JINDERERA HIT BY RANDOM ACTS OF KINDNESS

The local community was shocked after the Jindera petrol station became listed as a venue of Covid concern. Many residents responded quickly to this news and got tested at a mobile site set up in Jindera Oval.

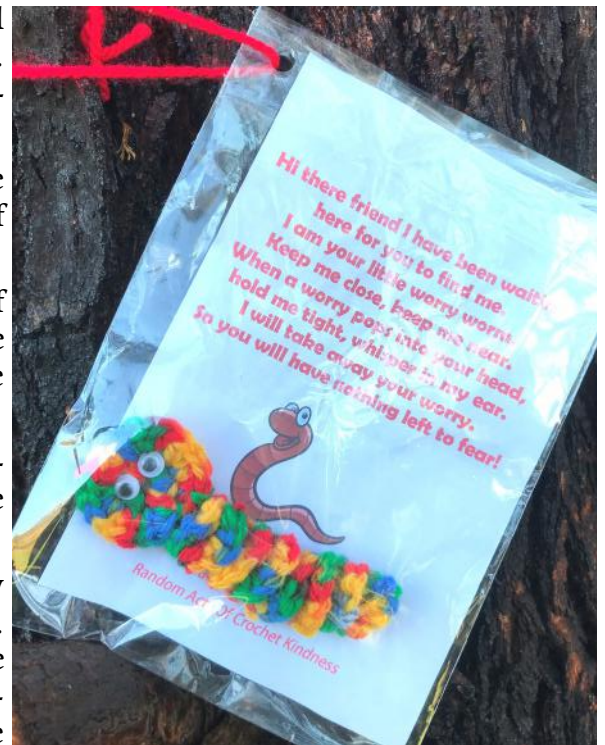
But it seems that a few residents have taken the event one step further and begun implementing 'random acts of kindness' in the community.

A 'random act of kindness' is a spontaneous gesture of goodwill towards someone or something. It can take the form of anything, from kind words to actions that make a difference to someone else.

These people have recognised how worrying and disruptive a Covid scare can be to our community and have started doing something about it.

There are reports of people finding 'crocheted worry worms' in the parks and recreation areas around Jindera. These are crochet works created by someone who has gone out of their way to provide something to make another person smile. The idea being that if you find them, then these 'worry worms' comfort your worries.

Other people have found random acts of poetry posted around the area. This is where someone has taken the message of a poet and pasted words to warm the hearts of the person who finds it. Words such as "When travelling on life's roadway. You may meet a weaker man, Make their journey brighter, by helping when you can." Such poems have begun appearing around bus stops, playgrounds, and open spaces in Jindera.

There are also reports of kids finding painting rocks with emojis and playing hide and seek to find them in the parks and playground.

Judy McLeod a social work academic at Charles Sturt University said: "Its heartening to see people in the community get out and support others in times of uncertainty. I am sure these things will bring lots of pleasure and happy smiles to the worried residents of Jindera. How often do we take time to take care of others or even do something nice for yourself. I congratulate whoever is doing this"

International Mud Day

Mud, mud glorious **MUD**. On Tuesday the 29th of June our educators and children got involved in International mud day, a day aimed at celebrating being outdoors and connecting with the natural environment.

A day for getting dirty, messy and grubby. There is nothing quite like splashing in muddy puddles or squelching thick, gooey mud through your fingers or toes.

Mud play is all about **FUN**, but as with anything we do in early childhood education there is learning through play. Mud play engages all the senses and builds on children's creativity. It's an opportunity for open ended, unstructured outdoor nature play. There are no rules to follow, no expectations, no finished product, meaning there is no right or wrong way to play or engage.



Mud play encourages increased movement and physical activity, helping to maintain a healthy lifestyle and research has shown that outdoor play reduces stress and anxiety in children. So, I think it's safe to say that **MUD** makes you **HAPPY**.

Educators observed children testing theories and experimenting in the mud kitchen, pouring and mixing, looking at volume and measurement, discovering and developing an understanding of maths and science.

Such a simple activity can bring so much joy and we have loved seeing our educators out and about in their communities, all getting involved in their own way.

70 YEARS of JINDERA RED CROSS BRANCH

A Public Meeting was called by Mr. G. Nation and chaired by Councillor Wally Briese and held in the School of Arts Hall on 27th October 1939. The meeting was well attended with about 50 people present.

Councillor Briese informed the gathering the object of the meeting was, namely, to **form a Branch of Red Cross in Jindera.**

Councillor Briese was voted Chairman, and Mr. C.J. Bunker, a local school teacher at the time, was appointed Minute Secretary for the meeting.

It was decided that a Jindera Branch of the Australian Red Cross Society be formed by the motion of Mr. A. Eckermann and Mrs. Lipsett. Carried.

The First President was Mrs. Aug Schmidt.

