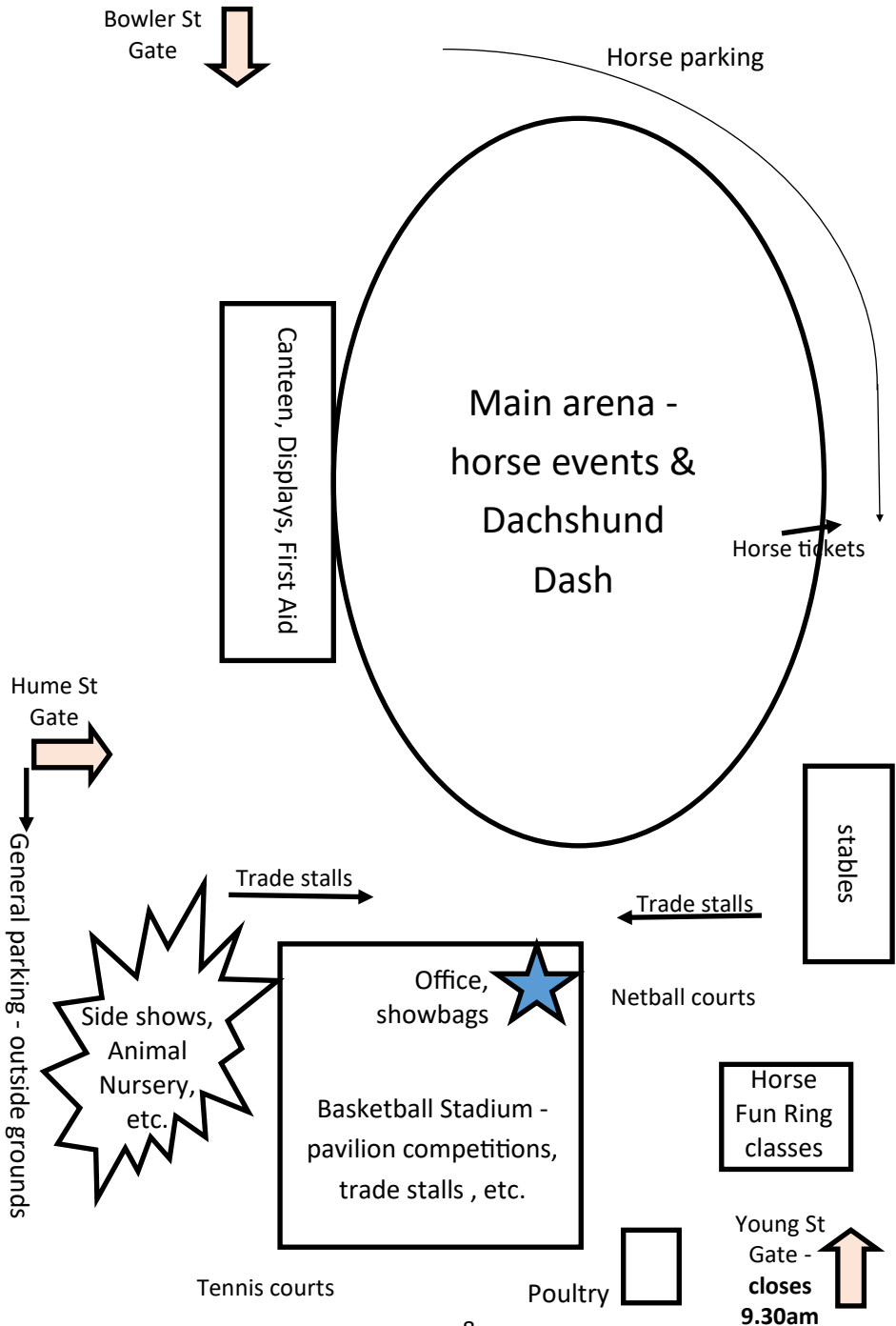

SYDNEY ROYAL AGSHOWS YOUNG WOMAN COMPETITION

The Competition aims to find a young female ambassador for rural NSW and the agricultural show movement. The winning Young Woman of each local Show Society retains her title until the next year's Show. Her role involves official and informal duties which may include opening a Show, public speaking throughout the year and presenting prizes for winners in agricultural events.

