

## IMPORTANT NEWS FROM THE JINDERA <u>OP SHOP</u>

The volunteers at the Jindera OP SHOP are pleased to be opening their door again to the community on the **3rd June, 2020**.

It has been a very difficult time for everyone, and, although operating under different rules and regulations, the Op-Shop Volunteers are sure that they can provide a safe service to everyone.

To achieve safety for everyone, there are now some procedures that all customers will have to adhere to until further notice. These procedures are not only for the protection of the community coming into the shop, but also for the volunteers at the Op-Shop and all the other staff working in the Jindera Greater Hume Shire building.

### The new procedures are:

- ★ NO DONATIONS TO BE LEFT AT THE SHOP UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE. If left at the shop these donations will have to go straight into land fill;
- ★ REDUCED OPENING TIMES 10.30am to 3pm for the next few months Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday (No Saturday);
- ★ FOR THE TIME BEING NO CHILDREN IN THE SHOP THE CHILDREN'S BOOKS AND TOY SECTION IS CLOSED;
- ★ BEFORE ENTERING THE SHOP, CUSTOMERS WILL BE REQUIRED TO USE THE SANITISING SPRAY PROVIDED (OR WEAR GLOVES);
- **\*** ONLY 5 CUSTOMERS AT A TIME, DUE TO THE SIZE OF THE OP-SHOP AND THE REQUIREMENT OF SOCIAL DISTANCING;
- ★ SHOPPING DURATION RESTRICTION DEPENDING ON HOW MANY PEOPLE MAY BE WAITING TO COME INTO THE SHOP, A TIME LIMIT ON SHOPPING MAY HAVE TO BE PUT IN PLACE (SAY 20 MINUTES PER CUSTOMER);
- \* THE WEARING OF MASKS IT MAY BE HELPFUL TO PROTECT ONESELF TO WEAR A MASK BUT NOT COMPULSORY; and
- \* MONEY FOR GOODS WE WILL BE TAKING CASH AS USUAL, BUT THE VOLUNTEER ON THE CASH REGISTER WILL BE WEARING GLOVES. WE HAVE NO "CARD SYSTEM", SO CASH IS ALL WE CAN TAKE.

Our thanks to everyone for supporting us as we try out our new procedures, and thanks also to the wonderful volunteers who have to work under these guidelines. All of the guidelines above will be reviewed again as restrictions are eased. Notices will be put outside the shop when the guidelines change and will be in the Jindera News.

We feel sure that we can continue to provide an adequate service and look forward to seeing everyone again.

> An example of how we help comes from the early part of the year, during the bush fires. Boxes and bags of good clothes and crockery were sent to Corryong and other drop off points for distribution to people affected by the fires. The most significant support was to an elderly couple who lost everything – home and all its contents, out buildings and machinery, tools, etc. We were able to supply them with many boxes of household goods and some furniture to get them started over. Again, just this week, five huge bags of clothing were sent to St. Mathews in Albury, when an emergency call went out to help the homeless.

#### Jindera Red Cross

The Jindera and TableTop combined Red Cross annual meeting, which was to be held on Tuesday, July 14<sup>th</sup> 2020, at Jindera, has been cancelled. All meetings of the Jindera Branch of the Red Cross will be postponed until further notice.

#### Information sent from State Branch:

Recently our President, Ross Pinney, let everyone know that State Red Cross would review <u>National Cabinet announcements on May</u> 8<sup>th</sup> to guide our advice to Red Cross branches on easing restrictions.

We have decided to **continue current working arrangements until 30 June**. This includes avoiding faceto-face meetings and events, and the continuation of work from home arrangements.

We will be preparing our workplaces and sites for safe return, and will give you more information about



how we are doing this shortly. We will also be ready to adjust to local circumstances and needs.

The reasons and considerations that go with these decisions are:

- We all need to remain vigilant. The pandemic is not over and a second wave of infections is a real risk;
- As restrictions are eased, we will enact our changes three weeks after the lifting of restrictions comes into effect. We will review these arrangements regularly and if stronger restrictions return, we will respond using our pandemic plan and business continuity plans; and
- We recommend that if you are at greater risk of serious illness with COVID-19, you consider carefully whether you will return to member and volunteer activities, or continue to remain isolated.



## Greater Hume Council Offices reopen Monday 25 May

Greater Hume Council Offices at Culcairn, Henty, Holbrook and Jindera will reopen Monday 25 May.

