\$2.2 BILLION BOOST TO ROAD SAFETY

The Morrison Government will deliver an additional \$2.2 billion in road safety funding to save lives on our roads.

Prime Minister Scott Morrison said this funding boost is about getting parents, kids, and workers home more safely.

"Keeping Australians safe is my Government's number one priority.

"When you get in your car to drive home you don't usually think about it being dangerous. The truth is fatal road accidents are far too common.

"More than a thousand Australians died on our roads last year. That's devastating.

"These are mums who didn't make it home from work, or children that didn't make it to school.

"These programs mean local councils decide where the money should be spent. They are in the best position to identify black spots and problem areas.

"This is why a strong economy is so important. It allows us to invest in safer roads that save lives."

Today's announcement locks in:

- An additional \$1.1 billion in funding for local governments under the Roads to Recovery program, which allows
 investment in road safety infrastructure in regional Australia.
- An extra \$550 million for the successful Black Spot Program, which targets known high-risk locations and reduces serious crashes by 30 per cent, on average.
- A further \$571.1 million to improve the safety and efficiency of heavy vehicle operations through the Bridges Renewal Program, Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program and Heavy Vehicle Safety Initiatives (HVSI).

Deputy Prime Minister, Nationals' Leader and Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development Michael McCormack said a new Office of Road Safety will also be established.

"The Office of Road Safety will provide a national point for collaboration and leadership on key road safety priorities, working closely with states, territories, local government, and key road safety stakeholders," Mr McCormack said.

"Safer roads save lives. They also create jobs in construction and boost productivity.

"The Liberals and Nationals are building safer roads and bridges. This means safer heavy vehicle operations, which is critical to our goal of reducing road trauma on the nation's roads.

"New funding to the HVSI will build on the other 30 projects delivered through the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator to date.

"2018 saw 81 fewer deaths nationwide compared to 2017, but there is no room for complacency. We must push ahead with practical measures and infrastructure funding to drive road deaths towards zero.

"These measures will also include a new \$12 million Road Safety Innovation Fund to support research and development in priority areas such as regional road safety, driver distraction from mobile devices, protecting vulnerable road users and reducing drug driving."

Treasurer Josh Frydenberg said safety on our roads was a key concern for every member of the community and that the public would benefit greatly from this important investment.

"Road widening, new overtaking lanes and intersection improvements are all important steps we can take to make our roads safer."

"As a Government we are able to deliver important investments like our \$2.2 billon Road Safety Package as a result of our strong economic management."

The Government is committed to working in a bipartisan spirit to progress the 12 recommendations made by the National Road Safety Strategy Inquiry in September 2018.

The additional funding announced today builds on the Australian Government's current investment of around \$2.6 billion in safety-enhancing projects, bringing the total investment to \$3.1 billion per year over the period 2019–20 to 2022–23.


LOCALITY PLAN



FY21 Budgetary estimate for Bulk LED Upgrade - Revised Offer after new funding support

I am writing to you to provide an updated budgetary estimate for a bulk LED upgrade in FY21 including new funding support being provided by the NSW Government, and to provide a clearer view on the business case for LED's whilst providing an estimate on the cost of smart controllers.

The new funding provided by the NSW Government supports Essential Energy's strategy to accelerate deployment of LED's, further reducing Councils' energy bills and facilitating savings that can be used for other local government critical services. For reference this letter is provided as Attachment 1.

The business case for LED upgrade provides clear benefit to all Councils, with a cost analysis provided below at Table 1 for both a full Council contribution upfront and funded by Essential Energy with capital recovery via regulated tariffs.

We have also provided estimated pricing for smart controllers in Table 2 based on expected pricing from the procurement activity. Smart Controllers, when added to an LED luminaire will enable monitoring, control, and further dimming. For the purposes of budgeting we believe the estimated value used is sufficient to provide for their installation.

Please note that for smart controllers only a cost has been provided at this time, without benefits. Benefits for Essential Energy are currently being assessed and will contribute to the business case for smart controllers, however there are key decisions for Council to make on both dimming of lights at off peak times and the value to Council of implementing 'smart cities' applications. Information into the benefits case and considerations for Council is provided in Attachment 2.

As procurement progresses and information can be made available we will write to all Councils with smart controller pricing to enable Council to make an informed decision.

Cost Estimate

Please note that some exclusions may apply to offer pricing where additional works beyond a luminaire replacement is required – for example where modifications are required to support structures. As planning commences, Council may seek to vary from the standard LED deployment, including increasing lighting levels or retaining aesthetics by choosing decorative style LED luminaires.

Table 2 below provides estimate pricing to co-deploy smart controllers with an LED luminaire.

The cost estimate is based on:

- Installation of a smart controller and associated equipment as a capital cost co deployed with an LED luminaire, plus integration and commissioning costs.
- Additional costs may apply if a deployed separately.
- Additional costs may apply where Council has a high existing LED inventory from an earlier rollout.

