpose Sports Facility at Holbrook.

Council authorised the Mayor and General Manager to affect the road closure and subsequent sale of the unused section of Nation Road to the applicant.

Council did not authorise the road closure and subsequent sale of the unused section of road at Culcairn.

Jindera Pony Club has been granted a further 5 year term with an option to renew on Reserve 94491 commencing 1 January 2021.

A number of local sporting clubs will be donated the loam lifted from oval refurbishments at Culcairn, Henty, Holbrook and Jindera.

Council resolved to authorise the General Manager to complete the acquisition of 124 Albury Street, Holbrook. A further report will be submitted to Council on future uses of the site once rehabilitated.