General Manager Steven Pinnuck commented that the reopening of Council Offices is a stepped process to resume face to face access to Council services, following the reopening of playgrounds, skate parks and all public toilets on Friday 15 May.

While Council Offices are reopening on Monday, Mr Pinnuck encouraged residents where possible to use electronic methods to communicate with Council by:



- and payment of rates can be made by using the online payment system, payment by Visa or Mastercard by phoning <u>1300 730 839</u> or Bpay.

Council also wishes to advise, in light of COVID-19, that public access computers will not be available at the Culcairn, Henty and Jindera offices until further notice.

In line with the NSW Government's recent announcement, it is expected that Council libraries will reopen on Monday 1 June and updates will be provided when further information on any restrictions imposed by the State Government are known.

COVID-19 restrictions have changed the way Council can run its monthly meeting. The April meeting was conducted with 9 councillors and some staff participating via Zoom, and only four officers present in the meeting room, to comply with social distance measures.

You can view the recording of the meeting at <u>https://</u> <u>bit.ly/35uKFxX</u>. The meeting was not open to the public but one statement for the public forum was read out.

#### Business dealt with at the meeting included:

A modified development consent was issued for a house extension, new unit and subdivision in Dight Street, Jindera.

Approval was granted for a boundary adjustment to a two lot subdivision on Halford Drive Holbrook.

Council also approved a modification to operating hours at the Bald Hill Quarry, permitting an expansion of on-site work hours by 1 hour per weekday, and 1 additional hour on Saturdays.

Council received a report on the proposed Jindera Solar Farm development. Council resolved to submit a response which indicates that the proposed modified development as reported in the Submission to the Environmental Impact Statement, to some extent addresses the concerns of Council, but that Council still has concerns regarding NSW Rural Fire Service and the Protection of the Environment Operations Act 1997. Further Council's response will include those issues not satisfactorily addressed as

•Continuing concern at the loss of high quality agricultural land, and

•The proponents have not provided any evidence that the devaluation of surrounding land will not occur.

Council also received a report on the proposed Walla Walla Solar Farm development. Council resolved to submit a response which indicates that the proposed modified development as reported in the Submission to the Environmental Impact Statement, to some extent addresses the concerns of Council, but that Council still has concerns. Council will raise concerns about being the Appropriate Regulatory Authority under the Protection of the Environment Operations Act 1997. Further Council's response will include those issues not satisfactorily addressed as

•Impact of the heat island effect

•Continuing concern at the loss of high quality agricultural land and question how the assessment of the value of agricultural land was undertaken

•Abatement of the dust nuisance, particularly in relation to the nearby function centre

•Reduced amenity of nearby residents

1In response to the COVID-19 Coronavirus pandemic, Council resolved to assist ratepayers, businesses and residents by adopting the following support measures:

1. Waiving interest on outstanding rates and charges for the

period 1 April 2020 to 30 June 2020.

2.from 1 April to 30 June 2020 rent on commercial premises impacted by the COVID -19 pandemic be reduced by 50% where the business continues to trade in a limited capacity and 100% where the business temporarily ceases to trade.

3.refer to the Budget Workshop the freezing of water, sewerage and waste collection charges.

4.amend the Local Purchase Preference Policy to provide a minimum 10% weighting for local businesses to 31 December 2020.

5.Further, that reports on the impact of COVID-19 be submitted to each monthly meeting of Council.

In response to the COVID-19 situation, demand for Council's childcare services have been dramatically impacted. Responding to the crisis, Council officers have been actively lobbying government to raise the issue of the funding shortfall in childcare revenue.

In response the NSW Government has agreed to fund the shortfall in revenue, and Council agreed to monitor funding options for Local Government childcare services and, if required, call on the Minister for Education, Hon Dan Tehan MP and Member for Farrer, Hon Sussan Ley MP for the immediate introduction of further relief measures for local councils who provide critical childcare services to their communities.

Council will take over the running of the Walbundrie Hall, as unfortunately membership to the Hall Committee has waned.

Council approved two additional works projects for the current year, being:

1.\$15,000 – St Joseph's School - extension of parking bay in Blair Street to be funded from savings from the Creek Street footpath at Jindera

2.\$26,000 – Frampton Court - construction of new footpath from Kala Court Units to Library footpath to be funded from the Kala Court reserve.