Vice Presidents were Mrs. W. Briese and Mrs. G. Keighran. Secretary — Miss Marg. Schmidt (Marg. Wehner) Treasurer — Mrs. T. Cross. The Membership fee was 1/- per annum.

Apologies for non attendance were received from Mesdames W. Schulz, G. Wagner and T. Funk. At the next meeting in November 1939, Mrs. Aug. Schmidt resigned as President and Mrs. W. Briese was elected President in her stead.

Branch membership for the first year was 65. Meetings were held on 2nd Thursday at 2 pm, and alternate months at 8 pm. Imagine keeping up with that! It must have all become too hard and from July 1941 meetings were the 2nd Tuesday of the month. When numbers declined the 8 pm time was recommenced with success.

The first function was a Euchre Party and Table Tennis. Charge being 1/6d and 1/-. Advertising was in the local paper and posters in prominent places in the town. 4 pounds 10/9 was made with 5/- expenses.

The Members were extremely busy making up pyjamas, flannels and draw sheets, etc. for the soldiers; and water bag covers were to be made with the left-over material from the pyjamas. Mrs. Aug. Schmidt was the "Cutter". In March 1942 it was realized that there was a need for "tropical pyjamas or material for making same". A continuous supply of knitted items was also on hand and were sent to the Red Cross Store in Mates, Albury.

In June 1942, 164 articles were packed and sent to the Red Cross Store consisting of: 2 draw sheets, 4 pillow slips, 5 pair slippers, 3 scarfs, 22 washers, 14 pair mittens, 6 pair long stockings, 1 pair socks, 4 long sleeve pullovers, 1 cardigan, 1 flannel, 2 dozen handkerchiefs, 13 flannelette shirts, 9 pair tropical pyjamas, 9 bed pockets, 4 dressing towels, 1 barber towel, 18 jug covers, 2 hot water bag covers, 6 cakes Lifebuoy soap, 7 packets cigarettes, 4 jelly crystals, 1 tin peaches, 1 bottle preserves, 1 parcel dried fruit, 1 tin talc, 1 junket tablets, 1 insect sprayer.

In the 1940's I know of a member who would ride their bike into town. In these times tyres and tubes were hard to get. A form had to be filled out to apply for new tyres and tubes. These forms would be handed to the gentleman in town who was the blacksmith, oxy-welder and make everything man! He would send the form away. In the meantime, with the tyres and tubes wearing out — haybands would be tied around the tyre to hold the tube in place and help prolong the life of the tyre and keep the tube in place — and hopefully hold out until the permission for the new tyre arrived and could be put on. No doubt this occurred in many other districts as well.



In 1985 Dorothy Keighran, Marge Wehner, Norma Schulz, Ann Smythe, Edna Funk, Ella Briese and Ella Salzke received their Long Service Certificates.

Paper drives were held in the early years. In 1941 300 weight of waste paper was deposited at the Albury Waste Paper Depot.

The Branch then commenced waste paper collections in 1978 until they were discontinued in July 1991. You will see some photos on display of members loading the bundles into vehicles.

Tennis Tournaments and Croquet games were other sources of fundraising. Entry fee was 1/- for tennis and 3d a putt for croquet. Afternoon tea charge of 6d. Proceeds were 13 pounds 19/6. Expenses of 5/-.

Our Branch in the early days never ever conducted Raffles, and this was replaced by a guessing competition. At one stage guessing the grains of wheat in a bottle. The Secretary was asked to take the grains and bottle to Mr. O'Connor to fill and seal. Mr. O'Connor being the local Jindera Constable!! Guessing the weight of fowls was another source, no doubt of laughter, and funds. 3d a guess. Profit on one occasion was 1 pound 10/-.

At the June meeting in 1941, a letter of resignation was received from a member (Miss Burdack) as a result of petrol rationing and it was decided to ask her to re-consider her decision. It appears she meant her word.

The Jindera Branch tried street stalls in Albury at the Dean Square, under the beautiful old palm trees. It was a roaring success — we were nearly mobbed for the first produce.

Members would go in and set up the tables (available from the old Civic Theatre for 1/- each) sell what was there and then wait for Mr. Wally Briese, who would always arrive late in the old Canardly Truck. He would go from farm to farm picking up cases of cakes, cream, butter, eggs (sometimes fresh mutton) vegetables, fruit and jam. Jam being a great seller, members made over 200 lb. of sugar into jam.

Mr. Briese's arrival was always eagerly awaited. There was always plenty of help to unload, and it would all be sold in no time.

One hot morning, one of the member's feet were "killing her", so while the rush was on, she slipped her shoes off. At the conclusion of the stall, she went to put her shoes back on, but alas, they had been sold! This happened to none other than Mrs. Alby Sawyer (Betty's mother).

Norma who joined the group in 1946 and Ester who joined the group in 1959 were amongst the branch members celebrating and commemorating the occasion.