- ◆ The Competition is open to those who are permanent residents of Australia.
- ◆ Entrants must be women aged from 18 years to under 25 years as at 1st May in the year of the State Final.
- ◆ Entrants must reside, be educated, or work within New South Wales for at least three months prior to their local Agshows Young Woman Competition to qualify to compete within the State.
- ◆ Only candidates nominated by an Agricultural Show Society are eligible for Zone and State Final judging.
- ◆ Previous entrants in the Agshows Young Woman Competition are eligible to enter however they are not to have been one of the 1st, 2nd or 3rd placegetters in a previous State Final.
- ◆ The following individuals are not eligible to enter the Agshows Young Woman Competition: a. Staff, Directors and Councillors of the Royal Agricultural Society of NSW ("RAS"). b. The daughters of the Staff, Directors and Councillors of the RAS. c. Current Rural Achiever applicants for the 2025 Sydney Royal Show.
- ◆ Winning entrants who are employed or engaged in full time studies will be required to obtain a leave of absence to attend Zone and State Final Judging.
- ◆ The winning Agshows' Young Woman is requested, where possible, to represent the RAS, ASC and their local Show Society at Agricultural Shows.

Judging criteria includes: Personality, Confidence, Ambitions & Goals, General Knowledge (local, Australian and international), Rural Knowledge (general, local, Show), Personal Presentation (style, grooming, deportment), Volunteer/Community Participation, Presentation Ceremony Interview.

Please note that you will need to attend an interview during the day, the judging lunch and the evening presentation at which you will be required to address the audience. You will be judged on all of the latter and therefore it is essential that you attend each of these segments of the Zone Final.

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REGULATIONS

No tents, booths, hawkers or others will be allowed on the ground without the special permission of the Show Society Secretary. All exhibits must be bona-fide property of the exhibitor (except where otherwise stated). In all classes and sections, exhibitors may be called up to sign a declaration if deemed necessary.

Exhibitors of livestock will be required to furnish the full particulars as to age and pedigree of such exhibit, also to breeder's name (in the case of cattle) and such other information as the committee may demand. The Committee reserves themselves the right to disqualify any exhibit improperly entered or regarding which any false statement has been made.

Proved wilful misrepresentations of exhibits will not merely forfeit the prize, but render the exhibitor liable to be disqualified from exhibiting at future Shows of the Association. The onus of proof of the bona-fide of the exhibit will rest with the exhibitor. All exhibitors are to place their exhibits in the place allocated to them by the Committee. All exhibits are to be on the ground by the time and day specified in the schedule.

The Committee will give every possible facility to exhibitors and every care will be taken, but no responsibility will be incurred by the Show Society as to loss or damage of exhibits. Prizes must be fixed to exhibits and stewards will affix the exhibitors' names to the winning exhibits after the judges have given their decision. For any exhibit being sold, the buyer and seller shall report same to the Show Society Secretary, and the seller shall pay a commission of 5% on gross profits.

Protests, with \$50.00 deposit, must be lodged with the Show Society Secretary within 24 hours of the declaration of the awards, to be dealt with by the Committee and if the Committee finds that the protest is frivolous, the deposit may be forfeited.

Work done by the School Children must be authenticated by a school teacher, or another responsible person, stating the age of the child. Special entries will be received if not in the Prize List, and space will be reserved if due notice is received by the Show Society Secretary.

Certificates and Entry Forms and all particulars will be supplied on application to the Show Society Secretary.

All complaints are to be directed to the Show Society Secretary.

The Holbrook Sheep and Wool Fair Committee is affiliated with the Holbrook Show Society but is financially independent of it.

NOTICES: Any person found guilty of improper practice and disqualified for any period, shall not be eligible to exhibit or compete at any Society Show during the period of disqualification. Any appeal must be lodged with the Show Society Secretary within seven (7) days.

Any person defaulting in their payment of entry fees, etc., shall not be eligible to exhibit or compete at any Society Show affiliated with the Association until all moneys owing have been paid to the Society concerned.

THE AGSHOWSNSW / RAS RICH FRUIT CAKE COMPETITION

The following recipe is compulsory for all entrants.
Prizemoney is sponsored by AgShowsNSW

INGREDIENTS:

250g sultanas	1/3 cup sherry or brandy
250g chopped raisins	250g plain flour
250g currants	60g self-raising flour
125g chopped mixed peel	¼ teaspoon grated nutmeg
90g chopped red glace cherries	½ teaspoon ground ginger
90g chopped blanched almonds	½ teaspoon ground cloves
250g butter	250g soft brown sugar
4 large eggs.	½ teaspoon almond essence
½ teaspoon vanilla essence	
½ teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind	

RECOMMENDED METHOD:

Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy.

Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.

Sift together the flours and spices.

Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences.

Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after, each addition, then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.