Due to COVID-19 pandemic, a report on interruptions to Council services was tabled. Closures include the Visitor Information Centre, Customer Service Centres to the public (but phone, email, etc. remain operational), libraries, caravan parks, playgrounds, skate parks, HMAS Otway. The free waste day has been postponed, all public halls, and selected public toilets are also closed.

Key staff have been segregated, and a range of measures undertaken to minimise impact to essential services such as water and waste water, building inspections and engineering.

An extraordinary meeting will be held on 6 May to adopt the Delivery Program and Operational Plan (Budget) for 2020/2021 operations.



#### St John's Masterplan

COVID-19 restrictions have changed the way Council can run its monthly meeting. The May meeting was conducted with seven councillors and some staff participating via Zoom, two councillors and four officers participated in the meeting room, to comply with social distance measures.

#### Business dealt with at the meeting included:

Council resolved to publicly exhibit a new draft policy covering the parameters to guide Council in the assessment of applications for mobile food vending activities on Council controlled land.

In response to a review of operations for the Riverina Joint Organisation and Riverina Eastern Regional Organisation of Councils, Council agreed to provide 'in principle' support to create a new organisation structured as a company limited by guarantee with the proviso that Greater Hume Council await the announcement of funding arrangements for the COVID-19 Local Government Stimulus Package.

Council received a report on the increase to the Emergency Services Levy (ESL) payable by Council. Council resolved to endorse recent correspondence forwarded to Justin Clancy, MP Member for Albury wherein Greater Hume Council requested a review of the unsustainable increases in the cost of the ESL to councils. Council further resolved for the Mayor and senior officers to meet with Mr Clancy to discuss the severe budget crisis that further increases to the levy will impose on Council and its ratepayers.

Councillors received a budget report updating the financial position of Council as at 31 March 2020. The budget review has revealed that a cash deficit is projected to be \$146,789, due primarily to the impact of COVID-19 impacting a range of services and the impact of record low interest rates on Council's investment returns.

Council formally acknowledged the generous contribution of all volunteers across the council area, as part of National Volunteer Week 2020. It is estimated that there are over 400 clubs, community groups, committees, events and service groups across the shire. Council thanks all volunteers, who are the vital link for important community work to be carried out right across the shire.

Council resolved to purchase a second hand road stabiliser, following thorough investigation, test and trial of a suitable second-hand machine. The investment will provide efficiencies in road pavement repairs and will be uti-

lised in construction, resheeting of gravel roads and major patching on sealed roads. In this instance the ownership of such a machine, rather than usual hire, will provide cost effective benefits to council's road maintenance budget.

Council accepted tenders for new rail level crossing works linking the Olympic Highway to the GrainCorp facility in Henty West. A tender was approved for \$1,003,657 (ex GST) for rail signalling and associated work and another tender was approved for \$668,682 (ex GST) for the track and civil construction work. This will be the largest road/rail infrastructure project undertaken to date in Greater Hume, with the total project funding of \$3.1 M by NSW Government, \$3.6 M funded by the Australian Government and Greater Hume \$500,000.

Council approved the allocation of grant funding totalling \$106,424 to construct underground drainage, and seal a new carpark at the Woomargama Hall including underground drainage at the Woomargama Hall, with remaining funds of \$43,981 to undertake landscaping and beautification in front of the hall and surrounding area at Woomargama.

The quarterly report of business activities for the Council highlighted that the period has been a challenge due to firstly the Green Valley Fire event and then the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite this, Council has continued to progress many operational projects during the period. One key highlight was the commencement of operations of Greater Hume Children Services at Holbrook in January. A comprehensive listing of actions completed year to date are detailed in the Council agenda paper.

A comprehensive report was tabled in relation to industrial and residential land projects undertaken to date in the shire. Council's view is that in the absence of private developers, it is particularly important that Council acts as a developer of residential and industrial land in all areas of the shire, excluding Jindera. In the Jindera area, where there is a number of private residential land developments, Council concentrates on the development of industrial land only in that location.

Council also resolved to make submission to the NSW Independent Bushfire Inquiry, and a copy of that report is available for viewing on the Council's Meetings tab at greaterhume.nsw.gov.au

Council accepted an offer to purchase 7,300 sqm at the Holbrook Industrial Park which will trigger a further subdivision of land in the precinct.