Attachment 1 - Letter to Councils re DPIE funding support



Dear Mayor/General Manager,

NSW Government and Essential Energy -- turning on LED lighting for rural and regional NSW

Over the past 18 months, Essential Energy has worked closely with various stakeholder groups, including the Southern Lights Group and several Joint Organisations to deliver better public lighting outcomes for regional NSW.

We are excited to advise that several key activities including our submission to the Australian Energy Regulator (AER) which provided for a reduction in charges by an average of 35 per cent, and the procurement of a full range of more efficient LEO luminaires support our new strategy to deliver lower public lighting costs for the 85 Councils that Essential Energy serves by realising a 100 per cent LEO lighting network.

The business case for upgrading to LED technology is clear, significantly reducing maintenance costs and increasing energy cost savings for Councils, whilst removing mercury used in existing older technology lamps and lowering energy consumption which reduces greenhouse emissions into the environment.

We recognise however that for many Councils the remaining high residual value of recently installed luminaires was a significant financial barrier. For these assets, the longer return on investment created risk of a fragmented deployment of LEDs, which would delay both the financial and environmental benefits LED technology delivers.

In order to support Councils and help remove this final barrier, Essential Energy, with the support of the NSW State Government, is introducing two new sources of support funding to enable 100 per cent deployment of LED technology across the Essential Energy network.

- The NSW Government is partnering with Essential Energy to provide up to \$3.13m of funding support to pay out the high residual value of around 10,600 existing luminaires, accelerating the transition to 100 per cent LED uptake.
 - This funding supports Essential Energy's goal to become Australia's first 100 per cent LED network, which will further reduce Councils' energy bills and facilitate savings that can be used for other local government critical services.
- The NSW Energy Savings Scheme (ESS) incentivises LEO upgrade through the creation of Energy Saving Certificates (ESCs) for each MWH of energy saved, thus offsetting the cost of upgrade.

These two new initiatives will mean all 85 Councils in regional NSW will receive savings on the upgrade to LED technology during both planned upgrade programs, and where an LED upgrade occurs due to a spot failure from December 2019.

Please note that Councils due for bulk upgrade to LED in FY21 received an estimate in late November for budgetary purposes. As a result of these changes a new estimate will be provided inclusive of the support funding by early January 2020 to your nominated Council representative.

The information provided in this letter is provided under embargo for the benefit of Councils, and we ask that you please do not share with the media prior to a formal Ministerial announcement in early 2020.

Procurement Update



Technical assessments are underway – Next Energy are part of the technical evaluation panel assisting Essential Energy



There is a lot of information to consider – currently holding 3+ evaluation sessions per week plus high volume of individual hours undertaking assessment of responses.



Many submissions required more supporting information - first round of clarifications has been sent to suppliers.



Current timeframe is likely to be impacted. This is due to some early evaluation delays (bushfire impacting availability) and complexity of responses.



It is still expected that Smart Controllers will be available for co-deployment commencing early FY21.


Commercial modelling of business benefits

There are benefits to both Essential Energy and Councils from deployment of Smart Controllers.

For Essential Energy:

- Direct savings on public lighting costs night patrols
- Maintenance optimisation from monitoring taking into consideration minimum service standards
- Potential for simplified management from 100% deployment
- Network visibility additional visibility and integration automation.
- Essential Energy is currently working on quantifying these benefits to contribute to the business case.
- There will be certain costs incurred to realise some of these benefits (e.g. system integrations)







Commercial modelling of business benefits

For Councils:

- <u>Dimming at night</u> Councils as the Road Authority are responsible for the decision to dim lighting.
 Reduced energy usage is a direct saving to offset the cost of deployment.
 - Councils need to commence socialising both internally and within the community to quantify acceptance of dimmed lighting levels
 - Essential Energy will support Council with technical information – including product performance and proposed dimming profiles.
 - Essential Energy will set up test sites in first deployment areas – expected in Bathurst.
 This will enable Councils to 'see what it looks like' and gauge community acceptance, helping Council to more confidently quantify savings within the business case.





Commercial modelling of business benefits

For Councils:

- Smart city application benefits Councils need to consider the financial and social benefits of other Smart City applications that are enabled by the Smart Streetlighting Communications network.
 - The network will provide low cost connectivity for other sensors, creating opportunity for remote monitoring, reduced inspections, and remote control of assets.
 - Smart City technology is progressing rapidly, with growing competition reducing costs,



- Revenue opportunities The network will enable 3rd party customers to connect other devices also. Whilst
 this may be an opportunity for additional revenue, at this time our recommendation is to exclude this from
 the benefit assessment as:
 - The tender is still being assessed, with various ownership and operation models proposed. The best