Place the mixture into a prepared **square 20cm x 20cm (8" x 8") tin** and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½ - 4 hours.

Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Note: To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 4-6 pieces and almonds crosswise into 3-4 pieces.

Judge Note: The height of the cake should not exceed 5.7cm (57mm)

The NSW Rich Fruit Cake Competition is conducted to seek excellence in the preparation, cooking and presentation of a rich fruit cake and to promote Australian produce.

The winner at the Holbrook Show will receive a **cash prize of \$25** and will be required to bake a second "Rich Fruit Cake" in order to compete at the Riverina Group Final in Griffith in February 2025.

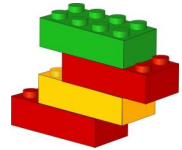

4. A sample of the yarn, fabric or fibre with label must be attached to each item making up the exhibit. If a label is not available such as in the case of a hand spun or felted item, a handwritten label with relevant details and sample will suffice."
5. An exhibit in this competition may consist of the work of one individual or a group of individuals, or an organization.
6. All three article/garments must have been completed within the 12 months prior to the local show and made by the exhibitor/s.
7. An exhibit having won at a local show may be exhibited (the same three article/garments) at the Group Final. The winning exhibit at the Group Final is then eligible to compete in the State Final.
8. An exhibit is only eligible to represent one Society at Group level and one Group at State level.
9. An exhibit (article/garment) that has previously competed at Group level is not eligible to compete again.
10. If this class is not scheduled or attracts no entries at a local show, the Chief Pavilion Steward in consultation with the appropriate Pavilion Section Judges, may select three suitable individual exhibits and, with the exhibitor's permission, enter them in the Group judging as an exhibit representing the particular Society concerned.
11. It is the responsibility of the Group Secretary and winner to co-ordinate the transfer of the winning entry to the ASC Office in Sydney for the State judging.
12. Recommendation: State Final garments are to include a photo of the garment being worn (where possible and applicable).

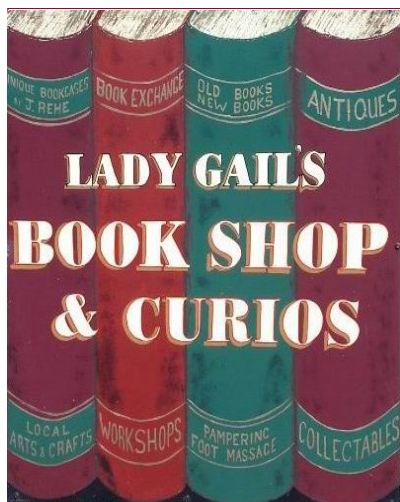

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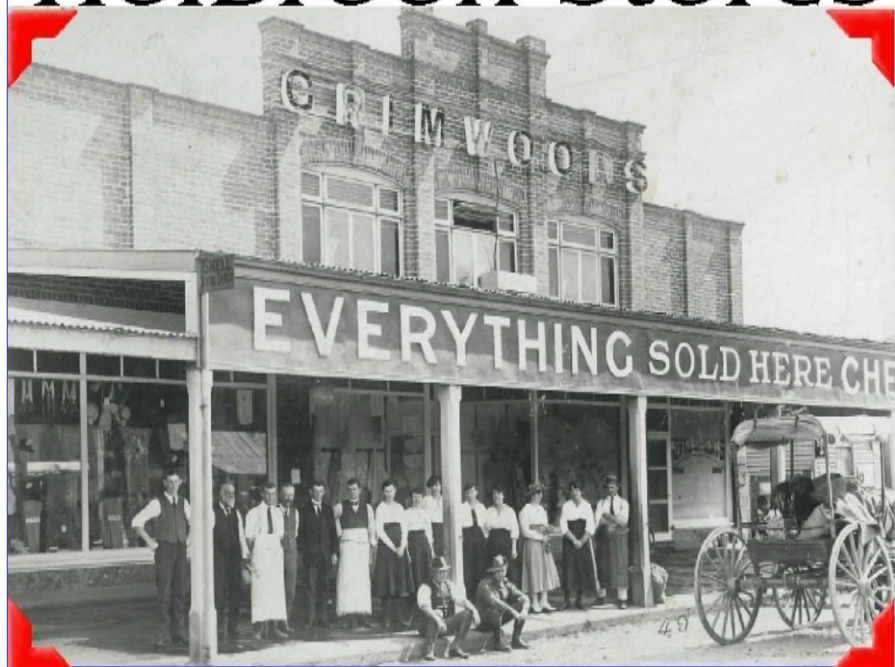
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