Additional paving has been undertaken and works completed in preparation for the new 'working machines' shed, construction of which will start soon. Considerable work is being undertaken on our photographic collection and if you have any photographs from your family or Jindera's history, please be in touch. We can scan these photographs and return them to you and you will know they will not be lost to the town's history. We have much to celebrate as we have a fabulous facility and the opportunity to expand and develop.

During this time, we have also been looking through many of our archives and items in storage. We found an interesting volume of stories from local identities; we are not sure of when this was done, who by or why but they are all titled *My Life* or something similar. I thought it might be interesting to transcribe some of these, so you can share in these interesting stories. Some are quite long so they might have to be done in segments. We hope you enjoy this look into our past.

#### In My Day - author unknown


In my day, babies were born in this village often at home, with only one nurse or midwife in attendance. Only on rare occasions, with a difficult birth, was a doctor called in. It was survival of the fittest.

Going to school, usually at the age of seven, involved walking long distances from surrounding farms. Very few children had a bicycle or a pony to ride. If you did have a pony, a small paddock adjoining the school was available to graze the pony during the day. Most schools in the area only had one teacher for the 35 - 40 children attending.

Most children left school at the age of 13 or 14. No high schools were available in the country and certainly no bus service. Boys would work on their family farms or help on neighbours' farms. Girls would help with the milking of the cows, feeding the poultry and general household duties which were more time consuming without mechanised items to help. When the boys turned 17 or 18, they often sought work at larger farms or orchards. For picking fruit the wages were \$2 per week; for harder work on farms, such as hay carting, bag sewing, chaff cutting you could earn \$6 per week with meals supplied and a bed to sleep in.

In my day the women would help their husbands out in the paddocks with various jobs, such as turning the winnower, which was a machine that would separate the chaff from the grain, be it wheat, oats or barley. The grain was harvested with a stripper, a machine consisting of a large box into which the grain was stored until full. A patch of ground was chipped clean at the end of the paddock and the grain tipped onto this patch ready for the windrowing. The chaff separated from the grain was called cockychaff, this was stored in a shed on the farm and used as cattle feed during the winter months. To make the cockychaff more nourishing it was mixed with molasses. Hay was cut with a mower or a reaper and binder which would tie the hay into sheaves. These would then be stood up into stooks to dry before being carted to a select place on the farm to be built into haystacks. To build a good weather resisting haystack required a certain amount of skill.

In my day, horses were employed to do the work connected with stripping, ploughing, hay carting and numerous other jobs on the farm. Most farms had 10 or more horses, usually Clydesdales, and these were bred on the farms. Horses were fed on chaff, mixed with oats or bran; a good horse would receive an extra scoop of grain. 

## New Jindera Land Use Planning Strategy



Greater Hume Council has identified that constraints in the town of Jindera, such as flooding, biodiversity and access to existing infrastructure, are likely to prevent opportunities for further residential development in the short term.

## A land use strategy for Jindera is required to give Council land use planning confidence in identifying land for future residential development.

To support Council in undertaking the land use strategy, NSW Department of Planning Industry and Environment has engaged local planning consultant Habitat Planning to undertake the required land use strategy.

The strategy will make the following investigations:

- Analyse residential subdivision and housing development trends together with population projections.
- Analyse the adequacy of urban residential land supply and assess the demand for residential land.
- Identify environmental and physical constraints to future residential development in Jindera.
- Provide a guide to Council on where residential housing growth and development should occur by identifying potential sites for rezoning including the appropriate future zone.
- Develop a profile of the potential biodiversity credit obligation (loss) likely to be generated by certain residential planning proposals.
- Identify ecological assets in the Greater Hume local government area that have the potential to yield biodiversity credits sufficient to offset the credit obligation associated with the nominated residential planning proposals.
- Assess the potential for a future planning proposal to rezone land for residential development that will be supported by the strategy to be biodiversity certified according to Part 8 of the Biodiversity Conservation Act.
- In conjunction with Council, identify the most efficient way to integrate infrastructure and services and facilities into potential new residential areas in Jindera.
- Provide guidance to Council on components of residential development such as residential design, future need for open space including links and networks to other open space, integration of residential land use with other major land uses, housing diversity and urban consolidation.

## Due to COVID-19 restrictions Council is encouraging interested parties who may wish to contribute to the development of the land use strategy to directly contact Habitat Planning,

Further consultation will be undertaken by Council and the Department on completion of a draft of the strategy mid 2020.

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


Our restricted May Fishing Big News... Comp has been done and dusted and many anglers ventured out.