Norma when pressed as to her charity work said it was just one of those things, fundamentally unwilling to take any personal credit for her individual achievements.

Ester also said she was proud of all the good work the group had done including many catering events which were very handy fund-raisers for Red Cross.

Ester said she enjoyed meeting people she may never have met and the terrific feeling of all working together for a common goal. Ester was especially happy and grateful for all the awards the

70 YEARS of JINDERA RED CROSS (Continued)

Catering has always been a big part of fundraising at the Jindera Branch. The Bolger Clearing Sale was one of the first big ventures raising 4 pound 10/7-.

Members then decided to further their catering activities ... in February 1946 the wedding of Cleaver Quast and Roma Schilg. This was a great success. From then on there was no stopping the Branch. They catered all around, even in Albury at the Pensioner Hall, Creek Street, and the Masonic Hall in Kiewa Street.

Unfortunately, Albury complained about the Branch's activities (probably because they were so successful) and it was then decided not to go over The Gap for any future catering.

Mesdames W. Briese as President, and G. Keighran as Secretary held these positions for 21 years. Only 3 more years Sheila!!

In the 1960's 2 members (Glenda and myself joined the ranks of the VAD's with regular training nights in home nursing and first aid and helping out at the Albury Blood Bank.

Two Cookery books were published with our tried and true recipes. The first one marked our 25th anniversary in 1964. 4 rose bushes were also planted at that time at the Hall. However, the book outlasted the roses! The second book marked our 40th anniversary in 1979.

In 1985 catering prices were set at:

Full wedding (no cake) — soup, main meal, dessert, coffee, slice, punch and savouries - \$8.50.

Full wedding (no cake, punch or savouries) - \$8.00.

Afternoon Tea - 4 quarters sandwich, 2 large pieces of cake, tea/coffee - \$2.50. Individual plates, 3 quarter sandwich, 1

piece cake, and biscuit tea/coffee - \$2.00.

The Red Cross Telecross service has been supported by members of our branch since it commenced in June 1991. Today, some of our members deliver Meals on Wheels and provide the Hands On service to elderly residents of Aged Care complexes.

After 70 years of - catering for clearing sales, weddings, wedding anniversaries, 21st's, fancy dress Christmas parties for children, bridal parades, football and tennis banquets, small school sports, election day stalls, street stalls, paper drives, knitting lots of "Trauma teddies" and collecting many thousands of stamps — our membership stands at 32.

Working out of very small primitive kitchen in the early days — wood stove, a copper for heating plum puddings and the making of that delicious milk coffee! *Can anyone remember that?*

Progressing then to an enlarged work area with an electric stove, double sink, microwave oven, and now we are actually cooking with gas!!

We look back over the past 70 years with great admiration of the early years, how members worked on, regardless, when times were very difficult with war time restrictions and rationing. We also remember those members who are no longer with us but whose untiring work for Red Cross can never be forgotten.

Our branch looks to the future of continuing the work of Red Cross. Keeping in mind and remembering always the seven principles of this wonderful organization

**Humanity, Impartiality, Neutrality, Independence,
Voluntary Service, Unity and Universality.**

Council has appointed Longford Civil for the construction of the Jindera Industrial Estate (Stage 1B) at a cost of \$232, 268.71 (excl GST).

It was agreed Council will continue to work with the Softwoods Working Group, in conjunction with Snowy Valley and Cootamundra-Gundagai Councils,

to develop partnerships for works on roads to benefit the softwoods industry. Council will make an ex gratia payment of \$10,319.41 to the Softwoods Working Group for assistance in preparing the Growing Local Economies funding applications.

The General Manager advised Council that the caretaker period commences four weeks before the local government elections on 4 September 2021.

The Holbrook Customer Service functions have successfully transitioned to the Holbrook Library. Thank you to the community for your support and assistance in the transition.

The museum has suffered as a result, with visitation numbers reduced. Lock-downs in Victoria reduce our numbers considerably, so we again face some very quiet weeks.

The recent increase in Covid cases in both states and the increase in restrictions has unfortunately led to the postponement of our Italian night, which was eagerly anticipated. We cannot set a new date for this event until the present situation eases.

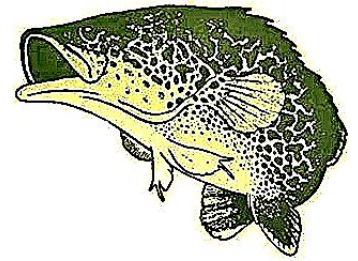

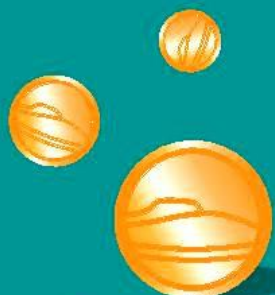
